Caddo Parish Louisiana in the Confederacy

These records are taken from the files of George L WOODWARD, a member of LeRoy STAFFORD Camp No.3, also a member of Shreveport Grays. A native of Caddo parish, born 1843, died 11 October 1930.

It is very difficult to disassociate Shreveport from Caddo in the matter of troops furnished to the Confederate Army, since a large proportion of the boys came from the country.

1. The first company to go was the Shreveport Grays, Capt. BEARD (killed at Mansfield) about 146 men. This was a part of DREUX' Batln. La. Vol. Infy. and served at Pensacola, Fla and in Virginia. This company was said to have furnished more officers, from Lieutenant to Brigadier General, than any company that left Louisiana. Mustered in service April 20th, 1861.
2. The Caddo Rifles, Capt. SHIVER, was about 140 strong, and became Co. A, 1st La. Vol. Infry.
3. Within a day or two the Greenwood Guards, Capt. Wm. FLOURNOY, with over 120 men, left and became Co. H 2nd La. Vol. Infry.

These three companies were a part of the 2nd La. Infry. Brigade, 1st Division, 2nd Corps (JACKSON's) Army of North Va. The Brigade was first commanded by Gen. STARKE, killed at Sharpsburg, Md, Gen. NICHOLS, disabled at Chancellorsville, and Gen. STAFFORD, killed in the Wilderness, Va. More than half the time Col. Jesse WILLIAMS, 2nd La. Regt. commanded the Brigade. He was also kill in the Wilderness. Capt. A. BOARMAN was Adjutant General of the Brigade.

4. The Shreveport Rangers went next, Capt. J B GILMON commanding, and was attached to the 3rd La. Vol. Infry. They served in Mo and east of the Mississippi River.
5. Afterwards the Shreveport Rebels went, Capt. Henry HUNSICKER commanding. Cannot recall their regiment.
6. Landrum Guards, Capt. Tom SHARP, 17th La. Vol. Infry.
7. Caddo Confederates, Capt. Geo. TUCKER, afterwards commanded by Capt. T C LEWIS. Co. F 27th La Infry. Vol.
8. Capt. Wm. ROBSON commanded a company from Caddo, a part of the 25th La. Vol. Infry.
9. The Caddo Fincibles, Capt. R H LINDSEY, afterwards commanded by Capt. Chauncey FORD, 16th La. Infry.
10. Another company was attached to the 19th La. Vol. Infry. I think its first Captain was W P WINANS, killed at Missionary Ridge. Maj. Camp FLOURNOY also commanded this company.
11. Caddo Lake Boys, Capt JETER, 17th La. Infry. Capt SPEARMAN also commanded this company. B H BICKHAM, late commander of Camp #3 (Gen. LeRoy STAFFORD) was 1 lieut. of this company.
12. The 11th Batln. La. Vol. Infry. must have had a company from Caddo as Fred H LEONARD was of this Battalion. Col. J H BEARD was its first commander. Afterwards a part of

Crescent Regt.

13. There was first a cavalry L M NUTT's company, afterwards commanded by Capt. Rufus SEWELL.

14 & 15. In Maj. W B DENSON's Squadron, first company commanded by Capt. Wm J SCOTT, second company by Capt.

HECOX. DENSON became Lt. Col. and the companies A and B 6th La. Cavalry, Col Wm. HARRISON.

At Arkansas Post many of these three companies were captured. On being exchanged, those captured were made into a company of Scouts, commanded by Capt. L M NUTT, and kept east of the Miss. River in Gen. BRAGG's and JOHNSTON's army

16. There was also a cavalry company of steamboat men, most of them residents of Caddo at enlistment. They served along the Mississippi River and Red River, around Natchez and below Alexandria. Cannot recall the captain.

We are told that Caddo had only 1153 voters in 1860. She has to her credit over 1500 Confederate troops, practically all volunteers.

Caddo's sons fought on nearly every field, from Gettysburg to Mansfield, from Oak Hills to Bentonville. No better troops that Caddo's boys were ever on any battlefield, everywhere honoring Louisiana, Caddo and themselves.

The Shreveport Grays

"The Shreveport Grays was part of the Louisiana State Guard and had been for 2 years when the state seceded; well armed & well drilled, first organized with 70 or 75 men. The first command & non-commissioned officers (all elected) were:

About the first of April the company met at the armory of the city & by unanimous vote requested Captain BEARD to tender our services to the Governor. On the 13th of April we left for New Orleans & had numerous additions to the company of young men from the country, Keichie & Mansfield. It looked nearly all of the city assembled on the levee to see the braves off & quite a number of those not members of the company there made the trip with the company to New Orleans, Governor MOORE & wife from Alexandria, also. The company reached New Orleans on the evening of the 17th, was quartered at Jackson Barracks. Enrolled several new members while there, was mustered in to Confederate Service for 12 months by Adjutant General MOUTON on the 19th. 138 strong, rank & file left that evening for Pensacola via Mobile. The first day out from Shreveport B L HODGES was elected Junion Second Lieutenant.

The Orleans Cadets, Crescent Rifles, Louisiana Guards Co A & Great Guards had preceded the Shreveport Grays & the Louisiana Guards Co C reached Pensacola 2 days after the Grays. At Pensacola the 1st Battalion of Volunteers was organized & Captain Charles D DREUX of the Orleans Cadets was elected Lieutenant Captain & Captain N H REIGHTON of Great Guards, Major. On the 6th of May the Battalion was ordered to Virginia expecting to go to Manasses. The skirmish which occurred soon after at Big Bethel doubtless was the cause for sending the Battalion to York Town. The Battalion remained at Richmond about 10 days, to get new uniforms, was by the side of the Washington Artillery who had preceded Col. DREUX's Battalion a few days & had captured Richmond with their big guns & fine uniforms. The Washington Artillery seemed not to recognize the Infantry with their little guns & worn uniforms & put out a line of pickets-as much as to say they did not want any mixing. That same evening at 2 PM DREUX's Battalion formed a line facing the Washington Artillery camp, Col. DREUX took his position "Attention Battalion, Fix bayonets, shoulder arms, Forward March! Charge Bayonets, Double Quick March!" and passing through their camp he proceeded out to the drill ground where the thousands had assembled to witness the drilling of the Artillery Boys. President DAVIS, Governor LETCHER & Bishop POLK were there too. We had some sweating in the way of Battalion drills at Pensacola but this one I am sure no man of the 600 or more who went through that 2 hours drill including every evolution known to harder tactics,

without single halt or rest, remember it yet. When halted was in line in front of the President & and Govenor. During our stay in Richmond the Washington Artillery never appeared on the drill grounds any more & their picket line was never seen again.

From Richmond to Yorktown, from there the Battalion did more marching along the peninsula than any other of the Infantry Commands. Was encamped at LEE's Mills the 4th of July when the non-commissioned officers got up a barbecue dinner for the whole battalion. That night at midnight Col. DREUX with 20 volunteers from each company not counting commissioned officers started on a scout down the Peninsula purposely to capture some of the enemy who were coming out foraying from New Port News every day. Had with him 10 of the Hallifax Cavalry & 2 members of the Light Artillery. Through a blunder made by the cavalry our ambush was discovered by the enemy (& they were old regulars of the US Army). Steve HACKET, one of the Greys & Col. DREUX were killed. The 2nd & 3rd Confederates killed in action with the enemy. No more skirmished ocured on the Peninsula until after the landing of General McCLELLAN's army. On the night of the 18th April 1862 we left our lines, worked up & down the Warneck River, reaching Williamsburgh next morning. The Greys & Company C Ia re-organized, the Greys electing the writer Captain, R P CATES-1st Lieutenant, J A LAMPKIN-2nd Lieutenant & Thomas H ILLER-2nd Jr Lieutenant. The other companys of the Battalion all left for home, as their term of enlistment had expired before the conscript law went into effect. The Greys & Co C were left alone then, when the invading army reached Williamsburgh. The 2 companys were double quicked back to Ft. McGruder made the first battery that opened fire on the town move back & held a Brigade of Cavalry in check until General HAMPTON arrived & charged the cavalry, capturing some. The 2 companys remained in the Fort until more infantry returned. The next skirmish the Greys were in was when put on advanced picket duty to watch the building of what was known as McCLELLANS "Grapevine" Bridge across the Chickahominy River with orders not to fire unless the enemy attempted to cross. The Greys saw the bridge finished having been in 300 yard of it all day in hiding behind large timber & as soon as the sappers & the miners had left the bridge several Batteries that we had not seen opened upon us such a shelling & at such close range as I am sure no other company ever went through from about one half by sun till dark. Never lost a man or had one wounded. Nothing but the Bay trees saved us. The next engagement was at Seven Pines. The Greys had then been placed in 1st La. Regt taking the place of the Co of that regiment that had been given a Battery of Light Artillery. The regiment lost in that engagement 156 men killed & wounded. Col SHIRERS was wounded & never returned to the regiment again (& I don't blame him he had the best of reasons for not doing so). The night before the Battle at Malvern Hill the company Greys were on advanced Picket line all night & engaged in night skirmish with the Pickets of the enemy who started. The Brigade with the 1st

Regiment in it (Rans Wrights of Georgia) were the first to make the attack at Malvern Hill & was rid by at least 150 pieces of Artillery as soon as it appeared on the farm. The Battery of the Brigade (Captain GRIMES of Georgia) entered the field to our left at the same time & before he could unlimber & fire the first gun all of his horses were killed & wounded & 79 men killed & wounded but still he held his ground also the Brigade until ordered to fall back by General WRIGHT. After Malvern Hill we camped at Falling Waters until the 10 La. Regiments of Infantry in Virginia were Brigaded together the 1st & 2nd both going into the 2nd Brigade & both Brigaded in JACKSON's old division. From Richmond we went by rail to Orange C House, from there we followed the Cavalry in the march around the army of the Patomic. When the cavalry captured Manassas Junction the Infantry wasn't far behind & the 2nd La. Brigade was in the advance. Were in 3 days fight there, on Saturday the 2nd Brigade defeated four different attacks made by the enemy simutaniously & the last line with rocks. In the advance into Maryland the Louisiana Brigade was in the lead to Fredick City. Then a back crossing Potomic at Williamsport to Harper's Ferry after capture of Harper's Ferry marched back to Maryland crossing Potomic at Shepards-town reaching position on extreme left of General LEE's line of battle. We slept on arms the night of the 16 of September in close proximity to the enemy on the opposite side of the Haguestown Williamsport turnpike. We were ordered forward in line, as we had slept, about sunup. The battle already commenced. In advancing to the same the right of our Brigade had to pass through the left of the STONEWALL Brigade that was falling back in some disorder & General W E STARKE then in command of the division was trying to rally them to at least hold their positions. As soon as our Brigade had passed on uncovering General STARKES to the enemy's line of Infantry on the opposite side of the lane (not more than 75 steps from their side of the lane) General STARKE was killed. Our Brigade then under command of General Leroy STAFFORD continued to advance under a terrible fire from both the line of infantry in our front as well as from a Battery of Light Artillery to the right of the enemies line on opposite side of lane. Our Brigade reached the lane & would have held our position & soon disposed of the line of Blue in our front had it been the extreme right of McCLELLAN's line as ours was the extreme left of General LEE's. The 1st La. regiment was on the left of our Brigade. We were not long at the Lane when we were advancing & firing upon our line from our left & rear, as soon as discovered General STAFFORD ordered "Fall back by the right flank." He was obeyed in a double quick step known only to those who have been in similar places. On reaching where we started from the line was reformed & just about that time Captain D. AUQUAN's Battery arrived on the ground, taking position at edge of timber to our left. We charged the column that had flanked us, never before nor since was better fighting done than by that Battery & the 2nd Brigade. Our loss was not so heavy then as at the Lane but the loss of killed & wounded

of the enemy was fearful. We were about broke up & out of ammunition & as we were retiring carrying to the timber some of our wounded & dead General McCLARE's division arrived. I think both Captain AUQUANs Battery & McCLARE's Brigade had just arrived from Harper's Ferry. The 18th was a quiet but gloomy day, our Brigade looked like regiments & regiments like companies. The 19th we recrossed the Potomic at Shepardstown the 2nd La. Brigade being the last to cross & as we crossed Gen. JACKSON was sitting on his horse in the middle of the stream & when we had passed he fell in behind us. About the 1st of October following under orders from the War Department the few men remaining in the ranks of the early volunteer companys were given transfers to other companies. Major LANIGAN having recovered from a former wound & returned releived the writer of the command of the 1st Regiment. He & Lieutenant ILER then reported to General JACKSON for orders. After hearing what we were there for he replied, "Captain, I don't know what will be done with so many of the company officers now being released from commands by the transfer of the few men left of the early Volunteer Companys, but I can tell you what I think, you ought to organize new companies as soon as possible & get back into service." He then directed how to find General LEE's Headquarters. When we reached his headquarters (tho' there were several soldiers there) we walked into General LEE's tent & General LONGSTREET was also in his tent. The writer commenced to explain why we had called only a few words passed before the General said, "Report to Col. PAXTON." He gave us transportation back to Shreveport & subject to orders from the War Department. I doubt if there was a company that entered Confederate Service out of which there were more promotions made than the Shreveport Greys. All of the original Command officers were Commissioned Colonels & commanded regiments, also our first Orderly Sergeant J S ANDREWS who was Colonel of the 15th Texas Cavalry. Of those of the Greys now living who was in the first skirmish besides the writer I can remember but one, W B DENSON, & of those who were in the last battle of the company but one besides the writer, George L WOODWARD--the only recruit that ever came to us from Shreveport & no better nor truer soldier to every duty, ever made tracks on any field of Battle or in camp.

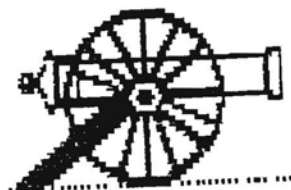

Louisiana Voter Registration Book 1898

The larger number of listings in the 1898 voter registration was encouraged by the 1898 Constitution, which was expressly worded to disenfranchise Negro voters. Under this new constitution a man had to either own property or be able to read and write in order to vote. It also included a "Grandfather Clause" which stated that a person could also qualify as a voter if he, his father, or his grandfather were registered voters as of 1 Jan 1867. Information included: date of registry, name, age, nativity, ward #, occupation, years in state, years in parish, years in ward, year born, naturalized (when & where), father or grandfather, where resided, remarks. All persons listed here are white and residents of DeSoto parish.

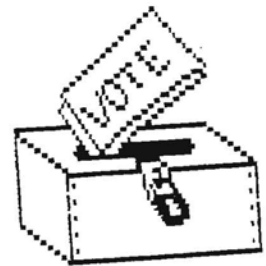

2. June 5, 1918. All men who had become 21 years of age since June 5, 1917. A supplemental registration was held on August 24, 1918, at which time were men who had become 21 years of age since June 5, 1918 were required to register.
3. September 12, 1918. This registration provided for the registration of all men between the ages of 18 and 21, and 31 to 45 years of age. This was the third and last World War I registration.
