Meet Miss Ima G* Bugg, our new research associate. In her own unique, lighthearted way, she has agreed to try to answer our questions and give us some clues as to how to proceed with our research. Dear Readers: Have you, like most of us, made a resolution that THIS YEAR you will organize your boxes and piles of scraps of paper into a more meaningful array of information? B8-01

If so, consider taking a seasonal approach to organizing your records. This winter, sort information by surname and place in folders. Then pick a family line to concentrate on this year. Organize the family line's information by generation, location, etc. Prepare ancestor charts and family group sheets in pencil, then as you locate sources of various entries, change those entries to ink and note on the back of the form the nature of the source. You'll soon be able to identify weak and missing links; make a list of possible places to search.

When it gets warmer, make short "research trips" to cemeteries, old homeplaces, and those aunts and cousins you have meaning to go see for the last twenty years. And don't forget those family reunions! Go armed with a notebook filled with copies of your ancestor charts and family group sheets and a gigantic descendant chart to tape on the wall (the bigger, the better!). It won't be long before someone says, "Where on earth did you get this information on Grandfather Smith? It's entirely wrong!" Time to bring out your notebook and ask for help. Be sure to take along plenty of blank family group sheets with you with your name and address on them. Pass them out; a few completed ones will magically appear in your mailbox when you least expect it!

This summer, using the "buddy system," learn to use a computer. You'll find that two heads are much better than one, and once you start entering your information, you'll wonder why didn't do this a long time ago! Then, check your newly printed family group sheets and pedigree charts to see that all of the sources of your information have been identified and copies are in your surname files.

This fall, resume those research trips to verify information you already have and to fill in the blank spots. This would be a good time to visit with the family photograph albums (and their owners) and have copies made for your newly (computer) printed family notebook. Could be an idea for a neat Christmas gift for Aunt Pearl; after all, she did tell you stories from the past, some of which actually turned out to be true! Then, next year, another family line. This all sounds so simple; I just wish it would work for me.

Dear Ima*: This Soundex/Miracode stuff has me so confused. Would you please explain to me how I can decipher this? Seems they could have just done the censuses alphabetically - that would certainly have made my life much easier! B8-02

Dear Ima-1-2*: Well, I agree that an alphabetical census would certainly simplify all of our lives, but unfortunately, our ancestors did not think about that when they established their residences in various areas. So, somebody came up with this unique system to easily locate someone.

The Soundex System was primarily a tool to identify people who were eligible to receive social security. The first census it became available was 1880 which coded only those households with children age 10 and under. Books are available that show the surname codes, eliminating the tedious chore previously required.

The 1910 Soundex/Miracode is not available for all states. Those available are: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Surnames in the 1910 Soundex/Miracode can be used to locate them on the census microfilm by noting the county, volume number, E. D. (enumeration district) number, and household number or line and page number. Miracode card lists visitation (household) number while Soundex shows page and line numbers.

Each state's system, whether Soundex or Miracode, is noted at the beginning of the state listing. Louisiana uses both.

The following chart shows how the soundex code key letters are determined:

1	b,p,f,v	4	1
2	c,s,k,g,j,q,x,z	5	m,n
3	d,t	6	r

Each soundex code consists of the first letter of the surname, followed by three digits representing the consonant sounds of the name. For a detailed explanation of census records, refer to chapter 4, "Census Records" in THE SOURCE, edited by Eakle & Cerny (Ancestry Publishing Co.).

Dear Miss Bugg: My female ancestors all seem to have the same last name, UNKNOWN. Do you have any magic tricks to finding maiden names? B8-04

Dear Unknown: No tricks, just more research. Possible areas are:

- Place queries in newspapers and genealogical periodicals in areas where she lived.
- County histories biographies of individuals and their families.
- Published family genealogies.
- Newpaper obituaries.
- Death certificate (if available), otherwise children's death certificates.
- Church records (many are available in public libraries).
- Her marriage certificate her father/brother may have been a witness.
- Her husband's will her brother may have been a witness.
- Deed and land records did her husband buy her father's land?
- Neighbors of her husband's family she could have been "the girl next door."
- Wills of neighbors she could be referred to by her married name.
- Military pension information.
- Divorce papers.
- Census records look for a mother-in-law or other in-law.
- There's always the possibility that she could have been a Native American hence, no maiden name.

Birth and Death Certificates

The State of Louisiana did not maintain birth and death certificates until 1918. Records prior to that date are probably non-existent unless the parish where the birth or death occurred kept such a record. If the individual(s) you are researching were Catholic, the birth or death would probably be shown in the records of the church or diocese where the person(s) lived.

Louisiana State Archives has recently acquired the following:

Birth Certificates (Orleans Parish only) - over 100 years beginning with 1790-1894.

Death Certificates (Orleans Parish only) 1804-1944

Death Certificates (Statewide) 1912-1944

Marriage Certificates (Orleans Parish only) 1831-1944

For more recent records, please contact Vital Records; P. O. Box 60630; New Orleans, LA 70160; Phone: (504) 568-5152.

Please include the following information with your request:

- 1) Full name of the person as given on the birth/death record
- 2) Sex and race
- 3) Parents' names, including maiden name of mother.
- 4) Month, day, and year of the birth/death
- 5) Place of birth/death (city or town, parish, and state; name of hospital, if any)
- 6) Purpose for which copy is needed
- 7) Relationship to person whose record is on file

Note: If you do not know the year, the fee is \$5 for each 3-year period searched.




SCOTTISH MIGRATIONS

Jim Whittington, of The Scottish Society of North Louisiana, presented an outstanding program at our meeting on January 6, 1996. Not only did he provide a great deal of insight into Scottish Migrations, his display of Scottish memorabilia was wonderful. These are some excerpts from his program.

When you say Scotland, what are you talking about? As one looks at a map of Scotland, it is all broken up. But as we look at the names listed on a map of Scotland, we can determine where particular people lived. Living in the borders were the JOHNSONs, GORDONs, MAXWELLS, HOMES, LINDSAYs, and others. You will find these names elsewhere. These are the ancestral lands of our Scottish ancestors. Many clans, such as the McFARLANDs, McGREGORYs, and BUCHANANs, lived around large bodies of water.

It is necessary to study the history of the clans to understand more about Scotland. Today, the clans, the pipes, and the kilts are recognized as national institutions in Scotland. That doesn't mean, however, that if you went to Edinburgh, you would be a member of a "clan." Edinburgh is in the lowland area of Scotland; clans are found in the highlands. It wasn't until about 1822 that they began having distinctive tartans in almost every district of Scotland. Some of the clan tartans in particular areas are certain colors; the reason for that is the dyes come from vegetable dyes in the area. Don't. however, ever make the mistake of calling the tartan a "plaid." Nevertheless, one can find tartans anywhere in Scotland today. Many people who wear tartans are not connected with that particular clan, but that is acceptable.

"Scots" are a mixture of several different kinds of people. The Picts were a group who loved to paint themselves; therefore, the name means *the painted ones*. The Angles came from Germany. Some of the Britons were Celtics from France. The Norsemen, who owned much property in Scotland, mixed with the other races.



The Highland clan structure usually consisted of many clans which formed a confederacy. These clans bound themselves together for protection. It is said that in 1745 the clans had 22,000 fighting men, or "strength," and that didn't include the ones who stayed home and kept the cattle.

The chief himself provided for his family. If a chief was killed or otherwise unable to serve and his son was too young to succeed him, many times an uncle would take over until the son became of age.

It was also a custom prevalent in the highlands for families to provide for foster relations. A child would live with foster parents and raised as the child of those parents. The purpose of this custom was to provide a sense of unity to one great family. Clan, therefore, means children. It was very important to have a large family and to be one unit because they were so often up in a glen or isolated area. They had to depend on each other and to be self-sufficient.

The Highland Scots has poor land; consequently, they had a lot of famine. Sometimes they would go down into the lowland area, work the fields, and bring in the crops there. Then they would return to their home in the highlands. But as times got worse, they would be forced to move to a different location.



This sketch, drawn by Jim Whittington, pictures a Crofter family. These were the common clansmen who tried to stay alive on the poor soil of the Highlands. They were cleared off the land during the 1820s and 1850s to make room for sheep and deer leases. Many emigrated to the United States in this period.

Surnames were forced on the Highlanders. The term, "Mac," means son of. Burns means *little brook* or *creek*; Burnette is a *small brook*. Glass means *green*; Glasgow means *green field*. It should be noted that Scots frequently changed their names when they moved from one place to another. A Scot owed his allegiance to the chief of the area in which he lived and frequently would take the chief's name. This could put a ripple in genealogy research!

Handfasting was a method of selection for marriage. It was a contract between two Highland chiefs so that the heir of one should live with the daughter of the other as his wife for a year and one day. If, during this time, the woman became pregnant, the marriage was considered legal. If the union was unfruitful, the contract was considered to be null and void. The most important aspect of the marriage was to have issue. It was considered imperative.

The basic economy of Scotland involved people. The chief was not as concerned with how much property he owned, but how many men he could bring forth. Therefore, women and children were valued and respected. The call for clansmen came frequently because neighbors fought all the time over property. The McFARLANDs were cattle thieves who stole so much that the moon was called *McFarland's Lantern*. Another good old Scottish institution was *Blackmail*, which means *secretive money*.

But the Scots were tough! The 42nd Royal Highland Regiment, or the Black Watch, has been one of the most renowned fighting groups throughout history. It was originally formed by the CAMPBELL clan who was loyal to the Crown. However, it should be noted that the term "Black Watch" referred to people who were watching for cattle thieves.

Many of the Lowland Scots moved to the Ulster section of Ireland, producing the erroneous term of "Scotch-Irish." As the Scots moved into Ireland, they forced the people out, resulting in constant battle. These conditions produced problems for the English government. The Scots were too successful economically. They threatened English domestic products, farm products, and textiles. Furthermore, the Scots were too tough to accept broken promises and restraints without protest. Most of these Scots were strong Presbyterians who refused to back away from anything. When the Ulster Plantation leases came up for renewal in 1717-1718, they took the opportunity to go to America; the Scots poured out of Ulster by the thousands. Properly, these Scots should be called "Ulster-Scots."

The emigration of Scots to America actually came about as the result of famine. Another reason for emigration was the *clearances*. Sometime near 1780, the power was taken away from the chiefs so that he could no longer protect his clansmen. The wearing of the kilt was banned in an effort to break up the clans. Sheep were imported and the people were evicted and deported. Homes and land were burned. As a result, Scots migrated to America to escape the English persecution.

During the French and Indian War, there were a lot of men who received free land for service, so they stayed in Canada.

When and where the first Ulster Scots emigrated to in America is not known, but soon after 1680, they were found in several colonies. It is estimated that over 20,000 Ulster Scots departed Ireland for America in the first three decades of the 18th century. More than 6,000 are known to have entered Pennsylvania in 1729 alone. Pennsylvania and that area was the kick-off point for the Scots to go the wilderness. Emigration increased between 1763 and the outbreak of the American War of Independence in 1775. During the war, emigration decreased; it was just not safe to be on the waters. Astonishingly, 18% of the British emigrants in these years left the highlands and islands of Scotland, one of the most sparsely populated areas in the United Kingdom.

English Americans saw the newcomer Scots from Ulster as shrewd, aggressive, and bold. They came from a rough life and it was said that they kept the Sabbath - and anything else they could lay their hands on! Not trusting or respecting English authority, they were not inclined to settle near established English communities; they moved to the frontiers. Scots are frequently teased about how cheap and tight they are, but when one studies the background of these people, it was only natural to self-sustain, that is, to use what one had and not ask for anything.

A tough plant that is hard to uproot, the thistle is an important Scottish symbol. Its flowers are usually purple or pink with prickly leaves. The adoption of the plant as an emblem dates from 1263, when a Scottish king defeated a Norwegian invasion. The attacking army wished to surprise the Scots, but a Norwegian soldier stepped on a thistle and yelled out in pain. His cry alerted the Scots to the Norwegians' position.

1 1/2 cups flour


Recipe from the Isle of Skye, Scotland (Elizabeth Henderson)

stick butter (not margarine)
tablespoons sugar


Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add the flour (it may not take all of it). Press 1/2 inch thick on a cookie sheet. Crimp the edges with a fork; you can also score the top with a fork. Bake a 300 degrees approximately 40 minutes. Cut while still hot or warm; this is very important as it will crumble if it cools.

It is a waste of time unless you double the recipe!
