100-Year Old Newspaper Article

The following article was copied from the Edgefield, South Carolina newspaper, THE ADVERTISER, dated August 15, 1878.

"The following note, whose sentiments are so well expressed and do so much honor to the writer, will explain itself.

Mr. Thurmond, who is a prosperous cotton broker of Shreveport,

La., called to see us during his late short visit to Edgefield;

and when he left us we felt proud that such a good man owed his origin to this old County:

Shreveport, La., Aug. 5th, 1878.

Edgefield Advertiser: - I returned home on the second inst, after an extensive trip North and East. Among the many places of interest, I visited, the one having the greatest attractions for me was Edgefield Village. Edgefield! the land of my birth, and that of my father and mother. I had been absent from the classic old Village for twenty-eight years. Judge then of my glowing, heart-felt emotion when the familiar church spires appeared to my searching eyes on the morning of the twentyfifth of July. "God bless the dear old spot!" spontaneously came from my lips; and my eyes filled with tears as my feet pressed once more the walks of my childhood. Only two I found whom I had even known before! And we two felt that time had backward turned and we were again children. Many were the inquiries I made for others, but the one sad answer applied to all was: "They are dead." Among the number was one in whom I always recognized, of all men, one of the most gallant, chivalous and true friends. I speak of Thos. G. Bacon. dearly hoped to see him, but he too was gone. The children born in Edgefield are scattered from the Savannah River to the Pacific Ocean. They are as true to the instincts and love of country as those who still are there. "Edgefield forever, if right; but right or wrong, Edgefield forever!" The love of their nativity is deep seated in their souls. Absence severs no links. None are ever found to betray her; but to know they are born in Edgefield, or live in South Carolina, is among her absent children an affinity that guarantee friendship and a hospitable roof.

walk through the woods and pick out the trees suitable for cutting and estimate the board feet in each. He entered land several miles northeast of the present town of Homer and built a four-room log house, with slave quarters behind. Later, they built a larger house of hand-hewn lumber put together with pegs and used the old one for a kitchen and dining room.

Elizabeth Weeks Brown was of Welsh descent. She was a mid-wife and homeopathic physician. She grew her own herbs and plants and made medicine from them. The herbs were planted in a small bed, about twelve by fifteen feet behind her house. The larger ones grew along the fence rows. For years after she died, some of them continued to come up each spring. They were yellow dock, golden rod, blackberry, May apple and crab apple, among others. Her doseswere usually a tea brewed from the roots, leaves or berries of one or more of these plants, and she carried extracts of them in a little black bag. The children thought she brought the babies in the black bag.

Medical knowledge was limited in those days. Fever could be caused by many things. Flux and cramp colic were usually upset stomachs and severe diarrhea. Yellow dock and blackberry root were used for Flux and colic, crab apple and May apple for fever.

Elizabeth W. Brown rode horseback to visit her patients and always carried a rifle. Legend has it that she was once attacked late at night by a "painter" (panther) while returning from a call and shot it dead through the head.

Nathan and Elizabeth W. Brown had sixteen children: Eleven boys and five girls. One little girl died in infancy. One boy died at the age of eight years, and the rest survived. Some of them past the age of ninety. Five sons enlisted in the Confederate Army.

Abram Nathaniel (my grandfather) and his brother, John Leonard served with the "Claiborne Guards". Abram N. was in the army the entire four years of the war and was with General Lee when he surrendered to General Grant at Appomattox, Va. April 9, 1865.

John Leonard, the one who lost his arm was wounded near Atlanta, Ga. The hospital had no chloroform other than the little they could steal from the Yankees. John L. had his arm amputated while under the influence of whiskey. After the surgeons had cut off his arm, they laid it on a table near his cot and left the room. They returned and found him sitting up with his severed arm on his lap trying to cut out

the bullet with his pocket knife. He said he wanted to take it home as a souvenier.

Thomas Marion was wounded at Appomattox, Va. There being no hospital room at the Army Headquarters, he went to the home of his father's sister, a Mrs. Woods in Tennessee to recuperate.

George W. contacted measles while in the army and died. His remains were sent home by wagon from Trenton, a cotton port town on the Ouacheta River near the present town of Monroe, La. He was the first person buried in the private cemetery on the old Brown place.

A grave stone bears the three inscriptions of:

Charlie Henderson, was the 5th son to serve with the Confederacy. He, among others, received the Southern Cross of Honor given by the United Daughters of the Confederacy in 1913 and 1914.

Remarkable Family Reunion

On the fourth day of the present month, Mr. John Autrey, the oldest sone of Absalon Autrey, both of Lincoln Parish, gave a dinner to all the members of his family now in the country. After the dinner, a procession was formed composed first of the head of the family. Absolon Autrey, after him in regular order came his children, his grand children and great grand children to the number of 96 (ninety-six). Seventy six (76) living descendants of Absalon Autrey were absent from the family gathering, so that if all living descendants had been present, the family procession would have numbered over one hundred and seventy. The old gentleman has his second wife, who is not the mother of any of these children and is not included in this count. The old gentleman is seventy-five (75) years of age. By his first wife he had 15 children, twelve (12) of whom are still living.

Absalon Autrey of this article was my great grandfather, who was born in North Carolina 11 April 1802, moved to Alabama as a small child when he later married Elizabeth Norris, born in Kentucky 16 Jan. 1810.

They were listed in Perry Co., Ala. Census for 1830 and 1840. Three of their daughters, Sara who married Albert M. Neighbors, Lucinda who married J. B. L. Mitchell and Harriet who married Joseph N. Wiley were married in Perry Co., Ala. before moving to Union Parish La. now Lincoln Parish, La.

From all the information I have, they arrived in Louisiana and found the place they wished to settle Christmas Eve 1848. This was about a mile west of the present town of Duback, La.

My grand father, Charlie Henry Autrey, was the only one of the fifteen children born in La., being born 4 April 1850 in the house Absalon Autrey built as soon as he could, after arriving. Elizabeth (Norris) Autrey died 22 July 1860 and after Grandpa was married he bought the home place from his father and brothers and sisters. Then Absalon and his second wife lived on with my grandparents until his death 11 Feb. 1885.

My mother, Laura Alice Autrey, born 15 Feb. 1876, so she and an older brother, James Robert Autrey, born 7 Aug. 1874, and Elizabeth Bush Autrey (Aunt Betty) were at this family reunion. The Autrey home is still standing and is said to be the oldest home in the Parish. Absalon Autrey and Elizabeth Norris had the following children:

Sarah, John, Lucinda, Harriet, Elizabeth Jane, William Norris, Cornelius, James Jackson, Celia, Robert Martin, Syra, Martha, Thomas Jefferson, Bird Griffin and Charles Henry.

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THE TORO-SIBLEY CEMETERY COMMUNITY

Like most of the hill country of Louisiana, the area around the Toro Baptist Church and the Sibley cemetery belong to that part of Louisiana sometimes called "Anglo-Saxen Louisiana" as distinct from "French Louisiana." Although French Louisiana is better known to the nation as a whole, the hill country, too, has played its part in the history of the state. The name Anglo-Saxon refers to the fact that the settlers of this area were largely descendants of the "old immigration" to the Atlantic seaboard states, coming from northern and western Europe primarily: English, Dutch, Irish, Scotch, and German. As the land "wore out" or became crowded in the East, pioneers from North and South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Alabama, and Mississippi flocked westward in search of new homes, and from this migration our communities were principally built.

This migration, however, did not begin in force in this area until after 1800. The first inhabitants, during the early years of white man's exploration of this area were the Indians of the Caddo Nation or Federation, hunters and traders who covered a large area in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas, and Louisiana. They were never numerous enough to seriously challenge the advancing whites in later years, but in general gradually retreated before them, leaving some of their trading trails to be developed as roads by the whites. Part of Highway 6, (El Camino Real) began in this manner.

While settlement of northwestern Louisiana was begun by the French when St. Denis established a fort at Natchitoches in 1713-14-- which, of course, is credited with being the oldest permanent settlement in the Louisiana Purchase area. Although Natchitoches and the settlements along Cane River and Red River grew and prospered as farming and trading centers, the area between Natchitoches and the Sabine River was largely unsettled by permanent settlers before 1800. There were some settlers nearer Natchitoches, and a few along the present route of Highway 6 to Pendleton. A few land grants had been made late in the century also: the La Nana grant of the Negreet area, and the Ambrose Le Compt grant in what is now Vernon Parish, on Prairie Creek.

The purchase of the Louisiana territory from France in 1803 immediately encourage migration westward, this in spite of the fact that the southwestern boundary of the purchase area was in dispute between the United States and Spain. The United States claimed the land westward to the Rio Grande River, while the Spanish claimed the land from Mexico northward and eastward to the Arroyo Hondo. An agreement between two junior officers of the United States and Spanish armies set up a tentative agreement to form a buffer zone or neutral area between the two countries and this arrangement was later approved by their superior officers, Generals Wilkinson and Herrera, in 1806. Congress was far from pleased with the plan, since it placed the neutral strip between

the Sabine and Red Rivers, and tacitly surrendered U. S. claim to the Texas area, but the agreement remained in effect until about 1821. The lawlessness of the "No Man's Land" or "Free State of Sabine" is a matter of record.

It was not the intention of the United States that any of its citizens should move into this area, unpoliced, and still in dispute. However, there was an immediate violation of the neutral strip by settlers flocking to the area from the Eastern States. Settlers reaching northeast Louisiana saw no reason to stop at the borders of the unguarded neutral strip, and permanent settlers began to increase. These would be the nucleus of the solid citizens of later years. Of course, there were also transients, and semi-transients, such as outlaws, hunters and trappers, guides, escaped slaves, etc.

It is difficult to say just when settlement actually began in the area of Toro Baptist Church and the Sibley Cemetery, since many of the first settlers were squatters who never recorded land transactions until much later. By 1809, the U. S. Government was alarmed by the large number of its citizens settling in the zone, and began investigation. One of the investigative reports showed that in 1811 two Americans were reported living on El Toro Creek, and planning to set up a lumber mill there. These were apparently allowed to remain. There was an attempt to evict settlers who had just recently entered the neutral area, and some homes were actually burned and the occupants returned to Natchitoches.

It seems apparent that in spite of Government vigilance, some settlers continued to come. "Filibusters," or armed expeditions against the Spanish in Texas that were launched from the Neutral Strip area by various radical elements failed in 1812-13, and again in 1819. The failure of these expeditions brought some American citizens who had migrated into the East Texas area back into western Louisiana to escape the weath of the Spanish officials in Texas, who now looked on all Americans with suspicion. Many of these remained and became permanent residents.

The filibusters alerted both nations to the dangers of having such a neutral zone outside of anyone's control, and negotiations were begun in 1813 to put an end to this miserable state of affairs. In 1821, an agreement was reached acknowledging the claim of the United States to the neutral strip area, and the Sabine River was accepted as the western boundary of Louisiana and the United States. Fort Jessup was established in 1822 to police and protect the area.

These developments opened the floodgates of immigration to the strip and from 1821 to 1850, the section with which we are concerned gained many families, farms, and plantations, some of which

were large enough to justify the keeping of a number of slaves. In 1624, Benjamin Norris registered the land he had settled on Bayou Toro in 1818. Azer Mathis also registered land he had settled on Hill Creek in 1820. The increase during these years is dramatized by the contrast of the meager reports of a few Americans living along Toro Creek in the 1811-1820 period to the fact that when Toro Baptist Church was organized in 1848, it had 70 charter members. These did not, of course, cover all the people living in that area in 1848, since no doubt a number were not Christians there were numbers of smaller children, and so on. It is probably that the ancestors of many of the families now connected with the Sibley cemetery settled in the area during the 1820-1850 period. Some information on exact dates for different families can be gained from land sales records at Many and Natchitoches, but many families did not buy land immediately.

One of the pioneers of the period was William L. Sibley, the first pastor of Toro Church, whose grave has been restored and marked with a plaque this year (1965). According to Parten's History of Louisiana Baptists, published in 1881, William L. Sibley was born in Bulleck County, Georgia, on January 31, 1795. He became a Christian in 1825, about the time he moved to Washington Parish, Louisiana, along with other members of his family (including two brothers who were also early settlers of the Toro community. W. L. Sibley became a minister in 1841, while still in Washington Parish. He served during the following years as a circuit rider preaching in northwest Louisiana, and the Paxton book states that he moved to Sabine Parish in 1847, where he was a close co-worker of Nathan H. Bray, sometimes called the "Apostle of Sabine."

W. L. Sibley was one of the Presbytery that presided at the establishment of the Toro Baptist Church in September 21, 1848, along with D. C. McCalley and G. W. Edwards. He was a member of the newly-established church, and its pastor from its founding in 1846 until his death in 1861. During the years 1855-57, he also served the churches of Cedron in Natchitoches Parish and Middle Creek as part-time pastor.

Attached to the end of this report is a list of the charter members of Toro Baptist Church -- 27 men, 26 women, and 17 Negro slaves, for a total of 70 members. The surnames represented in this group are: Addison, Bray, Brown, Byrd, Cassady, Clower, Coburn, Cooper, Dendy, Dowden, Ellzey, Gandy, Kay, Pon, Prewitt, Self, Smith, Warrick, West, and one which appears to be Wetr-- a total of 21 family names represented. The slaves were identified only by a given name, as was common before the war. Some of the family names occur on tombs in the Sibley Cemetery. The names represented here are: Clower, Crittenden, Ellzey, Sibley, Duggan, Peterson, Landrum and Nash. It should be remembered that there were two other cemeteries in the community which

served the Toro Church area--the cemetery at the church itself, Toro Cemetery, and Self Cemetery--so that some of the charter member families were buried there.

The families of the area worked hard to make their homes and lands prosper, and they survived many difficult periods. The community survived the Civil War Years, when most of the ablebodied men were gone, and the farms had to be worked by the slaves under the direction of the women. Then came Reconstruction days, when many of the slaves returned to work for their former owners under contract agreements of various sorts. These were indeed trying times for the people of this community, as for most areas of the South.

The one hundred years since that time has seen many changes in this section of Louisiana: the coming of the railroads, the great lumbering era, the two World Wars, the decline of row crop farming in western Louisiana with accompanying changes in the economic structure, to mention only a few. It is fitting that we pay tribute this year to the pioneers who established this community well over 100 years ago, and to the traditions that they upheld—hard work in honest self—support, Christian principles manifested in establishing churches in young communities. The efforts being put forth in restoring and maintaining this cemetery are fitting memorial to the sturdy homes which developed and sent forth citizens of high Christian and moral principles to live and serve in many parts of the state and nation.

We, the undersigned members of the Beulah Baptist Church of Christ of Washington Parish, State of La., holding letters from said shurch, have this day met on Walker Creek for the purpose of constituting a church under the title of Regular Baptist Church of Christ and known by the name of Toro.

Being assembled with the Presbytery composed of Elders D. C. McCalley and W. L. Sibley, (to) be aided by G. W. Edwards this 21st day of September year of our Lord one thousand Eight Hundred and forty-eight.

Letters presented and members found to be in order and in fellowship one with another, also orthodox in faith do agree to give ourselves to the Lord and to one another by the will of God in Gospel Bonds, agreeing to be governed by the law of Christ and do adopt the following articles of faith:

AMTABLE BAPTIST CHURCH

Glenmora, Rapides Parish, Louisiana (Copied By Trenkins McClain)

The following persons having been baptised according to the Apostolic mode and wishing to be constituted into a church on the Darbon in the Parish of Rapides and State of Louisiana, met together on the 5th Sept. 1839 and adopted the following Articles of Faith.

Article 1st

That the holy Scriptures of the old and new Testament are the work of God, and our only certain and infallible rule of faith, and obedience, containing every thing needful for us to know, believe, and do in the service of God, and able to make us wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus by which we expect to be judged at the last day; and to which our opinions and practices, ought at present and always to be conformed, and therefore that all persons who can read the Scriptures, ought to search them daily, praying to God for the light of his holy Spirit, without which none can understand them effectually.

2 nd

That there is but one living and true God, the almighty Creater, Preserver, and disposer of all things, visible and invisible, in whom we live and move and have our being, and to whom alone all divine worship and adoration, is to be rendered both in time and in eternity, by men and Angels as being most worthy of it, and one that will not give his glory to another, nor his praise to idols, having stricly (sic) forbidden us to worship or adore any but himself.

3rd

That there are three persons in the Godhead, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, the same in substance, power and glory, and therefore not to be divided in essence, though distinguished by several peculiar properties and personal notations.

41 h

That our Lord Jesus Christ, the second person in the adorable Trinity, who was eternally with the Father, did in time take upon him a real human nature in which he fulfilled the law and died to make atonement for sin, is the only Saviour of sinners, the prophet priest and king of his church, appointed heir of all things, and judge of the quick and dead, in whom alone we have deliverance from divine wrath and eternal misery.

5th

We do fully believe the Doctrines of particular Redemption, personal election, effectual calling, justification by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ, parton of sin by his atoning blood, believe baptism by immersion, the final perseverance of the saints, the resurrection of the dead and eternal judgement.

6th

That Christ will return in glory to judge men and Angels, at the end of this world, at which time the righteous shall enter into everlasting happiness, but the wicked shall be driven away into everlasting and eternal misery. Which Doctrines are contained in the Scriptures of the old and new Testaments.

Church Covenant

lst This church has a right when finally dismissed from the Calvary Church to choose their own Minister.

2nd The same to be a standing moderator only in cases of necessity.

3rd Conferences shall be opened by singing and prayer and a sermon taught without necessity forbids.

4th The state of the church shall be inquired into.

5th The (illegible) shall give in to the majority in voting.

6th In the receiption of members unanimity must be had.

7th No person shall speak without rising and addressing the Moderator.

8th No person shall speak on any subject more than three times without leave of the voice of the church.

9th The Moderator is to keep order.

10th All things that are brought before the church in order and seconded, shall be taken up and debated, without the majority oppose it.

And we do further engage to conform to the following rules of descipline as well as all others warrented by the word of God.

Rules of Discipline

lst Not to forsake the assembling of ourselves together but constantly attending our appointed meetings as far as the Lord shall enable, not neglecting any of them but in cases of necessity.

2nd For each one to bear his part according as the Lord shall prosper him, in defraying such expenses as are necessary for maintaining the worship of God in order and decency.

3rd Not to expose the infirmities of each other by any means when it may be lawfully avoided.

4th Not to remove to any distant parts without applying to the church for a dismission.

5th Not willing to live in the neglect of any known duty to God nor our neighbour, and one another but to endeavour to walk in all the Ordinances and commandments of the Lord blameless.

6th To bear reproff and to reprove each other in case of visible faults in Christian charity and brotherly love, as ordered by Christ in the gospel.

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis, and were in peace.

February 27th 1830

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis.

March 27th 1830

The church met in conference and was found in peace. Bro. Joseph Grimball applied for a letter of dismission which was granted.

May 27th 1830

The Church met in conference. Sermon by Elder Joseph Willis.

July 27th 1830

The church met in conference and was in peace. Appointed Brethern Johnston and Keller to represent us in the next Association and Elder Willis to write the letter. Resolved that the church be moved on the west side of the Caleasiau River. Appointed Bro. Eli Batson to select the place to set the house.

August 21st 1830

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis. A dissatisfaction having arisen with Brother Phares and his wife against Sister Bass for relating things that she ought not. Sister Bass confessed her wrong and was forgiven by all the members except Bro. Phares. Sister Moore applied for a letter of dismission which was granted.

Oct. 23rd 1830

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis. Bro. Reuben Phares still refusing to forgive Sister Bass, and having injured the feelings of several of the Brethren, he is hereby excluded by unamious vote of the church.

December 25th 1830

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis, the church was found in peace. Resolved. That the stated meetings of the church be held in future on the Saturday before first Lords day in each month.

January 1st 1831

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis. A door being opened for the reception of members Joseph Willis Junr. was received by letter.

February 12th 1831

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis and Sister Neele was received by letter.

March 19th 1831

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis, and the church was found in peace. The following members were received by letter viz. John Thompson and his servant and Sister Watson.

The Natchitoches Parish Notes for the July issue will consist of two parts: First a story pertinent to the present generation of the BARNHILL FAMILY who settled in Natchitoches Parish, La. 1852. William Hodge Barnhill and his children by his two wives; Sidney Hardwick and Eliza Ellen Gossett.

The second part of the notes will consist of Revolutionary Pension applications for Barnhills.

The first is really a true story of an incident which occurred during the Civil War. It was related to the author by Robert Barnhill, first cousin to my mother, Fannie Penola Barnhill. I will relate it as he related it to me in 1957, sitting on the front portion of his home at Marthaville, Louisiana.

Cousin Robert Barnhill, (6) son of Henry Clay; (5) son of William Hodge; (4) SON OF William; (3) Son of William; (2) SON OF Robert Barnhill (1) the immigrant. This genealogy is given in the preceding issues of The Genie.

William Hodge Barnhill and his younger sons were in the field preparing it for planting in April 1864, while the mother and girls were shelling peas for their noonday meal. They lived on land he bought from the U.S. Government in 1852, which is located near the present town of Marthaville, La. The property is close to the Bethany Road, but most of the early Barnhills were buried in Beulah Cemetery (Ajax to Marthaville Road) rather than Bethany Cemetery.

During the Red River Campaign of the Civil War, fighting came very close to the Barnhill property, and shelling was heard by this family coming from the direction of the present town of Belmont. I believe this is called a skirmish rather than a battle, and Cousin Robert said it was close to Crump's Corner. (Note (April) issue of Genie showing the marriage of William Hodge's sister, Cynthia, to Charles Crump 27 Mar 1824, St. Clair Co., Ala.) Also note Residence #496 1850 Natchitoches Parish Census - Natchitoches Parish Notes - July 1978 issue. This shows Charles Crump with wife Cynthia, their children and nephew, George Barnhill, who is sone of William Hodge and Sidney Hardwick Barnhill.

While the Barnhills were thus employed, a young man, too yound, not more than 18 or 19 and was very hot and thirsty. He looked like he belonged some other place than in a war where a mistake could cost him his life. His clothes, they had once been the beautiful gray of the Confederacy now hung in tatters. He stopped by the house and asked for water and the way to Pleasant Hill. They directed him to the spring where they obtained all their water, and gave him directions to Pleasant Hill. Shortly after the Rebel had passed, three Yankee soldiers on horses came galloping up to the Barnhill home and asked the women if they had seen the soldier. They told

him yes and that he had gone a different direction than he had really gone, but the soldiers noted the tracks and started in the same direction as the young soldier. A few minutes later they heard 3 shots ring from the forest, and later that afternoon the Barnhill men went in search of the soldier. They found him, but he was dead - shot three times. They buried him close to the road by the fence of the Barnhill field, and planted a cedar tree to mark it.

Uncle Robert wanted me to see the grave, but the only way we could get into the place was by tractor, and his some could not get off to take us. He often spoke of this grave to me. He told me how the Barnhill Family had taken care of the grave until William Hodge died, and then his father, Henry Clay cared for it until his death in 1905. After his death, Cousin Robert cared for the grave as long as he was physically able. Today, there is an old grave just off the road, the remains of which can still be clearly seen, but there is a marker there and the site is well marked today with an enclosed pavilion and other items of interest. It is called Rebel Park. The site of the grave was dedicated and a Memorial Service held 28 June 1962. No happier face has ever been seen than that of Robert Barnhill on this occasion. Within five days Cousin Robert was dead. He told me that about 1901 or 02 a man, his wife and daughter came from Arkansas to talk with Henry (Robert's father) about the grave, and came to the conclusion that he was probably the couple's son and the young lady's brother.

There are many heroes everywhere, but I believe this family is a very special one, and I know Cousin Robert is.

Edward Barnhill

S.C., Beaufort District.. Personally appeared before me, John M. Baker, Esq., Will Phoenix, servant in the family of the late Col. Robert Barnwell & now belonging to Col. Robert Barnwell of this Town of Beaufort, who makes oath ... to the following inquires: Name, Will Phoenix, about 83 years of age

During the Revolutionary War Will Phoenix says that he waited upon his old mistress, the mother of his young masters, her sons, John, Edward and Robert Barnwell

- Will Phoenix saith that he lived in the house from childhood and that Col. Edward Barnwll entered the service young, from school, that he had a commission but he cannot say what it was; that he was older than his brother Robert.
- Will Phoenix saith that he was not present at the Battle of Port Royal, but was on the plantation a few miles off, that the eldest brother, John, commanded a small company of calvry on that occasion.

- 5. Knows that Edward Barnwll was there and was an officer.
- 6. Says he remembers his three young masters, John, Edward and Robert Barnwell and their nephew William Elliot were among the troops under Col. Stepn Bull, sent by the Council of Safety of Charleston to assist the Council of Safety of George to put down some alarms and disaffection abt Savannah and Purysburgh. Knows Edward Barnwell was in battle at Matthews Plantation because his young master, Robert, was taken off the field by his fellow servan, Harry, the body servant of Edward Barnwell.
- 7th Knows the three bros. and their nephew, Wm. Elliott, were confined on the Prison Ship; as only a few servants were allowed on board Harry waited on all of them.
- 8th Will says he waited on his then master, Robert Barnwell at the wedding of his bro. Edward to Miss Mary Williamson doon after peace. Cannot say the year that they had a son; the one child and the lady died in a few years, and then Edward Barnwell married Miss Mary Wigg in 1790. That this lady is now the widow of Edward Barnwell and lives in the house where he died, that his master, Robert Barnwell, married this lady's sister Miss Eliza Wigg; that his master and mistress are both dead.
