Dear Miss Ima G* Bugg: How does a person become a professional genealogist and get to put those letters behind their name?

Dear Wanna B. Appro: There is an agency, the Board for Certification of Genealogists, that issues a test to see if you are ready to earn the right to be acknowledged as a Board Certified Genealogist. It would probably be fun for you to take a practice test. You can test your research skills by going to the website for the Board for Certification of Genealogists www.bcgcertification.org. Download a couple of handwritten deeds and see if you find as much information and can abstract the document as well as a professional researcher would.

Dear Miss Ima G* Bugg: My parents moved to Detroit from near Athens, Texas, and I now live in a Chicago suburb. There is not much to research here on northeast Texas. Could you recommend something I might order by interlibrary loan?

Dear Ex Tex: I know of a jewel of a book on Athens, Texas. It is a compilation of articles with family information by Robert W. Strain titled *Indexed Weekly Newspapers Athens, Texas: Forty Years (1900-1959) With Anthology*. It may be ordered from Strain Publishing & Seminars Inc. Box 1520, Athens, TX 75751-1520. It should give you many good hints on your family and its connections.

Dear Miss Ima G* Bugg: I have a big problem. I have two names for my great grandfather, Joseph R. Brant and Joel Brant. I feel like saying, "will the real great grandfather please stand up." Any suggestions?

Dear Well Endowed: Most people are searching for the name of their great grandfather, but you have more than one name. This is not too bad of a problem as genealogical problems go. Let me guess, you have as sources abstracts printed in books or names listed in indexes, right? A good, solid rule of thumb in genealogy is to go to the original source. It does not take too many generations to get us back into handwritten court records and when it comes to interpreting the clerk of court's handwriting, we have to allow for a margin of error. Your two given names, Joseph R. and Joel, are not so distant. I would suggest researching the original record, and do not stop with just two records. Research deeds, and do not forget to look at deeds, wills, and marriage records of collateral family members where he may have been a witness. You will probably discover that either a human error was made in interpreting the handwriting or that there may have been two men of similar given name, but you will probably solve the riddle.

Dear Miss Ima G* Bugg: Indulge a city-bred genealogist and tell me just what species are oxen. Are they hybrids like mules?

Dear City-Bred: At least you are honest about your ignorance. The ox is not a special specie. An ox is a two-year-old or older steer, as in beef. Nowadays since their great strength is not needed to pull wagons or haul logs out of the forest, as a beef yearling nears age two it will be designated for breeding or for a future Big Mac, so we just do not see oxen around any more.

The Goodspeed Publishing Co. of Chicago traveled around the nation enlisting subscriptions from each county. If you signed up to buy a county history, you got to put in your biography. For further remuneration you could have your photograph included. Obviously if your ancestor had experienced a bad crop year or thought the whole idea was bunk, you will not find his biography in a Goodspeed county history.

Greetings from the Genealogy Department.

The Department is pleased to say that we've just finished a busy and hectic summer. Our statistics show that we were shelving an average of 3,500 books a month. We do not currently keep tabs on the number of microfilms we shelve, but I'm sure it would be just as high, if not higher. Donations have continued to be high for which we are extremely grateful.

Genealogy is also excited about several technological changes. Several months ago, the Department created its own E-mail address: smlgenealogy@yahoo.com. Patrons are welcome to submit their questions to us twenty-four hours a day. Because of this new service, Genealogy has seen a rise in out-of-state queries. On September 28 we received an E-mail from a researcher in Amsterdam, our first international request. The Genealogy Department now owns a scanner and a CD-ROM burner. I plan on scanning fragile books and papers from the vertical files onto a CD. Hopefully, this will help us not only preserve the materials, but also make them more accessible to researchers. Eventually, some of this material will be placed onto our Web page.

Speaking of the Web page, keep your eye out for changes coming to the genealogy section of the SML website: www.shreve-lib.org. I want to make the website an one-stop shop for all your genealogy needs by linking the most common and popular genealogy websites to ours with an annotation of each link. Eventually, I would like patrons to be able to submit their research queries and Interlibrary Loan requests directly from the website.

Lastly, more genealogy classes will be offered in November at least once a week. Each class will be two hours in length and will cover topics such as ancestry.com, familysearch.org, military records, courthouse records, etc. All classes will be held in the Genealogy Department unless a group requests them to be held at another branch. Further information about the classes will be posted at all branches and on the website.

Thank you to everyone for all of your support and appreciation of the Genealogy Department. Continue to give me your ideas and suggestions about additions to the library or programs that you would like to see.

INDEX OF CADDO PARISH SUCCESSIONS

This is a previously unpublished index of the first original Caddo Parish Succession Suits. Neither the Index nor the suits have ever been microfilmed. The handwritten Index and the suits are located in the Caddo Parish Courthouse and the suits date from the inception of the parish (1838) to 1879. The Index was transcribed by Joe Slattery, Genealogy Librarian at Shreve Memorial Library in Shreveport, LA. The lower suit numbers are the earlier suits filed. [*Series began in Vol. XIII, No. 2*]

The records list the taxpayer's name, the year of assessment, and quantity of land as well as the values of land, livestock, and personal property. We are listing here only the amount of land shown for each year; a blank field indicates that there is no listing for that taxpayer for that year. The years 1865 - 1868 are combined into one tax roll. "None" indicates that the taxpayer is listed for poll tax and/or personal property tax and does not own land.

Tracing an Ancestor in a State Mental Hospital

This article is based on a newspaper article entitled "The Mystery of Plot 903" by Denise Gamino appearing in the Austin American-Statesman, Sunday, May 6, 2001, excerpts reprinted with permission from the newspaper.

"Ed Davis slipped from this world before he even died. Census takers overlooked him. His former wife thought he was dead. His children lost touch. And friends had only memories of a Confederate soldier from Texas who returned from war to find his family taken by another man. When Ed Davis did die, in 1902, he fell into deeper shadows. He was buried with no name. He got only a number."

Most of us have mysteries in our genealogical research—a man or woman who just disappears. Some turn out to be '49ers who went in search of gold in California; some just abandoned families to turn up a couple of states away with a new family; some are never found. Merrell Davis, a retired police officer from California, is tracing his great-grandfathers. Three of them were Texans, Confederate veterans. He has visited the gravesite of two of them and is searching for confirmation on the third, James Edward Davis.

Here is what Merrell Davis believes is a synopsis of his great-grandfather's life:

"Born between 1824 and 1827 in South Carolina. Came to Texas in the 1850s. Worked at a ranch near Austin cutting shingles from cypress trees along the Pedernales River. Married Elizabeth "Annie" Holcomb in 1859. A son was born in 1861. His son grew to be a much-loved cattle puncher and McCulloch County judge known as 'Wild John,' who rode a bucking bronc at age 60 to prove age didn't matter to an old cowhand raised in the saddle.

"Texas went Confederate and Ed Davis joined up in April 1861. Served as private in the 2nd Cavalry under Brig. Gen. Henry H. Sibley at Glorieta Pass in 1862 outside Santa Fe, NM, a battle called the Gettysburg of the West. Discharged, October 1865. Returned home to find wife and son living with another man and a baby girl."

Ed Davis was ordered to leave by the still unknown man and threatened with a bullwhip, whereupon he pulled a cavalry pistol and shot the man dead on the front porch. No prosecution records can be found.

Ed Davis then dropped out of sight until 1874 when he married Mary Ann Blackwell Wasson, a Confederate war widow. A son, James William Davis, was born in 1875 and is Merrell Davis' grandfather.

"Ed Davis began wandering off for days at a time, sometimes taking 2-year-old James with him. One day he stood in the Colorado River east of Austin with his son in his arms and refused to come ashore. Five men wrestled him to the ground and took him to the

State Lunatic Asylum in Austin.” A report on record at Austin State Hospital states, “He is quiet and often enjoys long periods in which his mind is clear where he spends his time in keeping the outer gate. When excited, he grows violent and indulges in fighting.”

Merrell Davis found an obituary for Ed Davis’ first wife that stated Ed Davis had died in 1880. An article in the *Austin Daily Statesman* of November 12, 1902, entitled “Lunatic Twenty-Five Years” states that Edmond Davis, “Connected in Travis County--Dies in the Insane Asylum--The Relatives Are Unknown” and was buried in the asylum cemetery.

Merrell Davis encountered many bureaucratic obstacles in his search through State Hospital records. His first inquiry netted a “no records found” response. A later letter stated the hospital was “100 percent sure” he had not been a patient. Finally a state mental health lawyer obtained a one-page asylum record for Edmund Davis. Edmund Davis appears in the 1880 Census, but not in the 1900 Census.

The Austin State Hospital refused to release further records to Merrell Davis without a ruling from the Texas attorney general’s office. Merrell Davis wrote for a ruling, stating in part, “These people need every effort to give them back their dignity taken from them out of ignorance and stigma. They need to be acknowledged and recognized how they suffered in life—now that we are more enlightened. We are their voices and we need to speak for them. Or are we ever mired in the shameful treatment and stripped of our integrity to right it?”

In February the attorney general’s office ruled that Merrell Davis could view all the records about the cemetery and his great-grandfather. He flew back to Austin and spent several days pouring over crumbling records. Making a chronology of patient deaths, he has come to believe his great-grandfather is buried in Plot 903. Determining the site of Plot 903 is itself a challenge. Some 2,800 mental patients were buried anonymously in the asylum cemetery. Graves are marked with a small flat stone bearing a number.

Merrell Davis did obtain a map of the gravesites and was able to find Plot 903. He knows that exhumation would be required to firmly establish by DNA tests that Plot 903 is the grave of his great-grandfather, but at the time of this article he had made no formal request.

Hopefully the rulings made in Merrell Davis’ search will open up opportunities for other families to view records of ancestors who were once patients in state hospitals.

Frank M. Buckelew – Indian Captive

The following is an excerpt from an article a member shared with me. I hope it may be helpful to those researching the local Buckelew family. This article comprises pages 106-111 of a book titled Yesteryears, and appears to contain sketches of families in central west Texas.

Frank M. Buckelew was born in Union Parish, LA on October 3, 1852, the youngest in a family of nine children. At age two his family moved to Texas where his father hoped for “more elbow room.” The Buckelew family settled near Hellencamp in Cherokee County. Frank’s mother and a sister died in 1856 when he was four years old and his father soon remarried. Sadly, Frank’s father became ill and died also. An uncle, Berry Buckelew, invited the orphaned children to join him in his home on the Sabinal River in Uvalde County. The children traveled by ox-drawn wagon to Uncle Berry Buckelew’s ranch. In January 1866 Berry Buckelew was shot by Indians while returning from a trip to San Antonio for supplies. His body was found and buried January 27, 1866 in a small cemetery near the Sabinal River.

Again the orphaned Buckelew children found a home, this time with James Booker Davenport who had a nearby ranch. One day it was discovered that a returning ox was missing a bell, and a young black boy, Morris, was charged with carelessness and ordered to find the bell. Frank Buckelew accompanied Morris to search for the bell and they came upon Lipan Indians hiding in the brush. Morris was able to outrun the Indians and return to the ranch, but Frank Buckelew was captured.

He was questioned by an older Indian named Custaleta who spoke broken English. He inquired if Frank was American or Dutch, and Frank probably saved his life by convincing them he was American and only 10 years old. It seems settlers believed that the Indians would scalp a captive boy who was more than 10 or 12 years old. Also the animosity toward the “Dutch” was no doubt due to quarrels they had with a German colony nearby.

The Lipan party traveled west with their captive to a village near the Pecos River. On introduction to the village, Frank Buckelew was beaten and forced to run a gauntlet of villagers who struck him with various sticks, quirks or clubs. After this violent beginning, he settled into the life of a captive and herded horses for the tribe. The elder Custaleta even chose a prospective wife for Frank Buckelew.

After a few months another party raided into Bandera County and returned with clothing that Frank recognized as belonging to the Bolden children who also lived on the Davenport ranch. Custaleta told Frank that his mother and sister had been killed. Frank knew his mother was long-time dead and none of the clothing belonged to his sisters, so he tried very hard to disbelieve that any of his sisters had been killed.

A peace treaty had been signed with Mexico and some of the Lipans prepared to move across the Rio Grande. Frank Buckelew was part of the tribe that moved camp to just outside San Vicente, Mexico. He was given freedom to go into San Vicente to trade. A stranger who came to the Lipan camp to gamble tried to purchase Frank from Custaletta, but Custaletta asked for \$500. The stranger told Frank he would write to his family in Bandera County and ask for the money, which he did. But Frank's sisters, on receiving the letter, believed it to be false and sent no money.

A Mr. Hudson who was working on an irrigation canal on the Rio Grande heard that the Lipans held a white boy captive and told a Mexican employee to try to get the boy away from the Indians. The Mexican met Frank in San Vicente and offered to help him escape if he could steal a horse and come to San Vicente at night. Frank was able to do this and the Mexican led him across the Rio Grande to Hudson's home. There the Hudson family gave him clothes, food and a bath. The following day Hudson and the Mexican took him to Fort Clark where he received medicine to combat his head lice. A sergeant there gave him a cap and made him promise to return to Fort Clark if he found all of his sisters dead in Bandera County.

When the trio reached the home of Judge Newman Patterson in Uvalde County, the local people prepared a reward for Hudson and the Mexican, giving them more than fifty head of steers and some money. Those listed as subscribing to the reward were Judge Patterson, J. L. Snow, G. P. Snow, Gid Thompson, Aaron Angling, Bill Adams, John Ware, Bob Kincheloe, Cris Kelley, Leek Kelley, Joel Finley, John Finley, William Finley, Mr. Vanpelt, Captain Watkins, J. L. Robison, Judge J. B. Davenport, William Davenport, Uncle Johnnie Jones, and F. L. Hicks, Sr.

During Frank Buckelew's 11-month captivity, the Davenport family had moved from Anglin's Creek into the town of Bandera, and it was here that Frank, with shoulder length red hair, the sergeant's cap, and traces of Indian paint, had a joyful reunion with his sisters and friends who had given him up for dead. Frank joined the Methodist Episcopal Church under the ministry of A. J. Potter and married Nancy Witter in Bandera. The couple had nine children, six of who lived to adulthood. In 1895, Frank Buckelew was licensed to preach by the Methodist Church. He and his family moved to Arkansas for about a year, but soon returned to Bandera County. He loved to dress in Indian costume and visit the schools of Bandera County, telling about his experiences as an Indian captive.

THE ERVIN FAMILY IN MISSISSIPPI

John Ervin (1796-1878) was born in Marion District, SC 2 Dec 1796 and emigrated to Hinds Co., MS at age 18. He was the son of one of Francis Marion's colonels, John Ervin (1754-1810) and his second wife, Margaret Ervin (a cousin). Margaret Ervin (1770-1798) was the daughter of Hugh Ervin, Sr. and Elizabeth James.

A group of Scots-Irish Presbyterians from Belfast, Ireland settled in SC in 1732 at Potato Ferry on the Black River, in present day Williamsburg County. Among the names of those who made the voyage from Belfast were those of Gordon, Wilson, Witherspoon, James, Cooper, McCaury and Ervin.

John Ervin (1754-1810) used several blank pages in the family Bible to record the family history and concluded with this admonition:

“Nowe, my Children, I adjure you, Hold to your Hearts always, your Grande & Glorious Heritage. Your forbears have laid requisite Precepts for you to follow. May they bee a Stimulus to laudable Ambition soe you will make Worthy Contributions to your Country, bee a Faithful Servant to your Church & add Renown & Splendor to the History of the Irvine Family. My Blessings rest upon you. May Jehovah bee with you and prosper you.”

John Ervin (1796-1787) migrated to Mississippi about 1814 and settled first in Marion County, MS. He joined the Methodist Church and was a planter. Following is part of a letter written from Hinds, Miss. On May 7, 1853 to his nephew, Bob Ervin:

“You wished to know if Hugh moved west of Missouri. He merely went to look at the country, but came back disappointed and located in old Hinds again, three miles from where he formerly lived. He has some 1,100 acres of tolerably good upland. Can you get him a good wife? I rather think he is a candidate or soon will be; his children are scattered. He has his little boys with him. His eldest daughter is with Thomas going to school; his youngest is with me; a daughter lives about six miles from me; Henry, three miles; Margaret is living in Claiborne, twenty sever miles. They are all steady and hope will do well. You requested me to say something of Burch. The last I knew he was teaching school between Raymond and Clinton – and at that time was doing well – but you are aware of his weak points. My crop this last season was good, some nine bales to the hand, making some \$275.00 to the hand, - plenty of provisions, corn, meat, etc. You

wrote me your plan of farming, which I think is good. Had I the facilities should adopt it, let cotton go ahead or not. It gives room for great improvements to the farm. Where we have a full cotton crop it is out of the question. . . . Give my best respects to your Sarah, and tell her I should be much pleased to become acquainted with her, if she could stand my roughness. I should write more, but am about starting to church.”

John Ervin (1796-1787) married first Asenath Ford, daughter of John and Catherine Ford and they had three children, Hugh Ford Ervin, John Ervin, and Thomas Griffin Ervin.

John Ervin’s second marriage was to Harriet Glenn Pope Bridgers, widow, daughter of John and Elizabeth Pope. They had three children, Samuel Clinton Ervin, Henry Pope Ervin and Margaret Elizabeth Ervin.

At the time John Ervin married Harriet Bridgers, he had two surviving sons, Hugh Ford Ervin and Thomas Griffin Ervin, know as Tom. Harriet Bridgers also had a son named Tom, the same age as Tom Ervin, so the potential for complications in the household was great. These two boys came to be called by their full names, Tom Ervin and Tom Bridgers. Here’s part of the story in Clara Ervin’s home-spun voice:

“Time passed and the two Toms were growing to be big boys for their 9 years. One cold winter’s morning Tom Ervin waked to find the ground covered with snow. He called, ‘Tom Bridgers, wake up, everything’s white!’ Both Toms jumped out of bed, scrambled for their clothes, and when Tom Bridgers saw Tom Ervin was besting him, he threw one of Tom’s shoes in the fire. Business picked up, and Tom Bridgers’ cries brought his mother on the run. When Col. Ervin learned the facts, he pronounced the same verdict on both culprits. ‘Tom Bridgers, since Tom Ervin has no shoes and cannot go out into the snow, you shall not go either.’ Both boys looked broken hearted – Tom Bridgers went to his mother for consolation as he dared not disobey his step-father. Tom Ervin, on the contrary, felt no remorse at the beating he had given his step-brother, but he did desire some show of compassion from someone, so, risking his father’s ire, he slipped out and ran down to Aunt Jenny’s warm cabin to tell her what had happened.”

John Ervin’s third marriage 13 Feb 1861 was to Elizabeth Waller Bradley, daughter of John and Mary Bradley. This marriage was brief, no issue.

John Ervin’s fourth marriage 24 Dec 1863 was to Beatina Nixon, daughter of Rev. Thomas and Elizabeth Nixon. Beatina survived him and there was no issue. John died at his home in Hinds County, MS 6 Mar 1878 and is buried in Bear Creek Cemetery, near Utica, Hinds County.

Hugh Ford Ervin (b. 1817), first son of John Ervin and Asenath Ford, was educated at Danville, KY. He served as a private in the Confederate Army. He was a planter and a member of the Methodist Church. He married Delilah W. Pope about 1841 and they had four children, Amelia Louis Ervin, John Ervin, Charles Ervin and Elizabeth Helen Ervin.

Thomas Griffin Ervin (b. 1825-1900), third son of John Ervin and Asenath Ford, was educated at Centenary College. He served as a quartermaster sergeant in the Confederate Army. He was a planter and married 25 Dec 1850 Martha Ann Sumrall, daughter of Henry Sumrall and Sarah Neal. They had twelve children:

Our history continues with the descendants of Eugene Griffin Ervin (1860-1935). Eugene Ervin was a dairyman, a carpenter, a Democrat and a Baptist. He lived in Vicksburg, MS, and married Emily Clyde Logue on January 13, 1891. They had twelve children:

Thomas Griffin Ervin (1892-1938) married Louise Brooks Green. They lived in Shreveport but had no children. Katie Viola Ervin (1895-1978) majored in piano, married Harry Eugene Melton on July 23, 1916, and they made their home in Charleston, SC. When Patrick Ervin (1904-1989) finished high school he went to work as a fireman in Vicksburg. When his first vacation time was accrued, he considered whether to go visit his brother, Tom, who lived in Shreveport or his sister, Katie, in Charleston whom he had not seen in 18 years. This important decision was made by flipping a coin, and Shreveport won. The Shreveport visit had a major impact on Patrick for his brother was renting to a mother and daughter, Delphine and Aline Welch. Young Aline had just started working for the Cumberland Telephone Company and was quite the young lady.

Opportunities in Shreveport convinced Patrick Ervin to move to Shreveport, where he went to work for the Shreveport Fire Department, and married Aline Welch on May 1, 1926. Patrick and Aline had three daughters:

1. Margaret Myrle (Patsy) Ervin who married Lyle Arnold (Doc) Wibben.
2. Shirley June Ervin who married W. E. (Bill) Huckabay
3. Glynda Fay Ervin who married James Edgar Johnson

Patrick Ervin worked for the Shreveport Fire Department for 20 years, retiring in 1946. He died October 4, 1989 and is buried at Centuries Memorial Cemetery. Aline Welch Ervin has eight grandchildren, fourteen great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. We appreciate her sharing this Ervin history with us.
