UPSHUR COUNTY TEXAS

Because of the Indian artifacts found all over Upshur County, it is considered positive evidence that the Caddo Indians lived here even before Jesus Christ was born, and some say thousands of years before then.

The Cherokee Indians, who had been moved from Alabama and Georgia wandered into east Texas and were able to overcome the Caddo tribes, so by the time the white people came very few Caddoes were left. The ceramic art produced by the Caddoes reached a higher quality than most Indian tribes.

Most of the Cherokee Indians settled south of the Sabine and west of Nacogdoches. They traded with other tribes in Arkansas and Oklahoma, and developed a system of traces (trails) to facilitate travel. The Cherokee Trace is well established through Camp, Titus and other counties as well as Upshur. When settlers came in from Arkansas, Tennessee, Kentucky and other states they used this trace. It is claimed by some that Houston, Crockett and many other famous men of Texas history came down this old trail.

The first white settler to settle Upshur County was John COTTON, and soon after came Isaac MOODY and O. T. BOULWARE.

The NEUTRAL GROUND comprised territory north and east of the Sabine River, and between the years 1803 and 1819 many outlaws, freebooters and other undesirable persons settled here. It is doubtful any of them lived in what is now Upshur County, but many did live around Caddo Lake, Harleton and Hallsville.

Around 1830 a band of maurauding Cherokees who lived at Indian Rock attacked a settlement at Fort Crawford, near Harleton, killing Capt. CRAWFORD and several other whites. They took two white women captive and started back to Indian Rock, and after two days finally arrived. A few hours later a white party charged into the Indian Camp and a running battle

started, moving westward through what is now Gilmer and on up the Cherokee Trace. The women were rescued, and because of the massacre at Fort Crawford, the Indians were asked to leave East Texas, thus opening the area for white settlement.

There is one old trace which appears on early maps of this area that was used by the Caddo Indians from Caddo Lake entering what is now Upshur County at Ore City (formerly Murry League) through Coffeeville, Lafayette finally crossing the Cherokee Trace near Newsom in present Camp County.

Galveston, in the early days of Texas history, was the largest city in Texas with Jefferson being the second. Because of its location, water transportation from east, not north and south, was available. All persons living as far west as Denton, Dallas, Corsicana and other points west and north went to Jefferson to sell their cotton and buy their supplies. Also, thousands of new settlers would come from the old states by water to Jefferson, and then travel over land to their new homes.

There was one road across Upshur from Jefferson to Coffeeville, Lafayette, Simpsonville and farther west. Another from Jefferson, through Gilmer, Calloway and west. There was still another from Jefferson to Harleton, through Pine Tree, Red Rock and across the Sabine River on one of the ferries available for crossing the river. The better known ferries at this point were: Terry's, Camp's, Gilbert's, Manchester or Walter's Bluff. There were also ferries or fords across Big Cypress at Talliaferro's (called Tolliver's), Mimms, Ferrell's and Walkers.

In 1835 John COTTON (according to THRALL'S History of Texas) was the first settler of what was to become Upshur County, settling close to the Cherokee Trace on Lilly Creek north of Bettie. Isaac MOODY was the second white settler

whose home was near West Mountain in 1838. It was about this time O. T. BOULWARE opened an Indian trading post on the John COTTON farm. The Indians were still living in this area, and by treaty it was supposed to be their land. Sam HOUSTON, it is believed, helped negotiate this treaty.

Although the previously named persons were the ones of record supposed to have been here first, it must be remembered that Upshur County was very close to the Neutral Ground. It is very possible, and highly probable, that there were white people here before 1835. The Neutral Ground was officially created after 1803 because of the dispute rising between Spain and the U.S. over the territory north and east of the Sabine River not to be occupied by either country. Because of the lack of any governing body, the area was very quickly occupied by outlaws and desperadoes.

The Republic of Mexico in 1824 had granted Hayden EDWARDS a grant of land in East Texas, which included what is now Upshur County. He got into such trouble with the squatters on the land that the grant was rescinded, but there is a Hayden Edwards Survey in southern Upshur today.

In 1816 the ill-fated Philip NOLAN expedition crossed the Caddo Lake just below Jefferson and went as far west as the Trinity River, so he surely crossed Upshur County.

The ox-wagon was the main mode of transportation over land with many wagons being drawn by mules. The ox-wagon or mule drawn wagons were the vehicles used to transport new people who were moving into the area. The wagons usually traveled in groups for protection, and there were stopping stations along the route. Coffeeville was a favorite station, and it was at one time larger than Gilmer. Pine Tree, Red Rock and Calloway became fairly large towns as they supplied camp grounds, hotels, saloons, supply stores, pool halls,

post offices, blacksmith shops and often even churches. At one time there was a stagecoach out of Jefferson to Coffeeville and west with a stopping place at the KEELING farm in the Cox Community. When the railroads came through they were given many concessions, and if a town did not cooperate they were left out. This is what happened to Jefferson. After the coming of the railroad, it lost its importance and dwindled to nothing, and finally almost disappeared. It was at this time that other towns came into prominence, such as Marshall, Longview, Pittsburg and finally Fort Worth and Dallas.

Most of the early settlers in Upshur came by covered wagons over land from the old states, but some came by boat to Jefferson and left from there to settle different areas. Most of the time, ten or twelve families came together for protection and usually settled in the same area. Many of them brought their slaves with them, and there was always plenty of timber for building purposes, an abundance of spring water and woods full of wild game. They would help each other build their log cabins, and then start clearing land so by the end of the summer they could build a church and/or school. Sometimes one building served for both. Someone would then build a gin and grist mill. One of the most important events of the whole community was when a traveling preacher would conduct revivals under brush arbor. Everyone came for miles around, and it played a very important part in the recreation, and served as the ideal place for young people to associate with others. Thereby, many marriages were a direct result of these meetings.

Of course, Upshur has its lost treasure story. When President Lamar sent General Rusk into East Texas to remove the Indians, they disappeared into the swamps of Little Cypress bottoms and were next heard from on the reservation in Oklahoma. Mexican agents were supposed to have been with

the Indians, with large quantities of gold, which they dumped into Little Cypress. Two Irishmen who were with General Rusk came back a few years latet and set up a boiler near Indian Rock and pumped the creek dry. The old boiler was still there until World War I, when it was cut up and used for other purposes. Who knows about the gold? Was it found?

REVOLUTIONARY PENSION APPLICATION OF WILLIAM HODGE:

He was born in York County, Pennsylvania 1 April 1762. While residing in Ninety-Six District South Carolina he enlisted 1778 and served at various times with the S.C. Troops in Capt. John Hayles' Company; in 1790 in Capt. Thompson's Co.; in 1781 in Col. Farr's Regiment nad joined General Morgan and was in Battle of Cowpens where he was slightly wounded in the shoulder. 1781 in Capt. Barnett's Company, Hampton's Regiment and was in the battle of Thompson's Fort on the Congoree, also at the battle of Orangeburg. In 1782 he was appointed Gen. Huger's guard, was wounded again in the shoulder and was discharged 29 Oct. 1782, having served two and one-half years. He was allowed pension on his application dated 20 Nov., 1832 in Madison County, Ga. where he died 19 Dec. 1836. He married March 1790 Ann Lay or Say and in Madison Co. Ga. she was granted pension 14 July 1839 at which time she was age 72. She died there 25 May 1840. LISTED IN FAMILY RECORD: John born 16 Aug. 1790; James b. 18 Dec. 1792; Mary b. 28 Jan. 1795; Elizabeth b. 4 Apr. 1797; Katherine b. 7 Jan. 1799; William b. 20 Apr. 1802; Richard b. 20 Oct. 1804; Allen L. b 18 Feb. 1807; Madison Montgomery b 24 July 1809 and Anna b. 3 May 1815.

"Grandma we like it out here just fine. It's Parrie country,

they make a bale and a half of cotton to the acra. And grandma there is a rural mail route that passes our house, and we don't have any trouble mailing our letters, we bought a mail box and our mail is brought and put right there. There is rural mail routes all over the country out here. Yes, the times is sure good here, every body has money, and it's clear too, in the bank. There has been sev eral men offered to lend Webb as much money as he wanted. We borrowed \$12.00 to make our crop last year, and we come out real good, we payed all that back and had \$23.00 left over. So we don't have to go into det and borrow this year, and we may lend Uncle Jake enough to make his cotton crop this year. We live in the house with Webb's folks, they have a good Two Room Log house, it is very nice and big a plenty. And we has goot watter, we just have to carry it a half a mile from a creek. It is only 15 miles to the nearest store. Dad went in to the store last month so he wont go back soon. He had his wagon wheel tightened, and now it rides as smoth as a dallor, but we need a new tongue for it now."

"They will have the bruch arber meeting again next summer. We go in the Ox wagon. It is only 9 miles, we have a lot of good talking and eating on the ground. I have plenty of syrup turned to sugar for to make my cakes.

"Everybody has been so good to us, Mr. Curry gave us 10 gallons of nice molasses and a hog. Mr. Raburn gave us plenty of potatoes. And one of Webb's neices gave us plenty of fruit. Two other people told us to come this summer and can all the fruit we wanted. We bought us a pr. of Oxens, we gave \$11.00 for them. We got a fine mule too, we gave \$5.00 for him.

"We soon will start picking out cotton seeds for to make some pillows, we got two new hay beds with crocker sacks ticks. Ma is working on the spinning wheel, she spon my dress and it is nearly too short. It's plum up to my anckles.

"We have a few chickens and a cow, we get 7¢ pr doz for our eggs, and 9¢ a pound for butter. We sold 50 lbs of lard when we killed hogs and got \$4.50 for it, I will write again next fall if I can get a stamp, the 1¢ stamp sure is high just to send one letter. But I am thankful to the Lord

this day and the days to come. Fetch your selves to see
us next year if you can, we may try to come to visit you
Christmas if we make a good crop this coming year.

REVOLUTIONARY PENSION APPLICATION OF SHADRACH AND MARTHA HOLT: States he was born 12 Dec. 1753 in Culpepper Co., Va.He did not have his record but has a letter from his cousin, a son of my uncle MICHAEL HOLT of Orange Co., N.C. who kept all the records of our families. I went into the service in Orange Co., N.C. 1 Oct., 1779 as a volunteer in Capt. EDWIN GIVEN'S company. He applied for pension in Bedford County, Tenn.Was in a battle with the Tories under a Capt. FANNING which took place in CHATHAM CO. N.C. He moved to GEORGIA at close of the war. After the defeat of the Tories he was marched to WILCOXEN IRONWORKS on Deep River and from there his troops were placed under Col. John PAISTLEY and DANIEL GILLESPIE. They were marched to CUMBERLAND CO., N.C. where they attacked a bunch of Tories and British and defeated them. He died in Bedford Co., Texx. 15 Apr. 1838.

His widow, Martha HOLT in FRANKLIN CO., TENN. 25 July 1840 age 84 and the widow of Shadrach HOLT made declaration that she was married March 1775.

John LOCKEY 25 August 1840 maked declaration in FRANKLIN CO. TENN. that he is married to the second daughter of Mrs. Martha HOLT, that his wife is age 62, and they have great grand children, and the oldest child of my wife is 40 years of age. That said MARTHA HOLT is a resident of his household and presents other affidavits as proof.

REVOLUTIONARY SERVICE OF WILLIAM AND PHOEBE ELLIOTT (PENSION APP.)
He was born 9 July 1761, and was the son of William ELLIOTT and Mary BARNWELL(BARNHILL). He enlisted while residing in Beaufort, S.C.. He was captured 20 May 1779 and was confined on the prison ship PACK HORSE. On the way to Yorktown the prisoners took over the ship and ran it into N.C. and escaped. Married Phoebe WRIGHT 23 May 1787. Died 8 May 1808.

The CIS(Congressional Information Services) Serial Set Index is one source for genealogical data often overlooked. This is an index of persons seeking special consideration from the Congress. The reports contain birth, marriage, death dates; locations od members of family; military units; injuries; doctors who have treated the individual; condition of health and finances. Not each item of the above mentioned appears in every report, but much of this data will appear somewhere in a related report.

Do not confuse this source with the AMERICAN STATE PAPERS, but should be used in conjunction with those papers.

You must locate the index to all persons, then locate the microfiche cards. The index usually is owned by large university libraries, but the fiche is more difficult to locate. Be sure to call your librarian to see if they have the set.

The Serial Set dates from 1817, whereas the AMERICAN STATE PAPERS date back to Washington's first term as President, and is included in the index as a part of the collection.

To identify the document a group of numbers is used; H.r.p. 15 (27-1) 185. This translates to HOUSE REPORT 15, 27th Congress 1st session volume 185 from CIS collection.

In the 1820 U.S. Census of Hancock Co., Miss. (See previous N.P.L. note page 66 THE GENIE Jan. 1984) William SELF, SR. & William SELF, JR are listed showing Sr. over 45 years old. He was born before 1775 probably Va. His son William, Jr. was born ca 1795-1800 in Georgia. William, Sr. does not appear on in the 1840 census of Miss. or La., (I did not check the 1830 of Miss., but he was not on that census of La., so we assume that he died between 1830 and 1840. To people working on the line the tax regords of Hancock County, Miss. would probably reveal the approximate death date.

William SELF, SR. according to U.S. Territorial and American State Papers (Claims west of Pearl River, abstract of actual settlers) claimed by settlement 1810 637 acres in sec. #44. Elijah SELF in the same records claimed 656 acres by settlement, 1809, Section 49. Both of these claims are west of the Tangipahoa River in what is now St. Helena Parish, La.

According to one written record William SELF, Sr., Joseph SELF, Elijah SELF, and Martha SELF (wife of Elijah) were charter members of Mt. Nebo Baptist Church east of the River Tangipahoa (now Tangipahoa Par. La.). Record dated 1813.

War of 1812 records name William, Joseph and Jacob SELF in Louisiana Military Records. It also mentions William SELF in PERKINS Miss. Militia- Madison, Miss.

William, Joseph and Jacob SELF list their place of birth as probably being Va., but did not definitely know. Joseph states the family migrated through North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and through Mississippi to Louisiana.

In 1817 William SELF sold land on west side of Tangipahoa River north of Elijah SELF, and on 4 Dec. 1819 William SELF was dismissed from Mt. Nebo Baptist Church.

Hancock County, Miss., borders on St. Tammany Parish, La. was founded 1812 and was in Miss. Territory. St. Tammany Parish, La. was founded in 1810 and was in Orleans Territory. It is no wonder that so many entries are found for the SELF Family in both areas at the same time period.

NATCHITOCHES PARISH, LA. NOTES (SELF FAMILY) cont.

William SELF, JR. born 1795-1800 in Georgia was married at least three times. His first wife, Jane WALKER was born ca 1800, his second wife was Elizabeth Ann SANDIFER, and the third was Frances (Fanny) BANKSTON. All of his children were by the first wife; Elijah, Eli, Elias, William Jackson, David Washington, and Franklin Dawson. He died 21 March 1846 in St. Helena Parish, La., but his will was written or at least dated Pike County, Miss. which, you will note, is just across the La. border

Andres SELF paid poll tax 1828 in Hancock Co. Miss., John SELF on tax list of Jackson Co., Miss1818 settling on Pascagoula River July 1813. July 1818-1819-1820 William SELF in Hancock County, Miss., J.G. SELF 1841 in same County, and Job G. SELF settled on Bayou St. John Feb. 1806. Balem SELF was in Wayne County, Miss. 1816, and Spencer and Eli SELF were in Monroe Co. 1815-1816-and 1817.

In the Greensburg Land Office records, which are housed in the Louisiana State Land Office at Baton Rouge, on 22 January 1822 William SELF of Hancock County, Miss. bought land on the waters of Silver Creek in Washington Parish, La. bounded by the La. border to the north. He sold it to Elijah SELF 22 Nov. 1823. William SELF witnessed land deeds Washington Parish La. 1825 and 1827.

From the tax list of Pike County, Miss. William SELF is taxed on 160 acres on Bogue Chitto and owns 4 slaves in the year 1835. In 1836 he is taxed the same and shows SELF and SIBLEY doing \$5,000.00 merchandise sales. In 1837 SELF is listed alone with \$3000.00 sales in merchandise 1 white poll and 4 slave polls on Taunchipedo. In 1838 he is not listed, but in 1839 William SELF listed with 1 white and 2 slave polls on Bogue Chitto. In 1840 he pays 4 slave polls. Elijah SELF Pike County, Miss. 1 white poll (first listing for him).1841 William SELF listed \$3000.00 merchandise sales, 1 clock - value \$15.00, 4 slave polls and Elijah SELF pays 1 white poll. In 1842 William SELF 2 clocks, 5 cattle and 9 slaves above 5 and under 60. Elijah SELFwhite poll. 1843 Elijah SELF 1 clock, 2 slaves and 1 white poll. William SELF has for that same year \$100.00 money loaned, 1 clock, 12 cattle, and 7 slaves. These tax lists are all on file at the State Archives in Jackson, Miss.

William SELF'S will was written(dated) Pike County, Miss.
7 May 1844. On 8 April 1845 William SELF, late from Pike Co.
Miss. paid \$1,900.00 for Section 46 Twp. 4 Range East 46.6
acres and Section 52 Twp. 4 Range 4 E. 594 acres adjoining
obert Sibley. 6 Aug. 1845 WilliamSELF and wife, Frances, sold
to Eli SELF land for \$400.00. August 1845 William and his
wife Frances bought a slave named Harriott for \$600.00

NARS ORDERING PROCEDURES CHANGED

A letter from NARS to the Association dated 12 March stated that effective 1 April 1984 all requests for copies of military service records or passenger lists held by the National Archives must be submitted on NATF Forms 80 and 81 respectively. After that date prior forms(NATF 26 and 40) will not be accepted for processing and will be returned.

A change in Payment procedure will also take effect at that date. At the present time NARS requires that payment accompany requests for copies of those records. After 1 April payment should not be sent with requests, but NARS will research the request, prepare copies of any records that are located and hold the copies for 3 weeks until payment is received. As soon as records are located and copied, the researcher will receive a bill with instructions for making a remittance.

A separate NATF Form 80 for each type of record desired. Before this change researchers have been able to request all files pertaining to one veteran on the same form.

CANEY CEMETERY Rocky Mount, Bossier Parish, Louisiana

The reason for making a record of the cemetery.

You will pardon my personal reference but after graduation from L.S.U. in 1923 I had to go to the Western Electric Co. in Chicago to find employment in my chosen profession, and I retired from the company 38 years later in New Jersey. As a result I raised a family far from home and except for an occasional visit, without the benefit of grandparents, uncles, aunts and cousins. I always felt that the children, and to some extent, I had been cheated by this lack of family fellowship.

To compensate in a small way I decided to make a family record so that my children might at least know the names of their folks and I might know the names of my ancestors. As usual I waited too late to start. Not until after the death of my parents and most of my uncles and aunts did I start.

I began by making a record with the aid of Aunt Allah (Mrs. A. C. LAY and later Mrs. J. A. BUNDY whose pride and joy was her knowledge of those buried there and the unmarked graves) of the Lay (Red River) Cemetery at Linton, La. This gave me a knowledge of my folks and provided me with the opportunity to repay in part a debt of gratitude I owed to those who had cared for the graves of my loved ones in my absence and neglect.

I have always felt a debt of gratitude to those who have cared for the Caney Cemetery in my family's lack of contribution and wanted to do something to make retribution. As you know I cut and fenced a 12 foot lane to the cemetery and in spring of this year again cleared it of weeds and bushes. At that time I visited the cemetery with steel tape and makeshift drafting board and sketched location of graves and recorded distances between each of them and the fence. Working alone without the aid of someone with a knowledge of the location of the unmarked graves all I could do was to record those graves which had some sort of a marker. As a child I was never taken to the cemetery and pointed out the graves of my folks so along with the many other unmarked graves I could not record them. The thought then occured to me it is really not so important to show the "exact" THE GENIE APRIL 1984

location of an unmarked spot. Why not admit the location is unknown but provide space in the record for recording more than could ever be recorded on an inscription on a monument. Also record the person for having the record shown and what relation to the one he wishes to have listed in record. The results of all of this is the "Map"* and "Tabulation of Marked and Unmarked" grayes.

It is a start and if others will help with information and ideas of how it can be improved I am sure it will become a record of which we can be proud. I am quite willing to revise periodically and to include additional information or correct what has been shown or add to it but it might work out better if someone would gather the information and send it to me in a lump sum so to speak. As I understand it someone has cleared the lane to the Cemetery only recently so there must be somebody or group interested so maybe they should be the ones to gather and coordinate the changes and additions to the record. Perhaps they would want to put an item in the "Banner" that a map and record of the Caney Cemetery was being made and anyone could have any of their folks buried there listed regardless of whether the exact location of their grave is known by giving their name and relation to the one whose name they wish to have listed along with when and where born and died and any other family data.

Genealogical societies have for many years made records of all buried in cemeteries throughout a county and cross-indexed and arranged alphabetically for preparing family records and writing histories of the county. It so happens that my folks spent some 30 years in Barber County, Alabama, along with the YOUNGs and others who came on to Louisiana. Every cemetery in the county has been recorded and two histories written of the county. Judging from what I read Mr. J. A. MANRY along with others in Layfette County, Arkansas, have started to prepare such records of cemeteries around Bradley and in time plan to write a history of that county. Mr. Manry I believe plans to write a history of Bossier Parish at a later date, but if he does not someone else will.

We thank you Mr. MANRY for letting us share in the wealth of materials you have collected over the years. Mr. MANRY is a historian as well as a genealogist, and has done extensive research on the early families of Bossier Parish. He was instrumental in getting the regional archives started in southwest Arkansas, and has given much of his material to LSU-S in their oral history project.

The record of the oldest person buried in this cemetery is that of Margaret COVINGTON, born 1783 and that is over two hundred years ago.

I believe the two following quotes (if I can remember them) are apropos.

"This life is but a sleep and a forgetting

Port Hudson, Louisiana, a Confederate river bastion between Baton Rouge and St. Francisville, was the scene of one of the longest, bloodiest, and most grim sieges in the annals of U.S. military history, It was also the scene of a spectacular river battle in early 1863.

The guns of Prt Hudson looked down upon a treacherous bend in the river from a series of imposing, almost precipitous bluffs. The Confederate presence there kept the Mississippi in friendly hands up to Vicksburg, 110 miles away, and permitted an impudent little Rebel flotilla to work night and day ferrying munitions and supplies across from the west.
