PROVING A LOUISIANA TITLE

A New Orleans lawyer was seeking a loan for a client from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and was told the loan would be granted if he could prove satisfactory title to the property offered as collateral. The title dated back to 1804, and he had to spend four months running it down.

After sending the information to the R. F. C. he got this reply: "We have received your letter enclosing application for loan, supported by the abstract of title. However, you have not cleared the title before the year 1804. Before final approval can be accorded, it will be necessary that the title be cleared back of that year."

The lawyer replied: "I was unaware that any educated man in the world - and particularly one holding a position of responsibility and trust in our Federal Government - failed to know that Louisiana did not become a part of the United States until 1804, and that there consequently are no American court records prior to that time.

Now, for your information, the United States Government purchased the Louisiana Territory from France. The title to the land was acquired by France through right of conquest from Spain.

The land came into the possession of Spain by right of discovery made in 1492 by a fellow named Christopher Columbus, who had been granted the privilege of seeking a new trade route to India by Queen Isabella. The good queen-----, who, I might say, was almost as careful about titles as the Reconstruction Finance Corporation-- secured the blessing of the Pope upon the voyage before she sold her jewels to help Columbus.

Now, the Pope, as you may just have possibly have heard, is the emissary of Jesus Christ, the Son of God: and God, it is thought by many people, made the world. I therefore think even YOU might with some degree of safety assume that God also made that part of the United States called Louisiana, and I hope to hell you are satisfied.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON THE SECRET FAMILY OF GEN. SAM HOUSTON OF
COLLINSVILLE, LAUDERDALE COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI

Since publishing our first story on this subject in the January 1979 issue of THE GENIE, we have received further correspondence from Mr. Ray Beeman, 1246 Goodman Street in Memphis, Tennessee - 38111. He expressed appreciation for the publication and disappointment at not receiving any correspondence pertaining to this family search. He enclosed another article, which is published below, pertaining to the marriage of General Sam Houston and the Cherokee girl, Talihina Rogers, written by George F. Mellen.

HOUSTON AND CHEROKEE

Several years back, the United States government paid a memorable tribute to General Sam Houston's Cherokee wife, the beautiful and admired Talihina Rogers. For sixty years her remains had rested placidly near a cedar tree in an attractive grove overlooking the Arkansas River. From that reposeful spot they have been taken and laid in the United States National Cemetery at Fort Gibson, Oklahoma. The new monument serves to perpetuate her memory in this wise: "Sacred to the memory of Talihina, Cherokee wife of General Sam Houston, liberator of Texas."

There is something peculiarly fitting and eminently pathetic about this act of a great government. In the few brief years of this wedlock, between 1829 and 1832, Houston was not a soldier. For five years, 1813 to 1818, beginning with his enlistment for the Creek War and ending with his sub-agency of the Cherokees under Agent Return Jonathan Meigs, he had been a regular private, ensign lieutenant. From the battle of the Horseshoe he had borne away three honorable and troublesome wounds. Like a ministering angel, Talihina had cared for him amid drunken stupors and in maintaining his trading store across the river from Fort Gibson.

The favoritism and popularity that he enjoyed among the officers' and soldiers' families of the fort, she shared with him. Welcome awaited her wherever he was bidden. When he left her for Texas in a frenzy of adventure, there was not wanting the hope of reuniting their fortunes. After determination to make permanent his Texas relationships, he sent back for her. She refused to follow. Within a few years her spirit went to the happy hunting grounds, while her body remained undisturbed for six decades. To do her honor, along with the honors heaped upon her distinguished husband, a generous government has taken it from a solitary abiding place and interred it among the patriotic dead.

Within all the range of fact or fiction, there is not a more engaging story than that which would adequately tell of the varied relations of Sam Houston with the Cherokee Nation. If some Homer or Virgil shall ever undertake to narrate the epic of its life and fortunes, Houston will occupy a large place. It

will not be exactly that of a Ulysses or Aeneas, but there will be in its recital much that runs parallel with the adventures and fortunes of those immortals. Talihina was not precisely some Calypso, enamored of her lover and seeking to detain him on her lovely island amid "a scene to fill a god from heaven with wonder and delight." Nor was she proximately some Oldo and reigning queen welcoming the wonderer, spreading before him luxuriant feasts, honoring him with games of skill and strength, and offering him a home, a principality, a bride.

Like so many romantic episodes, the story goes back to find its root beneath the blue mountains and along the sparkling streams of East Tennessee. From the Virginia home a widowed mother had brought her nine children to Blount county. Ten miles from Maryville, on the old Maryville and Madisonville road, a small clearing was made. But a few miles away, across the Little Tennessee River, lived the Cherokees. The boy in his early teens felt bubbling within him the spirit of adventure. It was the call to a wide, free, unrestrained life. He left the trader's store in which an elder brother had placed him, and went to live for three years among new-made friends of another race. The Chief, John Jolly, otherwise Alutucky or Oolootekahor Ahuludegi, who lived at the mouth of the Hiawassee River, received him and adopted him as one of his family. Here adapting himself to the dress, habits and occupations and learning the language of this fine type of American Indians, he lived in free association. At intervals he returned to the haunts of the white man to purchase ammunition and trinkets, but no appeals could induce him to linger longer than the mission required for its fulfilment. By 1810 he had abandoned his Cherokee life, and that year attended the school of Rev. Isaac Anderson, the distinguished Presbyterian educator, six miles northeast of Knoxville. To this day, off the mouth of the Hiawassee River, Jolly's Island perpetuates the name and memory of his Cherokee benefactor.

Returning to civilization, young Houston lived not far away from former associates. At Kingston, he became a clerk in the store of Mr. Sheffy. A prime qualification was his fluency in speaking the Cherokee language. The Indian trade was a large factor in mercantile success, and his familiarity with them proved a mutual attraction. With the outbreak of the war against the Creeks, it was to be expected that one of so adventurous temperament would enlist. He joined the thirty-ninth regiment, which Col. John Williams commanded, and with the friendly Cherokees under Col. Gideon Morgan won fame at Tohopeda, or in the battle of the Horseshoe.

Andrew Jackson, admiring his soldierly qualities and noting his disability from wounds, recommended that he should be appointed sub-agent of the Cherokee nation. The agency then was located

at Hiawassee garrison, in Rhea County just opposite Jolly's Island. Again he was brought into close relations with his former friends.

His withdrawal within a year from the office was caused by his too ardent regard for Cherokee interests and observances. He accompanied a delegation to Washington. When among Cherokees, it was his custom to don their garb. In this he appeared before the Secretary of War, John C. Calhoun, who chided him for lack of the respect due the dignity of his office. A graver difficulty was the charges against his conduct and integrity by persons whose trade he had interfered with. From Spanish Florida through the Cherokee reservation these had been hitherto unmolested in smuggling African slaves into the upper tier of states. It was so palpable a violation that he used all his resources to put a stop to it. Though fully exonerated when cited before President Monroe and the Secretary of War, he chaffed so under the spirit and conduct of the inquiry as to hand back his commission.

His friendly concern, however, increased the regard and confidence of the Cherokees. It was a distinct compliment to them to appear before Calhoun in blanket, buckskin hunting-shirt, leggins, moccasins, and a headgear of eagle and wild turkey feathers. It was the evidence of righteousness when he frustrated the machinations of agents and contractors who fleeced them out of the funds and rations accorded by treaty stipulations. Everywhere and under all circumstances Houston, as adopted Cherokee, sub-agent, president of the Texas Republic and United States Senator, showed himself unwaveringly the sincere and attached friend of the weaker race. He left it of record that he had never known any violation of a treaty by the Indian where good faith had marked the conduct of his white brothers. It was again to honor Sam Houston, as well as the Cherokee remnant, in giving Talihina a grave and monument in a National cemetery.

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS CEMETERY - Jasper Co., Texas

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS CEMETERY

Originally known as Pinetucky, this community was first settled by Alexander and Sherod Wright, two brothers who arrived about 1824. The settlement was renamed Magnolia Springs when the Post Office opened in 1850.

The earliest known interment in this community burial ground is that of Sherod Wright's wife Anna, who died on July 25, 1858. In 1860, Fellowship Baptist Church purchases 12 acres of land, which included her gravesite, for a church and cemetery. For many years the local Baptist and Methodist congregations shared a frame church building located north of the cemetery property. The graveyard was enlarged in 1902 when the black congregation of Springhill Church bought 4.2 acres adjoining the south side for burial purposes.

Many early leaders of the community are buried here, including the Rev. John Bean (1792-1871), a Baptist preacher; Nathan Corley (d. 1871), one of the founders of the Masonic Lodge that bears his name; Aurin G. Horn (1793-1858), a wealthy plantation owner; and Dr. Ransom P. Sholars (b. 1812), the area's first physician. Magnolia Springs Cemetery contains over 900 marked and unmarked graves.

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS CEMETERY

The Magnolia Springs Cemetery is situated on a section of a league obtained by Alexander Wright, under the Mexican Land Grants, on February 20, 1835. The cemetery derived its name from its location: the antebellum town of Magnolia Springs. It is located in west central Jasper County, along-side Farm Road 1005; approximately fifteen miles south of the town of Jasper and ten miles northwest of Kirbyville.

For the purpose of a church and burial grounds, John Bean, Pastor, and Johnathan L. Smith representing the other deacons of the Fellowship Baptist Church, purchased twelve acres on November 1860, from Z. William Eddy and wife, Maria. These twelve acres, located on the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of the Alexander Wright league, were first purchased September 1844, by T. F. Polly from the Sheriff of Jasper County. Since the courthouse and records were burned in 1849, it is assumed that Alexander Wright failed to pay his taxes - thus, the land was sold at auction by the County Sheriff.

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS CEMETERY - Continued

The existence of the cemetery and its name, prior to the date of acquisition of the land, is proven by the grave marker of Anna Wright, wife of Sherod Wright and sister-in-law of Alexander Wright. Anna Wright is the first known person buried in the cemetery (d. July 25, 1858 - age 60).

However, there could have been an earlier burial than that of Anna Wright; the tombstone of Aurin G. Horn reads: 19 May 1793 - 9 August 1858, but a notation written, presumably by one of his children, on a tattered sheet of the family Bible reads: Mother d. April 23rd 1826, Father August 9, 187. The mystery of the "dates" still remains.

Including the two graves mentioned, there are 846 marked graves, and 69 unmarked. Of the former, several prominent men of the community are listed - John Bean, one of the earliest known Pastors of the area; Nathan Corley, one of the founders of Nathan Corley Masonic Lodge No. 294 A. F. and A. M.; Ransom P. Sholars, probably the first physician in that area; his grandson, Arthur R. Sholars, also a physician in Magnolia Springs; Sherod Wright, one of two brothers, known to be the first settlers of the community. Several descendants of these men are also buried in the cemetery.

Adjoining the cemetery, on the south side, separated by a fence, is a burial ground for the colored people. The 4.2 acres were purchased May 20, 1902 from M. A. Eddy, (as recorded in the deed), "---by the collard (sic) people of Springhill Church near Magnolia Springs, Texas." Deacons of the church were: D. Bradford, George Cooper, Ely Barnett Sr. and John Collier. This area is also known as the Magnolia Springs Cemetery, but, locally distinguished from the white cemetery, by a word - "Colored".

On July 16, 1902, deacons R. W. Smith, M. F. Clark, J. G. Barnett and W. B. Bean of the Fellowship Baptist Church (white) purchased an additional 3.3 acres, adjoining the northeast side of the original twelve acres, from M. A. Eddy. Prior to this purchase, in around 1870, a one room frame Church had been built a few yards north of the north line of the twelve acres. Both the Baptists and Methodists of the area used the building, alternately, as their place of worship.

By the time the trustees, T. V. Swearingen, H. A. Pace, O. C. Rutledge, S. M. Primrose and G. W. Rawls, of the Methodist Church, had purchased 3 acres, adjoining on the west of the Fellowship Baptist Church's 3.3 acreage, the original church began to deteriorate. Therefore, a decision was made by both denominations to get all available good lumber, from the original church, and build another one-room building. Again, overlapping the property lines, the new church was built (between 1905-1910) a few yards north of the original.

MAGNOLIA SPRINGS CEMETERY - Continued

In 1962, when the Baptists decided to build a brick church building on the northeast of their 3.3 acres, the Methodists purchased the interest the Baptists had on the second church and moved the building, with all contents, to the northeast section of the Methodists' acreage. To date (1978), the one-room frame building used by the Methodists as their place of worship, remains in this location.

Although, the two denominations have had a common interest in the church building which adjoins the cemetery, there are no restrictions for burials of persons with different religious beliefs.

Most of the burials are located on the Methodists' acreage and some on the original land belonging to the Baptists. There are no indications that an epidemic or national disaster might account for a significant number of graves.

The cemetery, in good condition, is in current use; on December 22, 1975, a State Charter (Number 372444) was issued to the Magnolia Springs Community Cemetery Association, who maintains the cemetery. The seven charter members are as follows:

*Brief genealogy

Aurin G. Horn:

Born in Georgia and there married Sophia Dekle on March 6, 1816; they had ten children (Sally, William L., Elizabeth T., Alfred A., Chesley Allen, John A. M., Weston C., Aurin G., Mary Ann and Tearsey Ann).

Soon after his first wife's death (23 April 1836), Aurin married his wife's niece, Eleanor Dekle Heath, a widow with three children (Andrew Jackson, Julia Ann and George Washington by Hardy Heath). Aurin fathered an additional twelve children by Eleanor; six born in Georgia and six in Texas. He brought his family to Jasper County, Texas in 1847 and became a wealthy farmer; according to the 1850 census he owned 28 slaves at that time.

John Bean:

Born November 21, 1792 in Edgefield District, South Carolina, later moved to Walton County, Georgia and by 1839 was residing in Claiborne Parish, Louisiana. He moved to Jasper County, Texas in 1851 and remained there until his death on December 24, 1871. He was married to Jane Youngblood.

Nathan Corley:

Born in South Carolina and was one of the founders of a Masonic Lodge (September 1866), which still bears his name. The Lodge was founded in Magnolia Springs, later (1887) it was moved to Kirbyville. He died 24 September 1871.

Ransom P. Sholars:

Born in Georgia, May 8, 1812; was an M. D. graduate of Transylvania College of Kentucky and practiced in Alabama and North Louisiana

before moving to Jasper County, Texas in 1858. One of his sons, Samuel Wallace, also became a physician, and had three sons (Arthur R., Samuel W., Orrin L.) by wife, Elizabeth. Unlike, his father, Samuel and family, except son, Arthur R., settled in Orange, Texas.

Arthur R. Sholars:

Born in Texas, January 27, 1875; followed the footsteps of his father, Samuel and grandfather, Ransom in becoming a physician. He settled in Magnolia Springs where he died June 13, 1922.

Sherod Wright:

Served in the war of 1812 and later married Anna Clark; they had eight children (Mickey Ann, John (Jack) Valentine, Solomon, Alexander, Neomi (Omi), Susan, Betsy, and Sherod Jr.). John (Jack) Valentine's bachelor son, Solomon (Sol) wrote "My Rambles", edited by J. Frank Dobie and published in 1942 by the Texas Folklore Society.

On February 19, 1835, Sherod obtained a league of land adjoining his brother's league, and settled with his family on the south side of his land. This area was then known as Pinetucky, but changed its name to Magnolia Springs in 1850 when a postoffice was established at the site.

(Note: For more information on Pinetucky, see "Historic Sites in Jasper County" compiled, 1973, by the Jasper County Historical Commission).

My dear old dad remarked long ago,
"If your hopes and dreams fade a bit,
If things don't go quite right, my son,
Stand up like a man - and quit."

Story of Revolutionary Heroine of Georgia, "Nancy Hart"

"Is woman a coward? No, no, she is brave;
Oh nothing but love ever made her a slave
In home's happy circle, she's poetry's lark
But threaten that home, and she's Joan of Arc."

Among the outstanding women of history a prominent place must be given to Georgia's War Queen. Nancy Morgan Hart, who was perhaps, the most striking heroine of the Revolutionary War. She was the daughter of Thomas and Rebecca (Alexander) Morgan, a first cousin of General Daniel Morgan of the Revolutionary War, and a first cousin of Daniel Boone of a Kentucky farm. She was married to Benjamin Hart of Orange County, North Carolina, and they moved to what is known as Elbert County, Georgia, before the beginning of the war in which she was destined to play so distinguished a role.

Benjamin Hart drew 400 acres of land on Broad River, and here on the north side of the river, it was about twelve miles from the present city of Elberton, was built the log house in which he and his wife lived. They reared a family of eight children whose names were as follows: Morgan, John, Thoman, Benjamin, Lenmel, Mark, Sally and Keziah. Mrs. Hart, a woman of large phisque, great strength and wide pendance of character, knew no fear. Fired with a patriotic fervor such as few possessed. She was dauntless in her efforts to protect the "Liberty Boys" and to save her country. She was of Welsh Quaker ancestry, but she did not inherit some of the qualities attributed to the Quakers, for the creek near her home emptying into Broad River was named "War Woman's Creek" by the Indians who both admired and feared her on account of her many marvelous deeds.

Like many pioneer women of her day, this remarkable woman was deprived of educational advantages, but in her untutored bosom dwelt a heart whose patriotism ranked her second to none. She learned early in life to adjust to her surroundings and to cope with the trials of those perilous times. She could shoot her gun as well as any of the back woodsmen: indeed, it is to her unerring shot that she was able to accomplish one of her most notable feats.

During the days of Toryism, Mrs. Hart had much to endure in her primitive home in the woods in upper Georgia. She became well known to the Tories, who seemed to enjoy annoying her, but her shrewdness and exploits were such that she always defended herself and her children from them, and her babin became a theatre in which she and the plundering and murderous Tories were to enact many scenes, some tragic - other comic. In these little dramas she displayed an undaunted courage which was rivaled only by her cunning strategy, so from the following stories one can understand how the fame of her hitherto unheralded name spread rapidly over the frontier belt and even across the sea.

STORY OF NANCY HART - Continued

One evening while the family was sitting around the log fire, Mrs. Hart was boiling a large kettle of soap over the coals. They were chattering away gaily, when suddenly one of them noticed that someone from the outside was peeping in through the crevice of the chimney. This information was passed on to her in a silent way, so she became more animated in her conversation, stirred the soap with more vigor, and watched the crack for the reappearance of the spy. Suddenly she dashed a ladle of the boiling soap in a most vigorous manner through the crevice, and the eavesdropper, taken by surprise and blinded by the hot soap, screamed in a most terrible manner, whilst our heroine in a very solicitous way went out to inquire into the trouble and bound the Tory fast as her prisoner.

One day she chanced to meet a Tory on the road, and engaging in conversation with him, so as to divert his attention, she seized his gun and ordered him to march in front of her to the not far distant fort. The poor man was so intimidated that he obeyed, and after their brief march she delivered her prisoner to the commander of the American Fort.

On another occasion the brave Nancy with her sack of corn was riding to the mill, some miles distant, when she was met by a band of Tories. They knew her and asked her for her pass. She shook her fist in their faces and replied, "this is my pass". Wishing to have some fun at her expense, they dismounted her and threw her sack of corn to the ground, but she was not to be disconcerted in any such way, so she lifted her corn back upon her horse, mounted it and rode on to the mill.

While busy at home one day, she heard the tramp of a horse rapidly approaching, then looking out saw a horseman coming toward her door. She recognized him as a Whig, and when he drew near and she learned that he was being pursued by some Tories, she let down the bars of her home, and told him to ride through and hide himself in the swamp. She then put up the bars, closed the door, and shortly afterwards when the Tories rode up to her door and called to her, she muffled her head, opened the door cautiously, and asked why they disturbed a sick, lone woman. They explained that they had tracked him, a well known rebel, near her house and asked if she had seen anyone on horse back pass that way. She replied that she had seen somebody turn out of the path into the woods a few hundred yards back. "That must be the Man," said the Tories, and asking her the direction he had taken, she directed them in the opposite way, and they rode off. In relating this incident, she remarked, "They were well fooled in taking the contrary direction to that of my Whig boy, but if only they had looked down on the ground, they might have seen the tracks made by his horses feet.

She fought with her husband, Captain Benjamin Hart, and oldest son, Morgan Hart, in the battle of Kettle Creek, Feb. 14, 1799, but the deed that gives her greatest renown is the capture of the group of Tories at her famous "Dinner Party."

One morning a group of six Tories who had been waging guerilla warfare in her neighborhood called at her door and found her along with her daughter, "Sukey", perhaps ten or twelve years of age. They ordered Mrs. Hart to give them something to eat, but she replied that she never fed the King's men and that moreover they had plundered and pillaged her home until she had nothing left but one old gobbler. "Well you shall cook that for us," replied one of the men, and raising his musket, he shot down the turkey, which he ordered her to dress and cook, without delay. With no alternative except to obey and realizing the wisdom of getting the men well fed and relaxed before trying to even up her score against them, she set about in all haste to prepare the meal.

In the meantime, the men had stacked their guns and sat down by the fire to divert themselves over a beer jug. For the preparation of the meal, water was needed, so our heroine sent her little daughter "Sukey" to the spring near by for some water. A conch shell was kept at the spring and was used as a sort of trumpet for the family to signal to the men in the fields, warning them of danger or calling them home in case of trouble. This system of signals was well known to the child, so she blew the conch shell while at the spring and returned with her pail of water. When the meal was ready to be served, the soldiers were called to the table, and "Sukey" was sent for another bucket of water, which meant that she was to sound the horn again.

While busy watching the guest at the table, the brave woman cautiously picked up a gun and set it outside the house. She succeeded in doing this the second time without notice, but was detected in her third attempt. Quick as a flash, she raised this gun to her shoulder and declared she would kill the first man who approached. One man started to advance, and true to her threat, she fired and he fell dead. Seizing immediately another musket, she took aim again, and as a second man moved, she fired, and he fell to the floor wounded. She seized a third gun, and "Sukey" who had returned from the spring at this point, grabbed the remaining gun and announced that her father and other men would arrive in a few minutes. Mrs. Hart called upon her prisoners to surrender, which they did, and she held them at bay until her husband arrived with help. They were going to shoot the Tories, but she interposed, saying that they were her prisoners, and that "shooting was too good for them," so they were hanged. Shortly before this episode, a group of Tories had brutally murdered Captain John Dooly, a neighbor and friend of the Hart family, so knowing this and doubtless thinking that these men belonged to the same group, our dauntless patriot was more embittered than usual towards the men from whom she had suffered so much.

THE NANCY HART STORY - Continued

In 1912 after a lapse of almost a century and a half, while grading the Elberton and Eastern Railroad, a group of hands unearthed the well preserved skeletons of six men. They were buried a few feet under the ground, there was no trace of any coffin anywhere, and the fact that they were found about a half or three-fourths of a mile from the former house of Nancy Hart made many believe that these were the skeletons of the six Tories she captured.

There are many other stories told of the bravery of this extraordinary woman, but the foregoing ones will doubtless be enough to make one realize that she was perhaps the most daring heroine of the American Revolution, and that she is more than worthy of the various monuments erected to her memory.

Soon after the bloody struggle of independence was over, Captain and Mrs. Hart, with a part of their family, moved to Glynn County, Georgia, where they owned fifty acres of land in what is now the city of Brunswick. Benjamin Hart was appointed Justice of the Peace in 1796, and a Justice of the Inferior Court in 1797. He died in about 1802 and it is believed that he is buried in Wright's Square, which was the public burying ground at that time.

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Hart went to Clark County to make her home with her son, John who had become influential citizen and was a man of considerable property for those times.

He had married in 1878, Patience Lane, a daughter of Jesse and Winifred Aycock Lane, one of the outstanding families of North Carolina. John Hart continued to live for a number of years in various places not far from Athens, Georgia, but with family and famous mother, migrated later to Kentucky where he had long since been preceded by his uncles, Col. Thomas and Nathaniel Hart, and his cousin, Daniel Boone.

He located in Henerson County, about ten miles from the city of Henderson, and after having become a prominent citizen of that community, died in 1821. His mother, Nancy Morgan Hart, continued to live with her daughter-in-law, Patience Lane Hart, until her death in about 1830, and Mrs. Patience Hart died in the same home in 1802. All three lie buried on the "Hart Grave Yard" which is located on their farm near the old homestead. In this same graveyard - quite near the above mentioned graves, lie buried Rhoda Hart Floyd, the daughter of John and Patience Hart, and her only son, William Benjamin Floyd, the father of the author of this sketch.

Such was the role played by Mrs. Hart in public life, a loving and tender mother, a kind generous and hospitable neighbor and a woman well versed in the efficacy of various herbs and home remedies. With her rare common sense and robust constitution she often served as nurse and doctor until a practicing physician could be called.

STORY OF NANCY HART - Continued

Later in life she became a very devout member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in her extreme old age she rode many miles through the flats to service on Sunday. She was truly a good woman and she has left us an immortal memory.

Ever high spirited and energetic, she maintained her roaming disposition until the end of life, and often made extensive trips on horse back with a little negro boy behind her.

Mrs. Hart has been signally honored by the State she loved and served so well. Early in the last century, now the town of Hartford, which in 1810 was the county seat of Pulaski County, Georgia, was named for her.

In 1855 the county adjoining her old home in Georgia, was formed and named Hart County, and in 1856 the county seat was named Hartwell for this famous heroine.

This is the only county in the State of Georgia named for a woman. A few years ago, one of the highways in Georgia was named the Nancy Hart Highway. This is the only highway in the United States named for a woman. The city of Elberton, Georgia, has named a school for her and has erected a monument to her memory.

The Nancy Hart Chapter, D.A.R., in Milledgeville, Georgia, has been named for her, and this Chapter in connection with the Stephen Heard Chapter, D.A.R. in Elberton bought five acres of ground surrounding her home site and presented it to the National Society D.A.R. as a Memorial Park.

A painting, "Nancy Hart Capturing the Tories," was presented to the State of Georgia. It hung in the Capital Building in Atlanta until recently, when it was transferred to the Rhodes Historical Building.

Her grave has been marked by the Samuel Hopkins Chapter, D.A.R. Henderson County, Kentucky, and a childrens' Chapter in Milledgeville, Georgia, has been organized and named for her daughter, "Sukey" Hart.

Through the efforts of Representative Charles H. Brand, Congress voted an appropriation of \$1650 for a National Monument to be erected to her memory. This monument was placed in the city of Hartwell, Georgia, and under the auspices of the John Benson Chapter D.A.R., it was unveiled on Nov. 11, 1931 in the presence of a vast crowd of people from upper Georgia who had traveled many miles to pay homage to the memory of the state's most picturesque heroine.

The great Empire State of the South has ever cherished the memory of this heroine. Quoting from the famous Georgia historian who named her the Georgia War Queen. "She needs no help from the

devices of bronze or marble to keep her memory ablaze about the hearthstones of the Georgia commonwealth. She has ever been the fireside favorite of the Georgia home. In the drama of the Revolution she claims the enthusiastic plaudit of the Georgia youngsters above all other characters. She outstrips Washington and overtops LaFayette and surpasses Sergeant Jasper; and though only an ill-favored country dame, yet in childhood's verdict, hers is the lustiest shout of all the hurrying host whose quick step answered the battle cry of Lexington."

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PENSIONS

John Riddle of Continental New York Service #S 15617 (Section 162: At the time of his application he was age 73. Entered Service first in Dutchess Co., New York, he was drafted to serve in the capacity of a militiaman and private soldier for six months to serve under command of Capt Dodge in May 1778. They first rendezvoused at Fish Kill New York and he was there attached to the regiment under Col Wisonpelt. They first marched to Newborough New York and then from there they marched to Albany New York and then to Mohawk River. Then to Johnstown and there came under command of Gen. Sullivan and then marched to Saratoga.

Then again in May 1779 he was again drafted to serve in the capacity of a militia man and private soldier to serve under Capt White for 3 mo. They first were stationed at Fish Kill and there was attached to the regiment under Col Starks. He was then discharged and immediately re-enlisted to serve under Capt Savage. On this new tour they marched to West Point under Gen Putnam. He was in the regiment of artillery under Co. Lamb. He served at least nine months as a private militia soldier for 4 years as a regular soldier. The said pensioner had been born in Morris Co New Jersey in 1760 and entered service from Dutchess Co New York and after the close of the Revolution he removed to Morris Co. N.J. and from there he removed to Pennsylvania. Next removed to Frederick Co Va. where he resided for two years and from there to Lexington, Ky and resided for 1 year. Then removed back to Morris Co N.J. where he resided for 8 years and from there to Shelby Co Ky, and from there to Henry Co Ky where he continued to reside ever since 1816. He was drafted for 2 tours

and then on his last tour he had enlisted. He stated that he remembered Gen Putnam, Gen Sullivan, Gen Greene, Gen Lafayette, Col Crane, Adjutant Bradford, Col Lamb, Col Wisonpelt and Capt Dodge (SECTION 164+++++++)

He served during an engagement at Johnstown...

The affidavit of Will Knight was given. Deponent stated that he had been acquainted with pensioner and knew he served in the Revolution. John Riddle was on the Pension Roll at \$30 per annum and his certificate was issued on April 11, 1834 sent to Hon R. M. Johnson,HR

Thomas Robertson Old War Invalid File No. 25793

The said pensioner was a private in Capt Hopkins Co Second United States Dragoons. He was wounded in battle Dec 18, 1812 at Massissinway.

The affidavit of M S Pettitt was given at the same time and place. He was a surgeons Mate of U S during the Revolution and was attached to Major I W Bells Squadron of U S Dragoons. He certified that the pensioner Thomas Robertson had in reality been wounded as he had stated Dec 18 1812. That he had been wounded to such an extent that he had been incapacitated from active duty as a direct result of those wounds received while during battle. He was honorably discharged because of wounds he received while in the line of his duty and before the time for that tour had been ended. A personal description of him is as follows: He has black hair and blue eyes, dark complexion and five feet and 9" tall, age 26.

Joshua Prewett and Berkshire, Maria. Virginia Service W 27643

Bounty land Warrant No. 110265 - 160-55 Former widow. He was age 69 when he applied. He was born in Bedford County Virginia 1765, and removed to Ky at age 13 and in March 1779, he was garrisoned in Louisville Ky and enlisted to serve under Capt George of the artillery for five years, and attached to regiment of Gen George Rogers Clark. They first descended the Ohio River to its junction with the Mississippi River and then ascended the Miss. River to its junction with the Missouri River. They then went up the Ohio River to Louisville Ky and ascended the Ohio River as high as the mouth of the Big Ky River. They next marched to the Chillicothe towns and the pensioner was discharged in March 1784 by Capt George.

Fern Ainsworth

The first immigrants of this family to America came into Maryland, Virginia and Pennsylvania. The family of Nathaniel Holland born 1760 and died 1838, married Susan Bryan. Continuing the Paternal line to William Calvert Holland whose parents were William West Holland and Rosalie Eugenia Calvert, 3rd Gr. Grand daughter of Charles Calvert, 5th Lord Baltimore, who was 2nd Gr. Grandson of the 1st Lord Baltimore, George Calvert, Kt. Created Lord Baron at Baltimore in Ireland. George was the father of Cecil Calvert, 2nd Lord Baltimore, and the founder of Maryland. Through this lineage William Calvert Holland was also descended from the Arundel Family by the marriage of Cecil, the founder of Maryland, to Lady Anne Arundel whose lineage is available in most Heraldic publications.

This Holland Family is also descended from Sir George Yeardley, one of the most able and popular Colonial Governors of Virginia. He came to Virginia 1609 in the "Deliverance" (see Hotten's list), being a member of the Virginia Company that year and became Deputy Governor of Virginia 1616-17. He and his wife, Temperance Flowerdew, resided in Jamestown, Virginia 1625. He died November 1627.

Another genealogy of the HOLLAND Family is traced through Nathan Holland (1) WHO MARRIED Caroline Saunders. Solomon (2) who married Margaret Gatton; Nathan (3) who married Ursula Harding; William (4) who married Susanna Waters (born 1700, daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Arnold) Waters, and grand daughter of John Waters (died before 1704). Sarah Arnold was descended from Richard and Martha (Thomas) Arnold, she, Martha Thomas being descended from Philip and Sarah (Harrison) Thomas; her Grandfather who was Evan Thomas born 1580 in Swansea, Wales and died 1650); John (5) and Ann Spicer; Anthony (6) and Isabel (Parsons) Holland who was the daughter of Thomas Parsons and his wife Isabel. Anthony Holland (6) died 1703.

There is mention of Johan Ernst Holland from Hamburg, 3 Nov. 1752 in the "Queen of Denmark" George Parrish, Master, - Vol. I Pa. German Pioneers, page 504. Johan Christian Holland Oct. 1768 on ship "Minerva" Thomas Arnold, master, from Rotterdam via Portsmouth. Vol. I, page 721, Pa. German Pioneers.

The migrational pattern for the Holland Family from Pennsylvania into South Carolina; from Nansemond County, into Isle of Wight, Va. and then into Bertie Co. North Carolina into Nash and Northampton Counties in North Carolina, possibly through Bladen and Robeson into Mississippi, both groups, i.e., those of Pa. into S.C., and those of Maryland and Virginia into North Carolina through South Carolina and both groups finally into Mississippi

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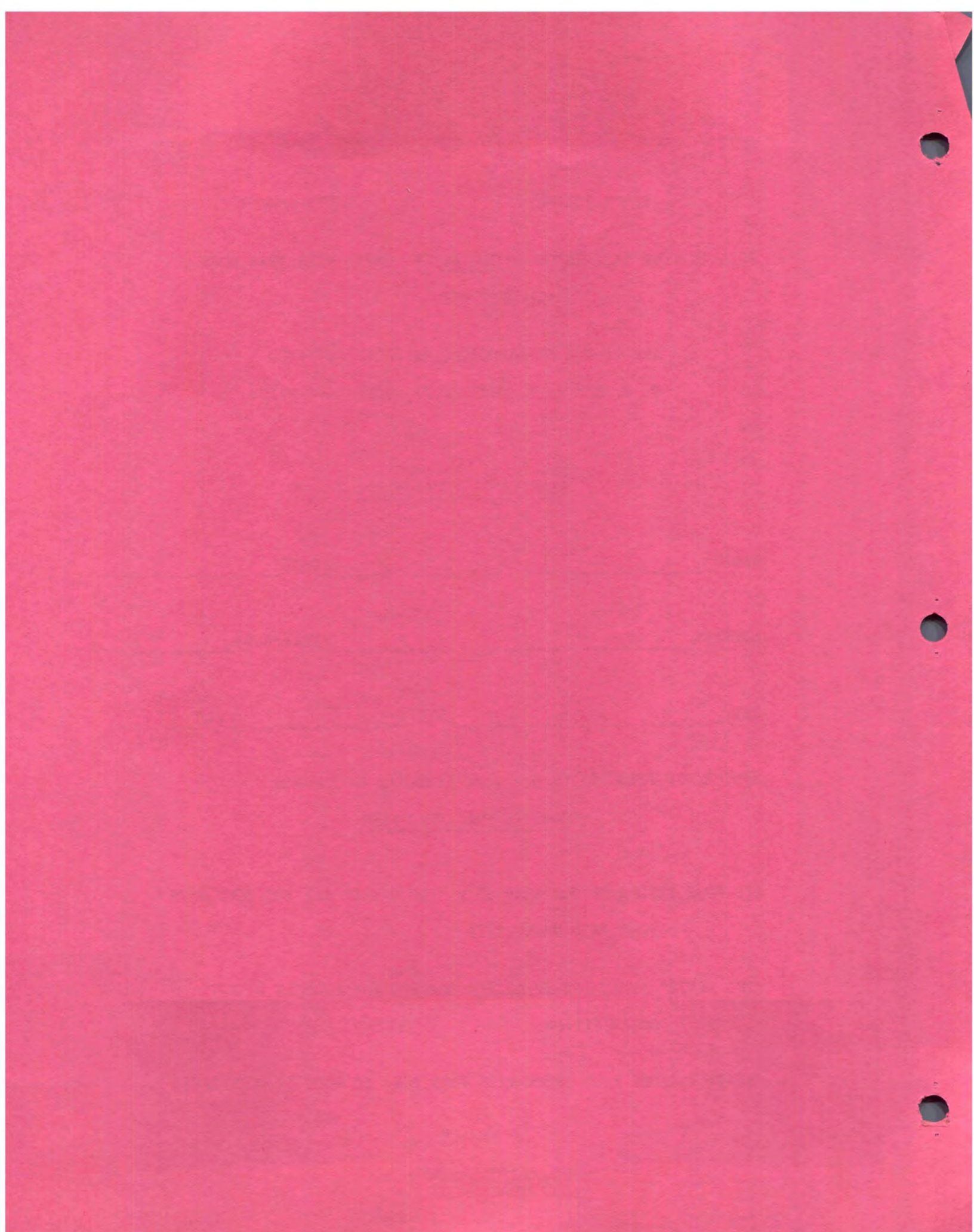
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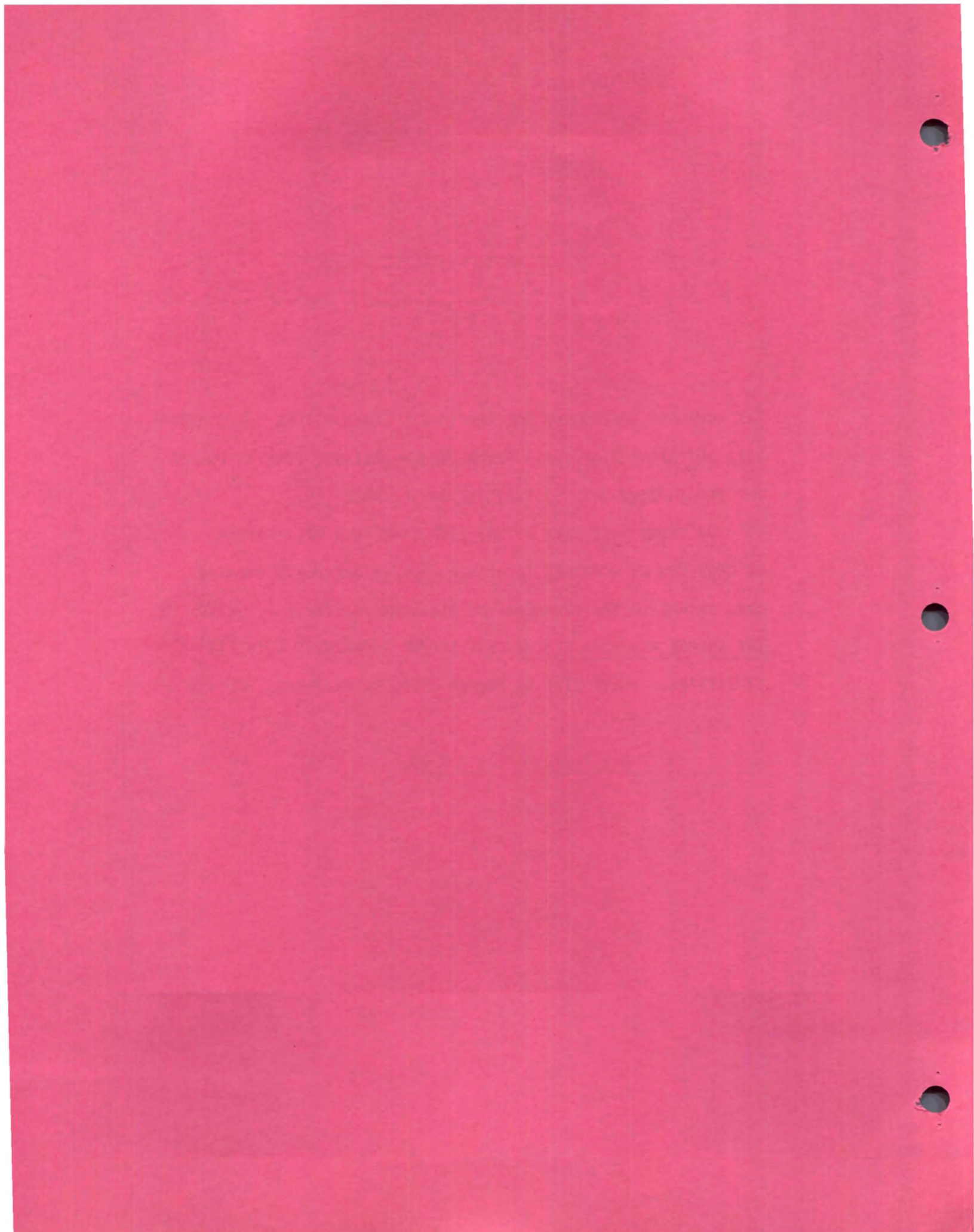

periodical literature should precede the undertaking of an extensive genealogical research project. The guide provides novices as well as advanced genealogists with descriptions and examples of the major American periodical indexes, citations to sources of further information, discussions of the proper use of periodical literature and the various types of periodical indexes, and an extensive list of American genealogical periodicals.

Ten chapters cover the following areas of interest: The Survey: An Introduction to Genealogical Research... American Genealogical Periodical Literature... The Index: Access to the Literature... The Munsell Indexes... Jacobus's Indexes... Waldenmaier's Indexes... Genealogical Periodical Annual Index... Topical Index of Genealogical Quarterlies... Query Indexes... Using Composite Indexes. An Epilogue provides comments on additional topics of interest and on the future of indexing genealogical periodicals.

Following the major portion of the guide are four appendixes. The first is an annotated bibliography of other genealogical periodical indexes. It includes little-known titles as well as popular works which index American genealogical periodicals. The second appendix lists and describes sources which contain bibliographical information concerning American genealogical periodical literature. The third is a select list of American genealogical periodicals. This list of about 500 periodicals furnishes the complete name and address of each periodical, its scope and frequency, and the editor's indication of priority for acquisition by genealogical librarians. The fourth appendix is an example of a survey calendar or log which the genealogist could utilize in his recordkeeping system.

The 415 page book is well indexed and documented. It traces the name of Whitfield from early 1100 in England, the family in the West Indies and the immigrants to Virginia Colony.

One of the English Pedigree begins with Robert, Chaplain to the Countess Ada, who grant "Whitfield" to him about 1160, and traces in a direct line to 1911.

Among the early colonial records, there are several references to Whitfields in Barbados. They contain lists of immigrants to the islands, baptisms, marriages, and deeds.

In 1636, a descendant of John Whitfield of England, with ancestors from Northern Holland, sailed in a ship to the West Indies and then to Elizabeth City Island in Virginia. Descendants moved across the James River with other probably in Albermarle Parish, Sussex County, Virginia. In 1800's descendants of the family moved to Tennessee where descendants are still living. As early as 1849 some were in Texas and later Calif.

Finally, each country's archives are described as they relate to genealogical research. For each national, provincial, departmental, or other type of archive, the guide lists relevant holdings and indicates the dates covered.

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
