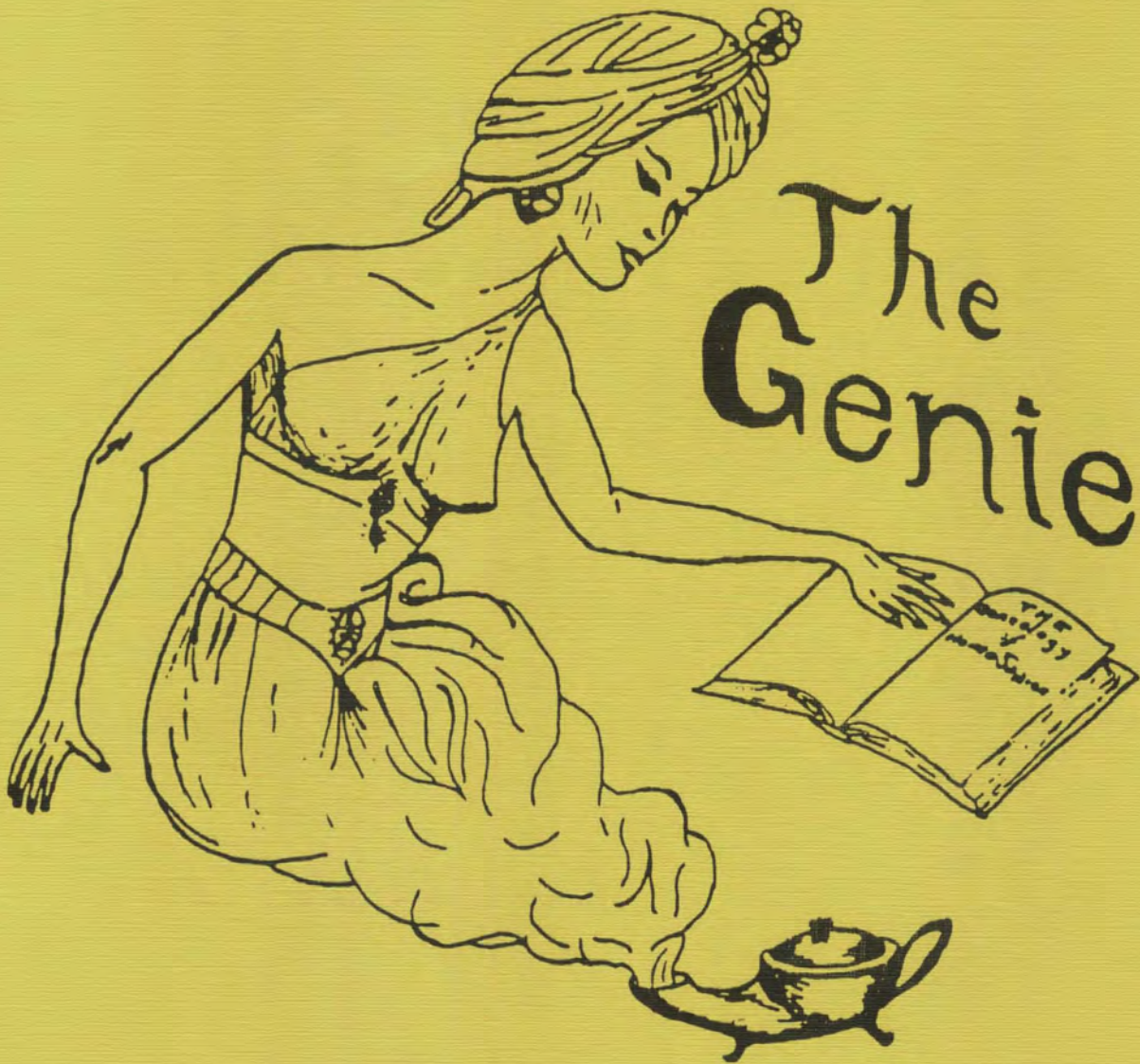

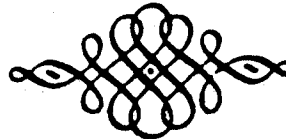

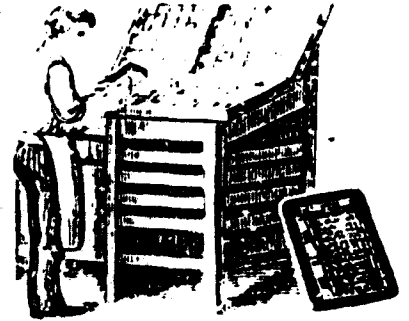
The genealogy lessons at Shreve Memorial Library, both beginner and advanced have been well attended. They will run every Saturday through July.

Feb. 7, 1844

A CARD

We, the undersigned passengers on board the steamer Bois d'Arc on her trip from New Orleans to Shreveport, adopt this method of tending our thanks to Captain John Smoker, for her very urbane and courteous conduct during the paggage, and we cannot withhold the expression of our admiration of the vigilance and care manifested by himself and officers on all occasions, and their assiduity to rendering these under their protection at one comfortable and contented.

"Resolved, That, the Committee on the Post Office and Post Roads, be requested to inquire into the expediency of establishing a post route from Shreveport, Louisiana, via Wollow Shut (Willow Chute) to the seat of Justice in the Parish of Bossier, thence to Conway, in the State of Arkansas, adopted."

OGILVIE CEMETERY
In Forest Park West Cemetery
Caddo Parish, Louisiana

Located in the center of the relatively new Forest Park Cemetery south of the Shreveport Regional Airport in Caddo Parish, is the old Ogilvie Family Cemetery. The Forest Park West Cemetery has preserved this old cemetery, surrounding it with a wrought iron fence. Inscription on a large dedication stone now identifies it as "Emily Moore Memorial Garden". 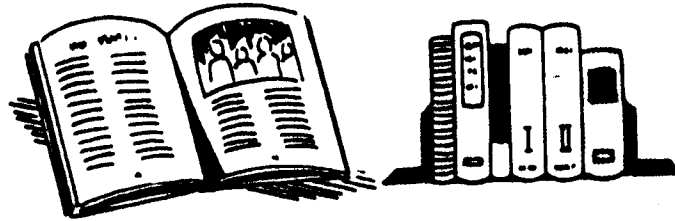

FIELD BRANCHES OF THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES

Most genealogists will know that the National Archives is roughly the federal government's equivalent to the shoebox full of important documents, old photographs, newspaper clippings, baby books, and perhaps faded love letters that many people have stashed on the top shelf of a closet. Established in 1934, it is the resting place for the historically valuable records created or received by numerous federal agencies in the course of doing business. For more than fifty years genealogists have been visiting the granite and marble building on Constitution Avenue searching for an original piece of paper containing information about some elusive ancestor. Unfortunately, many genealogists do not know that they can make use of the resources of the National Archives without travelling all the way to Washington, D. C.

Since the founding of the federal government in 1789, it has had employees working in all parts of the country, busily creating records of their activities. Although many of these records eventually made their way to the National Archives, others were lost, destroyed, or allowed to accumulate in basements and attics of countless federal office buildings. In 1969, in an effort to provide a safe home for records created "in the field" which have research value, the National Archives established Field Branches in the eleven cities mentioned earlier (Atlanta, Bayonne, Boston, Chicago, Denver, Fort Worth, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Seattle.) The staff of each branch is responsible for identifying records created in its geographic area that have enough research value to warrant spending tax payers' money to preserve them permanently in the same carefully controlled storage conditions found at the main National Archives building. Once these "field records" have been found and saved, the Field Branches' primary goal is to make them available to anyone, including genealogists and historians.

Shortly after the Field Branches were created, the Archivist of the United States decided to give them copies of the National Archives Microfilm Publications which reproduce some of the most valuable and heavily used records kept in the main National Archives building. The original plan was to place a copy of every microfilm publication in each branch, but limited budget prevented that. Fortunately, each branch has received a "core collection" of more than 40,000 rolls of film, including many of the records most frequently used by genealogists. For example, each of the eleven branches has a complete set of microfilm copies of the Federal Population Census Schedules from 1790 to 1910 for the entire United States (not just the branch's geographic area of responsibility) and the related "Soundex" index for 1880, 1900, and 1910.

The "core collection" of microfilm held by all the branches also included compiled military service records and pension and bounty-land warrant files for the Revolutionary War and related indexes (M804, 860, and 881), and the index to compiled service records of soldiers who served during the War of 1812 (M602). Each branch has microfilm copies of lists of the names of persons appointed as U. S. postmasters from 1832-1971 (M841), an index to the names of U. S. Marshals from 1789-1960 (T577), passenger lists of vessels arriving at Galveston from 1896-1948 and related indexes

(M1357-9), and letters of application and recommendation made between 1797 and 1869 for jobs with the federal government (M406, 418, 438-9, 531, 639, and 650).

Most of the branches have supplemented their core collection of film by buying other National Archives Microfilm Publications that relate to their specific geographic areas. Many of the branches have purchased indexes to compiled service records for Union and Confederate soldiers, passenger lists and related indexes, and Internal Revenue assessment lists for the period from 1862-1867. Researchers can obtain a complete list of the microfilm held by a particular branch by writing to its director.

The National Archives Gift Fund, which seeks to collect a contribution of at least \$1.00 per year from every genealogist has assisted in adding National Archives publications to the Field Branch microform collections. Among the important additions made possible by NARA Gift Fund projects are the Street Index to Major Cities in the 1910 Census, Index to Compiled Service Records of Volunteer Soldiers Who Served in the War of 1812, and the Galveston Passenger Lists and Related Indexes. The Federation of Genealogical Societies acts as the caretaker of the funds, which are accepted by NARA when they become sufficient to finance a new project.

Other supplemental microfilm has been bought using money donated to individual branch Gift Funds. Branches can use funds donated by the public to buy National Archives microfilm publications for much less than the \$20 per roll the public would have to pay for the film. Reference books and printed indexes are also purchased in this way, and donors can specify that the gift be used to buy a specific item or leave the expenditure to the discretion of the branch director. Donations are always welcome, and are, of course, an excellent way to increase the resources available for all researchers.

Each branch operates a microfilm reading room and can provide visitors with copies from microfilm for a fee. Last year more than 98,000 people visited one of the eleven branches while 108,000 went to the National Archives building in Washington, D. C. Many of the visitors to the Field Branch reading rooms were helped by fellow genealogists who donated their time to the branches. These volunteers allow the branches to provide more service to researchers than would otherwise be possible, and their efforts are sincerely appreciated. Anyone who has any amount of time available and is interested in working with researchers should contact the nearest Field Branch for information about its volunteer program.

Although microfilm has become the most frequently used resource, you will remember that the branches were established to provide a safe home for original records created "in the field." The eleven branches hold a total of 364,436 cubic feet, which is 24% of the total volume of material being preserved by the National Archives. The archivists who work in the Field Branches are involved with the same kinds of professional activities being done by their colleagues in Washington, D. C., including arranging the records, preparing various types of descriptive finding aids, answering letters regarding their records, and helping visitors use the original records (which is usually the most fun for both archivist and researcher.).

The kind of records found at each branch varies depending upon what federal agencies were active in its geographic area. The Field Branches have accessioned (taken legal custody of) the records of more than fifty government bureaus or agencies as well as records created by the federal courts. This material documents the impact of the federal government and its programs at the regional, state, and even local level, and provides basic information about

people and events which is essential to anyone interested in genealogy or the social, economic, and political history of an area.

The records of the federal courts are the documents used most frequently by genealogists because they often include petitions for naturalization and related material. Many of the branches have indexes to these naturalization records, which researchers can use to track down immigrant ancestors. Although the civil and criminal jurisdiction of the federal courts has been relatively limited compared to state and local courts, it is always possible that ancestors found themselves facing a federal judge. Finding the case files that document such occurrences can be difficult unless you know where and when the cases were tried, but there are archivists at each Field Branch who will be glad to help you look. The Bayonne Branch (usually called the New York Branch) has records of the court which heard claims against the company owning the ill-fated Titanic. The Fort Worth Branch has records of the court at Fort Smith, Arkansas where "Hanging Judge" Isaac Parker sentenced 96 people to the gallows. The Denver Branch has records of the U. S. District Court of Utah which hears 2,500 polygamy prosecution cases from 1870 to 1890. The New York, Fort Worth, Philadelphia, Chicago, and San Francisco branches are among those having cases relating to the enforcement of the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1902 (often including photographs and biographical information).

Records of other federal agencies held by the field branches can be useful for genealogical research. The Atlanta Branch has more than twenty-four million cards on persons who registered for the draft in World War I, as well as records relating to the relocation of families in the 1930s by the Tennessee Valley Authority. The Chicago, Kansas City, Denver, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Seattle Branches all have records of the Bureau of Land Management. BLM records often include tract books, plat maps, surveys, and other material that documents the settlement of the West. The impact of that westward movement on the Native American population can be found in the records of the Bureau of Indian Affairs which are held by all of the branches (excluding Boston, New York, and Philadelphia). These records generally include tribal censuses, payment rolls, land allotment files, and school records, all vital to anyone tracing an Indian ancestor. The San Francisco Branch has records of the government of American Samoa and the Seattle Branch has records relating to the settlement of Alaska.

In addition to ensuring that all of these valuable records are preserved and made available to researchers, the field branches are active in public outreach programs. Many branches conduct workshops for genealogists and teachers interested in using archival resources more effectively. Most of them give tours of their facilities, provide speakers for genealogical and historical societies, produce exhibits about their holdings, sponsor film festivals and symposia about historical topics, and participate in activities marking major national and regional events such as the Bicentennial of the U. S. Constitution, state centennials, and the 200th anniversary of the establishment of the federal courts.

In 1988, the National Archives will spend about 3% of its total budget to operate its eleven field branches. That works out to a little more than one cent for every man, woman, and child in the United States. Be sure to get your penny's worth by making use of your nearest National Archives Field Branch. 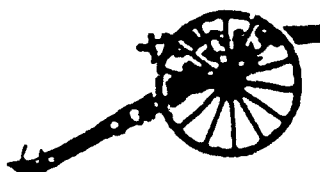

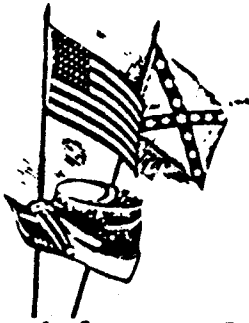

SEARCHING FOR YOUR CONFEDERATE ANCESTOR

The search for your Confederate Ancestor and his official military records will begin at home. Learn everything you can from family Bibles, old letters, newspaper clippings, other old documents, family traditions, and from all your older relatives. Letters, telephone calls and/or visits to some of the oldest members of your family can often help locate information available from no other source.

As each ancestor is found, enter his or her name in the proper place on your ancestor chart, showing full name, dates and places of birth, marriage, and death. Records of second or third marriages should be shown on the back of the chart, since widow's pension was sometimes drawn by a second or third wife, not always your ancestress. A blank chart is attached, with a filled in yellow chart as an example of how to use it.

When you have the names of one or two of your Confederate Ancestors, you should begin research in your local library. Almost every southern library, no matter how small, will have a collection of Confederate books and records. The Genealogy Room of Shreve Memorial Library is probably the best place to start. If you are unfamiliar with genealogical research, ask a relative or friend who has done this kind of work to go with you on your first trip to the library. The librarians can show you how to use the card catalog and where the various collections are shelved, but they cannot do your research for you.

At Shreve Library, books, microfilm and other materials are grouped on shelves or in cabinets by States or category. A brief basic list is given to help you get started, but you will need to check the various groups for special books and microfilm, according to the state where your ancestor lived or drew his pension. If you do not find a roster or book of records for the county or state you are interested in, ask the librarian to check her catalogs to see if she can get what you need on inter-library loan, or if it can be ordered from some publisher.

Many fine guide books, called "How Books", for genealogists are available at Shreve Memorial Library. TRACING YOUR CIVIL WAR ANCESTOR by Bertram H. Groene is probably the best for research in this period. THE RESEARCHER'S GUIDE TO AMERICAN GENEALOGY by Val D. Greenwood has a very good chapter, "The Other Side of the War, The Confederacy", on pages 458-60. If this is your first time to do a little ancestor hunting, I suggest you consult both these books.

A list of Archives, and major research Libraries of Shreveport is limited. Do not overlook your smaller local libraries. Also, your county courthouse may have lists of Confederate soldiers and pensioners, if you fail to find the data in the library.

The short list of basic research material is just to help you get started. There are thousands of other books and microfilm in the special groupings that you will find in the larger libraries, including microfilm of many old newspapers.

Always be sure to check to see if some older member of your family has joined a Confederate Organization, and if so, obtain their records. This could save you all the trouble of searching for the military records of your ancestor.

SOUTHERN STATE ARCHIVES

Military records on many Confederate veterans are not available at the National or Regional Archives. However, most of the Southern State Archives have large collections of original rosters and other documents which have been indexed by name of the veteran.

Confederate pensions were paid by the state in which the veteran or his widow lived when the pension was applied for. Each state enacted separate pension laws and these vary from state to state. A man may have served in Georgia, later moved to Louisiana, and that is where he drew his pension. You must obtain pension records from the state that paid the pension.

To obtain records from any State Archives, send a letter asking if the records are available and the cost of a copy of the complete records. You must give the last name and at least the initial of the veteran, and include any other identifying data you may have. Always enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope with your first inquiry.

A request for pension records should give as much information as possible on both the veteran and his widow, such as dates and places of birth, death, service, and full names if you know them. Usually the state the veteran or widow died in will be the state that paid the pension.

If the first State Archives you write to cannot supply the records, then write to the Archives in an adjoining state until you locate the right one. The big secret of all genealogical research is "Never give up". You may never find any records on your Confederate ancestor, but since most of us had more than one, we can always try for records on each of them.

If you have any difficulty, go back and recheck the guide books listed on page one of this material.

Each of these libraries have special rules governing their use, but one rule is common to all of them. The research materials are often out-of-print, very rare and very valuable; some can never be replaced at any cost. Every book and roll of microfilm that you use must be handled with the utmost care. NEVER turn down corners of pages; NEVER make any mark on any page; NEVER close a book with a pen or pencil or other thick object in it...use a slip of paper to mark your place if necessary. A paper clip or bobby pin slipped over the edge of a page can do irreparable damage. When you finish using a roll of microfilm, always turn off the machine at once - even for brief periods when you want to check something else. Heat from the lights can seriously damage the film.

Librarians are a very special breed of people. Most of them are highly trained dedicated specialists, always glad to help you in every way possible. They can be of great assistance to any researcher, but they simply do not have time to do your research for you. Courtesy and strict observance of all library rules will pay off for you. Demands and rudeness will get you nowhere in a big hurry.

The list of books and microfilm in TRACING YOUR CIVIL WAR ANCESTORS will be very helpful. A very short basic list is given on the following page, but do not limit your research to these items. The card catalog in each library will tell you what is available in that library. Select one or two books at a time, and when you have checked them, select one or two more. NEVER take more than three or four books from the shelves at any one time, and when you have finished with them, leave them neatly stacked on the table for the librarians to replace. If you need more books, follow this same procedure.

CONFEDERATE RECORDS

A FEW BASIC RESEARCH MATERIALS

Thousands of books and rolls of microfilm are available in the Shreveport area which will help in any research on Confederate veterans and widows. Each of the major libraries has special collections, some of which can be found in no other local library. Check the card catalog very carefully and ask the librarian for any special materials they may have. The list below is preliminary.

CONSOLIDATED INDEX TO COMPILED SERVICE RECORDS OF CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS--Microfilm

The collection in Shreve Library is not complete, but if the roll of film that you need is not available, you may have it ordered for \$12.00. It takes from six to eight weeks to get it from the National Archives. Military records for any soldier listed on this microfilm can be obtained from the National Archives. Almost all microfilm in this collection has been donated by Confederate organizations or by individuals doing research on their own Confederate ancestors. Your donation of one or more rolls will be most welcome.

OFFICIAL RECORDS OF THE UNION AND CONFEDERATE ARMIES IN THE WAR OF THE REBELLION

Index and entire collection of 128 volumes containing 138,000 pages. Complete set on microfilm at Shreve Memorial Library. Rebound set of books at LSU-S Library, must be very carefully handled since paper is very brittle and easily damaged.

OFFICIAL RECORDS OF THE UNION AND CONFEDERATE NAVIES IN THE WAR OF THE REBELLION

Microfilm of entire set of 31 volumes with index at Shreve Memorial Library. Rebound books at LSU-S Library.

RECORDS OF LOUISIANA CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS AND COMMANDS.

Three volumes, list officers and enlisted men who served in Louisiana units of the Confederate Army. Complete set, rebound, now out-of-print, and irreplaceable. Printed in 1920, on poor quality paper, now very brittle and shattering from age and use. Kept in locked cases at Shreve Memorial Library. Zeroxing not permitted. Ask librarian for these books and handle with great care.

This microfilm publication reproduces passenger manifests of vessels arriving at Galveston and the suburbs of Houston, Brownsville, Port Arthur, Sabine, and Texas City, Texas. The early lists are shipping company manifests. The later lists are on Immigration and Naturalization Service forms. The lists are arranged chronologically by date of arrival beginning in January 1896.

Some lists are annotated to show the date of admission as a resident alien or date of naturalization. Some entries are stamped "debarred" if the alien was not allowed to enter the United States. Some of the lists include names of U. S. citizens returning from abroad.

Roll 1 includes several lists from 1893, but none from 1894 or 1895. Roll 14 contains one list for September 16, 1911, and both rolls 32 and 33 include lists for 1938. On rolls 24 and 29, the first list was filmed out of order. Roll 24 includes several lists that are very difficult to read due to poor focus having been used during the filming process.

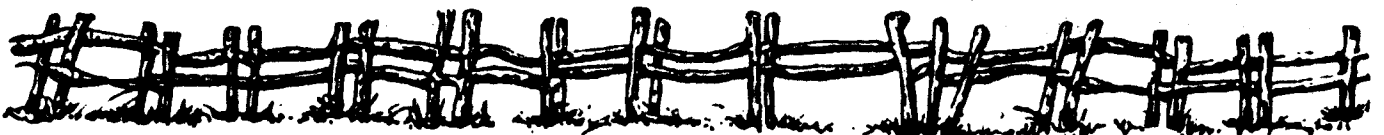

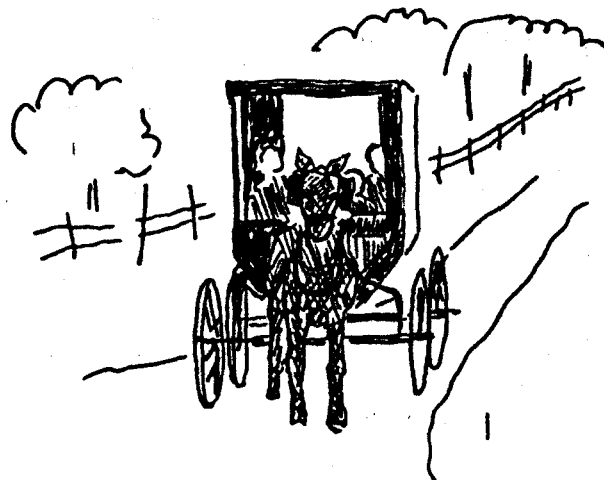

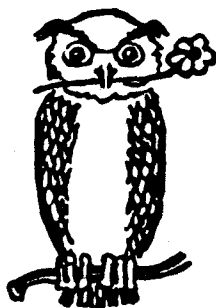

Gingerich made use of Amish and Amish Mennonite genealogies in the Goshen College Library. This was the beginning of years and years of search for Amish and Mennonite Family histories. During the course of many visits in the following years he visited friends and relatives and other genealogical researchers and collected all the material he could. In 1986, he visited Rachel W. Krider for the first time and asked her to join with him in compiling the history of the Amish and Amish Mennonite families. They have worked together in publishing this 848-page book. The volume actually accounts of all known Amish related immigrants who came to America. The histories of the families are included from 1737 up to 1850, and in some cases even more. The cut-off date made was determined because most people are able to trace their families back to that date. There are thousands upon thousands of names in the book. Every name will be found in one of the four indexes. As much data was listed as space would permit. The book should be available to everyone who has an Amish Mennonite ancestor." A fine volume!

This listing of guardianship records contains 1384 cases, about 7500 names, and covers a period of 100 years. Guardianship records are a valuable source of information for genealogists. Guardians were appointed by the county probate court for minors (Males under the age of 21 and females under the age of 18) who were inheriting money or property from an estate. If the child were 14 or older, he or she was allowed to chose his or her own guardian. They were usually, but not always, close relatives. Guardians handled the money affairs of the children, saw that they were educated, clothed and fed, and otherwise managed the life of the child. They did not necessarily take the child into their homes to raise. Minor orphans who wished to marry had to have a guardian who would give permission for them to marry before they could obtain a marriage license. The fiancée was sometimes appointed the guardian. There are 117 pages in this volume, with a complete index.

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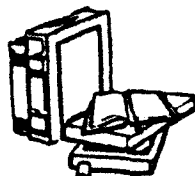

ABOUT PROGRESSIONAL CREDENTIALS

We know that initials such as C.G. or C.G.R.S. after a genealogist's name is an indication the person holds professional credentials. But what kind of competence or expertise does the designation imply, and how and where are they obtained?

The "Board for Certification of Genealogists" is an independent group in Washington, D.C. which grants credentials in six categories. It is not affiliated with any society, but was founded specifically to establish professional credential standards.

Applicants are accepted, not only from the U.S. but from all areas of the world. Certification is granted upon passing the required exam and presentation of examples of work in the specific category or geographic area of certification.

The genealogist is then qualified to be listed in the register. The credential must be renewed every five years by submission of evidence of continuing activities in the profession.

Here are six "CREDENTIALLED" categories:

1. C.G.R.S.-Certified Genealogical Record Searcher. One who searches original and published records, has an understanding of all sources relating to the area in which he (or she) works, and reports details of the contents of the records but is NOT certified to construct a pedigree or to prepare a family history.

2. C.G.-Certified Genealogist.

One who not only searches original and published records as above, but also does problem solving and IS qualified to construct genealogies.

3. C.A.L.S.-Certified American Lineage Specialist.

One who prepares a single line of descent and IS qualified to determine acceptability and authenticity of evidence, original source material and compiled printed material.

4. C.A.I.L.S.-Certified American Indian Lineage Spec.

Must show competency in records dealing with American Indian Lineage.

5. C.L.-Certified Lecturer.

One who lectures on specific topics. Requirements are the same as for a "C.G.R.S."

6. C.I.-Certified Instructor.

One who provides instruction in all aspects of research. Requirements are the same as for a "C.G."

A.G.-Accredited Genealogist.

The Accreditation Program of the Genealogical Department of the LDS Church grants the designation of "Accredited Genealogist" (A.G.) upon completion of both written and oral tests which must be taken in person in Salt Lake City.

The written test, which takes about 8 hours, is in six parts. One part is an

actual problem in which the applicant must carry out research in the library and write a report of the results.

No formal pre-requisites are required, but one should have at least 1,000 hours experience in the chosen area. Areas of specialization include all the various sections of the U.S., Latin America, the Pacific Area, Africa, Canada, Continental Europe, and the British Isles, as well as LDS church records and American Indians.

After passing, the person's name is included on the list of Accredited Genealogists.

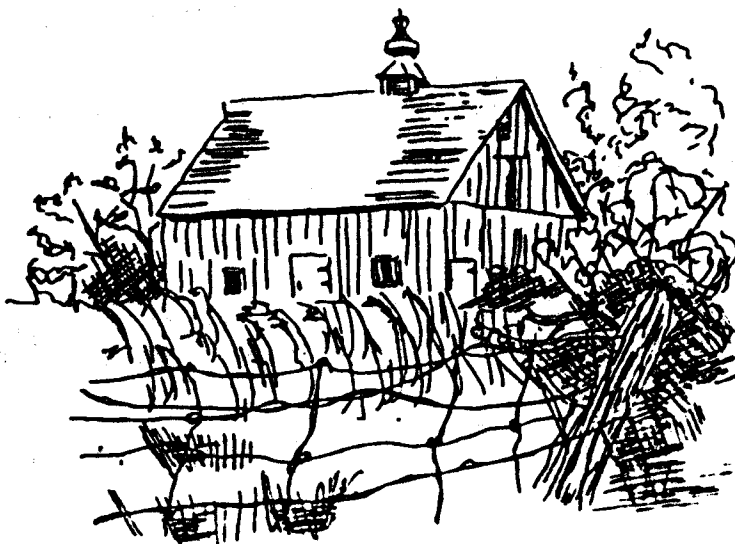
Both the Board of Certification of Genealogists and the Accreditation Program of the Genealogical Department of the LDS Church are widely respected in the profession and they seek to award credentials to competent persons who will uphold the highest of ethical standards in their genealogical work.

It has been called to my attention that an organization based in Illinois has announced that it will issue credentials using the SAME INITIALS as the Board of Certification and the LDS Church, which could cause confusion. The Board claims that this group does not have the same rigorous evaluation of qualifications; the Board and the LDS Church have issued a protest.

MILITARY MEDICAL FILES

When submitting forms to the National Archives for Military Records one should include the wording, "Send Complete Medical File". Medical Records are usually not filed with the military records. If the veteran was injured, hospitalized or received a medical discharge, there could be helpful information in the medical file. Request it.
