THIS OLD HOUSE



With the home of James P. Shackelford of the Pisgah Community, Union Parish, Louisiana in the background, members of his family posed for this photograph about 1910. When our editor, Priscilla Reinowski, saw the photo of this old house, she asked if I would write its story. I replied in the affirmative, thinking at the time that I would push the proper keys on my computer, the disk drive would whirr, and the printer would react with a clatter. Out would come a family group sheet with all the usual vital data. Well, on second thought, that would not be the "story of this old house and its family", which is preserved in only one place, as far as I know - the computer in my head.

I was fortunate as a child because my grandmother, Mary Caroline Shackelford Glass, would show me the old photos in her family album and tell me stories of our family.

This photo was made around 1900, and shows James Paschal Shackelford, his wife, Sarah Madora Byram, (daughter of Quincy A. Byram) some of their eleven children and their spouses, and some of their grandchildren. They are standing in front of the James P. Shackelford house, which still stands, located one mile northeast of Pisgah Baptist Church in Union Parish, Louisiana.

James P., was the grandson of the oldest Shackelford to come to Union Parish, Louisiana, Paschal James Shackelford, who was born ca. 1800, in Georgia. James P. was born in Jefferson Co., Alabama, 10 Feb 1848. His father was Joseph Henry Shackelford, also born in Jefferson Co., Alabama on 24 Jun 1826. James P.'s mother was Harriet Elizabeth Massey, daughter of James Massey. Joseph Henry Shackelford's property, where James P. was born, was just south of the Vulcan Statue on Red Mountain in Birmingham, Alabama. This property includes a large portion of Homewood section of that city. James P.'s grandmother, who married Paschal J., was Elizabeth Ann Hickman, daughter of Joseph Hickman. Paschal J.'s property was just west of Five Corner in downtown Birmingham.

The Shackelfords sold their land in Jefferson Co., Alabama, between 1848 and 1850. I was told that they moved without selling their property after three years of drought, during which they made no crops. However, deeds are recorded, so that part of the story is untrue. The drought part of the story is true, for there are letters in existence telling of that horrible drought in Georgia and Alabama. They moved to Union Parish in the late 1850s. Paschal J. settled about a mile south of Pisgah Baptist Church and Joseph Henry about 3/4 of a mile north of Mt. Olive Baptist Church. Mt. Olive Church is no longer in existence, but the cemetery can be found in the woods off La 2 Alt, northwest of Bernice.

James P. Shackelford and Sarah Madora Byram were married in 1866, at Shiloh Baptist Church, where she was a member. She moved her membership to Pisgah Baptist Church in 1867, which is about the time the house was built. Both parents offered the young couple land, but they wanted to start fresh away from their parents. James bought land incrementally north of the old Pisgah-to Spearsville Road, about one mile northeast of Pisgah Baptist Church, where the house sits. The record shows that Quincy Byram signed-over 40 acres to the young couple. Quincy had considerable land holdings near Pisgah, but did not live there.

I "found" the old house in the summer of 1988. It was my first visit back there since James P.'s funeral in 1933. Naturally it has changed. The most noticeable changes are the "dogtrot" that has been enclosed with entry doors added and windows on either side of the front door. The banister is gone and the roof has been tinned. The left (or west) chimney has fallen revealing a fireplace in the loft. I don't remember ever knowing that was a loft, but I guess they would have to put all those kids someplace.

The house is in a beautiful setting. A half-mile dirt road runs north from the Spearsville road and ends at the gate. The house sits on high ground and the fields slope to the north and northeast to a tree line along Corney Bayou about a mile away. Pink Crepe Myrtle line the east side of the house, and just to the east stand three large old pear trees. They were laden with fruit when I was there.

After this picture was taken, the two chairs on the porch were moved to the yard and a photo was taken of James and Dora seated in them. I have that photo, too. Last year I was showing this photo to one of their granddaughters, Malta S. Holder, who still lives near Pisgah. She said, "See that round-backed chair? I still have it."

James P., was a veterinarian. I found a lawsuit in Union Parish Court-house records where he was suing to collect a fee for pasturing and doctoring a horse. I guess that confirms his profession. I don't know where he got his training. His mother's estate records show that he bought a "doctor book" from her estate. I have wondered if that was the source of his training.

The little girl standing between James P. and Dora is their youngest daughter (to survive), Effie Pauline. Effie was born 7 Nov 1890. She took care of her father after her mother's death 28 Jan 1923, until he died 28 Feb 1933. I have one of James P.'s Bibles in which is written in a child's hand: "This book belong to J P Shackelford. Writ by his daughter Effie." After her father's death, Effie married the widower of her sister, Stella, John G. Goss. They had an infant who died at birth 18 Dec 1934. They lived on the Goss place about a mile north of Shiloh Baptist Church. After John's death, Effie married two other times, to a Gray and a Ferguson, and lived in Bernice. She spent the final years of her long life in a nursing home in Bossier City, Louisiana. She died 8 Jan 1987, and was buried at Pisgah next to John Goss, Stella and her infant.

The fourth in line is Rosa Stella. She was born 24 Jan 1885, and united with Pisgah Baptist Church in 1900. She married John G. Goss, 15 May 1904. They had two sons: Leonard and Dale. Dale survives and lived in Blanchard, Louisiana. Stella died 24 Dec 1928.

The fifth from the left, Lillie M., was born in Aug 1888. She married Douglas Gray and they lived in New Orleans where Douglas was Secretary/Treasurer of the Baptist Bible Institute (now New Orleans Seminary). They lived out their years in New Orleans. Their only son, Dr. Joel Gray, died in his 40's in New Orleans, leaving two daughters. Lillie's daughter, Troyce, married Roderick Smith, and lived in Washington, D. C.

Seventh in line is Sarah Rebecca. She was born 17 May 1870. Sarah united with Pisgah Baptist Church when she was 18 and lived out her days in the vicinity of that church. She married William H. Fitzgerald (to her right) in 1894. They had no children. She died 9 Sep 1908, and was buried at Shiloh.

Felix Hillman is pictured holding his oldest son, Earl. Hillman was born Aug 1874. To his left is his wife, Frances Lessie, one of two Nutt sisters to marry James P.'s sons. They were daughters of Samuel David Nutt of Butts Co., Georgia. Lessie died in 1917, leaving three children. The other two were Harvey and Treece. Hillman lived in Union Co., Arkansas for a time and remarried there to Josie Jackson. He then moved to San Antonio, Texas, where he was successful in the insurance business.

Harriet E. was born Oct 1875. She married George W. Mabry, 17 Sep 1893. They are seen in the picture with their only child, Ruth, standing between them. Ruth married Harvey B. Thompson in Shreveport and they had four sons: Truett B., G. Lionel, Roland W., and Orval R. She died at age 42 at her home on Milton Street in Shreveport. Harriet and George lived in a house built in Ruth and Harvey's backyard, and raised Ruth's four sons.

George Wesley, next to last, was born in Oct 1877. He married the other Nutt sister, Georgie, 24 Dec 1899. They lived in Bernice, where he was a rural mail carrier. Their six children were: Aubrey, Reull, Seth, Troy, Harry and Era. He died in 1942, and is buried at Bernice Cemetery.

Of the children not shown, the eldest was Henry I., who was born 19 Sep 1867, and died 20 Nov 1889. He was not married and is buried at Mt. Olive Cemetery.

James Allen is not shown. He was born 18 Mar 1880. Allen married Ada Coplen and lived near Pisgah. They had four children: Exer, Boyce, Malta and Colvin. He died 24 Jun 1959, and is buried at Pisgah.

My grandmother, Mary Caroline, is not in the picture. But that helps to date the picture. She was married 17 Jan 1900, in this house, then went to live with her husband, Harry T. Glass, and his widowed mother, Roseanna Ellen Nutt Lewis Glass, south of Shiloh Baptist Church. That fact, together with the apparent ages of the small children, helps date the picture to 1900, probably in the summer. Mary Caroline was born 28 Jul 1882, in this house, as were the other children. Mary Caroline's children were: Eunice (my mother), Myrtle and Henry Morel. After the death of her husband, she lived in Bernice until Eunice and Myrtle graduated from high school in 1918, then moved to Shreveport, where she lived until her death 20 Nov 1964. She is buried at Forest Park Cemetery in Shreveport, Louisiana.

The youngest child was Selma A., born 17 Mar 1894. She died 1 June 1896, and is buried at Mt. Olive.

This old home is silent now. A caretaker's mobile home sits where the family is standing in the picture. The impression one gets on visiting the place is that it is much smaller than it appears in this picture, yet 13 people lived in this house....this old house was truly a HOME.

CIVIL SUIT COURT RECORDS IN UNION PARISH, LOUISIANA

Arelia Breed has been sorting and refileing old Civil Suit Records in the courthouse at Farmerville, Union Parish, Louisiana.

She has found some that contain interesting family information, such as the place of marriage, the maiden names of wives, one's parents name and where they were living.

These suits were filed during the days of the Works Progress Administration and are filed according to the number as found by the WPA workers and not according to the year filed.

Of great interest is to find a name for which one has been searching listed as a debtor when an estate is sued.

Mrs. Breed even found an 1802 original Spanish Land Grant, copy of which appears in this issue of The Genie.

She is spending countless hours helping to re-organize these files since personnel of the Office of the Clerk of Court have limited time to check after each researcher. Remember to return material to its proper place when researching in any facility.

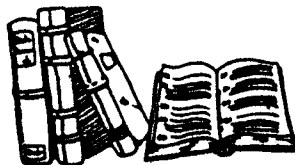

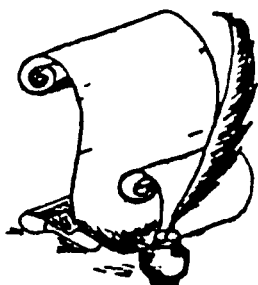
HISTORIC NEW ORLEANS COLLECTION

The Historic New Orleans Collection has surveyed nine cemeteries in New Orleans: St. Louis I and II, Lafayette I and II, Cypress Grove, Odd Fellows Rest, Greenwood, and St. Joseph I and II. This cemetery project is an excellent source of information about families and craftsmen in New Orleans.

The survey meticulously documents every tomb in each cemetery. An 8 x 10 black and white photograph, tomb description, condition report, and a copy of the tomb inscription exist for each tomb.

The information on the tombs has been indexed according to name, country of origin, and tomb builder and carvers.

THE SAMPSON STEWART FAMILY AND LETTERS FROM EARLY SHREVEPORT

Morris Monroe Stewart, of Monroe, Louisiana, Membership Chairman of The Clan Stewart Society of America, is the author, with Virginia May Murdick Stewart, of "The Sampson Stewart - A Family Record." It is a 275 page genealogical record of William Stewart, born 1756, in Virginia, and his descendants. This book is reviewed in this issue of The Genie and a copy of the book is being donated to The Genealogy Department of Shreve Memorial Library in Shreveport.

Known children of this William Stewart and his wife, Mary, are William, Jr., (b. 1783 NC ?); Bartholomew G. (1786 VA); Andrew C., 1788 VA; Elisha, 1749, VA; Mary "Polly", 1796 VA; Nancy, 1802 TN.

Monroe Stewart is a great grandson of Elisha, whose brother, Bartholomew, was the first registrar in Hickman County, Tennessee, moving to Perry, then Madison County, TN in the 1820's, rearing a family about eight miles north of Jackson. One of the sons, Henry Taylor Stewart, located in DeSoto County, Mississippi, in the 1840's, then moved his family to Louisiana, where they are found in the 1850 Federal Census of Bossier Parish, Louisiana.

Letters written by Henry Taylor Stewart and his nephew, Adolphus Snodgrass from Shreveport to Tennessee are included in the Mississippi Valley Collection of the Brister Library at Memphis State University in Memphis, TN. Filed under "Jones-Black Letters", they were placed in the library by Miss Sara Margaret Black, of Jackson, TN, who wrote the following in 1985: "The Stewarts were prolific letter writers. Henry Taylor Stewart, B. G.'s son, lived in Shreveport, La., and had a home on the main street and one in the country south of town. He wrote a vivid description of conditions during the yellow fever epidemic. My grandfather's brother, Adolphus Snodgrass, also lived and died in Shreveport."

These letters describe conditions in the Shreveport area in the 1850's, when the city had a population of 700 and over 300 died of yellow fever.

Henry T. Stewart and Martha, his wife, have five children listed with them on the 1850 Bossier Parish Census: Louisiana, age 11; Bartholomew, 10; Sarah (Sally A.), 8; Martha E., 4; and Eliza J., 2. A Thomas J. Richards, 19 is living with them. Sarah later married Allen W. Marshall. Bartholomew entered service with CSA at Camp Moore, 4 June 1861. He married Mary Lawless in Rapides Parish in 1867.

Elizabeth Stewart, sister of Henry Taylor Stewart, married Joseph Snodgrass 7 February 1828, and had three children: Adolphus, Sally J., and Elizabeth. The family moved to Yalobusha County, Mississippi, where the mother died 25 May 1835. After her death, Joseph went to Texas, serving with Republic of Texas during the Mexican War. For this service he received a headright and he and another man operated a cattle business on that land. According to family legend, Joseph died in the 1840's and was buried on the banks of the Brazos River. His son, Adolphus E. Snodgrass, went to Shreveport and Texas in search of his father's headright to claim the land, living part of the time in Shreveport with his Uncle Henry Taylor Stewart. He died in Shreveport and is presumed to have been buried near his children "in the Shreveport burying grounds." Indications are that Joseph's partner had appropriated all of his belongings, including

the cattle and land.

Some of these letters are here transcribed. Words shown in parenthesis in these transcriptions have been added as explanation and are not in the original.

Shreveport, La. Dec. 22nd 1853

Dear Brother:-

I would commence with an apology but it is no use as none of you write to me. I have not read a letter from any of you in six months and I believe longer. We are all well and doing very well, etc.

Enclosed you will find a Power of Attorney. I want Sarah Jane and Frances to sign and do it before a Justice of the Peace and have witnesses to prove that they are legal heirs of Joseph G. Snodgrass and also to have it certified by the County Clerk that the Justice is an Acting Justice, etc. There are two, they must sign both and have them certified - any Justice knows how to fix them up, etc. This man George is to attend to all business of Snodgrass' in Texas that is not located. The portion that is located he will have no interest in - only to pay taxes, etc. Have it done and send them back to me immediately as he is going out on business in a short time and he wants them to take with him.

Dec. 23rd - I have made a good crop of cotton. Will make between forty and fifty bales. I have out about thirty bales. I had to put up a Gin House and Press that made me so late in getting out my crops. I only had four or five acres in corn and my place is three miles below town on the River (Red). I traded for a house and lot in town in the summer and moved my family to it to send the children to school. I was sending them and paying six dollars per month board for each one and I concluded it was cheapest to move to town and board them ourselves. We have three large enough to send, but we are not sending any at present but Sally.

A short time after we moved to town, the yellow fever broke out here and I sent Martha (wife) and children out to the country and they stayed away until the epidemic was over. Me and Bart went down to my place to stay. I passed backwards and forwards to town until I took the yellow fever. I then stayed in town and sent for Bart and Jeff to come and stay with me. In about three days Bart was taken too. We both had a very hard spell but both got well. I would not let Martha and children come back until we was well and the fever pretty well subsided. I had to send her word every chance that we was not dangerous to keep her away. There was two days that I did not know how it would be or which side of the fence we would fall with.

The fever lasted as an epidemic over three months. A great many ran away from town to keep clear of it. Those that stayed away escaped. There was about two hundred died out of a population of seven hundred. All whites - black negroes do not have it. It was the scarriest times I have ever seen. My house is on the most public street and in the route to the grave yard. I have seen the hearse pass with eight and ten a day.

I saw James Christian as he came through from Tennessee. He gave me all the news as far as he could recollect. Him and son-in-law and family was all well. Pressley Maulding passed through here about the first of September. He had been north to buy goods. He had been from home two months. He said the family was all well when he heard from them last. I was from town when he was here but met him in the road, and he knew me. He had run short of funds and I loaned him fifty dollars to get home on, etc.

I see a letter from Mary to George K. Wilson inquiring about business affairs. You can say to her that I have got his matters pretty well all settled. His effects lacked one hundred and eighty or ninety dollars of

paying his debts. I have paid all his arrears but eighty dollars and will have to pay it. No person knows what they owe until they die. As to Hart, I have not got a letter from him since Mary left him. I have written to him two or three times requesting him to send her money to her, but no answer from him. Pressley Maulding told me he traveled with him on a boat up Red River. He was on his way up from New Orleans and got off the boat at Alexandria with the yellow fever. He may be dead. I have not heard from him since. Christian told me that he expected that John Tomlin (Tomlinson) would be here in a few days. He has not come yet. I do not much look for him, but would be very glad to see him here.

I want you to pay the taxes on my land and don't sell it unless you get it's value for it. Keep the receipts for taxes, etc. Our town is very healthy. Myself and family are all well, etc. Martha and Children joins in respects to you all and to Mother expecially, etc.

Dear Brother: (actually Brother-in-law)

I am on board of a steam boat with Mr. James Christian. I will drop you a few lines. Myself and family are well and with pain have to inform you that we have lost our dear little Jane Eliza. She died about the first of October with fever and inflammation of the bowels. She was sick some eight or ten days. I also have the misfortune to inform you of the death of Adolphus E. Snodgrass. He was taken on Tuesday night after Christmas with a diarrhea and he let it run on him so long that it terminated in cholera and died on Thursday at 10 o'clock. He was sick about 36 hours only. Ed Watson the man he was doing business for sent for me about four o'clock on the morning before he died. He knew me but spoke but few words after I got there, but nothing relative to his situation or his affairs or relations. It was a very sudden death and unexpected to everybody. I had him buried by my two children in the Shreveport Graveyards.

I will live the next year three miles below this place on the river, etc. I have no good news to write. Times are pretty brisk and money plenty and a big crop of corn and cotton made, etc. Your inquiry about Hart and Mary and Nutes (?) business I can't tell you a word about it for I do not know anything about them. I have written two letters to Hart but haven't recieved a word from him since they left here (?).

I must close as the boat is about to bear off. Give Mother (Mrs. Bartholomew G. Stewart, Sr.-Sally Maulding) and the balance of the family my compliments and recieve for yourself and family my best respects, etc.

I this morning take my pen in hand to inform you I am well and doing as well as could be expected in this country. I have enjoyed good health ever since I wrote you last winter. You have been grumbling about my not writing you. I have been waiting for a (note?) from you or some of the balance of you until I am tired and concluded to write you again. I understood that

Bee? had moved to Louisiana _____ and _____ no _____ kind I want to see? him but my business is such that I cannot leave long enough to go ninety or a hundred miles at this time a year. This is the _____ of the _____. Crops is as sorry as you ever seen for any country. Cotton that has been planted four or five times is just now 5 or 6 leaves out little red no count? _____ corn was doing very well until snow? in April. It is sorry enough and we _____ had a great deal of rain and cold _____ matter? Farmers, overseers negroes running away frequently though our crop is as good as our neighbors. A. E. Snodgrass

I seen Uncle Henry the sixteenth of March. Him and family was well that time, and also Hart was there and well. I have not seen him since last November. Give my best love to Miss S. J. Goodrich. Also to Mrs. Burns? and tell them that I would be glad to see them but I expect it will be a many hot and tough day before I can have the pleasure of conversing with you like I could if I could see you. Tell Miss Christena Back? that I would like very much to see and to have a conversation with her. I cannot write in pen or pencil what I would like to speak to her. Write me as soon as _____ this. Write me what and how the people is doing in that old country.

I have a chance to attend to our land matters this summer and it will cost us about \$200 cost double tax for several years back double tax until we catch up to 1850. They is two tracts a head-right of 640 acres and 320 acres that Father gave his horse for a cost and surveying will be 134(?) dollars on each tract besides my expense going and coming. I will be compelled to go to Austin on the Colorado River. It is about four hundred miles from here and time and expense will be not much short of 80 or \$100, and I can settle the claims for two hundred dollars I think. Head-right claims is _____ \$100 and \$300 is _____ unlaid but _____ was laid when land plenty I reckon it _____ two hundred dollars as it was laid on choice tracts of land, and I want you and Frances to make it your study and write me which to do. Sell the claims or to hold them and risk the conveyance and try to serve it. I having looked at all around and I thought it will be best to sell the claim and be done with it, because if go to the expense and save it it will not amount to much for a long _____ time if we could save it. The reason I want to sell it is for the present. I will draw to a close sending you my best love and respects. Write to me as soon as poss-

ible. Direct your letter to Bethany, Harrison (County), Texas.

Dear Sister: -

Yours came to hand this day which was a great pleasure to me. I am always glad to read a letter from any of my relations or friends in that country. That is about all the pleasure I see or have in this life. I am in fine health and hope these few lines may reach you and all the connections enjoying the same blessing. Uncle Havra? (Henry) was present when I received your letter. He said he would write to Grandmother in a few days. His family is all well at present. Bart is a very mild rattling boy. He has grown some since he came around here, but the little girls does not look a bit larger than they did before they left Mississippi. I and Uncle Barrd (Bart) has been in a company of men today after a Texan for committing a little crime in Shreveport this morning. Though he made his escape by stealing a horse running like all hundred.

Tell Grandmother that I am most Subtely(?) stuck with a girl from Gibson County and if she throws one, I have a French girl in tow. One of the prettiest blackeyes and black curly hair that ever growed on a girl's head. She is one of the boyshois(?) sure. Tell Frances and Reab that I am in hopes they will be ready to marry by the time I get there. Make the engagements and necessary arrangements by the time I promised to be there for I will be there if they can steam on water enough raised(?) in Red and Mississippi Rivers. There has been twenty seven steam boats in this trade this season. I have had one of my school mates with me for a week from Mississippi. He is fortunate(?) fellow. His name is Hester. He will leave tomorrow for Vicksburg. Crops look very well before the frost on the 21st of the present month. Crops is a slim chance now. Talk about the South being warm, but the cold pinches as tight here as it does there and lasts as long according to my knowledge and then summers is very trying to any person in this country. In West Tennessee and North Mississippi is a better place than this although I can make more money here than I can there for the simple reason that everything brings nearer it's worth here than it does there and a better place for trade than that. I believe that is richer country land than this.

I have not heard anything more about our land afar. I am afraid it is all trouble and expense for no profit to be derived from it. I am looking for returns from Austin every day. I wrote Mr. Stickney a letter concerning it. He is my attorney or counselor there. If I can't bring it through, it is no use bor anybody else to try.

I believe I have given you all the news at present. Give my best respects to all inquiring friends and recieve the same for yourself this April 24th, AD 1852.

Dear Sister: -

Once more I take my pen in hand to inform you that I am in existence yet and in fine health. I got your letter dated March the 20th which gave me the greatest of satisfaction to hear from you all and know you was getting along through the world and to people generally. It makes me particularly happy to hear from there. Nothing gives me more satisfaction than to get a letter from you or any of the connections. I have nothing new to write to you. I ran into Uncle Henry (Stewart) this evening. His family is all well except Aunt Martha. She has chills and fever. I saw young Wilson last Sunday. He was just from B. G. Stewart's. He left them all well. He said that B. G. and J. N. Smith was at work like Turks a farming on the river. I have not seen either of them in some time. I do not know how they are doing. We are about 60 miles apart and no _____ in _____ would know no way to go than? the river.

Grandmother requested me to tell Louis Ann to write to her(?). I am sorry that I cannot do it as she bid me. She died about a week before I got your letter. She died in Shreveport about the first of April. Uncle Henry then moved five miles below town on the river.

I went and attended to that land again. I redeeded? and taxes paid on nine hundred and sixty acres. Fourteen hundred and seventy six acres head-right claim liking? yet I think we can make that tell yet. Father (Capt. J.G. Snodgrass) never proved up his headright. I then fled(or filed) to New Orleans? with it on Little River which was ninety miles and found William Reed who was in the army with him and waited on him in his sickness and burial. Also a Mrs. Stickney wife of E. Samuel Stickney who was personally acquainted with him before he went to the army. A. E. Snodgrass I got William Reed and this lady and went to Clerk's office knowed by them that this headright never had been (got)? out and then came back to Shreveport and proved by H.T.S. (Henry Taylor Stewart) and B.G.S. (Bart G. Stewart, Jr.) that I was the heir of Joseph G. Snodgrass and then went back to Texas and gave claim to one of the members of the legislature twenty five dollars to write a petition and fix affidavits all up right.

N.B.- This has been done by making an application to the legislature and then grant us the land on the headright and then I can lay it on my vacant land that has not been filed in Texas and sell the claim if we should be lucky enough to get it. I am afraid it will cost me more than it is worth, The cost and traveling expense on it now is one hundred and nineteen dollars. A neat calculation besides times going and coming when we get it. There is no vacant land between here and the Wichita Mountains in Santa Fe for when I was at the last house on little river they told me then that there was not one house up the river in two hundred miles.

I will draw to close sending you manifest? love and all the family. Give my best respects to Mrs. Bock? family. Nothing more until death. Your affectionate brother.

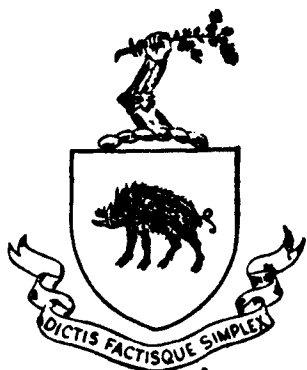

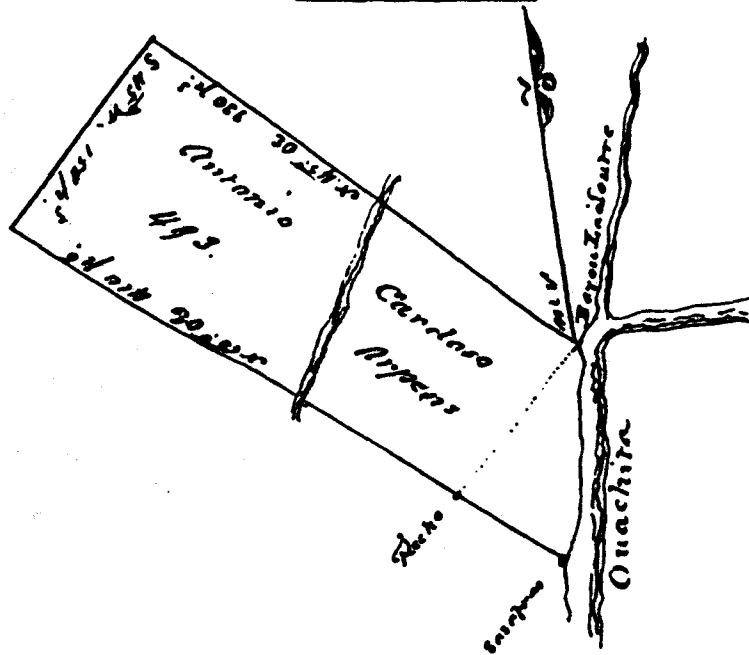

MARRIAGES AND OBITUARIES FROM THE NEW ORLEANS CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Prior to the Civil War the combined branches of the Methodist Church made it the largest Protestant denomination in the United States. After the division of the church on a sectional basis in 1844, the Methodists maintained book publishing houses in several locations. Most conferences also published a weekly newspaper, usually bearing the title of Christian Advocate, further identified by the name of the city of publication or the sponsoring conference.

The Louisiana Conference, formed in 1847, when it was separated from the Mississippi Conference, sponsored the New Orleans Christian Advocate from 1851, until it ceased publication in 1946. Originally created at a conference in 1850, to serve the Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Arkansas Conferences, only the Louisiana and Alabama Conferences actually sponsored the publication when it began February 8, 1851. The Mississippi Conference added its sponsorship in 1858, and the North Mississippi Conference joined in 1883. Alabama withdrew its support in 1880, and Arkansas never officially participated.

With primary emphasis on religious news, it was a complete newspaper for the subscriber, of whatever denomination. As a general newspaper, it compared favorably with the New Orleans Times and the New Orleans Picayune.

The marriage announcements were usually sent in by the minister who performed the ceremony and were very brief. The obituaries were sent in by ministers, members of the family, or a friend of the deceased.

Publication was suspended during the Civil War period of 1861 through 1865.

Few copies of the original paper exist today and microfilm copies are not available in many libraries.

Realizing that these pages contained much information valuable for genealogical research, E. M. Tipton and Ema, his wife, in the 1970's obtained microfilm copies of The New Orleans Christian Advocate, and began the tremendous project of extracting the marriages and obituaries. Marriages and Obituaries From the New Orleans Christian Advocate 1851-1860 With Complete Index, Volume One was published in 1980.

The illness and death of Mrs. Tipton prevented their planned publication of other volumes. (Volume One is still available from E. M. Tipton, 4810 Barksdale Boulevard, Bossier City, LA 71112, at a cost of \$25.00)

Mr. Tipton has made his microfilm and microfilm reader available to the editor of THE GENIE for these further extractions from the NEW ORLEANS CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE.

Mr. BUHLER was among the first American settlers in this section of the country, and for many years in the old time was Sheriff of East Baton Rouge Parish. A large portion of the City of Baton Rouge at one time belonged to him, and previous to the war he was estimated a wealthy man. He had retired to his plantation. Mr. BUHLER was over 80 years of age; his remains were brought to this city this morning, and interred in the Magnolia Cemetery.

From the Montgomery correspondent of the Southern Christian Advocate. On Friday last was buried in our city cemetery, by the side of his little boy "Sunshine", Rev. Edwin BALDWIN, of the Mobile Conference. He died on Tuesday of apoplexy in Selma. Had he lived to the 28th of this month, he would have been 38 years old. He was born in Franklin County, Georgia, father a lawyer. Connected with the Methodist Protestant Church, he began to preside in 1851 and filled pastorates at Uniontown, St. Francis St., Mobile, Columbus, Franklin St., Montgomery and Selma. While in Selma, during the past year, in association with Rev. F. M. GRACE, he had established the Messenger, a daily paper.

Mrs. Sarah GEORGE died suddenly (it is supposed of heart disease) in Mobile County, Alabama, the 31st of January 1866, in the 83d year of her age. She was born in the State of South Carolina soon after the close of the Revolutionary War, her father (Reuben TURNER) having been a soldier in the American army for years. Early in life she was married to Travis GEORGE, and in 1810 removed to Alabama, settling in Mobile County, where she remained until her death. She left more than twenty children and grandchildren.

Mrs. Ridley J. WILLS died at her son-in-law's residence, Mr. Jordan BAILEY's, Hinds County, Miss., on the 16th of December 1865. Mrs. WILLS was a native of Virginia, but for many years a resident of Tennessee. At the beginning of the war she went to Texas to escape the horrors of the impending struggle. The storm passed over, and she then earnestly desired to return to her Tennessee home in Brownsville. Her son, Dr. WILLS, hastened to her help, and started home, got to her son-in-law's, where, surrounded by her children and servants, she died in her 78th year.

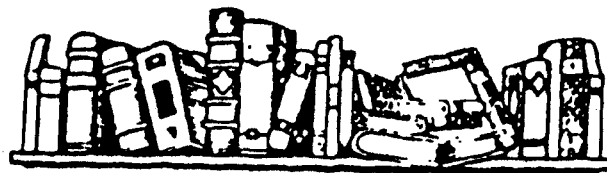

SPRINGRIDGE CEMETERY

Caddo Parish, Louisiana

Springridge is located at the intersection of Louisiana Highways 169 and 525 in southeast Caddo Parish, Louisiana. The cemetery is on a road directly east of the town.

Notes of the late O. C. Roscoe dated 27 Mar 1932, recorded 59 graves. More than 28 years later, 20 June 1970, Bill Randolph reported this cemetery had been heavily vandalized and that he could find only 32 graves.

Eighteen years have elapsed since the Randolph recordings, 56 years since Roscoe's notes. Realizing that both sets of notes are valuable history for anyone searching for evidence of burial in this cemetery, the two sets of records are here combined. The first listing is from the notes of O. C. Roscoe. If a listing was made later by Randolph that information is also supplied and is marked with an asterisk (*) (There is some variation.)

TWELVE WAYS TO GET MORE GENEALOGY FROM PUBLIC OFFICIALS

Correspondence with public officials requires a special approach. Clerks are besieged with genealogy requests and they will eventually get to your letter. Some agencies have a 6-8 month waiting period because their staff is small and the demand is great. They select those letters for reply which can be easily answered within the time they have to spend and those which contain payment for their services; others are set aside for a more appropriate time—a time which may not come.

1. Keep your letters brief and to the point. Clerks are not interested in your family tree nor the stories that enhance it.

2. Use correct addresses. Consult *WHERE TO WRITE FOR VITAL RECORDS: BIRTHS, DEATHS, MARRIAGES, AND DIVORCES* (U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington DC 20402. Current edition \$3.95). *NAMES AND NUMBERS* (New York: John Wiley and Sons, 1978 and later editions) included county and state record officials and is available in most public libraries.

3. Address officials by their correct title. *THE HANDBOOK FOR GENEALOGICAL CORRESPONDENCE*, revised edition (Logan, UT: Everton Publishers, 1974) includes the most used titles for church and civil officials and for military personnel. Check a copy at your nearest genealogical library or order a copy from Everton's (Box 468, Logan, UT 84321) for your personal library.

4. Leave blanks between the questions you pose so the clerk can write in the answers. Even when you request a birth certificate, the clerk may write comments directly on your letter—it saves time and taxpayers' money.

5. Always include a SASE (self addressed, stamped envelope) with each request for information. This gives you a better chance of an early reply even when there is no information on file.

6. Include your return address on your letter. Clerks do not have time to double-check for return addresses or to write them on the body of your letter.

7. If your first letter does not bring a reply, send a courteous reminder. Refer to the letter you sent, give the check number and date (if you enclosed money), briefly restate your request, and send another SASE in case your first letter went astray.

8. If the clerk says there is no entry, wait a couple of months and try again. It may take more than one request to get the information you want.

9. Be sure you ask for the right document. If you ask for a probate packet, the clerk will look for an entry in the probate index. If your ancestors' property did not go through probate, there will be no entry. Property can also be transferred by deed or quit-claim when a man dies.

10. Request a photocopy of the original record, not a certified extract. The cost is usually the same but you get all the information the record contains, not just what will fit on the abstract form.

11. Calculate search dates carefully. The Period Alproximation Chart tells you how to calculate dates for birth, marriage, and death. If you lack a complete date request a five-year search. Clerks vary in their search policy-some search for 12 months, some search only the date you specify, some search for a five-year period. If you request a search for a common surname, also supply age, specific year, volume, and page number if you can. Many clerks will not look for Smith or Jones unless you supply these details.

12. Be considerate of a clerk's time and express appreciation for their help. If you are sent a form to fill out, fill in the blanks with your information and return it. When clerks go out of their way to help you, send a thank you.

1883 MANSFIELD COLLEGE PRESIDENT MURDERED

Rev J. L. Borden, president of Mansfield La Female College, Mansfield, for the last two years was shot and killed this morning by Rev Benjamin F Jenkins, Jr at his father's store. Borden was speaking to Jenkins brother Ned when fired upon by Jenkins. The ball hit his watch and caused just a bruise. Borden then ran down to William and Hobgood's store, 2 doors below when he was fired on again by Jenkins. Just outside the store Jenkins shot him again, this time in the leg and Borden fell. Jenkins advanced to Borden's feet and fired again at the forehead shooting out his brains. The cause of the killing was over a 17 year old daughter of a well known sugar planter of this state (La) and the rumored affiancee of Mr. Jenkins, and also a student for the past session at the Mansfield College. She and Jenkins left here by train for her home Thursday where Jenkins remained about 2 weeks with her. Between here and Robilene, 40 miles distant, it is rumored she conferred to Jenkins that she had been ruined by Borden. Borden has been engaged in teaching for years having had charge of colleges at Monroe and Homer, La for years past. He will be buried tomorrow from the college building, where he now lies ready for burial. Jenkins immediately surrendered. William Keithly was the only witness.

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The complete name index of this hardback volume provides easy access to the genealogical information extracted from the marriages and deaths appearing in The New Orleans Christian Advocate of this period. This newspaper, under the sponsorship of the Louisiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was a weekly publication. The marriage and death notices it carried, while primarily devoted to Methodists who were members of the sponsoring conference, did not exclude non-members. Consequently, while readers with Methodist ancestors from the South will find this valuable research material, no one, particularly of a Protestant background, should fail to examine it carefully. The Tiptons purchased a complete set of microfilm of the original publications and laboriously extracted the information from the original columns. While their intention was to publish other volumes of this work, the death of Mrs. Tipton several years ago, curtailed those plans and this is the only volume available. With Mr. Tipton's co-operation, however, the microfilm has been made available to The Genie and its editor has extracted marriages and deaths from Volume XII, the first issue dated 20 January 1866. Extracts from this Volume XII begin on page 19 of this issue of The Genie. (Publication of the New Orleans Christian Advocate was suspended during the Civil War period of 1861 through 1865.) 346 pages, 8½ x 11.

In 1803, The United States purchased some 544 million acres of land from France for fifteen million dollars. Thirteen states, partially or wholly, were formed from this vast unchartered land known as The Louisiana Purchase. District Land Offices were opened in New Orleans and Opelousas. Later land districts were established in Natchitoches, Ouachita and Greensburg. These same Land Districts are used today to identify lands within the State of Louisiana. In March 1844, the Louisiana State Land Office was created with the governor authorized to appoint a Register of State Lands. This index covers only entries in the U. S. Tract Books for Northwestern Louisiana District (Old Natchitoches District). This district includes the following parishes: all of Bossier, Caddo, DeSoto, Natchitoches, Red River, Sabine and Webster; most of Bienville and Claiborne; northern two-thirds of Vernon; and the western portion of Rapides and Winn.

Incidentally, the Federal Government did not give bounty land to Confederate veterans or their widows based on service in the Confederate Army or Navy. (For Confederate Bounty Land records one must research the Louisiana State Tract Books. These Confederate grants will not be found in the U. S. Tract Books.) Contains 244 pages of complete names indicating number and page of U. S. Tract Book in which land record for that individual may be found.

He married Catherine and had a family of three sons and three daughters. Brother Philipp migrated in 1754; Uncle Johann Weyrick Katterman, Jr., and his family had come to Pennsylvania in 1738; and Maria Barbara Katterman was probably also a close relative.
