QUERIES are free. They must be 75 words or less and must be typed or plainly printed.

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

LIKEN'S 35TH TEXAS CAVALRY

AND DAVID COOK'S LETTERS

David Cook, great-great grandfather of Janie Brazel of Shreveport, Louisiana, was a member of Likens' Texas Cavalry Regiment (35th Texas Cavalry) during the Civil War. This regiment saw action in Texas and Louisiana. David fought in a skirmish at Hodge's Plantation near Many, Louisiana.

David wrote many letters home to his wife, Rebecca, at Tyler, Smith County, Texas. Transcripts of seven of those letters, as provided by Mrs. Brazel, are printed here.

A Capsule History of the regiment was provided through the services of The Hill Junior College History Complex, P. O. Box 619, Hillsboro, Texas 76645. This facility has an extensive collection of material pertaining to the Civil War.

THIRTY-FIFTH (LIKENS') TEXAS CAVALRY

Two Texas cavalry regiments bore the numerical designation of the Thirty-Fifth cavalry. To distinguish one from the other, the name of the unit's commanding officer is usually shown following the numeric designation.


The Thirty-Fifth (Likens') Texas Cavalry was organized in late 1863 by the consolidation of two Texas cavalry battalions, Likens' Texas Cavalry Battalion and Burns' Texas Cavalry Battalion. The unit was organized at Galveston and Hempstead, Texas.

More detailed information has been found on five of the regiment's companies. This material is listed below.

The Thirty-Fitth (Likens') Texas Cavalry participated in a number of various type engagements during its career. The list below identifies these. Numbers after the events locate them on the following map.

surrendered at Galveston on June 2, 1865, unofficial reports indicate that the regiment disbanded at Beaumont on May 1, 1865.

Dear Companion:

Alex GRISSON

I seat myself to write you a few lines which leaves me well. Hoping that these few lines may find you all well. We reorganized today and Boren was elected Captain. The health of the Rigee is tolerable. Some of them have the mumps and there is several cases of small pox in Houston. We are camped in three miles of

of Houston. I dislike a camp life very much. It is very hard here-one meals victual is worth 2 dollars-chickens is worth 3 dollars a piece and eggs is 2 and 50 cents per dozen-butter is worth 5 dollars per pound: We have only 20 ears of corn to the horse per day. I want you to be very saving with your corn and quit taking county money. We received orders to go to Corpus Christi today. We will start and direct your letter to David Cook, a private to Houston Camp Lubb-ock Captain Baren Col. Likens Ridgment. I finished this letter December the first. We have marching orders and will start in the morning to Sandy Point on the Brazos River. I have drawed our bounty and I send you fifty dollars by Bt. Harrison. It you think you will not have corn enough to do you buy it as soon as you can. We will draw our guns in the morning. I don't know when I will get the change to come home but will come when I can. The soldiers is very much dissatisfied. I have not drawed no blankets-nothing but my bounty. We think the war will wind up some way by spring. I want to see you and the children very bad. So I will come to a close-so farewell.

December the 29th A.D. 1863

Dear Companion:

I seat myself this morning to write you a few lines which leaves me well. Hoping that these few lines will find you and the children all well. There is a right smart of sickness in camps. I am as heavy as I EVER WAS in life. We have been on a force march one night and two days. We have stopped to rest today in 8 miles of Polasco Bay. We don't know where we will be ordered to next. I don't know when I will get to come home. There is no chance to come soon. Do the best you can and try to hire a negro and make someone to tell Abram to keep out of the war as long as he can and if he has to go in I want him to come to my camp. We get plenty bread and beef to eat. I have not eat a meal victuals in a house since. Get and tell me all the news in that country and have bill find out in January if you get no news from the administration of the estate of Merchant. Write to me and direct your letter to David Cook a private in Likens Ridge Co. Tk Camp Lubbock. I want to see you and the children very bad. Excuse bad writing for I am writing on the knee.

Direct your letter to David Cook a private in Likens Ridge Co. Tk. Houston Camp Lubbock. James Louis is in my company and is well. I have seen Webb Burks at Houston. He was well and a great many more of my acquaintances. We drawed Muskets. Nothing more.

January the 12th 1864

Dear Companion

I seat myself this evening to write you a few lines to let you know that I am well hoping that these few lines may find you and the children all well. I have nothing of any importance to write to you. Time is hard here. We have poor beef and corn bread and not enough corn for our horses and no foder and the horses is getting very poor. There is a great deal of dissatisfaction with the soldiers. There was 12 deserted the company last week and the confederate money is nearly worth nothing. I have drawed nothing but my bounty yet. We are in 4 miles of Matagorda and we are ordered to stand tone and will start in a few days. I want to see you and the children very much and I want you to write to me as often as you

chance to get a furlough but if I keep well and my poney is able to fetch me home, I will come home. We think that we will get the chance to brake up and come home in the spring if can't I will try very hard to. Write to me as often as you can. Send your letters to Houston and they will follow me. Give me all the news. You can tell me what Abram is doing and if you got the money I sent you. So farewell for this time.

The State of Texas Matagorda County, January the 30th, 1864 Dear Lovely Companion,

I seat myself this evening to write you a few lines which leaves me well. I received your letter yesterday dated the 17th of January which gave me great satisfaction to hear from you. I have nothing of importance to write to you. We don't draw any money yet. I have (teuit)? ranks and is driving a four mule team and if is like the wagon, I can drive long as I stay in the service. I want to come home very bad but there is no chance to come but to runaway and I don't want to do that. Have your corn planted early and don't try to tend more than you can I am heavier than you ever saw me. We are living on beef and corn. We have been on the coast about 30 miles from here and we mounted on the account of there being no corn. We are (-reaking) up the people in this country. We go and you had better to get Mr. Shelton to Tainup pool and if the soldiers was to camp there they would break you up. Tell Matilda and Mary to be smart and shun bad company. The yankees landed on this island call Ponenchela and we could not get to them before they left. I wish I could see you. I could tell you a great many things. I had no idea that men would do as they do. Write to me as often as you can. Tell me what was done with bills and what Abram is doing. . This is seven letter I have wrote and received two. So farewell Write and for this time. David Cook to Rebecca Cook and Family

February the 4th A.D. 1864 Dear Companion

I seat myself this evening to write you a few lines which leaves me well. I have nothing of importance to write to you. Times is hard here beef and corn break and not half enough salt to season our victuals. We think there is no danger of a fight in this county. We was to be dismounted but our boys was all about torn away and we are waiting for more orders and if they go to dismiss us we will ride off. There is a great deal of sickness in camps. The measels is all among the soldiers. I have drawed two month wages U.S. dollars. I have made some money by trading and I will send you seventy five dollars the first chance I get. Write to me as often as you can and tell me all the news in that county and tell me what Abram is doing and you must not think hard of me for not paying the postage on my letter for I can't get stamps here. Tell me who preaches for you this year and what Fitzgeralds is doing so excuse and I will come to a close. So farewell for this time. We are in Matagorda county about 30 miles from the coast. people is planting here now. I want to see you and the children very bad but I don't know when that time will be. The people here will charge us 3 dollars for our meals and victuals and from 15 to 20 dollars for feed a man and horse night and morning. Tell the children to be smart and help you to work. Have corn made if you can. Nothing more at present.

July the 20th 1864 Camp near Elexcandria Dear Wife and Children:

I seat myself this morning to write you a few lines which leaves me tolerable well-hoping these lines will find you all well. I have nothing of importance to write to you. Times is hard in this county. We get beef and bread enough but it is not good. There is a great deal of sickness in camps. It is thought we will come back to Texas, but I don't know where we will go to. The man I sent the mare by has not come back yet. His time is out several days ago. If he ever comes back you what he done with her. Tell the boys to keep out of the war as they would give me sixty days furlough if they don't go out west on the frontiers. I would like they would come to my company. Tell me all about how you are getting along. How many young calves you have and how many goslins little Lucy raised. I want you to save a pair of the best steers to make oxens of if you have enough to do you without them. Becca do the best you can and it will satisfy me. I want to come to see you very bad-so farewell for this time

September the 22nd 1864

Dear Companion

I seat myself to write you a few lines which leaves me well. On the lith of this month we fought the yankees all day. We had 4 killed and seven wounded. We don't know what the yankees loss is. The letter Burkes brought, I never got. I put it in the office and that was the last of it. I am driving the ambulance. We have retreated back 40 miles 5 or 6 days ago. I received your letter dated the 30th of August. I want to come home very bad. I would like to have a very well but Abram had better to stay at home as long as he can for if he more but if he has to come in the service I want him to come to my company and if we can't do no better I will sell my furlough for him a horse but if he can pick up a pony do. So Clifton has not come back yet. I want you to send Abram after the horse that Clifton swapped for. He was a bay horse five years old. I will send him away bill, nothing more at present.

GRAVE OF FRANCES MARION BICKHAM

According to Bill Randolph, who has done much research on cemeteries of Caddo Parish, Louisiana, and East Texas, for the Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association in years past, the grave of Francis Marion Bickham, pioneer Caddo Parish settler, is located in an isolated spot near Cross Lake. Francis Marion Bickham was born 14 July 1822, in Washington Parish, Louisiana, and died 13 October 1869, in Caddo Parish. He married (1) Minerva Cole (born 17 Mar 1833, and died 4 March 1860, in Caddo Parish) and (2) Mary Ann Parnell.

Bill says he was given this information by the Late Bickham Christian, whose papers have since been placed in the archives at the LSUS Library in Shreve-port.

1843 GEORGIA CALL TO MUSTER

This Public Order addressed to Jordan Stanton as "4th Serj." was issued 19th September 1843, in Gwinnett County, Georgia. It concerns notice of a call for a Battalion Muster at ten o'clock 27 September 1843, at the Battalion muster ground at W. A. Hamilton's. Corporal George C. Harvil is to assist in notifying the men.

Signed by C. A. Robinson as Captain, men to be alerted are W. M. Sikes, William Manders, S. E. Manders, John Manders, Lodwick Greeson, Wiley Nelson, Joshua Hutchins, Z. B. Betts, David Carter, Henry Osborn, Elijah Osborn, Jesse Osborn, Jr., Wiley Hill, Henry F. Hill, John Bradberry, Edwin Bowman, William Bowman, Theophilus Parham, Thomas H. Harvil, Sanford Harvil, John R. Townley, Coker, W. W. Pearce and Reps Osborn.

This well-preserved document is among family memorabilia handed down in an 1833 Stanton family Bible. It is now in the possession of James C. Stanton of Switzerland, Florida, a brother of Mrs. Norman Mauroner, of Shreveport, La.



"THE HOWARD WAGON TRAIN" By Randall Lovejoy

The Howards were a large and close-knit family. They had migrated from North Carolina into Tennessee in the early 1800's and from Tennessee to Iowa by 1853, where they bought fams. They had been quite happy in Iowa until the Civil War when anti-south feelings caused them to be targets of harrassment. They were strongly opposed to slavery but sympathetic to the south in the struggle. There was also the possibility of draft in the Union army. One, William Henry Howard, posted over \$200 to prevent his son, Martin Van Buren Howard, from being conscripted. One incident in Marshalltown, Iowa set the Howards to planning the trip west. Charles Murphy Howard was past the age of seventy and was the titular head of the family. He had a long white beard. While attending a town meeting, someone made a statement about a victory which the Confederate army had won, upon which Charles tossed his hat into the air and said, "Hurrah for Jeff Davis". The crown surged toward him, but luckily, Henry Clay Henderson, who was a lawyer and the publisher of the Marshall County Times, soon to be called the Marshalltown Times, quickly came to his rescue, saying, "Any harm will have to come over my dead body".

Most of the related Howard families in Iowa decided to move west. Their farms were sold and, in at least one case, abandoned. Charles Murphy Howard dug up his money, which he had buried in the pig pen. They formed the Howard Wagon Train, consisting of thirty wagons and were well-armed and well-provisioned. The band must have been composed of at least seventy members, all closely related. Charles Murphy Howard was elected captain of the group, but the authority actually rested with his son, William Henry Howard, who was appointed wagonmaster. One member of the family, Wyatt Alonzo Wherry, who had married Charles' niece, served as the doctor on the trip. He had acquired the monicker, "Leather Britches", conferred upon him by his comrades-in-arms during the Mexican War after he had fashioned a sort of pants made out of leather, which today we call chaps.

The wagon train departed from Marshalltown between mid-April and early May of 1864. The group headed south to "St. Jo", Missouri, where the Howards remained for a time to complete the outfitting and to buy supplies. Heading west, they crossed the Missouri river at Council Bluffs, Iowa, where they witnessed the marriage of two of the clan who had decided to remain in Iowa. Charles Murphy Howard's nephey, Harry Green Hill, married his own first cousin, Martha Virginia "Mattie" Howard, there on May 29th. Harry served as bandmaster in an Iowa unit of the Union army. He was not the only Howard relative to join with the northern side. Thomas Jefferson Henderson, another of Charles' nephews, volunteered his services in the Civil War and became a colonel in the 112th Regiment from Illinois. Upon his discharge he was brevetted Brigadier General. Three of Thomas' brothers also served in units from Illinois.

Most of the wagons were drawn by yokes of oxen, although a few used horses. William Henry Howard had given Mary Henderson Howard, his daughter, and Jeremiah Birks a fine span of horses and a wagon. Jeremiah and Mary, who was only seventeen, were the newlyweds on the train. Reminiscing later, she declared that no bride ever had a more romantic honeymoon. She remembered having crossed a bridge, 'near Yellowstone', so narrow that she had to walk along the edge of the bridge and prod the oxen in order to keep the wagons centered on the bridge. She also recalled having been so tired by the end of the day that many times she would gladly have skipped cooking dinner.

The Howard Wagon Train became known as the "Singing Wagon Train". They were extremely musical people and they sang to entertain and to lighten their ardous journey. They caught glimpses of herds of buffalo, although they had been considerably scattered and thinned by the earlier immigrants. At night the wagons were driven round in a closely formed circle for protection. Many graves were passed along the route with crosses marked "Killed by Indians", and at one place they came to a spot where an immigrant train just ahead of them had been attacked and a number had been killed.

The Howards had traveled for a long time when they came to the Platte river country, where there was reported to be very warlike tribes of Sioux Indians. One evening a large band of painted warriors circled on their horses around the Howard camp. The men quietly got their guns and kept a close watch although William Henry Howard advised them not to make the first hostile move. The Indians showed a friendly attitude and began coming into camp. The Indians finally made known their purpose. They wanted to buy Nancy Howard, William Henry's daughter. Nancy was a striking fourteen year old beauty with long blond hair and had been riding the family's pet horse, John Bateman, following behind the wagons in sight of the Indians during the day. After this incident, Nancy was forbidden to ride her horse and was instructed to remain inside the wagon.

The Howard women had already prepared dinner when the Indians came into camp. Feeling had run high when the Indians began taking seats and helping themselves to the meal. The men were eager to open fire, but older heads prevailed. William Henry walked over to where a fine looking Indian, a noble specimen of his race and evidently the chief, stood conversing with the white men. William Henry called his attention to the rude behavior of his people, upon which the chief gave a low whistle. At the call, his warriors hastily arose and followed him out of camp, mounting their ponies and riding hastily away.

The wagon train probably had another encounter with the Indians, although the Indians were not actually seen. This was the most exciting experience of the trip, and resulted in the loss of a few head of cattle, the only loss suffered by the train during the trip west. One night the members were dozing off to sleep when a noise, sounding as united thunder, broke forth and the very earth seemed trembling with a roaring sound. Voices were heard, "Turn out boys, the stock have all broken away from the guards and are running like mad". The men crawled dazedly from the wagons and as many as could be spared from the camp were mustered out. There were a few horses which had been securely tied in camp. Mounting these, they rode out into the darkness of the night, leaving the women in camp to face a night of dread and terror. Most of the cattle were rounded up although the wagon train had to camp a day or so while the men were away hunting for them. They felt certain that the Indians had caused the stampede, although they never knew for sure.

At an army post, Fort Hall in Idaho Territory, two men were selected by the post commander and required to repeat the Oath of Allegiance. The two were Charles Murphy Howard and his nephew, Oliver Perry Howard, picked to represent this secessionist group. This caused some difficulty when Charles refused. He protested that he had been born in, reared his family in, and fought for the United States. Charles had been a volunteer during the War of 1812, in the Tennessee Mounted Gunmen. William Henry Howard let it be known that three or four of Charles' ancestors had come over on the Mayflower. And William Henry was a minister! In deference to Charles' age, the train was allowed to pass without his having repeated the oath.

Prior to reaching the fort, another party consisting of a John Brown and his family, in three or four dilapidated old wagons, had been traveling with the Howards for protection. This marriage of wagon trains had not been harmonious, what with the John Brown group being Yankees and the Howards, Southern sympathizers. The rumor concerning John Brown's daughters that he might find himself "grandpa to a secessionist grandchild" had not helped matters. After the Fort Hall incident, the friction had become more intense and the commander of the fort ordered an army escort to accompany the two groups in order to maintain peace between them. After a short distance, the John Brown wagons turned off the Oregon trail and headed south over what is now the road to Salt Lake City, and the escort returned to the fort.

The Howard's planned destination had been California, but upon reaching Idaho, they heard reports of drought there, whereupon the Howard Wagon Train began to disintegrate. James Webster Howard, who was Charles Murphy's youngest brother, along with his rather extensive family, may have left the train in the Payette vally of Idaho, where some of his descendants still live. He had come with his wife, Mary Jane Justice, but just how many of his eleven children and their children came west is not known. The ones who are known to have come are Mary Edith, who later married Warren Parrott and lived in Pasadena, and Edmond Charles Howard and his wife, Mary E. Scarlet, along with their children. Charles was later found in Shasta county and then in Modoc County, California, and after Mary was widowed, she lived in Midland, near Klamath Falls, Oregon. This family were Catholic, the only ones among the otherwise all-protestant Howards on the wagon train. James Webster Howard headed south, spending a year in the Rogue vally of southern Oregon and, in 1871, settling at Dorris Bridge, later called Alturas, where he was County Surveyor and Assessor for Modoc county. At the time of his death, in 1885, he was living with his nephew, Reverend William Henry Howard at Adin, California.

Harry Greene Hill, Charles Murphy's naphew, who had remained in Iowa and who was Roenna Josephine Howard Wherry's half-brother, joined these relatives in Medoc county in 1874. He had arrived by boat in San Francisco in 1868, having traveled by land across the Isthmus of Panama, along with his parents, Dabney Pettis Hill and Elizabeth "Betsey" Ann Howard. Harry taught school in Suisun Hills, California. One of his students was the poet, Edwin Markham, in whom Harry recognized the potential and had given Edwin a considerable degree of extra attention. Edwin Markham, later, at a banquet given in his honor in New York City, credited Harry with his success. Harry became a widower in 1869, when his wife, Mattie, died. Harry was a medical doctor as well as school teacher. When he arrived at Dorris Bridge, he "hung out his shingle". Later he is found in Elma, Washington, where he operated a drug store, a joint venture with his son, Charles, and son-in-law, L. I. "Bud" Wakefield, Dr. Harry Greene Hill was given custody of the journals and records of the Howard Wagon Train.

Presumably these were later in the possession of his granddaughter, Marjorie Wakefield, but there the trail for these treasures grows cold. His mother, Betsey, after she was widowed, later lived with her nephew, Reverend William Henry Howard, at Adin, California. She was the aunt who smoked her pipe on the Reverend's front porch. Pipe smoking was a common habit of southern women of that time, but was an embarrassment to the Reverend and his family in their church position.

At least one family dropped off the wagon train and headed into the Walla Walla valley in Washington. Elizabeth Wessley Shropshire Howard, widow of Allen H. Howard, who was Charles Murphy's eldest brother, along with many of her children and grandchildren, settled in this area. Elizabeth's son, Thomas Hill Howard, who was a widower, had brought his four children, Theodore Frelinghuysen, Joshua "Josh" Allen, Clarence Edward, and Sarah Elizabeth. Theodore, in 1920, had the lead role in an unsolved murder mystery in Pendleton. When Thomas Hill Howard's wife had died back in Iowa in 1858, his sister, Nancy Batson Howard, had moved in with him to care for the four children. She was on the wagon train and later married Hiram Still, son of an early pioneer family. Oliver Perry Howard, another of Elizabeth's sons, had come with his wife and their four children. One of Oliver's sons, born later in Washington, was named Tennessee Howard. Elizabeth had eleven children, but just how many came west is not known. Two sons, Joel Shropshire Howard and John Reed Howard, remained in the midwest.

William Henry Howard and his immediate family remained at LaGrande, Oregon that winter, awaiting the birth of Phoebe Ellen Birks, who arrived in February of 1865, the first-born of Jeremiah and Mary Birks. There were eleven in this group: William Henry Howard and his wife, Margaret Wilson, and their children, Martin Van Buren Howard and his wife, Lucetta Larue "Settie" Carpenter; Mary Henderson Howard and her husband, Jeremiah M. Birks; Nancy Eugenia Arabell Howard; Sarah Jane Lee "Jennie" Howard; John Robert Howard; William Rollings Howard; and James Ashley Howard. In the spring of 1865, they crossed the Blue Mountains to The Dalles, going down the Columbia river and on to the Southern Methodist Mission House at Independence, Oregon. In the fall of 1867, this group, except for Jeremiah and Mary, and Nancy, who had married Jeremiah DeSpain in 1866, packed their wagons and headed into northern California. The Birks and the DeSpains had returned to the Pendleton area. William Henry Howard became a circuit pastor in the Shasta district of the Methodist Church in northern California, his first known assignment being in Anderson in 1869.

Most of the Howards had traveled on to the Willamette valley that fall, arriving in Portland on October 2, 1864. Charles Murphy Howard and his wife, Mary "Polly" Hendrick Henderson Rice, settled near Sheridan, Oregon at a site called "Gopher Valley". Charles Murphy was the son of Edmund Howard and Edith Murphy. He was born March 3, 1794, in Sampson county, North Carolina, and died here on August 10, 1866. Polly was the daughter of John Henderson and Nancy Singleton. She was born June 23, 1798 in Garrard county, Kentucky, and died here December 19, 1879. She had applied for, and received, a veteran's widow pension in 1879, too late to do her much good.

Martha Frances Howard Wright, daughter of Charles Murphy Howard and widow of William C. Wright, Sr., with her son, William C. Wright, Jr., settled at Sheridan. William, Jr. later moved to Red Bluff, California.

Charles Augustus Howard, son of Charles Murphy Howard, and his wife, Jane Carpenter, who was a sister to Lucetta Larue Carpenter, traveled to

Shasta county, California, and are found by 1880 in Oakesdale, Washington. Charles Augustus Howard had many a chat with Joshua Howard, reviving old memories of their journey west on the Howard Wagon Train. Both, at different times, farmed the same land.

Pleasant Marion Scroggin, who had married Charles Murphy Howard's daughter. Sarah Elizabeth, came with their five children: Charles Carter, Mary Frances, Stephen Leonard, Phoebe Ellen, and Martha Alice. James Harvey Kennedy, one of the orphaned Kennedy children, had lived with them in Iowa, but whether he came on the Kennedy Train in 1862, came later, or stayed in Iowa is not known. "P.M." was successful both as a farmer and later as a banker in Sheridan, Oregon. He was County Commissioner in Yamhill county. He later recalled that his wagons had been pulled by five yokes of oxen and eight horses.

James Lawrence Howard, son of Charles Murphy Howard, and his wife, Rachael A. Gillespie, a member of the Quaker sect, settled in Albany, Oregon. Their first son, Franklin "Frank" William Howard, may have been born in time to be on the wagon train. A grandson, Frank Howard, son of James Austin Howard, was later the publisher of the "Albany Democrat". Many of the Howards now living in the Albany area are descendants of James Lawrence and Rachael.

Virginia Ann Howard Birks, daughter of Charles Murphy Howard and a widow, accompanied her brother, James Lawrence Howard, to Albany and lived out her life there with members of the family.

Andrew Jackson Myers, Charles Murphy Howard's nephew, was on the wagon train and is known to have been in Monmouth, Oregon in 1866, when he was the signing witness to Jeremiah DeSpain and Nancy Howard's marriage. Andrew had lived, as a farmhand, with his uncle Charles back in Iowa.

Wyatt Alonzo Wherry had married Roenna Josephine Howard, a neice of Charles Murphy Howard. They brought their six children: Elizabeth Susannah, Charles May, Samuel Alonzo, William Wyatt, John Robert, and Andrew Jackson. This family continued on to the town of Elsie in Clatsop county, Oregon. Roenna was to be the Howard family historian. She recorded names and dates and saved all the family letters and newspaper clippings. She died in 1913, in Horse Heaven county in Washington, where some of her children were living. Her collection of Howard date was turned over to her granddaughter, Eula Elvira Hardison Piland Lewis, who in turn gave this collection to Howard Stevenson Bagley, a grandson of Joshua "Josh" Allen Howard. Howard Bagley died in 1980, and one of his nieces was the recipient.


Alfred Harrison Kennedy and his sister, Loucinda, orphaned but grown, children of Charles Murphy Howard's sister, Edna Howard Kennedy, were the only two Kennedys on the wagon train. They were of a family of nine children, who had been orphaned in Tennessee, and taken in by Charles Murphy Howard and his wife, Mary "Polly" Hendrick Henderson Rice. The children were very fond of their Uncle Charlie and their Aunt Polly. Two brothers, Charles Millington Kennedy and Hiram Lawrence Kennedy, came west in the 1880's. Alfred was associated with Hiram, for a time, in raising cattle in Modoc county, California. Alfred's sister, Louisa Kennedy Hogle, has descendants living in southern California. Alfred is found "all over the west" and seems to have been the Howard family courier, visiting and carrying messages among the scattered Howard tribe. Alfred was a school teacher and had kept a detailed diary of the Howard trek across the plains and had included a complete roster of its members. After his death in Seattle in

1931, the diary was not located and has been the object of many a search.

Felix Grundy Wilkinson, Charles Murphy Howard's nephew, came west probably after 1864, and lived in San Francisco. He was the only other Howard relative to be of the Catholic faith.

Charles Murphy Howard's daughter, Mary Jane, had married Thomas P. Chambers and they were living in Iowa. They were not on the wagon train, but many of their grandchildren are found later "out west", including Charles "Charlie" H. Chambers, who settled in Surprise Valley, over Fandango Pass, in Modoc county, California.

There were others on the Howard Wagon Train who cannot be listed with any degree of certainty. These include Charles Murphy Howard's sisters and their families with the married names of Jones, Myers, Essex, Wilkinson, and Athey. The Myers and the Essexs are thought to have settled in Modoc county, California.

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BOSSIER PARISH, LOUISIANA MARRIAGE RECORDS

When Bossier Parish was created in 1843, the Parish Judge was invested with authority to issue marriage licenses, required to demand bond from applicant according to his means, and to post notice of intended marriage at the door of the church or courthouse. Applicant's bond was a guarantee no legal impediment to the marriage existed, and was binding for two years. After 15 days, there being no objection, license was issued. The Parish Judge and any Priest, Minister or Justice licensed by the Judge had authority to celebrate marriages. In 1845, for the first time, it became the duty of the minister or magistrate who celebrated marriage to make duplicate acts of the fact and return one copy to the Parish Judge within 30 days, he being required to record and file such acts in his office. After 1846, the office of Parish Judge was abolished and authority to grant marriage licenses and special licenses to ministers, et al, to celebrate marriages, and the duty of recording and filing the acts of marriage devolved upon the Clerk of Court.

Prior to 1828, when Claiborne Parish was formed, all this territory belonged to Natchitoches Parish. From 1828 to 1843, Bossier Parish was a part of Claiborne Parish. Claiborne Parish Courthouse burned in 1848, with all the records destroyed.

Bossier Parish was formed 25 February 1843, with Fredonia as the first Parish seat, then changed to Society Hill, which soon adopted the name of Bellevue. At this time the inhabitants numbered only a few hundred persons, most coming from Mississippi, Alabama, the Carolinas and Georgia. In the early 1900's the Parish seat was removed to Benton, after a long and warmly contested law-suit.

Bossier Parish Marriage Records consist of Bond, Licenses, Marriage Certificates, Ministers' and Officials' returns. Dates of marriage certificates are shown unless otherwise stated.

Records from Books 1 and 2 were published in THE GENIE in 1971, copied by Mrs. Sam J. Nation and Mrs. James T. Evans. Records from Marriage Books of later years copied by other volunteers will be published in future issues of THE GENIE.

Emigrate means to leave one country or region and settle in another. It takes the preposition "from". Immigrate means to enter and settle in a country or region to which one is not a native. It is followed by the preposition "to".

It follows, then, that an emigrant is someone who leaves one country for another. An immigrant is a person who moved to a new country for another. An immigrant is a person who moved to a new country. You can't do one without the other, of course, so if a person is an emigrant, he is, by definition, also an immigrant. The grandfather mentioned above was a British emigrant and an American immigrant.

CITY OF SHREVEPORT SEXTON'S REPORT

Official reports of deaths occuring in Shreveport in the last part of the nineteenth century, may be found in the sexton's records. In the first group of such records, printed below, are those to be found for the year 1896, beginning in March. These are from records entitled "Greenwood Cemetery Records, Sexton's Book." Records of deaths from 1897 through 1899 are from "City of Shreveport, Sexton's Report 1897-1913". (Greenwood Cemetery is a city-owned cemetery operated by the City of Shreveport and located at the intersection of Stoner and Centenary Streets in Shreveport, Louisiana.) Places of birth are given for only a few of the earliest entries.

OUR COLONIAL ANCESTORS KNOTT, MASSEY, YOUNGBLOOD, HICKMAN, PULLEN AND OTHERS, by James Dewey O'Brien, J. D. is scheduled for publication by Gateway Press of Baltimore, MD, by December 15, 1988.

The author is a native of Natchitoches Parish, LA, a former trial attorney and Deputy Assistant Attorney General for the Tax Division, Department of Justice, Washington, D. C. Other ancestorial families of the author include SHACKLE-FORD, EVERETT, TAYLOR, GASCOINGNE (GASKINS), STOTT, SHIPP, MC NEIL, NATIONS, HOLLADAY, FLETCHER, and the O'BRIENS. A final section also contains information concerning various families of Natchitoches Parish, LA, including BARNHILL, CRUMP, DURR, OLIVE, SMITH and INGRAM.

Of particular interest is the Gascoigne line which is of royal origin and descends to the author through the Taylors, Everetts, Pullens, Hickmans, Shacklefords, and Youngbloods. This enables descendants of these lines to trace their ancestry through the royal families of Europe to the beginnings of the European era. In addition to being the first book of its kind to document some of these families, it includes heretofore unpublished data on early immigrants of general interest to genealogists, corrections, supported by document citations, to some published accounts of these families, and gives an insight into the history of those times through the lives of the subjects.

VIRGINIA FINDS LOST COPIES OF RECORDS

While the records lost were from the years 1912 through 1959, for Army personnel and 1947 through 1963, for Air Force personnel, the duplicate records cover the years 1942 to 1945 and 1950 to 1954. 

SHUEY FAMILY

Emigrant ancestors of Jacob Augustus Shuey were Daniel Shuey and his wife, born Maria Martha Schilling, and their son, Ludwig Heinrich Shuey, who emigrated to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, in the year 1732. Ludwig's son, John Ludwig, moved his family to a farm near Swope in Augusta County, Virginia about 1790. In the house he built there, which is still standing, were born his son, Jacob, and his grandson, Jacob Augustus. John Ludwig, who served in the Revolutionary War as a private in Captain Casper Stover's Pennsylvania company, is buried nearby in Old Glebe Burying Ground, the oldest cemetery in that part of Virginia. Beside him is buried his wife, born Anna Mary Lash, daughter of Balthazer Lash, in Berks County, Pennsylvania. (Reference: HISTORY OF THE SHUEY FAMILY IN AMERICA, second edition 1919, by D. B. Shuey.)

Records existing in the Speyer State Archives, Speyer, Germany state that Daniel Jouis (Shui/Jue), who had returned from America, sold, as lessee in 1748, k of the Munch property at Dannstadt, belonging to the University of Heidelberg. According to the documents he had "already 16 years ago with wife and children, betaken himself to the new land" and had there taken up residence. His father, Daniel Jouy, tenant of the Universitatshof (Munchof) at Dannstadt, had died on August 22, 1737, at Dannstadt. This Daniel Jouy was in turn the son of David Jouy of "Grissy (Grichy) near Metz" (i.e. Grigy, southeast of Metz), who is designated in the church register as a refugee. Daniel Jouy had married, at Dannstadt on October 16, 1725, Maria Martha Schilling, who came from Dannstadt. Three children were born to this marriage, all born on the Munchof at Dannstadt and baptized at Dannstadt: (1) Ludwig Heinrich, born October 15, 1726; (2) Anna Margaretha, born February 15, 1729; and (3) Johannes, born November 24, 1730, died November 28, 1730. The pronunciation of the name is, corresponding to the French origin of the family, also French, as Daniel wrote his name "Schui" in the Documents. (Source: Staatsarchiv Speyer, Universitat Heidelberg Akt Nr. 14; Reformed Church Register of Dannstadt. An article by the late Speyer Archivist, Frederich Krebs, detailing this information was translated by Don Yoder and appears on page 42 of his book, RHINELAND EMIGRANTS, published by The Genealogical Publishing Company, Inc., in Baltimore, 1985. His article is illustrated with a 1965 picture of the Munchof (farmhouse) near Dannstadt "from which the Huguenot emigre family of Shuey (Jouis) came to Pennsylvania in 1732.")

The Bible records here transcribed are those from a Bible of Daniel's great-great grandson, Jacob Augustus Shuey, who, with his parents and other members of the family emigrated to Iowa in 1855, to found the village

of Shueyville in Johnson County, between Iowa City and Cedar Rapids. The elder Jacob Shuey and his wife, (Elizabeth Lowman, born 3 June 1804 at Middlebrook, Virginia, to Barnhart Lowman and his wife, Margaret Bell) are buried in the Shueyville cemetery.



A GUIDE TO JEWISH HISTORY SOURCES IN THE HISTORY LIBRARY OF THE WESTERN RESERVE HISTORICAL SOCIETY, edited by Kermit J. Pike, 92 pp., 1983, \$5.00. Includes 118 manuscripts, collections, photographs, and printed material dating back to the arrival of Jews in Cleveland in 1839.

A GUIDE TO THE MANUSCRIPTS AND ARCHIVES OF THE WESTERN RESERVE HISTORICAL SOC-IETY, by Kermit J. Pike, frontispiece, 425 pages, includes 73 page index. 1972, \$10.00. This guide was the first published reference tool to the manuscript and archival holdings collected by the Society since its founding in 1867. Part I describes the manuscripts, including 945 general collections, 4 special collections, 6 collections in microfilm, and 50 recent accessions and other collections in preparation. Part II describes 86 groups of Ohio local government records. Principal subjects of interest include art, banking, Civil War, economic life and conditions, education, farming, fraternal and patriotic societies, Indiana, industry, journalists, labor and unions, law, libraries and historical associations, medicine, merchants, politics, public welfare, religion, slavery, temperance, transportation, travel and writers.

A GUIDE TO MAJOR MANUSCRIPT COLLECTIONS ACCESSIONED AND PROCESSED BY THE LIBRARY OF THE WESTERN RESERVE HISTORICAL SOCIETY SINCE 1970, compiled by Kermit J. Pike. 92 pages. \$5.00 A supplement to the Library's original manuscript guide published in 1972, this guide contains bibliographical descriptions of the 457 manuscript collections added to the Library's catalogued holdings through April 1986. Included are those collections gathered through several special archival programs established since 1970, such as black, ethnic, Jewish and labor history archives. Other collections relate to the traditional interest in business and industry, the Civil War, genealogy, political history, religion, social service, transportation and travel.

INDEX TO THE MICROFILM EDITION OF GENEALOGICAL DATA RELATING TO WOMEN IN THE WESTERN RESERVE BEFORE 1840 (1850), 226 pages. 1976. \$15.00. The first permanent settlement in the Western Reserve, an area in northeastern Ohio, larger than Connecticut, was at the present Cleveland in 1796. A century later a group of enthusiastic women organized themselves into the Woman's Department of the Cleveland Centennial Committee. Noting that the published county histories dealt primarily with men, they decided to collect information about women. They directed their attention to pioneer women who came to the area between 1796 and 1840 (1850). The information collected is of considerable genealogical interest. The preparation for this publication including the preparation of the master name index has been a project of the Genealogical Committee of the Western Reserve Historical Society.

ENUMERATION OF YOUTH AND PARTIAL CENSUS FOR SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN PORTAGE COUNTY, OHIO, 1832-1838. Includes a Census of Youth and Parents for Akron in 1838, prepared by William Cumming Johnson II. 1982. \$10.00. These lists were copied from the original statements of the Clerks of the school districts in Portage County. Lists are available for 1832, 1833, 1834, 1836 and 1838.

LIST OF VOTERS IN PORTAGE COUNTY, OHIO, 1816-1856. Includes voters in Additional townships before 1840, prepared by William Cumming Johnson, Jr., past president of Portage County Chapter of the Ohio Genealogical Society, 54 pages, 1985. \$4.00. This list of voters supplements census and tax records and is an important source of information for persons working on family histories. Names are given along with the place and year of their voting. A map is included to locate townships which appear in the body of the booklet.

A STECHER-STECKER SAGA, the Story of Several German Families and Their Descendants in America, by Robert M. Stecher, M. D., 209 pages, 1977. \$12.00. Dr. Stecher traced the descendants of Hans Melchior Stecher, who established a family in Pennsylvania in the 18th century. In addition, he traced the ancestry of the twelve Stechers who came to this country in the 19th century and established families here. Dr. Stecher's genealogical manuscripts have been deposited in the Western Reserve Historical Society where they may be consulted.

Randolph, who copied these inscriptions 10 December 1970, reported at that time that all but one of the stones were down, and that several known to have been there at one time were now missing.

POLLARD, Emaline J. 11 Mar 1811-13 Aug 1897 POLLARD, Henry A. 9 Jul 1829-25 Aug 1872

POLLARD, Sudie E. T. dau of Willis and Rmsline POLLARD 18 Jun 1850-7 Dec 1880

POLLARD, Willis T. 22 Pab 1841-30 Sep 1866

POLLARD, Willie was born 13 Apr 1807 and died 22 Feb 1877

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
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
