Personally appeared before me, Jackson Millsaps, Judge of Probate of said county, Hannah Carpenter who after being duly sworn by me says that the following are the legal heirs of Temple Carpenter late of said county deseased, and also their ideas of residence to the best of her knowledge and belief, to wit - Solomon Carpenter now deceased leaving the following children who reside in the state of Arkansas, to wit, Owen, Martin, Patrison, Jasper and John Carpenter, Jane Chance in the state of Louisiana, (Adaline Murry/Maury of this county and her husband Alexander Murray/Maury" inserted here between lines, but seemingly in same handwriting, followed by another between line insertion which reads, "first work is illegible. but could be 'Impatience' and Thomas Carpenter of the state of Louisiana"), John Carpenter last account in Coafonia, don't know whether dead or alive, William Carpenter residing in Arkansas, Martin Carpenter residing in Yalobusha County this state, Mary Smith and her husband Everett Smith of the State of Arkansas, also in the state of Arkansas the children of Margaret Pate now deceased who was daughter of decedent, to wit, William, Mary, Sarah, Martin and Edwin. Elizabeth O'Neal now deceased leaving the following children, William Guess of Leake County this State, Adaline Cagle and her husband Jesse Cagle of this County. Malvina A. Scott and her husband John Scott of Texas. Owen Carpenter now deceased and the residence of his children unknown. Matthew Carpenter Leake County this state. Amanda James now deceased leaving a son named Hugh James. Sara James and her husband Bartley James of this County in said residence this County.

Averitt is the "old" spelling for Everett and so Mr. Smith feels this is the same as Everett Smith of the Probate Record.

Dec. 1st 1832

The church met in conference, and were at peace at the request of Brothren living in the Ten Mile Creek

Brethren Isaac Johnston and Eli Batson are appointed to assist in constituting them into a church.

August 3rd 1833

The church met in conference, and were in peace. Apointed Brethren Simpson and Eli Batson Delegates to the next Association and Elder Joseph Willis to write the church letter.

August 31st 1833

The church met in conference, and were at peace. Resolved. That this church approve of Missionary labour.

October 5th 1833

The church met. Sermon by Elder Joseph Willis.

November 2nd 1833

The church met in conference, and were at peace. Resolved. That the meetings of the church be held in future on the east side of the Caleasieu near Sampson Watsons.

March 1st 1834

The church met in conference, and were at peace. March 2nd 1834 recd John Hambleton by experience as a Minister of the Gospel.

May 30th 1834

The church met in conference, and were at peace. Bro. Batson and his mother having applied for letters of dismission they are granted. Received Sister Cely Shuffield by letter.

July 5th 1834

The church met in conference after a sermon by Elder Joseph Willis. Appointed Br. Luckey Simson our delegate to the next meeting of the Association, and Elder Willis to write the church letter.

August 2nd 1834

Elder Joseph Willis and Benjamin Carlington preached.

January 12th 1842

This church having disappeared by removals and death of its members, and no conference having been held since August 1834. The refreshing from the presence of the Lord having visited the neighbourhood during my stay amongst them, and many having been baptized as members of Spring Hill Church, and wishing to revive this (Amiable) church agreed to take letters for the purpose, and on

the 8th of January 1842 Brethren William S. Terrel, William Smith, Elisha Andrews, William Johnston, Isaac Johnston, Senr. Isaac Johnston Jr., Charles Johnston, Bazzil Smith, Josiah Miller, James Orr, George C. Mastard (?) and Sisters Malinda Smith, Patience Miller, Martha Johnston, Emily Johnston, Mary Terrel, Rachal Masters, asked for and obtained letters from the Spring Hill Church, and this day joined with each other and Bren. Egerton Willis, Robert Snoddy, and sisters Ferriby Johnston, and Nancy Smith, who have been baptized lately here and agreed to revive Amiable Church, and on examining the six Articles of faith approved and adopted them. Examined the covenant and rejected the fifth Article and adopted the other ten articles. Examined and adopted the six articles of Discipline. This having been read by one to them distinctly Article by Article, and a unanimous vote being given to approve and adopt all (except the fifth Article of the covenant) and then to come into a church state as a constitution of the church called Amiable Church.

I Peter W. Roberts Ordained Minister of the Gospel of Christ and brethren Randal Eldred Jr. and Jos. P. Willis and Sisters Elizabeth Moore (who was once a member but now a member of Spring Hill Church) Polly Willis, Patience Hamilton, and Elizabeth Eliot, gave to them the hand of fellowship as a Baptist Church of Christ authorized to transact business as an independent body. "Our aged Father" Joseph Willis being unable from age and infirmity to be with us, Brethren William T. Terrel, Isaac Johnston Sen., Elisha Andrews, George C. Masters, William Johnston and William Smith were appointed to wait on Father Willis and receive the hand of fellowship from him, and they having done so, and received his blessing returned and gave the hand of fellowship to the other members. And Father Willis resigns his pastoral charge of the church.

I hereby recognize them as a Baptist Church of Christ, May grace mercy and peace from God the Father and Jesus Christ my Lord be with them and guide them.

March 2nd 1842

On motion of Bro. Bazzil Smith, Deacon of this church, Bro. Elisha B. Andrews was chosen clerk protem. By order of the church Brethren William T. Terrel and Isaac Johnston were licensed to go out and preach and expound the scriptures of our Lord to the world, wherever the Lord may cast their lots, to which end written license was given to each of them this day March 2nd 1842 signed by Bazzil Smith, Deacon and Elisha B. Andrews, Clerk protem and P. W. Robert, Elder.

March 19th 1842

Received Sister Lucinda Snoddy by Baptism.

March 20th 1842

Received the following members by letter Viz. James Swan, Jane Swan, Eliza P. Swan (blank) Terrel. Robert Snoddy, Clerk.

May 14th 1842

The church met in conference. A door being opened for the reception of members the following were received. John Smith was received by letter and Elias Kelso, Nancy Johnston, Mary Dial, Wilkinson Hoose, Rachel Johnston, Jeremiah White, (blank) Smith, (blank) Swan, Mahaly a coloured woman belonging to Sister Rhodes. Dismissed Leathy Dial and Fanny Batson. Robert Snoddy, Clerk.

Saturday August 20th 1842

The church met in conference after a sermon by Bro. Terrel. The door being opened for the reception of members to fellowship, Sister Jane Hughes presented a letter from the Spring Hill Church and was received. A charge was then brought against Mahaly, a coloured woman, belonging to Sister Rhodes, for burning a dress in order to conceal it which she was accused of having stolen before she was baptized. And when asked about it denied it (although the proof against her was strong) and said she preferred to be excluded from the church as she had seen no peace since she had been a member. She is therefore excluded. The expediency of calling a council to ordain Bro. Isaac Johnston and William Terrel as Ministers of the Gospel was then considered and it was unanimously agreed that a Presybtery be called to assist the church in the Ordination on the 4th Sabbath in next month. The State of Louisiana Parish of Rapides August 21st 1842

This is to certify that Joseph Willis (an ordained Minister) and Bazzil Smith an ordained Deacon have ordained William T. Terrel to preach the Gospel and to officiate in all the ministerial function. We recommend him to all the churches and to every good man. Joseph Willis Sen.

August 21st 1842. This is to certify that Joseph Willis and Bazzil Smith and William T. Terrel have ordained Isaac Johnston to preach the Gospel with all the Ministerial functions. We recommend him to all the churches and every good man. Joseph Willis Sen. O. M.

This certifies that Bro. Bazzil Smith was ordained as a Deacon of the Amiable Church by Elder Joseph Willis on the 21st of August 1842.

Saturday Dec. 17th 1842

The church met in conference after a sermon by Brother Terrel. A complaint was made against Bro. Robert Snoddy who has been permitted to speak during the last 12 months but has no written license. The charges were 1st That Bro. Snoddy in his preaching made God the author of sin. 2nd That he desires to put down women that is, that they have no right to hold religious meetings of any kind. 3rd Preaching doctrines that are not in the Bible. Bro. Snoddy having made some confession was forgiven, but is not authorized to preach any more. Bro. Snoddy then requested a letter of dismission which was granted. Adjourned. W. P. Ford, Clerk protem.

Saturday Jan. 14th 1843

The church met in conference after preaching by Brethren Johnston and Terrel. The Church covenant and Rules and the minutes of the last meeting were then read. A charge was brought against Bro. Snoddy for having been drunk since the last meeting. Bro. Snoddy acknowledged to have drank spirits on three successive days, but says he was not drunk, and expresses his sorrow for what he has done. Bro. Snoddy was forgiven and restored to the full fellowship of the church. Bro. Huges having spoken hastily in regard to the action of the church in stopping Bro. Snoddy from preaching, came forward involuntarily and acknowledged that he had done wrong and did not intend to hurt the feelings of anyone. He is not therefore under the censure of the Church. A difficulty having existed between Sister Melinda Smith and Jane Hughes is all settled by each forgiving the other. Resolved. That the Church proceed to the Ordination of Bro. James Swan on tomorrow. Adjourned. W. P. Ford, Clerk protem.

This certifies that Bro. James Swan was ordained as a Deacon of the Amiable Church by Bro'en Wm. T. Terrell and Isaac Johnston on the 15th of January 1843.

Saturday February 18, 1843

The church having met in open conference after preaching Brethren Johnston and Terrell. No business on hand. Adjourned. Wm. S. Terrel.

Saturday March 18th 1843

The church having met in open conference after preaching by Brother Terrel no further business for the day adjourned. William Rollin.

April 15th 1843

The church met in peace and received for the communion treasury \$2.85. A motion was made and seconded with regard to washing of one anothers feet but was lade (sic) over till next meeting. Adjourned. Tomas Jonston prodent (sic).

Saturday 20th 1843 (no month given)

The church met in conference after preaching. The door was then opened for the reception of members and Sister Mary Rollins came forward and asked and was received for Baptism. The subject of the washing of feet which had been laid over at the last meeting was then taken up and after the reading of the scriptures on the subject, the vote of the church was taken. It was found that the church was in favour of washing one anothers feet immediately after the next communion and annuly afterwards. Adjourned. W. F. Ford, Clerk protem.

July 15th 1843

The church met in conference after preaching by Mr. Terrel was found in peace and adjourned. Wm. Rollins, C. protem.

August 19th 1843

The church met in peace after preaching by Mr. Terrel and then received Br. Thomas Johnston by Letter and gave him the hand of fellowship and then appointed Bro. James Swan and Tomas Jonston deacons to conference and Mr. Terrel sed (?) Rollin to write a letter. Adjourned. Thos. Rollins C. protem.

September 10th 1843

The church having met together in full fellowship after preaching by Bro. Terrell we proceed into business after hearing the church letter red (sic) it was received Elias Celsey having been baptised at Calvery Church and had his membership there we not having this admitted him with us. At his request, we have withdrawn his membership from us. Adjourned. William S. or W. Terrel, Clerk protem.

November 18th 1843

The church met in conference the clerk and moderator being absent, Br. B. Sims was chosen moderator, and E. B. Andrew was chosen clerk, by the church. A charge was found against Br. Wm. Hughs about not providing for his house and household and for slaping his wife and throwing their bedding in the fire. Adjourned. E. B. Andrew Clerk.

January 20th 1844

The church met in conference after preaching by Mr. Isaac Johnston Sen. Conference being over E. B. Andrews was appointed clerk by the voice of church. Adjourned. E. B. Andrew Clerk, P.T.

February 17th 1844

The church met in conference after ward of a exortation by Bro. Smith. William Johnston Clerk.

March 16th 1844

The church met in peace after preaching by Bro. Johnston, Sen and nothing being found on hand. Adjourned. E. B. Andrew Clerk P.T.

April 20th 1844

The church met in peace and harmony. And conference was opened after a word of exortation by Brother B. Smith and nothing found on hand we (ended here).

May 20, 1844

The curch (sic) met in open conference after a sermon brought by Ts Johnson no business on hand we adjourned. Wm. Rollins, Clerk.

No Date

Saturday before third Sunday in June Church met according to adjournment and after a discourse from Brother Smith and Johson (sic) the church proceeded to business when it was stated that Bro. Jeremiah White had not attended conference for a considerable time and Brother Isaacs Johnson was appointed to see him and know the reason of his absence and report to our next meeting. Brother Terrel applied for a letter of dismission as a licensed preacher which we cannot grant believing him to be ordained according Scripture and that Brethren Swan and Isaac Johnson write to him on the subject. Then adjourned by praise and prayer. Henry Jackson Clerk protem by request of the church.

Saturday before third Sabbath in July 1844. The church met according adjournment after praise and prayer by Bro. P. Tanner who was present on a viit and an exortation Bro. Smith. The church unanimously appointed H. Jackson to act as clerk protem. The case of Bro. (?) White was taken up and Brethren Swan (possibly something missing here).

Saturday Sept. 14th 1844. The church met in conference after an address by Brother Smith and one by Brother Isaac Johnston. Brother R. B. Eldred was then unanimously requested to act as clerk protem. A charge was then brought against Brother White for marrying another man's wife for which act he is excluded from us by a unanimous vote of the church. Brothren Bazzil Smith and Thomas Johnston were then appointed as Delegates to the Association and Brother James Swan as the alternate. According to our request of the church at the last meeting Elder N. J. Tpeneis (?) wrote the letter to the Association which was offered for inspection and

Gainesville, Ga. Sept. 1877

Doct. D. L. Cheatham Davisboro, Ga.

Dear Lewis:

I propose now as I know to give you the ancestral lineage of the Cheathams and Hancock families from whom your fathers sprang. They were all of English origin. The Cheatham, Hancock, and Rudd all came from England proper, the Bakers from Wales, which is a principality of England and the citizens of which was formerly known and called Welch people. The Prince of Wales to this day is known as the heir apparent to the Crown of England. They all then came from England to America sometime between the accession of William and Mary to the throne of England in 1689 and the declaration of war by England against France in 1753, known in history as the French and Indian War.

These four families (with the exception of John Hancock of Revlutionary memory who settled in Massachusetts) all settled in Shartoll and Chesterfield Counties in the Colony of Virginia. They was all considered at that time quite wealthy and soon got to farming and purchased and owned quite a number of negroes. Your great grandfather Cheatham was by the name of Obadiah. He married Margaret Rudd. They had but two children, Arthur, who was your grandfather Cheatham and sister Lavinia. Your Great grandfather Obadiah was with General Washington in his celebrated retreat through New Jersey in the fall of 1776, was in several battles, suffered a great many hardships, was never wounded, returned home on furlough sick and died the latter part of 1776, or first of 1777.

His wife, your great grandmother Cheatham, whose maiden name was Margaret Rudd, afterward married Barnette Cheatham, who was a distant cousin of her first husband, by whom she had three children, Obediance who was called Aunt Bidsey, Charles and Thomas. Your Mother will remember Aunt Bidsey and Uncle Charles. They were all half brothers and sisters to your Grandfather Arthur Cheatham. John Hancock, who settled in Massachusetts, and Anthony Hancock, your great grandfather, the father of your Grandmother Cheatham, was cousins. Anthony Hancock married Sarah Baker sometime in 1751. Sarah Baker was your great grandmother on your father's side. She lived to be 91 or 92 years old, was the best read, the most scientific, and stood higher as a physician than any lady of her day, and in domestic matters particularly as a cook world could not excell her. She was one of

the best chemist of her day and should have been made professor of that science, and the science of common sense in some University, for she was better versed in either than any woman I ever saw. She died June 20th, 1822.

Anthony Hancock, your great grandfather on your father's side, was a mechanician, but especially that of a house carpenter. I expect more than fifty young men learned the trade of being a carpenter by being bound to him. He had what was called a common English education. These were yours and my father's grandfather and mother on Mother's side. They had seven children. Their names was Martin, Douglas, Thomas, John, Sarah, Ann and Jane. Schools being scarce in their day, they educated their own children, mostly at night, and principally by their Mother. These were the brothers and sisters of my Mother who was your Grandmother. Your Great Grandfather, Anthony Hancock died 7th April 1806 aged about 72 or 73 and 16 years before his wife.

Their son Martin married a Miss Harvey. They had six or seven children. Four boys, three of whom were born mutes. They became quite wealthy,, educated all their children in all the higher .. classics. The one named Douglas, who was one of the mutes, was one of the best farmers in the state of Virginia and wrote a great many essays on the subject of farming. My uncle Douglas Hancock married a Miss Thomas, had but one child. His wife died, he then moved to the state of Mississippi where he died. His only daughter married Dr. Cooper, also of Mississippi, who was a D. D. and a M.D. My uncle Thomas Hancock married my father's Sister, Laviney. They had five children and two grandchildren, all of whom died before the age of twenty-two except Mrs. Margaret Fryerson of Athens, Ga., who is the only grandchild living.

My uncle John Hancock married, but like his namesake, the writer, never had any children. Aunt Sarah Hancock married Isaac Smith! They had six children, three boys and three daughers. The daughters were said to be the prettyest girls in Virginia. One of them marryed one of the Governors of Virginia. Aunt Jane Hancock marryed Richard Brown, father of cousin Dick as we all call him, whom you knew, and who died in Washington County, Ga. since the war (civil). They had eight sons and one daughter Vic (?), Burrell, Martin, Marcus, Richard who is known as cousin Dick, Douglas, James, and John and Sarah. Sarah marryed Nathaniel Bostick. She was the mother of General Jim Bostick who killed a man by the name of Barge and who himself was killed in the same spot.

Your grandfather Arthur Cheatham marryed your grandmother Ann Hancock in 1792. He only 19 years old and she a little over 17. They had twelve children viz: Sarah Baker, Anthony Robinson, Obadiah Pride, Arthur Rudd, Your father, John Isom, myself, Thomas Hancock, Martha Ann, Barbary Jane, Caroline Lavinia, Mary Douglas, Sophia Obedience,

and Martha who died the 5th Sept. 1805. Your Grandfather Cheatham died 30th Jan. 1818, aged 45 years, 6 mo. 14 da. Your Grandmother An Cheatham died in Monroe, Walton County Ga. 4th Sept. 1839 age 66 years 3 mo. and 18 days. Their children all lived to be marryed and all except myself and sister Caroline had children. The children of your grandfather and grandmother Cheatham are all dead except Brother Tom who lives in Mississippi and will be 71 years old on the 16th day of August 1878 and myself who am 76 years old on the 29th inst. which will be next Saturday. Their Grandchildren that are still living are scattered to the four winds. The last I heard of them there was between 40 and 50 grand and great grandchildren still living. They reside in Ga., Ala., Mi., La., Ark. Tenn., Mo., Ky., Va., N. Y., and some I know not where.

I believe I have given you the lineage of your fathers on the Cheatham family as far as I know or have heard with the exception of an anecdote concerning the name Cheatham and a few facts relating to the same. It is daid the name is pure English and was originally Chatham and not Cheatham as written, and the way the e cropt into the name is thuswise: One of the young bucks in England by the name of Chatham became enamoured with a young maiden of the same name, but no relation, some mutual pledges passed and as usual in such cases forfeited. In due time a witness in the shape of a fine little boy came into court and sealed the bargain. She said they both was cheated, neither expecting such a result in half the time, and it's name should not be called Chatham but Cheatham because there was a chear somewhere, but in due course of time they complied with the Bible, wiped out the crime with a marriage, adopted the e and the name hence the name Cheatham, and while it is said there is nothing in a name, I believe I would sooner have the name Cheatham than Chatham.

The facts I wish to relate concerning the name are these: I have never know or heard of a man by the name of Cheatham that ever committed a crime that was indictable in a court. I have never known or heard of an unmarried lady by the name of Cheatham that every bartered, sold, bestowed or in any other way to part her chastity or virginity, or as it is sometimes vulgarly called, to break her leg. The men, except myself, generally carry out what they undertake, are industrious, and smart in the way of common sense. The women make the smartest housekeepers, seamstresses, cooks, wives, mothers and sisters in the world, and generally pretty.

I don't now of anything that I have left out of much importance. If you think of anything either now or hereafter you would like to know remind me of it and I will inform you if I can.

Should you wish to keep this lineage you had best copy it in ink as I cannot write only in pencil, and after a time the pencil marks will rub out.

You or Dr. Tom write me soon what has been done in the division of the Hardwick land. My respects to your wife, Mother and all.

If you will notice in brother Anthony's name the name of Robinson, in brother Obadiah's that of Pride, in my own that of Isom, these names was given to perpetuate the names of certain families by those names that was connected by marriage to the Cheatham family and that emigrated from England to Virginia bout the same time with the Cheathams, the R udds, the Hancocks, and the Bakers.

This publication contains extractions from three newspapers, e.e., THE GREENVILLE REPUBLICAN, which was published first in 1826, then sold and the name changed to THE GREENVILLE MOUNTAINEER, its first issue being published Feb. 1829. The records were abstracted through Dec. 1849.

THE LAURENSVILLE HERALD was first published 26 Nov. 1845 but some issues are unavailable. Those included in this book are for 1845, 1846, 1853 and 1854. Included are marriages; obituary notices; letters remaining in P. O. at Greenville 1826; Majistrates, Road Commissions, Public Bldg. Commissions; Free School Commissioners of Greenville; Laurens & Newberry Dist. for 1845; Subscription lists; List of Post Offices in Laurens, Greenville, Newberry, Abbeville, Spartenburg, Union and Anderson Dist.; Lists of letters in P. O. at Laurens Court House 1846; Committee to supervise distribution of breadcorn to needy families in Laurens Co. 1846; List of Laurens Guards 1846 (Mexican War Volunteers); List of Officers Palmetto Lodge #19 (Masonic) 1853; arrivals at Simmons Hotel June 1854, etc. This book is completely indexed.

An example showing the excellent genealogical data included in an obituary notice is shown in that of a Mr. George Jones, which reads as follows:

May 26, 1843 Issue: Died at his residence on White Oak, Rutherford Co., N.C. May 12th, MR. GEORGE JONES, age 70 years. He was a native of Orange Co., Va. but came with his Father at an early age to Wilkes Co., N.C., where he was raised. He entered the Mercantile business in Wilkesborough for 10 years when he removed to Buncombe C. H. where he continued for 2 years. He became co-partner of PATTON and ERWIN at Laurens C. H., S.C. in 1806. In 1814 he removed to Rutherford Co., N.C. where he settled on a farm until 1825. In that year he went to Spartanburg Court House and opened a store for 12 years, after which he returned to his farm on White Oak where he remained until his death. He married in Buncome Co. in Oct. 1806 to the daughter of WILLIAM MILLS, SR. and had born 9 children. His wife and 8 children are still living. In 1814 he became a member of the Medthodist Church.

James Keith, Sr. was brought to America as an infant about 1719. Since the Keith Family of Scotland and England were active in attempts to return the Stuart Family to the Throne, evidence indicates possibly his parents were deported to the Colonies or were fleeing punishment for their part in the Jacobite Rebellion and the disasterous Battle of Sheriffmuir in 1715.

Keith descendants can be rightfully proud of the historical and authentic record of the ancient and noble Family of Keith given in the Book. It tells of their origin as a tribe in Germany where they were known as the Chatti and of their refusal to accept terms of their conqueror. They migrated to present day Holland where they were unwelcome because the natives considered them too industrious, thriving and warlike and ordered their The Chatti set sail with their wives and children departure. and were forced by storm to land in Scotland. The Scots, alarmed by a people trained in war, declined them a share of their country and ordered their departure. The newcomers refused and were victorious in the battle which followed. They increased, prospered and spread into the McPHERSON, McINTOSH and other families from the Eleventh through the Seventeenth Centuries. Their surname comes from a royal grant to them of lands of Keith in East Lothian; Keith meaning wooded place. Because of their adherence to the Stuart Family cause in the Jacobite Rebellion and the climaxing Battle of Sheriffmuir in 1715 they lost their estates and Royal titles, were executed, imprisoned, deported and otherwise punished. Today those who were forced to immigrate, or were deported, to the American Colonies are represented by numerous descendants occupying all levels of society in virtually every profession.

KEITH KINFOLKS is a record of one group of these individuals; descendants of James Keith, Sr. in America from 1719 to 1979. For years many genealogists have been harassed by the lack of an index to the cities, towns, and townships of the 1850 U.S. Fed. population census schedules. The first problem that the lack of an index presents is the necessity of turning to read maps, atlases, gazetters, or place name literature to determine the county in which a town or city is located. This research step is essential, as all U.S. census schedules are arranged by county.

The second problem is that the schedules of many counties are to be found on more than one reel of microfilm. In most of these cases, it is necessary to consult more than one reel of microfilm to locate the desired town. The third problem is that communities and townships are not arranged in alphabetical order within county schedules.

Besides solving these three basic problems, this index also supplies the user with the Nat'l Archives microfilm order numbers and the microfilm call numbers used by the Genealogical Dept. Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of LDS in Salt Lake City, Utah. These two numbers are important to researchers, as the most readily available sources for the use of the census schedules on microfilm are the National Archives, with its eleven branches throughout the U.S. which loan the schedules via the inter-library loan services of any libraries, and the Genealogical Dept. which loans schedules for a small user fee for use in its over 273 branch dibraries.

Besides cities, counties, towns, and townships, the index also includes boroughs, named census beats, districts, divisions, named election districts, grants, hundreds, parishes, plantations, named precincts, settlements, and villages. Most directional townships, e.g., east, north, south, and west, and all numerical census beats, census districts, election districts, precincts, and townships were not indexed. The names of post offices were not included in the 1850 census schedules and are, therefore, not included in this index.

The slave schedules have been excluded from this index because they include only the names of owners and the numbers of slaves. Also, none of the slave schedules include counties on more than one reel of microfilm. The index is arranged in one alphabetical order. There are no cross references, but there are some double entries that serve the same purpose.

This compilation is an index to the biographees included in 61 Calif. county histories published between 1855 and 1898 for 47 of Calif California's 58 counties. The biographees are those of whom biographical sketches have been written. The names of parents, spouses, children, other relatives, and friends mentioned in biographical sketches have not been indexed in this compilation.

The approximately 16,500 index entries include full name of the biographee, when given, county of residence at the time the county history was published, the date of publication, the volume number in the case of one county history, and the beginning page of the biographical sketch.

Ranks and titles have been included to assist in the identification of biographees. However, they have been ignored in alphabetizing except when absolutely necessary.

Index is arranged in one alphabetical order. There no cross references, but some double entries that serve the same purpose. Names indexed were taken from the tables of contents, the lists of biographees, or, when necessary, from the text. Names are listed as they were spelled in the histories.

The Book of Clouatre traces down to the present the descendents of Joseph Clouatre who was born in St. Mary's Co., Md. in 1760. Joseph married Marie Poirier in St. James Pr., La. in 1785. After his first wife's death, Joseph married Felicite Louvier in 1801. He had 7 children from his first marriage and 3 from his second. The book is a rich source of family information on St. James Parish, including such families as LeBLANC, BABIN, BOUDREAUX, BREAUX, CAILLOUET, LANDRY, MELANCON, SANCHEZ and WEBRE. The book contains a detailed index of more than 2500 names

The Book of Landry is a rich source of Louisiana family history. It traces down to the present the family of Joseph Landry, an Acadian who was among the early settlers of St. James Pærish above New Orleans.

Joseph Landry married Anne Cormier around 1768. They settled in St. James shortly afterwards; they had 10 children between 1770 and 1791. In 1797, their eldest son, Joseph, married Magdelaine Michel; they had 8 children who married into the Gautreaux, Thibodaux, Poche and Keller families. Other families that appear frequently in this volume include POIRIER, CAILLOUET, BOURGEOIS, Leblanc, MICHEL AND OUBRE. The book includes an index of more than 2500 names.

Nora Lee Pollard is the archivist of the Catholic Diocese of Baton Rouge. The Book of Landry completes her invaluable fourvolume history of the families of her grandparents. Previous volumes were: The Book of Clouatre, The Book of LeBlanc, and The Book of Caillouet.

In the October 1979 issue of THE GENIE, the book FINDING OUR FATHERS - A GUIDEBOOK TO JEWISH GENEALOGY was reviewed. This book was given by one of our members and was only reviewed to show the availability of Jewish records. It will not be placed in the Genealogical Dept. of the Shreve Memorial Library until a later date.

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
