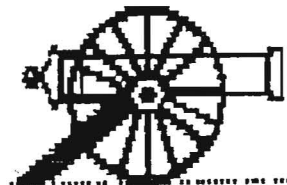

OFF TO THE WAR

During the high tide of patriotism in 1861, enlistment in the Confederate Army was the prevailing vogue. Scions of leading families rode about the countryside organizing companies for their command, thus adding the weight of social position to that of patriotism. Community belles offered their smiles and praise to men who joined the ranks of "our brave soldiers."

There was no lack of will and effort to provide the young volunteer with all necessities in the early years of the war. Women volunteered to make uniforms, and even bullets. Wealthy men gave money for the complete equipment of entire companies. Society leaders raised funds by putting on fairs and amateur plays. Blacksmiths repaired ancient muskets and contrived deadly looking knives and sabers from farm implements and scrap steel. Local leatherworkers fashioned saddles, harness, and bridles.

As the time arrived for the Confederate soldier to depart for the war, he was a part of a ceremony that was staged with such flourish as to thrill the hearts of the homefolk, if not his own. This was the flag presentation.

A battle flag was considered indispensable to organization. When a company or battalion was being formed, some woman, frequently one having a heart interest in one of the volunteers, began the making of a banner. When the work was completed and the speeches memorized, a time was appointed for the presentation. (This might be a dress parade, a banquet, a religious assembly, or a mass meeting called especially for the ceremony). After being duly assembled, the volunteers listened to the flowery tribute of some beauteous, behooped patriot; kept eyes fixed as an officer stepped up to receive the banner; and then gave respectful hearing to the grandiloquent response of their captain.

Among the innumerable companies that received flags from fair hands in 1861 were the DE SOTO RIFLES OF LOUISIANA. A reporter of the New Orleans Daily Crescent recorded the presentation ceremony which took place in late April, 1861. Miss IDELEA COLLENS offered the colors with "appropriate remarks," including the following:

Receive then, from your mothers and sisters, from those whose affections greet you, these colors woven by our feeble but reliant hands; and when this bright flag shall float before you on the battlefield, let it not only inspire you with the brave and patriotic ambition of a soldier aspiring to his own and his country's honor and glory, but also may it be a sign that cherished ones appeal to you to save them from a fanatical and heartless foe.

The color-sergeant, who advanced with his corporals to receive the flag, rose to the occasion with an impressive response:

Ladies, with high-beating hearts and pulses throbbing with emotion, we receive from your hands this beautiful flag, the proud emblem of our young republic...To those who may return from the field of battle bearing this flag in triumph, though perhaps tattered and torn, this incident will always prove a cheering recollection and to him whose fate it may be to die a soldier's death, this moment brought before his fading view will recall your kind and sympathetic words, he will... bless you as his spirit takes its aerial flight...May the God of battles look down upon us as we register a soldier's vow that no stain shall ever be found upon thy sacred folds, save the blood of those who attack thee or those who fall in thy defense. Comrades you have heard the pledge, may it ever guide and guard you on the tented field...or in the smoke, glare, and din of battle, amidst carnage and death, there let its bright folds inspire you with new strength, nerve your arms, and still your hearts to deeds of strength and valor.

The various battle flags identified a particular regiment or brigade. The soldiers felt pride in their organization, its battle flags, and its hard-won reputation for gallantry on numerous fields of battle. The consolidating of the companies later in the war created a harmful effect on the morale of the soldiers because the old organization felt that the loss of their own officers and their own battle flags made them lose their identity, and now were without the chance of perpetuating the distinct and separate history of which they were once so proud.

CATAWBA EMIGRANTS TO I.T.

Among arrivals in the Choctaw Nation was a party of Catawba Indians who left South Carolina in December, 1851. After six had died on the way, the surviving nineteen reached the Choctaw Agency the following February. They were peaceable and inoffensive people and begged to be admitted to the Choctaw Nation. A similar application to the Chickasaw Nation had been refused. On November 9, 1853, the Choctaw council passed the necessary legislation admitting to the tribe as members the following Catawba Indians: William MORRISON, Thomas MORRISON, Sarah Jane MORRISON, Molly REDHEAD, Betsey HEART, Rebecca HEART, Phillip KEGGO, and the infant child of Phillip KEGGO and Cynthia KEGGO, Rosey AYERS, Betsey AYERS, Juliana AYERS, Mary AYERS, Sopronia AYERS, and Sally AYERS. 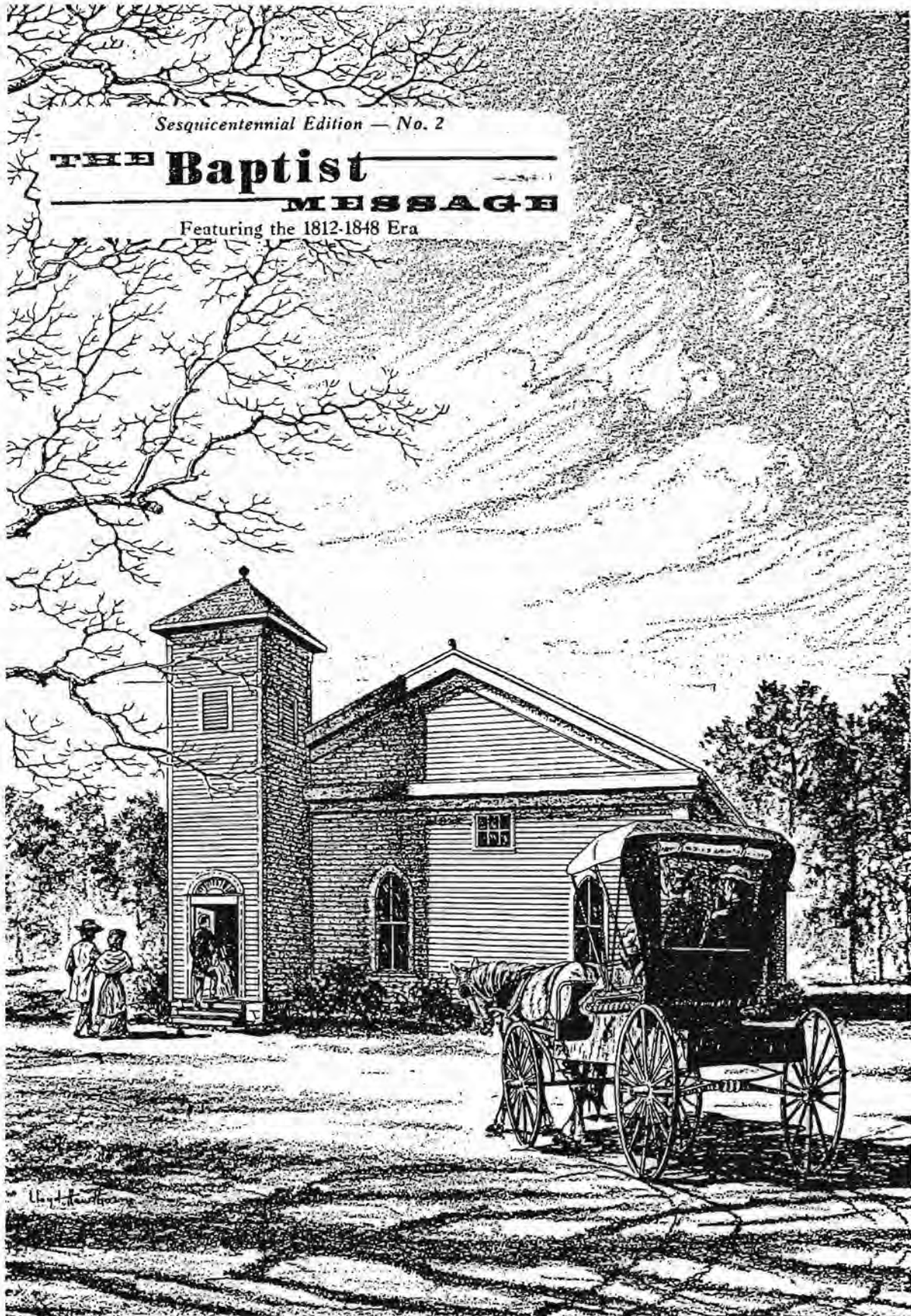

Edition No. 2: A TIME OF TESTING: The scattered and struggling churches of the 1812-1848 era faced many problems, including constant pressure from the Roman Catholic church in South Louisiana.

However, the greatest problems resulted from the anti-mission and other movements inside Baptist ranks. The anti-mission movement growing out of extreme emphasis on Calvinism, was led in the South by John TAYLOR and Daniel PARKER. Their anti-missionary doctrine was called "Two Seed in the Spirit Predestinarian."

Another disruptive movement among Baptists was "Campbellism." Started by Thomas and Alexander CAMPBELL, the movement spread like a brush fire through Louisiana.

In spite of their lack of training most of the self-appointed prophets were articulate men. Where they could not base their case on logic, they substituted emotion, the half-truth, the untruth. Where they could find no Scriptural justification for their fantasies, they boldly substituted their own doctrine often based on some latter day revelation.

The democracy and autonomy of Baptist churches have long provided a haven for the devotees of dissension and disorder. Dipping into Roman dogma these "prophets" claim infallibility for themselves while decrying the evils of others.

The anti-mission leaders could denounce mission work from their pulpits, completely ignoring the heartache, suffering, bloodshed, and other sacrifices that had been made to bring the Gospel to them.

Had the anti-mission groups succeeded, ours would be an unspeakably different America today.

But they did not succeed in selling their doctrine of Election to the majority of Baptists. The majority saw missions as the central theme of the Bible.

So as the first half of the century drew to a close Baptists had reached a time of decision. Either they would continue to dissipate their energies on controversy or they could unite around common tasks.

The path to unity was laid out by 13 men who met at Mt. Lebanon on December 2, 1848, to organize the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Article III of the constitution revealed the purposes of the new organization: "The objects of this Convention shall be missionary and educational."

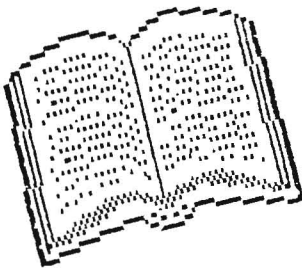

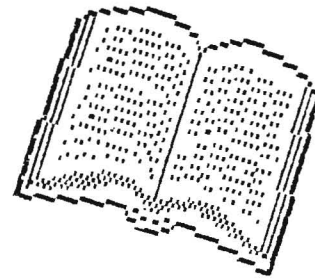

SEQUOYAH

The best known Cherokee and the one who contributed most to Cherokee civilization was Sequoya. Sequoya was his Indian name, but his father was George Gist, sometimes written Guest or Guess. Little is known of Sequoya's early life, except that he was born about 1760, was brought up as an Indian and, due to an accident, was a cripple.

About 1809 he began to reflect upon the advantage white men enjoyed because they could write their own language, and set himself the task of creating an alphabet. He persisted in the face of great opposition and ridicule, until he achieved a workable alphabet and formulated rules for writing the language.

Intrigued by a legend that a small band of Cherokee once wandered into Mexico and were lost to their people, he set out in his old age to recover their lost history. Quantum of Indian blood is computed from the nearest paternal and/or maternal lineal ancestors of Indian blood enrolled on the final rolls of the Five Civilized Tribes.

If applicant is not enrolled, a Certified Copy of Birth Certificate is required to establish relationship to an enrolled parent. If parents are not enrolled, a Certified Copy of Birth Certificate on each parent is also required. In some cases where the grandparents are not enrolled, a Certified Copy of Birth Certificate on each such grandparent will be required. Certified Copies of Birth Certificates may be obtained from the State Department of Health in the state where a person was born. HOSPITAL BIRTH CERTIFICATES ARE NOT ACCEPTABLE.

Copies of court proceedings probating the estate of your deceased ancestors would be preferred in lieu of a Birth Certificate. If there have been such proceedings, submit a copy with this application.

In cases of adoption, quantum of Indian blood must be proven on the natural parents. A copy of adoption proceedings must be submitted with this application. All information will be kept confidential.

DINING OUT, EARLY SHREVEPORT STYLE

A town developing on the frontier in the nineteenth century attracted a diverse assortment of persons. Newcomers arrived daily in Shreveport seeking homes here or merely passing through on the way westward. Consequently, as the population grew the need for businesses which offered public meals increased also.

Although restaurants which provided meals only were rare in the old south, many places served food in connection with lodging or liquid refreshment. Already, by 1838 there was a business in Shreveport which was known as Porter's Hotel, albeit a crude log structure. By 1850 there were in the city four hotels: the Catfish or City, operated by William B. Woolridge; the Palmetto, of which Adam Leonard was manager; the Powell, leased to Cedar Powell; and the Planters, probably owned by W. C. McDoug. Even then hotel properties changed owners and managers often as they do now.¹

There were at least four boarding houses in the young town at that time. These were operated by two men, John S. Allwine and James Lee, and two women, Martha Bowie Sterrett and E. Boazman.² Boarding houses were often operated by widows as this was one respectable way a woman could earn a living. Emeline Boazman bought Mrs. Sterrett's house in 1857 and it remained in operation for almost forty years, with her son William managing the place on the corner of Spring and Travis Streets after she retired.³

By 1850 there were restaurants or eating shops, too. One was located on Texas Street between Spring and Commerce and another was operated by Horne.⁴ The first newspaper advertisement found of a restaurant in the emerging town was in the Southwestern, 29 August 1855 for E. Mahn's place on Texas Street.⁵ A brief review of the 1860 census schedule revealed one reported restaurant keeper, Sophia Norman, a free woman of color.⁶ Sophia was representative of the sizable free black population of Shreveport before the Civil War.

Many changes were wrought in Shreveport by the Civil War. These contributed to an increase in the need for additional public dining establishments. Among the post war arrivals were some who helped meet this need. The city had always welcomed persons from other countries as well as Americans into the local melting pot. Ethnic groups represented in management of eating facilities in Shreveport by the 1870s included German, Italian, French, and Welch.⁷

In 1875 the Shreveport Commercial Directory compiled a listing of selected businesses. Among those included were ten boarding houses, twenty-two saloons, but only six restaurants. Proprietors of these were F. Williams, Mark Parsons, J. J. O'Brien, Perry Barns, Baptiste Ticolat, and Victor Calvarac.⁸ Hotels were not listed, but at least four operated in the seventies. Pitt's, Planter's, Cumpston's and Brooks were establishments that existed for several years in Shreveport's business district.⁹

Of the hoteliers named one seemed to rate quite favorably with professional people. In the diary of Henry Hall, a local attorney, he mentions frequently eating lunch at Brooks House, and on one occasion Judge Land dined at the same table.¹⁰ In 1870 W. T. Brooks acquired the Pitts House as well, allowing him a more flexible operation. By 1871 the Brooks House was also known as the Southern Hotel.¹¹

Unfortunately, the year of 1871 was not a good one for Shreveport economically and it was reflected in December when it was necessary to auction off the Southern. In the local newspaper report of the auction hope was expressed that Capt. Brooks would be allowed to continue the operation of the hotel. In spite of such support this fine manager was not destined to continue his work in Shreveport. During the yellow fever epidemic W. T. Brooks, age fifty, was listed as a victim 14 September 1873.¹³

Other restaurateurs who developed a following were two Frenchmen, Victor Calvarac and Baptiste Ticolat. It appears that Victor got his start by working in Ticolat's place, the Commercial Restaurant at #44 Texas Street. Ticolat assumed the sole operation of the restaurant when Victor left, apparently to open his own business. The Commercial remained under Ticolat's personal management until his death in 1898. A note in a local publication in 1883 declared the Commercial Restaurant the "leading saloon in the city, supplied daily with fresh dish, oysters, game, celery and all delicacies."¹⁴

Victor Calvarac, the second Frenchman, was noted for his oysters. He was one of the first to arrange for daily shipments of oysters and fresh fish by rail from Galveston. Victor served these tasty morsels in a variety of ways: fried, raw, boiled, or stewed. Regardless of apparent popularity, by the 1880s Calvarac was no longer in business in Shreveport.¹⁵

Other entrepreneurs were attracted to Shreveport in the post war years and remained to become long standing members of the food service community. Henry Dillenberger, a native of Germany, arrived in Shreveport in 1868. He had been a corporal in Company B, 4th Missouri Cavalry, U.S.A.¹⁶ Perhaps he had served in the area during the war and decided to stay. By 1870 Dillenberger had married, purchased property, and was operating a saloon.¹⁷ It was in front of his place on Texas Street that one of the first victims of the yellow fever epidemic died 20 August 1873.¹⁸ By April 1874 he had become proprietor of the Mechanic's Exchange which offered lunch at any time. A financial setback in late 1874 caused the real estate that Dillenberger possessed to be sold at a sheriff's sale, but he remained in Shreveport.¹⁹

Another man of German descent Henry Holzner had moved to the city from the midwest in the late 1870s. On 1 January 1880 Henry Holzner and Henry Dillenberger formed a partnership for the purpose of operating Two Brothers Saloon at #35 Texas Street. Holzner was

owner; Dillenberger was partner to share equally in profits and labor. For eight years the two Henrys continued a profitable business.²⁰

After the partnership was dissolved Holzner continued to operate the restaurant and brought other saloons and restaurants under his control. Unhappily, it seems he over extended his assets, as his untimely death caught his heirs without enough cash to cover his debts and a sale of all real and personal property was necessary. Even though business connections had terminated, the Henrys had remained friends, even living next door, and Dillenberger was appointed administrator of Holzner's estate.²¹

Friendships, like dining parlors in the city on Red River, formed, developed, and faded, while new ones took their places. From a few crude eating houses in the 1830s which served rough frontier people a diet of local foods, through a tumultuous growing period of the sixties and seventies food service businesses expanded into a variety of accommodations. Not only were there places offering plain food for the working man, but there were also finer restaurants which provided a wider menu selection to appeal to the ladies and families of the city. Hardy American pioneer operators had been joined by an assortment of ethnic entrepreneurs setting the stage for further growth in the twentieth century.

CEMETERY INFORMATION

He has long collected cemetery books and some of the more unusual or no longer available ones were on display for our browsing. Charles told some of the ways that cemetery's are recorded: some good, some not so good. Some of his suggestions are: (1) take a photo of the cemetery entrance (2) Texas uses markers when a cemetery is off the highway (3) most states will mark graves of persons of importance (4) most often Union soldiers will have rounded top stones while Confederate soldiers will have pointed top stones (5) check all sides of stones - might be something carved on back (6) use powder, shaving cream and chalk to help clean, read and photograph stones (black & white film is best). Most informative program and maybe Charles can come up with a sure fire method to keep the redbugs from crawling up!!

YOUNGER BROTHERS

MY GLIDEWELL FAMILY

Archibold GLIDEWELL, born ca 1788, SC, died before 1850, and Betsy JONES, possibly the daughter of Joseph JONES, married 6 Oct 1808 in Oglethorpe co GA, and had the following known children: Thomas, born 1811 GA, married 1st Jane, 2nd Sarah HOWARD. Winifred born 1812 GA, married ca 1828 to Benjamin PARKER in AL. Archibold born 1814 GA. And Wiley born 1819 GA, married Civil? in AL.

It is possible that Archibold married 2nd Dorcus. Dorcus is mentioned in Ward's book as having purchased 80 acres of land west of the Fairmount Church in 1855 in Red Level, Covington co AL.

Archibold GLIDEWELL is shown on the 1830 and 1840 census of Covington co AL. He bought property in the Red Level District in the period between 1840 and 1850.

Census records for 1850 show Thomas GLIDEWELL, age 39 living with his wife, Jane, age 34. Their children were: Elizabeth 17, James 15, Cintha 12, Margaret 10, Lucy 5, Francis 3, and William 8/12. Also listed with the family was Harty 21 female and Jane 3/12.

Wiley GLIDEWELL, age 31, is also listed in the 1850 census with his wife, Civil, age 23. Others listed with the family were Susannah age 2 and Sarahann Read age 5.

Dorcus GLIDEWELL, the presumed second wife of Archibold is listed as age 51. Living with her was Martha DUBOSE, age 21, Darcus age 3, and Darious 4/12.

The 1860 census lists Dorcus, James, and Thomas living next to each other in the Red Level District of Covington co AL. James was the son of Thomas.

The 1870 census lists Thomas, age 59. Living with him in the household were: Sarah 42, Eliza 37, Lucy 25, William 20, Susan 18, Archibold GLIDEWELL 56, Thomas 2, Ella 7/12, Howard 8, Josey 25 (male teacher), and Gatsy 21.

Thomas is also listed in the 1880 census. He does not appear in the 1900 census. It can be presumed that he had died by that time. His son James is listed in the 1900 census as are Sarah GLIDEWELL and Susan GLIDEWELL, widow. By 1910, the only GLIDEWELL listed is Henry, evidently the son of James.

section = 640 acres = 1 square mile
