Miss Ima G* Bugg, our own unique, lighthearted research associate, has agreed to try to answer our questions and give us some research clues. If you are confused and in need of help, drop her a line. Dear Miss Bugg: A company has sent me an offer to purchase a coat of arms for my family surname. I became suspicious when I received a second offer, styled identically, for my husband's family surname. Are these for real?

Dear Suspicious: In most cases, no. Several companies sell coats of arms, or "ancestral arms," for thousands of surnames. You may rightfully use British coats of arms only if you can trace your ancestry through the male line directly to the man who was first granted that coat of arms. It must also be registered with the English College of Heralds or the Scottish Lord Lyon, King of Arms. Obviously, these companies are not doing that kind of research. Also, a number of companies are selling certificates and books that supposedly detail the history of your surname. It may include a list of people with your surname, but do not expect that it will include your ancestors. When in doubt, always obtain the right to return such merchandise *before* you order it. Dear Ima G* Bugg: Where is the state of Franklin?

Dear Lost: Lost in the pages of history. An area of northeast Tennessee was only a "state" for the four years from 1784 until 1788, having its own governor, legislature, and court system. Originally named Frankland, its name was changed to Franklin, to honor Benjamin Franklin. In 1789, it applied for statehood as the 14th state of the Union, but lost by one vote. When Tennessee became the 16th state in 1796, the area that comprised the state of Franklin was included in that state. The "lost state" included what is now 14 counties of Tennessee. Probably the most noteworthy person born in the "lost state" of Franklin was Davy Crockett, who was born there in 1786. (*Kinfolks*, SW Louisiana Gen Society, LA)

Dear Looking: You can obtain CCC (Civilian Conservation Corps) personnel records by writing the National Personnel Records Center, Civilian Personnel Records, 111 Winnebago Street, St. Louis, MO 63118.

Dear Ima G*: I am having difficulty in locating early deeds in South Carolina. Can you help me?

Dear Difficult: Of course! In 1719, South Carolina became a Royal Province rather that a Proprietary one. Deeds prior to 1719 are in a different series at the South Carolina Archives and have their own index. There is an index for the later period, "An Index to Deeds of the Province and State of South Carolina 1719-1785 and Charleston District 1785-1800" by Lucas.

Dear Miss Ima: One of my ancestors was said to have been a part of the Wuerttemberg emigration, but I have been unable to document this. Do you know of any publications that may be of help to me?

Dear Lucky: Sure do – "The Wuerttemberg Emmigration Index" by Trudy Schenk and Ruth Froekle. This is a unique collection of papers and documents on applicants who filed for permission to emigrate from Wuerttemberg during the nineteenth century. Extracted from the original records filmed at Ludwigsburg and available at the Genealogical Society of Utah, Salt Lake City. The index is not confined to those destined for North America. Column headings include applicant's residence at the time. Have fun!

Dear Ima G* Bugg: Is there a repository for military newspapers?

Dear News Hungry: Yes! The State Historical Society of Wisconsin is the self-appointed central depository of newspapers of the Air Force and other U.S. military services. The collection started in a small bookcase in the Wisconsin governor's office in 1854 and has now grown to more than 2.8 million printed and microfilmed items of history, genealogy, and related topics. March 15, 1864 Camped near Bulls Gap Tenn. Dear Sister,

Your welcome letter dated Jan 17 has just come to hand and I am glad to hear that you are well. I am well and hearty and hope these few lines may find you the same. Everything is quiet here at present as far as military affairs are concerned. General Longstreet's men have all reenlisted. I expect we will go into Kentucky this spring. The campaign has opened in our favor so far and I hope it will continue so. We have heard several reports about the Yankees having possession of Galveston and Sabine, but I do not believe it. I do not think that the Yankees will ever get into the interior of Texas. We are perfectly ignorant of what is going on in Texas, as we receive no papers at all, but I suppose it is all right. Hope so anyway. Frank Gearing has just arrived here and joined He was captured while running the blockade. our company. He has been exchanged. Ham and Lee are both well and send their kind regards. Charley Settle is expected here Every day as they have again agreed upon an exchange. It is reported that General Morgan is going to join General Longstreet on his raid into Kentucky. If it is true he will surely make those Yankees suffer for his imprisonment in the penitentiary. He now commands a large cavalry force. He is a worthy commander. I must come to a close. Please excuse this short letter written in haste. Write soon. Your affectionate brother, William

May 25, 1864 Lynchburg Dear Sister,

I take this present opportunity to let you know how I am getting along. I was wounded in the right side at the Battle of the Wilderness fought on the 6th day of May. I remained at the field hospital for 16 days after I was wounded. I just arrived at this place yesterday and am now staying at the College Hospital. My wound is not dangerous, although very painful. It is healing very fast and if nothing happens to me I will be with my company in The battle was a very severe one. Our loss a few weeks. is heavy, but that of the enemy is still greater. Their loss is estimated at forty five thousand according to their own papers. A great many of their dead are still unburied. Both armies are now near Hanover Junction, which is 25 miles from Richmond. Another battle is expected daily. General Grant says he is going to take Richmond in forty days, but I suppose we will have something to say about that. He will find Richmond a hard road to travel. I am in good

health and spirits and hope these few lines find you the I suppose you have heard the particulars about the same. battle before this. You must excuse me for not writing sooner for this is the only chance I have had since I have been wounded. The following is a list of casualties in the company: killed; Lieut. W.T. Randall, Private G. Baker and Fred Cole. Wounded; Capt. W. Beddel in the side, Lieut. R. Armstrong in the hip, F. Schmidt lost the left arm, F. Gearing in the shoulder, John McCarty in the shoulder, I. Welch in the hip, Peter Gilles in the arm, I. Fralish in the arm, C.L. Bolling in the leg, H. Shultz in the leg, Les Thompson in the arm. Missing; C.H. Kingsley, L.D. Sims, O.A. Brandt. The missing men are supposed to be taken prisoners. Ham Settle was all right when last I heard from him after the last battle. Charley had not arrived up to that time, but was expected every day, but I suppose this fighting has interfered with the flag of truce arrangements. Les Thompson was wounded very slightly and I expect he has returned to the company. The wounded are all doing very well. I don't like a hospital and will be very glad when I am able to leave it.

I have survived another great battle without great injury and I am very thankful to Providence for my narrow escape. Please give my kind regards to my friends. I am anxious to hear from you.

July 23, 1864 Camp near Petersburg Dear Sister,

I have just received your welcome letter dated May 1. I was truly glad to hear that you were well. I have also received a letter from Eugene dated June 8. Please tell Eugene that I am under obligations to him for his kindness. Dear Sister, it is with deep regret that I inform you of the death of our dear friend, Hamilton Settle, who was wounded on the 14th July in the neck and has since died in Richmond. Charley Settle has made his escape from Fort Deleware and arrived in Richmond on the same day his brother was buried. How sad it is to think that this world is nothing but a tide of troubles. Poor Ham, he has left this land of troubles and gone to the Kingdom of Heaven, which is prepared for those who bear and obey the laws of God. I am proud to say that he was both a true and faithful Christian and a soldier. Charley has got a furlough, but I do not know where he is going. I hope it is to Texas. He is well and hearty.

I have just recovered from a wound received in my right side at the Battle of Wilderness, fought on the 6th May. My wound was very painful, but I am willing to bear all

such if I do not receive any worse. I am at present in good health and spirits and hope your are the same. We are in the entrenchments about two miles from town. The Yankees are also in entrenchments four hundred yards from us. Cannonading and picket firing is kept up pretty regular day and night. I do not think that the enemy will attempt to storm our works, but will try to flank us, but at any rate we are ready to play him any game he chooses. General Early commanding Ewell's old corps, has made a raid into Maryland, and has captured a large amount of stores, horses, mules, cattle, etc., and has returned safe to Virginia with all his plunder. He has also done great damage to the railroads. General Johnston has been relieved from his command and General Hood has taken his place. If General Hood loses any ground it will not be by retreating, but by hard fighting, for such he is used to, for I know that by experience. Eugene wishes my opinion about this war. Tell him I think that there will be a great change this fall or winter, and besides I think we shall see peace before twelve months. Les Nagle has not arrived yet.

Dear Sister, I am glad to hear that you have met with such friends. I would very much like to see them. I did not get that ring you spoke of. I do not know anything about George Robins, last that I saw of him was at the field hospital at Chickamauga. He was then wounded in the arm and doing well. Les Thompson is a clerk at a hospital near this place and doing well. Please tell Billy Young to write me and tell me what has become of all my old friends. Please give my kind regards to all my friends and acquaintances. In haste. Please excuse bad writing, shells are flying. With much love, your affectionate brother, William.

September 15, 1864 Near Chaffin's Bluff My Dear Sister,

I just received your kind letter dated July 23rd. Τ am glad to hear that you are enjoying good health. We are at present in line of battle near Chaffin's Bluff where we have been for the last four weeks. Everything is quiet along here except cannonading from here to Petersburg, which kept up day and night. Artillery duel and picket is fighting is a daily occurrence and have long since ceased to create excitement. You speak in your letter about me trying to get a furlough. I tried my best but did not succeed, but I have a chance to get one this winter and if so I will be sure to come home. I will try to send this by hand as a Lieut. in the 5th is going to Houston. Joseph and James Nagle will return to Texas next month. Charles Settle has just returned from his furlough and is well and sends regards. George Robbins is in Richmond. He is trying to get his retirement papers and if he succeeds he will go to Texas. He has loss the use of his arm, otherwise he is well and hearty otherwise. Les Thompson is sick with fever but is now getting better. He had quite a hard time. Fred Delesdernier is well and sends his kind regards. Please give my kind regards to all my friends. Your affectionate brother, WM.

It is a painful duty that impels me to write to you. Prepare yourself to hear bad news. I will no longer keep you in suspense, but write the whole truth at once. Your brother, William, on the 7th of October was wounded (but not seriously), and left in the enemy's hands. We were charging a Yankee fort when he was struck and being repulsed had to fall back, leaving most of our badly wounded on the William, I am certain, was not very seriously field. Shot probably in the leg. Do not fear, Lina, injured. he will be well taken care of. Trust in God, and pray daily for your captured brother. As soon as we hear from him we will write again. May God grant you strength and fortitude to bear up under this calamity. Say with Christ in the garden "Thy will be done, oh God." Yours truly, Les Thompson

Billy was a good and true friend of mine, and I feel much interest in him and his reputation is untarnished as a man and soldier.

I hope you are in good health and spirits. Trust in God. He knows what is best for us. Mr. Wakelee did not say what prison you were in, but I hope this will reach you to let you know that I am well.

I have been to see Mr. Gearing. He speaks in the highest terms of you. He says you are one of the noblest boys in the world. He will take your socks on for me, if he can send them to you he will, I am sure, for he thinks so much of you. Mrs. Crane and family are all well. Miss Ellen Settle is up here. She wants me to go home with her, but I am not ready to go yet. Mr. and Mrs. Santers are well. All send much love. I had a letter from Les but he did not know where you were. I have written you before. All your friends here are well. Brother dear, if the prayers of a loving and affectionate sister are answered you will come home safe.

My kindest regards to your friends, if you have any there. If I can write, let me know and I will write often. God bless and keep you from harm and let you return home safe.

WRITING YOUR QUERY

Correspondence is probably the most important part of our genealogical research. But sometimes it is very hard to locate others researching the same families that we are. Posting queries in genealogical publications, such as this one, is a good way to get in contact with others.

Persons researching in a geographical area usually subscribe to the genealogical publications from that area, so that is the first place you should look for new correspondents. The Internet is also a great place to post queries. Almost all states and most counties now have genealogical bulletin boards and there are thousands and thousands of news groups, web pages, etc.

The way you write your query will probably dictate what response you receive. If you write a short, clear, tothe-point query stating exactly what you need, you stand a much better chance of receiving an answer than if you write a long, rambling, confusing query.

Begin your query by **listing only several surnames**. Long lists of surnames are not as effective. It is better to use both given name and surname. If you list the name Hill only, many people will just ignore it, because Hill is such a common name. But if you list Henry Hill, you may get the attention of some readers who would pass over the name Hill.

State your problem in a few very specific words. Let the reader know exactly what it is you are looking for. Are you looking for the marriage date and place of Aunt Mary? Or are you wishing correspondence concerning the whole Hill family?

Give a location, including state and county, if known. Also, give a time period. Usually just a year is sufficient. If you do not have a specific year, give an approximate year. Just so the reader knows that you are looking for Henry Hill in 1750 and not in 1850.

Make relationships very clear. Use names, not "he" or "she." Also, it usually makes a query very unclear to the reader when you list all the children and who they married. It is better to write three or four short, clear queries than to try to get all the information from a group sheet into one query.

Write or type your query clearly so the person responsible for putting it in the quarterly can read it. Be sure to give your name and address, and it is also good to indicate whether you are a Mr., Miss, or Mrs. Many times it is hard to tell just by looking at the name and that makes for confusion. [Editor's Note: Also include your E-mail address, if you have one.]

Before sending your query be sure you will have time to reply to the answers you receive...even if the answer is not about what you are looking for or even about your family. Please be courteous; send a reply.

If your memory is like mine, you will probably want to enter your queries in your correspondence log so you will have a record of where and when you sent them.

I wish you good luck in your search. I have had very good luck with posting queries and I hope you will too. Remember:

- List a couple of surnames
- State your problem using only vital information.
- · Be specific. Do not elaborate.
- · Give a specific location and time period.
- Make relationships clear.
- · Write neatly. Include your name and address.

RootsWeb Genealogical Data Cooperative

The RootsWeb project, started in August 1996, is one of the larger, more popular genealogy web sites currently on the WWW. It claims that it has two missions: "1.To make large volumes of data available to the online genealogical community at minimal cost. 2. To provide support services to online genealogical activities such as USENET newsgroup moderation, mailing list maintenance, surname list generation, etc."

A really nice feature of this web site is that it incorporates search engines along with its databases to let you search for records online. It has enhanced search engines for the 293,287-name Roots Surname List and the Roots Location List. As resources allow, they plan to bringing more databases like the Social Security Death Index, census extracts, and county history indices online.

An important service provided at this site is support to Usenet newsgroup moderators, mailing list owners, surname list maintainers, and file archive maintainers. RootsWeb registries allow online genealogists to post information at RootsWeb directly from their Web browser. They have registries for family associations, family reunions, personal web pages, professional genealogists, and many others.

RootsWeb freely provides space on their servers for 1,500+ home pages of genealogical and historical societies and to groups such as US GenWeb. The Olive Tree Genealogy Home page, with its ship lists and other resources, was one of the first to join RootsWeb. Pay a visit to their guests page to find out who else is listed there.

The ROOTS-L Library offers down-loadable files on a wide variety of subjects such as: Beginning Genealogy; Family History Centers; Terms and Definitions; Specific Ethnic, Religious, or Social Groups; Historical Names and Families; Members of Historical Groups; American Civil War; Information about using ROOTS-L; Genealogical Resources on the

Internet; General Resources on the Internet; Regional Resources; Genealogy on your Computer; and Dates and Calendars. Their FTP site can be found at:

This area contains more than 400 megabytes of files that are available

over the Web by FTP transfer or by the archive function of the mailing list software.

While all of RootsWeb's databases, mailing lists, and other activities are open to the public, selected services that are conveniences (like automatic notification when your surnames appear in new material uploaded to RootsWeb) or

expensive to provide (like Web serving personal GEDCOM files) are available only to Members (\$12 per year) and Sponsors (\$24 per year).

The Roots Surname List is one of the most widely used and important aspects of the RootsWeb site. ROOTS-L started out as a LISTSERV mailing list at NDSU in late 1987. After several moves, they currently reside as a SmartList mailing list hosted out of RootsWeb. The Roots Surname List (RSL) is a list or registry of surnames (approximately 200,000 surnames and over 20,000 net.genealogists, with additional names arriving at the rate of over 600 a day). Associated with each surname are dates and locations, and information about how to contact the person who submitted the surname. The web-searchable RSL is currently only updated once a month, on the first Sunday of the month. There is no charge to participate, although RootsWeb, the major sponsor of this effort, does accept voluntary contributions.

A second way of submitting your surname is via e-mail. In this case please read the instructions at this site carefully before submitting data and follow the basic guidelines exactly as described.

If you see a surname listed that interests you, especially if there is a good match on dates and locations, contact the person who submitted the surname by their uniquely selected nametag/hyperlink. Simply click on the submitter's nametag to be shown the submitter's contact information.

As to the future, we quote directly from their web site, "RootsWeb is still in its infancy, and the primary focus to date has been on building the infrastructure: there's a lot happening, but most of it has been backstage until now. RootsWeb began official public operation in August of 1996, and we're still actively adding functionality."



SHREVEPORT TIMES OBITUARIES

JANUARY 1, 1884 -- DECEMBER 31, 1884

Obituaries in the early newspapers were limited and placed in various locations in the copy. Therefore, it is most difficult to locate this data. Furthermore, very seldom were family members mentioned. Frequently, much more emphasis was placed on obituaries from out of the city than local residents. The following obituaries are in a series of 1880s and 1890s obituaries which have been extracted from the *Shreveport Daily Times*, Shreveport, Louisiana. [Note that if the date of death is listed as *about* - date of newspaper is given.] The microfilm is located on the third floor of the Shreve Memorial Library, Genealogy Department, Shreveport, Louisiana. This series began in Vol. IX, No. 2 (2nd Q 1997).

Cora C. VanceDied in New Orleans 29 Dec 1883. Widow of Hamilton R. Vanceand daughter of Robert A. Crain. Aunt of N. C. Blanchard, M. S. Crain, and L. B. Crain. [Note:Lawrence B. Crain was at one time the mayor of Shreveport; N. C. Blanchard became governor ofLouisiana.]

Dr. William M. Turner Died in Shreveport at 11:55 p.m. 7 Jan 1884; age 72. Born in Tennessee, 10 Oct 1812. Served as assistant surgeon during the Florida War. He settled near Blossom Hill, six miles beyond SpringRidge. He moved to Shreveport after the war and practiced medicine at Shreveport Charity Hospital for 10 years. Leaves wife and daughter [not named]. Masonic funeral held 8 Jan 1884 at 4 p.m. [Note: Buried Oakland Cemetery] [Times 9 Jan 1884]

James Albion McRadyDied in Shreveport 9 Jan 1884; age 3 years. Son of E. C. and AliceMcRady. Funeral held at family residence at Common and Cotton - 10 Jan 1884 at 10 a.m. Burial
at SpringRidge.[Times 10 Jan 1884]

Mrs. C. E. Willie Died in Marshall at the home of her grandson, the Pope Brothers. 6 Jan 1884. Burial at the Marshall Cemetery. She was the mother of Chief Justice Willie.

[Times 10 Jan 1884]

Adele RobicheauxResident of Shreveport, but died in Baton Rouge where she was
visiting. She was burned to death Wednesday a.m. at 8 o'clock, and was the daughter of Thomas
Robicheaux. Her skirt caught fire from the fireplace and she was badly burned. She lived 12-13

Eustace Barrow Lowe Native of Shreveport and son of Robert G. Lowe, managing editor of the Galveston News. He was lost at sea aboard the whaler "Dawn" out of San Francisco, sometime in March, 1883. He was the nephew of Judge J. C. Moncure of Shreveport. [Times 22 Jan 1884]

Mrs. Olivia H. Jenkins Resident of SpringRidge and wife of Samuel C. Jenkins. Died at age 32 years, 6 months, 2 days, the result of childbirth. She was the second daughter of Washington and Olivia B. Jenkins. Her child, born two weeks before her death, died shortly before its mother. She is survived by one child, age 6, and her husband. [Times 23 Jan 1884]

Mrs. Annie LeonardDied 28 Jan 1884 at age 76.She was a longtime resident ofShreveport. Funeral held at residence on Texas Street.[Times 19 Jan 1884]

Gus LevelDied of smallpox Saturday, 2 Feb 1884, at or near the pesthouse.He was a colored man, age 30, honest, respectable and truthful. He aided many during the scourge
of 1873.[Times 4 Feb 1884]
Elder E. N. Kirley Died 30 Jan 1884 - Resident of Bossier Parish for 30 years. Age 67 - Baptist. [Times 7 Feb 1884]

Mrs. Sarah Hyman Age 56 - funeral held at residence - Marshall and McNeil 3 p.m. [Times 12 Feb 1884]

Mrs. Virginia Listor Land Age 37- Resident of Shreveport and wife of Alfred D. Land, died Sunday, 10 Feb at 4:30 p.m. Survivors include husband and five children - not named. Funeral held [Times 12 Feb 1884]

Mrs. P. FortnerDied 1 Feb 1884 at age 64.Residence near Longwood, LA.Survivors include four children [not named].[Times 12 Feb 1884]

W. F. Loper Resident of Shreveport, died Friday night, 30 Feb 1884, at his residence near Commerce and Travis. He was employed by John R. Jones Sawmill. Loper had recently married and leaves a young wife. [Times 3 Mar 1884]

Mrs. Elizabeth S. Frierson Died 30 Feb 1884 at age 57. She was the wife of Robert B. Frierson and the daughter of Jacob S. Allison of Dallas Ct., AL. She leaves six children.

REMOVAL OF PRIESTS TO FINAL RESTING PLACE

The remains of Fathers Pierce, Lavoisonet, and Quemerais were removed from the Catholic Church yesterday to a final resting place in St. Joseph's Cemetery. A large number of persons attended the obsequies which were conducted by the Rev. Father Gentille, the ceremonies commencing at 9 o'clock. After a high requiem mass in the Church and sermon by Father Gentille, the remains were conveyed from the church to the cemetery where a funeral sermon was delivered by the officiating priest and the mortal remains of the self-sacrificing and noble martyrs were lowered to their final resting place with the blessing of the priest and benediction of the Church and people. [Note: These priests gave their lives caring for the ill during the Yellow Fever Epidemic of 1873]

J. B. Hinkle Died at age 50, Monday, 13 Oct 1884, at 4 a.m. He was born in Shreveport and serviced with Capt. Robson's Company of the 25th Louisiana Volunteers. He was wounded at the Battle of Murphreesboro. He was a steamboat pilot during the remainder of the war with the Trans-Mississippi Department, Capt. Cassiday's Company. He had suffered from painful rheumatism for many years. [Times 14 Oct 1884]
