

#### Dear Miss Bugg:

I just read a bunch of these explanations about where the terms in our language come from and it said "putting on the dog" derived from the colonial practice of making shoes or gloves out of dog skin. This is terrible! How could our ancestors do this?

Dear Horrified: Such little saying are idioms. You probably got your information over the Internet. Don't be an idiot and believe everything you receive via the Internet about idioms. According to a reliable source, the expression "putting on the dog" most probably referred to the fad among wealthy people for keeping lap dogs. Try scanning the pages for your family name before you send the book back.

#### THEOPHILE'S CLIPBOARD

What's your game plan whenever you are going to meet a team of heavy hitters? Here's a secret we used in the summer of 1944.

Playing out of Greenville, NC that season, our team manager was Marine Sergeant Major Bennett who gathered the best talent he could assemble to help represent our base. This guy was a genuine *Reader's Digest* "Most Unforgettable Character". For two months he taught me the other things the fine Sisters of Divine Providence failed to teach in 11 grades (11 grades in those days) nor taught by college coaches in 4 years.

In catechism, by the rote method, we learned the Pope was infallible—but the good nuns must have never heard of Sergeant Major Bennett with cobwebs of stripes on his sleeve.

Sarge filled the gap of past teachers and introduced me to the new world. He was a knowledgeable man, worldly wise, and knew his baseball.

Quickly I noted his kind virtues—never argued with umps, gave players weekend passes despite the fact that it weakened the team, etc. Although we represented an air base, he wouldn't even let us fly—too dangerous—so if we played a series 150 miles away that started on Friday, we left our base on Wednesday.

One weekend we had a scheduled game with the Raleigh All-Stars, a select group of the best players from the area. En route to the game he handed me a box of baseballs and told me to keep them separate from the others. He stated his intentions were to use them and give away what were left. Strangely, the box felt cold.

In our pregame discussion Sarge startled me when he told the outfield to play in close. I remember our conversation, "Play close and be ready to come in fast."

"Sarge, I watched them in batting practice and they can pound that ball, I always play shallow and I can hardly make it to the fence on flies."

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"Forget the fence, do as I say."
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<sup>&</sup>quot;Who is going to pitch?" I asked.

<sup>&</sup>quot;I am," replied Sarge.

<sup>&</sup>quot;And you want me to play close?"

<sup>&</sup>quot;Yes, and shut up, college boy, no wise cracks."

As all good stories should end, we won 5 to 2 despite four bobbles on grounders to the infield.

That night Sarge celebrated as usual, but this time he let the cat out of the bag. Seems the box of balls he handed me had been placed for several weeks in the icehouse at Greenville and frozen solid. They thawed on the trip. No wonder the box felt cold.

Sarge's best pitch was his wind-up, but he did have control. He put it in there, they connected, and the ball died on the way to the outfield. The seven put outs I made felt like catching snowflakes. There was no resilience left in the baseball after thawing.

As an act of kindness in furnishing the balls, he made sure we got the good ones and the All-Stars got the thawed; however, I believe his ego got the best of him in the 7<sup>th</sup>, or maybe he just delivered the wrong ball.

One player mentioned we had a 25-win, 4-loss record—three of those losses were weekends when several key guys were on liberty. Bennett celebrated just as much.

Sergeant Major Bennett had a unique technique in leading us—however, his goals and how to achieve them were reminiscent of the wartime '40s.

#### **Funeral Guest Registers**

If you have a pack-rat relative you just may find an old guest register from an ancestor's funeral. Quite likely it will provide useful information such as who was living where on that date and may give clues to family connections you were unaware of. I have given more attention to my early generations than to my later ones, especially skimming over the ancestors whose lives coincided with mine. I remember visiting one maternal great-grandfather who lived to be 93, but I did not realize my other maternal great-grandfather had also lived to 93 until I saw his name on the guest register at my grandmother's funeral. My heart went out to this gentle, pious man who saw his own daughter die. I had the statistics of his life written down, it just had not registered in my lame brain that he had such a long life.

At age 7, I was considered too young to attend my grandmother's funeral and going over the guest book was almost like an instant replay. I was surprised to see that the lady my grandfather married six months later attended grandmother's funeral. I well remember how upset my mother was when he remarried. Perhaps her dismay was not unfounded.

If you have found an old, undated letter, hang on to the envelope. If there is no postmark or the postmark is illegible, there are other guides to dating the letter. Stamps were not used until 1847, but using the guide below you just may be able to determine a closer date by the denomination of the stamp. Our source gives the following dates and first class per-ounce postage rates:

#### The 1930 Census

Genealogists across the country are beginning to research the 1930 Census. In our area the 1930 Census may be researched at the Regional Office in Ft. Worth, TX. The Shreve Memorial Library has funds to purchase the Louisiana and Mississippi film plus the accompanying Soundex for these states. We hope to have this addition to the Genealogy Department early September.

HeritageQuest has just announced a new book to facilitate one's research of this new census: *The 1930 Census: A Reference and Research Guide* by Thomas Jay Kemp. HeritageQuest provides the following regarding content of this book:

One of the first things that strikes you about the 1930 Census is how clear and legible the handwriting is. Perhaps this is the first generation to take to heart those years of penmanship lessons.

The 1930 Census was the last census to ask the same questions of every household. More than 100,000 enumerators covered the US and her outlying territories and documented all 124 million of us. One enumerator, William J. Little almost died when he collapsed from thirst and exhaustion in Death Valley after his car died. Luckily he was found by a prospector and taken to the nearest town, preserving his life and the census records he had recorded.

Several families across the country immortalized the work of the census in the names of their children. A family in Athens, Georgia was so pleased to have their names on the census that they named their newborn child "Census Tooken" and in St. Louis, Missouri a proud father named his child born nine months after the census was taken "Census FRIAR."

One tip for this census is that military records are not grouped together but appear within the returns for the state where the base was located. Overseas troops based in Alaska, Hawaii, Guam, American Samoa and the Panama Canal Zone were enumerated with the returns for those "outlying territories." Another unique feature in this book is a guide to the reel and page numbers for the Consular Reports is given in the appendix.

The government prepared soundex and miracode indexes to the 1930 Census. *The 1930 Census: A Reference and Research Guide* goes into detail on how these indexes were created, tips for searching them and what you can expect in the 1930 census.

This guide explains not just how to use the Census of Population but also the Census of Agriculture, Census of Religious Bodies and the other less well-known special censuses. The Census of Religious Bodies is particularly interesting as it includes a brief biographical return for every member of the clergy and a detailed statistical description of the hundreds of denominations and their local congregations across the country. This is an excellent tool for learning how many Methodist or Presbyterian churches existed in a

given town and knowing which strain of the denomination that they, and their records, followed.

Did you know that the Census Bureau did a study of marriage patterns in 1930? This guide summarizes their detailed conclusions and points out that couples living in North Dakota often got married in Moorhead, Minnesota; that after Texas imposed a new 3 day waiting period for getting married that Texans went to Arkansas, Louisiana, and Oklahoma to get married.

The guide also alerts us to the Special Municipal Censuses that were taken between the census years. There were more than 20 of these carried out in Alabama, Indiana, Illinois, Oklahoma and other states. Many researchers have never heard of these "extra" censuses.

The 1930 Census: A Reference and Research Guide is packed with information that genealogists will rely on to get the most from the 1930 Census and to push forward in their research. You'll want to get your copy now!

#### Jackson Parish, LA Tax Assessment Rolls 1865-1868

This list has been copied from the microfilmed records. The records were of poor quality at the time of filming and are in many places difficult or impossible to read. As a result, this transcription will contain many errors but it is hoped that this information will assist those researchers with Jackson Parish ties. As always, please verify this information with the microfilmed records.

The records list the taxpayer's name, the year of assessment, and quantity of land as well as the values of land, livestock, and personal property. We are listing here only the amount of land shown for each year; a blank field indicates that there is no listing for that taxpayer for that year. The years 1865-1868 are combined into one tax roll. "None" indicates that the taxpayer is listed for poll tax and/or personal property tax and does not own land.

#### WOODARD WALKER CEMETERY

This cemetery is located on private property in Webster Parish and you have to cross other property to get to it. Take Louisiana Highway #531 south from Dubberly, Louisiana for approx. five miles, turn left (east) on Central School Road, go east approx. 2.4 miles, turn right and then left onto Lyons Road, go approx. 0.25 mile and turn left onto Irvin Rowland Road. Go to end of road, this is at the home of George SIMOLKE, the cemetery is located on the back of his property. He was kind enough to guide me back to the cemetery, which is located in SE1/4 of Section 9 Township 17 Range 8W. Survey made 10 Mar 2002 by John C. Head and 28 Mar 2002 by John C. Head and Mike O'Rourke.

Most of these families can be located on the 1850 census of Bienville Parish, Louisiana (page 268). Tom GRAY, Green B. LEWIS, James LEWIS, Herbert WALKER, Neil WALKER, Thomas WOODARD and William STILES, all patented land in this area in the late 1840s and early 1850s. This appears to have been the community cemetery for that time period. There was evidence of additional graves, including pieces of concrete, iron ore rocks, etc., and there could still be markers located in the thick black berry vines and under brush covering the area.



#### Louisiana's Oldest Confederate Veteran

This article began in the 1st Quarter, 2002 Journal and is completed in this issue.

In his inexhaustible quest for a Confederate pension, it seems Eli Townsend had outlived all witnesses who could have testified either for or against him. In fact, shame for denying a pension to a very old man appears to be the primary basis for granting his Confederate pension. Immediately following the establishment of the Confederate pension, if they thought to be rid of him by granting the pension, they were soon to be disappointed.

With his career as a Confederate Veteran established, Townsend writes to inquire if he can collect the pension retroactive to June 1, 1932 and to inform them he is not residing in Bonita, LA but instead is in Urania, LA. W. M. Stirling, Secretary of the Board of Pension Commissioners seems to enjoy telling him on Dec. 5, 1940 he will not receive any back pay.

Next on Oct. 1, 1941, we have a letter to the Department of Public Welfare from Mrs. Maggie Townsend of Olla, LA:

Am writing concerning William D. Townsend pension check I am his wife Mrs. Maggie Townsend when he get his check he will get made (sic) and leave and just waste and leave me without food are anything and never give me a penny I want to no if there would be any chance for me to get a part of it as I feel I am due half of it so if you need more information can furnish all that needed please let me hear at once and send mail to Olla, La. R. 1. We live on route he has his check come to Urania.

Wonders never cease! This poor old man who surely does not have much longer to live marries wife No. 4 on July 3, 1940, in LaSalle Parish, LA. Maggie Johnson Miller is a whole other story. One might say they deserved each other.

The ever responsive bureaucracy replies on Oct. 9, 1941, ". . . we advise you to discuss your problem with your worker in the LaSalle Parish office. Your worker is very interested in your situation and she will be glad to have the opportunity to discuss any problem which you wish to bring to her attention." This lucky worker is Miss Hilda Simon, Field Representative, who gets a carbon copy of the letter.

The correspondence field is quiet for 5 years and then Townsend writes to ask for an increase in his pension. W. S. Terry, Jr., Commissioner of Public Welfare, replies on Aug. 20, 1946, "We regret very much that it is not possible to increase the Confederate Pensions. This net amount was passed by the State legislature and it is not in our jurisdiction to vary it."

Oh, no problem, on Feb. 13, 1947 Townsend writes Governor Jimmie Davis. But Gov. Davis refers his letter to W. S. Terry, Jr. who patiently explains he is due no back pay, his \$60 will remain \$60.

On March 19, 1947, Mrs. W. D. Townsend writes the Department of Public Welfare:

This is Mr. William D. Townsend Wife asking if it would be possible for you all to grant Enough Money to Buy Mr. Townsend a suit of cloths a pair of shoes for his Birthday which will be the 12<sup>th</sup> of April he will be one hundred an one years old should he Live till then we are Planning to celebrate his Birthday on the thirteenth Sunday following it would be greatly appreciated yours very truly

Mrs. W. D. Townsend Olla, La. Gen Del

P.S. now I don't ask you to give me the Money Just send some one here and get and take him and fit him if you can do it at all if [not?] just through in wast Basket and forget I will guarantee every penny would go for him

Also on March 27, 1947 W. S. Terry, Jr. replies to Mrs. W. D. Townsend, "We are sorry that we cannot grant enough money to buy Mr. Townsend a birthday gift."

Well, Uncle Eli made it to his purported 101<sup>st</sup> birthday, suit or no suit, and in December 1947 enlists the assistance of W. T. Hodges, State Senator. Sen. Hodges writes the Hon. Sam Terry of the Welfare Department to see if Townsend can get any back pay or increase in his pension and states, "This is a fine old man and I guess the oldest Civil War Veteran in Louisiana, yet he is able to get around and go to the Post Office. If there is any assistance you can render in his behalf it would be highly appreciated."

Actually, Uncle Eli got around pretty well. Once his Confederate Pension was established William D. Townsend attended many Confederate Veterans' meetings, traveling to Natchez, Jackson, Biloxi-Gulfport, and Vicksburg, MS; New Orleans, LA; and Norfolk, VA. He entertained patients at the VA hospital, telling of his exploits and showing them the scar on his arm from his war wound.

On August 31, 1950, Lawrence E. Higgins, Commission of Public Welfare has completed a questionnaire sent by the State Comptroller's Office in Richmond, Virginia, and states, "Mr. William D. Townsend, Olla, Louisiana, is the only Confederate Veteran receiving a pension from the State of Louisiana. Mr. Townsend is now 104 years of age."

On Jan. 15, 1953 there is a memo from Edward P. Dameron, Commissioner of Public Welfare, to Mrs. Billy O. Walters, Director of LaSalle Parish Department of Public Works, "In the last few weeks we have had several inquires concerning Mr. Townsend. . . We would appreciate if you would visit Mr. Townsend and give us a report as to his present situation. . . it may be possible that he needs and would be eligible for assistance, but does not know that he can apply for it, since he is receiving the Confederate Veteran pension." Miss Hilda Simon is still that lucky Field Representative in LaSalle Parish and she gets a carbon copy of the memo.

On Feb. 26, 1953 Mrs. Billy O. Walters reports on her visit:

As requested . . . we started investigating the current situation of Mr. Townsend to determine whether he was receiving the full amount to which he was entitled as OAP. Before this investigation could be completed, Mr. Townsend passed away. We had investigated enough, however, to feel sure that Mr. Townsend was not in dire circumstances, in fact, there was an indication that his OAP grant would be reduced or possibly closed.

Again, Field Representative Hilda C. Simon gets a carbon copy.

Uncle Eli was given a grand funeral and is buried beneath an impressive monument in Greenwood Cemetery, Shreveport, LA. One obituary published at the time states that he was addressed as "General" by his many friends, and that his death left only four other Confederate veterans living in the United States.

On July 10, 1953 there is a letter from Otto E. Passman, U. S. Representative of the 8<sup>th</sup> District, Louisiana, who writes from Washington, D.C., ". . . the funeral home which handled the funeral arrangements has inquired concerning burial benefits or any other possible benefits which might accrue to Mr. Townsend in connection with his Confederate War service."

Shall I refresh you, patient reader, with a few facts? In the 1850 Census Eli Townsend's parents are found in Copiah Co., Miss., page 212, family 39:

We usually acknowledge the age given in the first census enumeration in which any given individual appears as being closer to reality than subsequent enumerations. That being the case, I would place Eli Townsend's birth in 1852. He would have been 9 years old in 1861 when he purportedly enlisted in the Confederate Army and 11 years old in 1863 when paroled after the fall of Vicksburg. What do you think?

The next focus for my research was to find the legitimate William W. Townsend who did serve in the Confederate Army.

We ordered his service record. William W. Townsend enlisted September 8, 1862 at Camp Norwood for three years. Enlisting officer was Maj. Tucker; he was paid by McLandry on November 1, 1862. There is a certificate of Disability for Furlough for 20 days dated Feb 11, 1863 for Pvt. William W. Townsend of Co. B 27<sup>th</sup> LA Volunteers for pneumonia and general debility signed by J. S. Cutliff. He was paroled at Vicksburg following the surrender and signed an oath of allegiance on Jul 7, 1863.

This man's service is undoubtedly the service that Eli Townsend described as his own. Of note is the fact that no wound to the arm was listed in this record.

What other evidence can we find of William W. Townsend? Census records for 1850 show a William Townsend in Bienville Parish, Page 257:

This couple was married 29 Aug 1850 in Bienville Parish. Her maiden name was Sooney.

In 1860 there are 2 William Townsends in Louisiana, a William Townsen in Caldwell Parish and a William Townsend in Livingston Parish.

We know the William in Livingston Parish and an Alfred Townsend in Jackson Parish are brothers, born in Vermont. This William Townsend is married for the second time to a widow, Martha Perkins Harrell, he was a Methodist Minister and schoolteacher, and did not serve in the Confederate Army.

And left is the William Townsen of Caldwell Parish, Page 313:

Is this the William and Mary who married in Bienville in 1850? Possibly, but the evidence is not compelling. We do know from the research of John Townsend [a descendant of John Townsend and Martha Sullivan, Jackson Parish in 1860] that an examination of Andrew Booth's compilation of records reveals that many of the men of Co. B 27<sup>th</sup> LA Infantry were from Ouachita, Franklin and Caldwell Parishes. None were from Jackson Parish. There is also evidence on the location of Camp Norwood—citing it as "near Vicksburg." This is in direct conflict with Eli's statement that it was "4 miles from his home near Dubach."

This William Townsen of Caldwell Parish is proving difficult to gather evidence on. Possibly he died prior to 1870 as a direct result of the debilitation he suffered that prompted his Disability Furlough in February of 1863. I believe he was related to Loving Townsend and his son, Eli, in some degree and that Eli as a boy heard about William Townsend's Confederate experiences in great enough detail to create a cover story for his application in 1935.

What can we find on Eli Townsend from the time of his first marriage in Lincoln Parish on November 2, 1873 to his application in 1935? He is found in the 1888 tax roll of Lincoln Parish as E. D. Townsend; in the 1889 tax roll of Lincoln Parish as D. E. Townsend. He is found in the 1900 Census in Rapides Parish, LA as D. E. Townsend. He applied for an Old Age Pension in Morehouse Parish, LA as D. E. Townsend sometime after 1924 as the Old Age Pension board used the following criteria:

Our instructions state that we can verify eligibility for Old Age Assistance if the marriage record shows that they have been married longer than fifty one years, therefore, we used this marriage record as a verification of Mr. Townsend's age. He did not have any other proof of his birthdate.

If we reach the conclusion that Uncle Eli lied, fraudulently obtained a Confederate Veteran's Pension, and has no right whatsoever to the monument erected in his memory at Greenwood Cemetery, should we campaign to have the monument removed?

If the purpose of such monuments is to serve as a reminder of valiant soldiers who served their native land and if 99% of those visiting the monument never heard of the individual anyway, then what is to be gained by removing the monument? And, since Eli confiscated the name of a genuine veteran, then the only false message conveyed is that William Townsend lived to be 106.

So I end with a question: who was truly Louisiana's oldest surviving Confederate veteran?
