

## WWI Draft Registration Card Index Bossier Parish, LA

There were three draft registrations for World War I in which more than 24 million men born between September 13, 1873 and September 12, 1900 registered. Only a small percentage of those registering actually were inducted into service. Not all who served in our military branches participated in this registration, but the compilation of such a large number of male citizens and alien-born men is a useful source of information. This is a particularly good source for tracing African American men.

A typical WWI draft registration card possibly may include the registrant's full name and signature, home address, age, date of birth, citizenship status, occupation, employer's name and address, race, dependents or nearest relative, and physical description. Cards for registrants born between June 6, 1886 and August 24, 1897 may also include birthplace, previous military service, and marital status.

### CIVIL WAR PRISON CAMP, ELMIRA, NEW YORK By Elizabeth Lewis

Woodlawn Cemetery in Elmira, New York is that area's largest cemetery, with tens of thousands of Elmirans interred, including Mark Twain and his family. However, just beyond the entrance to the cemetery can be found row upon row of identical tombstones and there, at the gates to Woodlawn National Cemetery, is one of many national cemeteries scattered about the United States. But this national cemetery holds a special honor.



One of the city's black marks, if it can be called that, is that during the Civil War Elmira was host to one of the larger and more notorious prisoner-of-war camps. On the outskirts of town, nearly 12,000 Confederates were imprisoned, awaiting the end of the war in a prison camp that would be known throughout the South as "Hellmira." Nearly 3,000 would eventually die from their wounds, from disease, or from the harsh northern winters.

The prison camp was conceived when Adjutant General E. D. Townsend reported several empty barracks buildings could be used to house as many as 10,000 men. The prison camp contained some forty acres of land with a heavy stockade wall surrounding it, the ends of the upright planks going some eighteen inches into the ground. The planks were about sixteen feet high and nailed to heavy sills, which were supported by large posts set deep in the ground. Three feet from the top of the stockade was the parapet walkway for

the guards who were stationed forty feet apart. About every fifty feet large coal oil lamps with large reflectors were nailed near the center of the stockade.

Inside the fenced area were 35 two-story barracks buildings, each measuring 100 by 20 feet. Ceilings were barely high enough to accommodate two rows of crude bunks along the walls. With unsealed roofs, flooring of green lumber, and no foundations, the wooden buildings had little resistance to wind and water. Behind the rows of barracks was a group of buildings converted to the dispensary, adjutant's office and guardrooms. And behind them were the cookhouses and mess halls.

The first group of prisoners to arrive reached the prison camp at 6 a.m. on July 6, 1864 and numbered 399 men, one soldier has escaped en route. The camp quickly became crowded and subsequent arrivals lived in "A" tents scattered around the prison area, sleeping on the hard cold ground with only a blanket for protection from Elmira's notoriously harsh winters.

The prisoners in one of the tents laid a false floor and covered it with hard-packed dirt so it would have the same appearance as the ground floor in the other tents. The six occupants arranged for one man to be digging all the time, tunneling to get under the fence, approximately sixty feet away. The tunnel was only two feet under the surface, their only implement a large knife. They used a small box with a string attached to each

end, and when the man digging at the far end had filled the box, he gave a pull on the string and another man just under the false floor pulled the box to just under the floor and piled up the dirt. At night they removed the false floor, gathered the dirt in their hands and filled their haversacks, then scattered the dirt along the new-made streets. When they had dug to the upright planks of the stockade they had to go more than a foot lower than the tunnel to get under the ends of the planks. Finally, on October 7<sup>th</sup>, the tunnel was completed and one of the men crawled through, poked his head outside, and went back to report bright moonlight. They waited for the moon to go down before commencing their underground journey and making good their escape.

Of a total of 12,123 Confederate soldiers imprisoned at Camp Chemung (it's official name), 2,973 died of sickness, exposure, and associated causes. One by one, as a Confederate soldier would die, he would be buried in the Woodlawn National Cemetery by John Jones, a former slave and sexton of the Park Church. He had escaped from the Elzey family of Leesburg, V A, by the "Underground Railroad" in 1850 and settled in Elmira. During the time of Camp Chemung, he took on the job of properly burying the Confederate soldiers who died during their captivity. Mr. Jones transcribed every record which appeared on the pine coffin lid into a book kept for that purpose. He saw that the burials were properly and reverently conducted. He was given a small wooden tombstone, which he hand painted, and an earthen crock for each grave. In each crock were placed the soldier's personal effects, and a detailed handwritten account of that soldier, including his name, the unit he served with, his home address, cause of death, and

any last personal requests. The crocks were then buried next to the tombstones, about 12 inches deep, rather like a primitive time capsule.

As a runaway slave, John Jones will be remembered for helping 800 others to freedom through the Elmira Underground Railroad and for his work as Sexton, burying with respect and honor the 2,973 Confederate soldiers who died in the Elmira prison camp. On June 22, 1997, the Southside High School Diversity Group dedicated a memorial and plaque to their local unsung hero, John Jones. The special ceremony at Woodlawn Cemetery was a tribute to Jones on his 180<sup>th</sup> birthday. The 21-gun salute from Union and Confederate Civil War re-enactment troops echoed through the normally still cemetery. The inscription on the granite memorial reads: "He risked his life to escape bondage, then dedicated his life to bury those who might enslave him."

After the war the Daughters of the Confederacy came north, searching out "every Confederate soldier who lay buried in the inhospitable Yankee soil and exhuming their bodies to take them home." They went to all the prisoner-of-war camps, even to the Gettysburg battlefield, and did just that.

When they arrived in Elmira, they found those little earthen crocks and were told of other acts of kindness by the people of Elmira toward their loved ones. The Daughters of the Confederacy decided that Elmira was not as inhospitable as they had thought and they took only the earthen crocks home, leaving their fallen heroes to rest in peace in Elmira. These are virtually the only Confederate graves north of the Mason-Dixon Line.

Woodlawn National Cemetery is a constant reminder to all who visit Elmira that nearly 3,000 Southern soldiers sleep here. There are 36 trenches extending across the plot, north to south, all occupied by Confederate dead. On the north side are two trenches extending the entire length of the plot from east to west, in which are buried Confederate soldiers on the east and Union soldiers on the west. Union soldiers are buried on both sides of the flagpole. Seven graves are marked "Unknown."

The marble markers, all facing the South, were placed there in 1907, replacing the wooden ones inscribed by John Jones. The markers on the graves of Union soldiers all face the North.

Behind the graves stands a large granite monument with a bronze statue of a young Confederate soldier, a gift from the United Daughters of the Confederacy to the people of Elmira in 1937. It is the northernmost Confederate monument in the United States.

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# A Tragedy of Three Brothers

The Mercer Family 1875-1887 Bossier Parish, Louisiana

In April 2003 Mike O'Rourke, a surveyor, finds a lone gravesite in southwest Webster Parish near Koran. The inscription on a large obelisk reads:

In Fond Recollections of William Mercer Jan. 23, 1855 – Feb. 17, 1887 Husband of Linda Mercer Uncle Lellie Misses You Knights of Pythis



The serenity of the setting gives no clue to the violence of the 12-year span in which 3 Mercer brothers were killed by gunshot. But let's begin at the beginning.

In Twiggs County, Georgia lived a man named Garner Mercer. According to a posted lineage on Ancestry World Tree Project, Garner Mercer 1808-1868, was married three times and had a total of 11 children. Here is the linage posted:

Garner Mercer married Sarah Vinson and their children were

The 1840 Census, Twiggs Co., GA, page 378, shows Garner Mercer, age 30-40 with 1 male under 5, one female 20-30, one female under five and one female 5-10.

This family group is listed in The 1880 Census, Jeffersonville, Twiggs Co., GA, page 56B, with Missouria Day as the wife of William Day and Ida Murcer – 14, as a step-sister of William Day. Color me confused.

Unfortunately the Twiggs Co., GA courthouse burned and, while genealogists have done an amazing job publishing UDC applications, various deeds held by family members, and much more data exists than usual for a burned-courthouse county, there are still no ready records for Twiggs Co. to answer the questions raised by the Census enumerations.

Thomas Elijah Mercer, James Alexander Stephens Mercer and William Marion Mercer are the three brothers who migrated to Bossier Parish. Undoubtedly from the tombstone inscription (Uncle Lellie Misses You) there were other family members who also migrated, but I have not been able to identify who they were. If we postulate that they migrated in 1873, their ages at that time were Thomas – 36, James – 23, and William – 18. Thomas Elijah Mercer was a merchant and planter. He married Malinda Russell Sockwell of Webster Parish. In 1875 the *Bossier Banner* published this article:

Thomas E. Mercer, a merchant and planter of this parish, was murdered on Friday of last week—shot through the head. J. M. Sledge and his brother-in-law, McKinney, are now in the parish jail of Webster, awaiting a preliminary examination. It is said that McKinney acknowledges the shooting.

Bossier Banner, Thursday, September 2, 1875, Page 2

Who were J. M. Sledge and his brother-in-law, McKinney? James M. Sledge was a native of Houston Co., GA. On 28 December 1859 he married Mary E. McKinney of Bossier Parish. Benjamin F. Daniell put up bond with him, Andrew Lawrence, J. P., performed the marriage, and witnesses were P. J. Beaird and Russell C. McKinney.

In the 1860 Census, Caddo Parish, page 51, J. M. Sledge is overseer for William Hutchinson at Caspiana Plantation. Sledge gives his age as 30 (he was actually 45) and Mary E. McKinney gives her age as 24. When the Civil War breaks out, J. M. Sledge enlists November 1862 at Shreveport in Co. C, William Harrison's Regiment of the 6<sup>th</sup> LA Cavalry. His officers were Col. William Harrison, Lt. Col. William Denson, Major Scott, Capt. N. W. Sentell, 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. John Arnold, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. James Taylor and 3<sup>rd</sup> Lt. John F. Deford. J. M. Sledge suffered a gunshot wound to his left arm while in service in

Rapides Parish. His arm was amputated at the hospital in Alexandria, and he was discharged. He was attended by Dr. J. E. Eagan of Shreveport and then returned to his home in Bossier Parish. He received a Confederate pension beginning in April 1899. At his death in April 1912, his widow became recipient of the pension until her death in September 1926. J. M. and Mary E. Sledge are buried in the Doyline Cemetery as is their daughter, Virginia Sledge.

The Confederate pension application also mentions three other children: Hettie Sledge Huddleston, Nina Sledge Hendricks, and Paul Sledge.

I have not been able to determine the full name of J. M. Sledge's brother-in-law, McKinney. I did find a Confederate pension application for a Carlton W. McKinney born 29 Jan 1846 in Houston Co., GA. On investigation of Houston Co. records I found numerous Mercers in that county also as well as in the neighboring county of Twiggs. It may well be that the Mercers, Sledges and McKinneys were acquainted from their childhood in Georgia.

Ten months following the death of Thomas Elijah Mercer, the youngest of the three brothers, William Marion Mercer, age 21, marries Thomas Mercer's widow, Malinda Russell Sockwell Mercer on June 1, 1876.

#### Married:

On the 1st instant, at the residence of the bride, by Rev. L. J. Jones, Mr. WM. M. MERCER to Mrs. MALINDA R. MERCER; all of this parish.

The Bossier Banner, June 8, 1876, p. 3

The marriage record gives as witnesses to this marriage J. J. Bryan, A. B. Hodges and William T. Nuckolls.

Four years pass and on April 8, 1880, at Mercer's Store, Bossier Point, William M. Mercer shoots and kills his older brother, James Alexander Stephens Mercer. James, age 30, was married to Matilda Gregg Childers, (widow of J. A. Childers) daughter of John and Margaret Gregg of Bossier Parish, 5<sup>th</sup> Ward. The shooting was reported thus:

On Thursday last, at Mercer's store, in Bossier Point, this parish, a difficulty took place between two brothers, William M. Mercer and James Mercer, which resulted in the immediate death of the latter. Wm. E. Mercer at once delivered himself up to the officers of the law. On preliminary trial Saturday, before Judge R. C. Drew, it was ordered "that the defendant be held in bail in the sum of \$2000, to answer to the charge of manslaughter at the next regular jury term of the District Court, to be holden on the 5<sup>th</sup> Monday in August."

William M. Mercer was not tried for killing his brother, James Mercer. The following newspaper account is all we have on the matter.

In the case of the State vs. William E. Mercer, charged with killing James Mercer last April, the Grand Jury last week unanimously ignored the bill.

The Bossier Banner, September 9, 1880, Page 3



James Mercer is buried at the Gregg Cemetery on the Webster Parish border.

Is this beginning to sound like the wild, wild west—only 123 years ago, right here in our area, it appears everyone was armed and not afraid to shoot to kill? I have not studied *The Bossier Banner* to determine how many shootings per year there were back then, but it seems significant to me that none of them were front page news.

So, Thomas Elijah Mercer is shot and killed by J. M. Sledge and McKinney. James Alexander Stephens Mercer is shot and killed by his brother, William Marion Mercer. It appears Bossier Parish was in need of a bit of law and order.

Henry Bodenheimer was elected first mayor of the village of Haughton in 1880. His marriage to Cora Weil was celebrated:

#### Married

BODENHEIMER-WEIL -- In this city on Wednesday evening May 26, 1880, at the residence of the bride's mother, by the Rev. E. L. Hess, Mr. Henry Bodenheimer and Miss Cora Weil.

The young couple, though happy as heart could wish in each other's love, were made yet more so by the kind consideration of their friends who presented them with a number of beautiful and valuable bridal presents. They have resided in Shreveport for many years, in fact have been raised here and have many warm friends of all classes and creeds. The fair bride is one of the handsomest and most lovable young ladies in the city, and certainly Henry has won a rich prize.

We acknowledge the receipt of the usual printer's fee—delicious cake and sparkling wine. We wish them all imaginable happiness.

In addition to the position of mayor of Haughton, Henry Bodenheimer was a merchant, operating a general store in Haughton. Henry and Cora Bodenheimer are enumerated in the household of William and Malinda Mercer in the 1880 Census, Bossier Parish, ED 12, page 136, Ward 6.

It is believed the store was built with living quarters on the second floor above the general store. An early photograph of Haughton shows two such two-story buildings on the main street paralleling the railroad track.

The Bodenheimer-Mercer business continued well at least through October, 1882, when notices for a Constable's Sale by Bodenheimer & Mercer of cotton bales seized to satisfy a judgment appeared in *The Bossier Banner*. Lest we swallow the myth that credit is a new problem for our day, be aware that from the earliest days of our nation, farmers bought goods on credit at stores, paying for them with money received for crops in the fall. In the south, where cotton was king, these credit arrangements were called "gin-whistle terms." In studying mortgage records, you will find many payments due on December 25 or January 1 in order to coincide with the flux of money after the fall picking and selling of cotton.

At some point in the subsequent 5 years, Bodenheimer and Mercer dissolved their partnership. There was a bone of contention between the two men and one Saturday in

February William M. Mercer was "disgruntled". Here is *The Bossier Banner* account, from page 3:

On last Saturday night, at Haughton, in this parish, Mr. Henry Bodenheimer shot and killed Mr. Wm. M. Mercer. Mercer had been drinking and had had several disputes with citizens of that town during the day, and had threatened Bodenheimer's life several times. About half past 7 o'clock Mercer called Bodenheimer over to Mr. D. E. Griffin's saloon, grabbed Bodenheimer with his left hand by the collar, applying very abusive language to him, at the same time putting his right hand on his hip pocket to draw a pistol, when Bodenheimer jerked away from Mercer and fired four shots, two taking effect in Mercer's breast, who lingered a few seconds and died. After the shooting, Bodenheimer surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Edwards.

The preliminary examination of Bodenheimer will take place at Haughton tomorrow at 10 o'clock, before Hon. R. C. Drew.

The Bossier Banner, February 17, 1887, Page 3

A family account of this event is slightly different.

Because of disagreements with Mercer, Henry dissolved the partnership. Mercer, angry and dissatisfied, announced to the townspeople that he intended to kill Henry Bodenheimer. He strapped on a pistol and stalked to the town saloon in search of the mayor. Hearing that Mercer was waiting for him in the saloon, Mayor Bodenheimer quietly entered the back door and came face to face with Mercer. Both men drew their weapons. Mercer fired, missed, and Henry shot him to death.

For a time feeling ran high in the frightened little town, but Henry himself asked for and got an immediate trial by court. He was cleared on the grounds he had fired at Mercer in self-defense.

A further account of the incident at the Golden Rule Saloon states that an angry mob stormed the store, wanting to lynch Bodenheimer. He was saved by his boyhood friend, Sheriff Ford Edwards, who protected Henry until a judge could conduct a proper trial.

Mr. Henry Bodenheimer, who shot and killed W. M. Mercer at Haughton recently, had a preliminary examination before Judge Drew at Haughton last Friday, and was honorably acquitted, the evidence showing that he acted entirely in self-defense.

And thus ends the story of the Brothers Mercer. Young Malinda Russell Sockwell who twice found herself "the widow Mercer" at last found peace, remarrying to Isaac P. Lay November 24, 1892.
