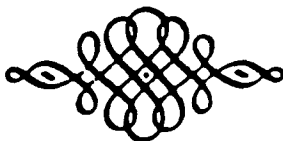

JOHN WIMBERLY HENDERSON OF TENNESSEE, ILLINOIS, AND IOWA

(The following appeared in The Cedar Rapids (Iowa) Gazette of 9 January 1904. John Wimberly Henderson died at Cedar Rapids 8 November 1908 in his 89th year.)

On July 26, 1902, His eighty-third birthday, "Uncle" John Henderson, the veteran Treasurer of the Farmers' Insurance Company, than whom no man is better known or more highly respected in Linn County, dictated to a stenographer an autobiographical sketch which The Gazette is privileged to publish in its twenty-first anniversary edition. It is a well told, modest story of a busy, useful and eventful life, replete with incidents and facts that the rising generation should know.

Almost two years have passed since Mr. Henderson wrote the sketch, but the year 1904 finds him still remarkably hale and hearty for a man of his years. Each day he is at his desk in the offices of the Insurance Company, loath to relinquish one of his old-time duties to any of the younger men in the institution.

Under the caption "A partial record of my life from infancy to the present time, with some of the incidents occurring in the settling of the states of Tennessee, Illinois and Iowa, also my near relatives," Mr. Henderson wrote:

My great grandfather Henderson was a Scotchman, and my great grandmother was an Irish woman. My grandfather and mother Henderson were natives of Virginia, and settled in Kentucky in an early day. My father William H. Henderson, was born at their home on Dicks River, Garrard County, Kentucky. My mothers maiden name was Lucinda Wimberly, a native of North Carolina. They were married at Dover, Stewart County, Tennessee, January 11, 1816. Date of my birth, July 26, 1819. My father moved to west Tennessee when I was about three years old. We took a flatboat down the Cumberland, Ohio and Mississippi rivers, and thence to a place selected for residence, about fifteen miles inland. At one of the landings where we stopped, I got out to play on a drift and slipped through and was saved from drowning by someone unknown to me at the present time. I was lifted out just as I was about to disappear under the drift.

West Tennessee, at that date, was new and heavily timbered, and wild game of nearly all kinds abundant. Wolves were so numerous it was almost impossible to raise hogs and every means was resorted to for their destruction. One was to dig pits and construct pens over them, covered with trap doors, baited with meat, and when the wolves jumped for the bait the doors tipped and let them slide in, and numbers were destroyed in this way. Turkeys were caught by constructing pens with ditches from the outside, leading under and to their centers, all covered except a place of entrance. This ditch was baited with grain and the turkeys followed the bait and found themselves caught in the pen and unable to return the way they went in.

Bears and deer were also abundant, and occasionally a panther. My father killed three deer one morning before breakfast. They were feeding near the house on the buds of felled timber. I remember helping an uncle of mine trap quail by means of a hooped net, with wings extending each side from its mouth. The net

being set, the quail were carefully driven and whole covies of quail were bagged in this way.

In the spring of 1831 my father, accompanied by my uncle, Charles Howard, left Tennessee on horseback for Illinois, to select a place there for homes for themselves and relatives. The trip extended north to Lake Michigan, then Fort Dearborn, now Chicago, I mean at a point on Lake Michigan where Fort Dearborn was located, now called Chicago. They finally decided to locate on Indian Creek, some thirteen miles from Ottawa, Illinois, and return home. Shortly afterwards a number of families set out for the place selected, among them my grandfather and mother Henderson, my uncle Rollins and John Henderson, uncle Stephen and Allen Howard, and my uncles, Singleton J. Henderson and James W. Howard, single, and Robert Norris, a hired man, sent by my father to work for him. All the above were accompanied by their families. My father remained in Tennessee, expecting to follow as soon as they were settled. I was sent along with my uncle, Allen Howard. I was then about thirteen years old. We made the trip with ox teams. It was my first trip away from home. My father gave me a small rifle, flint lock, and on my way I amused myself by shooting squirrels and other game, and no doubt, occasionally bagged some. My Uncle Allen and myself, on account of cold weather, stopped for winter on Sangamon River, some five miles from Springfield, Illinois, and early in the spring of 1832, continued the journey and reached the settlement, built a log cabin and commenced plowing for a crop.

Soon thereafter our people became alarmed by reports of Indian depredations, and having been warned by a Pottawattamie chief, concluded to pack up and leave.

Referring to this chief, reminds me of what my father related of the battle at Thames in Canada, during the war with Great Britain, in 1812 and 1814. He was in Col. Richard M. Johnson's regiment from Kentucky, and a soldier of this same regiment claimed the honor of killing Tecumseh. My father denied it and claimed that Col. Johnson killed him, and this was confirmed by Chief Shabonee, who was aid to Tecumseh, and was near him when killed. He said the person who shot him rode a gray horse and used a short gun, meaning a pistol. Colonel Johnson rode a gray horse, and no doubt did the killing. Colonel Johnson was under command of General William Henry Harrison, who in 1840 was elected president of the United States by the whig party. He died within one month of inauguration, and was succeeded by President Tyler of Virginia.

The time of our leaving the vicinity of Indian Creek was about the 17th day of May, 1832, the year of the Black Hawk war. On the day of leaving for Ottawa, Mr. Davis and one of my uncles had just returned from an observation trip to the Indian village, some miles from the settlement. During their absence rumors came that hurried us, and immediately on the return of Mr. Davis and my uncle we started for Ottawa. Mr. Davis and my uncle concluded to return to his claim, together with his family and three of my uncles, a cousin and Robert Norris went with him. On their way back they met Mr. Hall and family and persuaded them to return, all congregating at night at Davis' house at the mill. On the Monday following, the 22nd day of May, 1832 the Indians made an attack about an hour before sunset and killed fifteen men women and children, and took the two daughters of Mr. Hall captives. One of the boys made his escape by jumping down the bank of the creek and running along that under cover. Robert Norris was killed that day, having exchanged work with someone at the mill in order to help Mr. Davis in his blacksmith shop, and thereby lost his life. My relatives who returned with Mr. Hall were at work in the field in sight of the massacre and escaped to Ottawa. All the slain were scalped except Mrs. Davis. She was shot through the shoulders while sitting in a chair in the house. A man by the name of Pedegru, who was boating gravel for mill dam, left his rifle standing against the bank where he worked, and was found on the opposite side of the mill pond in shallow water, shot in the back and not scalped. The Indians were evidently in

a hurry. They took all the horses they could find and left, and there is little doubt but that they were Pottawattamie Indians who were above on the same creek, who had objected to the mill dam being built, which prevented the fish from ascending the creek to their village. The next day after the massacre some of my uncles, accompanied by soldiers went to the mill and buried the slain in one common grave.

The Misses Hall were afterward ransomed by the government from the Indians.

Our people were discouraged, and most of them left by land for their old home in the south. My Uncle John Henderson stopped in Sangamon County, and afterwards returned to his claim and lived there until his death. My Uncle Stephen Howard returned by water, and I went with him. We left Ottawa in a keel boat and where Peru is now located, took passage on a steamboat named "Caroline," to St. Louis, and thence down the Mississippi River to our home in Tennessee.

Some time after my return I attended the academy and with others, organized a circus company with permission, built our ring on a lot and fenced it in with boards, high enough to prevent people from seeing over, and on Saturdays gave a performance charging an admittance fee. We had some fairly well trained horses, spring boards, etc., and gave a pretty fair show. The attendance was good and we soon paid for the improvements and made some money after paying expenses, including our suits, etc. We had good riders, somersault actors, and the most amusing of all, I acted as clown. Our show did not come quite up to the Ringling Brothers show of today, but it was very good, considering the circumstances. I quit the circus business when I left for our new home in Illinois.

A short time after we went back to Illinois there was great excitement caused by a slave deserting his master, a Mr. Shepard. A man by the name of Moody was accused of being concerned in the escape and a mob court was held and his punishment was decided upon one hundred stripes with rawhide whips on his naked back, and to be branded with the letter "R" on his cheek. Two men were designated to carry out the sentence, which they did on the public square. My father opposed this unlawful act, and there was a great danger of a collision between the mob and law abiding people, both parties being armed. It passed without bloodshed at the time, but one of the men named Jones, who helped to whip Moody, was soon afterwards shot in a quarrel and killed, near the place where Moody was punished. Moody was banished from the state under penalty of death, and he left. Some time later, however, he sued the ringleaders and recovered several thousand dollars damages. My father became so disgusted with such proceedings that he determined to leave the state, and I remember him saying in public that he would not raise his seven sons under the influence of slavery, consequently in 1836 he left Tennessee for Illinois, by way of the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers, and settled in Putnam County on a claim purchased of a Mr. Leek. At this home I had my first experience in farming.

The country was new and our county seat, Hennepin, twenty-five miles away. We received our mail at Wyoming, seven miles away and postage on letters carried 400 miles was twenty-five cents. No postage stamps then. Our nearest physician, Dr. Thomas Hall, ten miles away. He was an Englishman and must have understood his business, as he cured me of the fever when in my eighteenth year, and I have not been under a doctor's care, since, except when by an accident I fell and injured my hip joint.

Our trading points were Peoria, Lacon and Hennepin, all situated on the Illinois River, distance from 22 to 35 miles. Some of our people went to Chicago, over 100 miles distant, to trade. The first cook stove I owned was brought from there by one of them. This was probably the first cook stove in our county. I was in my seventeenth year when we reached our new home in Illinois. Before leaving Tennessee I attended the Brownsville Academy, preparing for college, but I never went to school after that time. Had studied Greek and Latin and had made some

progress, but the oxen I drove when plowing prairie land, knew nothing of these languages and little of English, being controlled principally by the whip.

The first money I earned was making and hauling rails to fence William Ogles' farm, south about two miles from our home. My father was elected to the legislature and took me with him to Vandalia during the last session of the legislature held at that place, the capital afterwards being removed to Springfield. I had the good luck to obtain employment every other day, copying the journal of the house at \$4.00 per day.

During this time I made the acquaintance of Abraham Lincoln, Stephen A. Douglas and other prominent men, both Whigs and Democrats. I recollect an amusing incident that occurred. A man by the name of Clapp kept a store, and one member of the legislature wagered another an oyster supper that he could not call for an article in his store that Clapp could not produce. Upon arriving at the store a Goose Yoke was asked for. The proprietor went to a shelf, came back, and handed out the article, remarking that he kept them especially for the members of the legislature. In proof of this I refer to my old friend Wollf, the boss brick-maker of Cedar Rapids, who was there. He remembers me as a long legged kid.

During this session of the legislature the county of Stark was created from parts of Putnam and other counties, and Thos. Ford elected Judge in our judicial district. He appointed me temporary clerk of our circuit court. Afterwards, when of lawful age, I was appointed clerk. The first court was held at my father's house about one mile south of Toulon. Prior to this I attended court at Peoria and took lessons from William Mitchell, considered one of the best clerks in the state, and when our court convened he came and assisted me, and I soon became fairly well qualified to perform the duties of clerk.

I erected the second house in our new county seat; was the first postmaster, taught the first school in an old log cabin, and managed to earn my support. Judge Ford was afterwards elected Governor and John Dean Caton of Ottawa appointed to fill the vacancy. He removed me from the clerkship on account of my being a Whig. I was also removed as postmaster for the same cause. To make up for losing these two offices, my friends elected me recorder for four years, and later sheriff for two years, holding these two offices at the same time. I served papers as sheriff and collected taxes, which was part of my duty in the day time, and at night recorded deeds and mortgages. I frequently worked until 12 o'clock at night. After the expiration of these offices I was elected to the legislature from the district composed of Stark, Henry and Rock Island counties and during this session, with other members, boarded at the same house with Mrs. Lincoln and her children, Mr. Lincoln at that time being in Washington, having been elected from the Springfield district, to Congress. This was about the only Whig district in the state.

After the legislature adjourned I went to Washington, D. C., having recommendation for appointment to any office I desired, sent me by Mr. Lincoln from Washington. I prized this letter highly, but unfortunately it was lost and never found. Upon arriving at Washington, I concluded not to apply for a permanent position, and accepted a temporary one in the general land office. My pay was \$4.00 per day, and that was ample to pay my expenses. Office hours were from 9 o'clock a. m. to 3 o'clock p. m. Thus I had ample time to visit the senate and house of representatives, and listen to the exciting debates on the slavery question. I heard Clay, Calhoun, Benton, Jefferson Davis and other prominent men of both parties. I left Washington to attend a special session of the legislature at Springfield, and after adjournment, returned to Toulon. In 1851, I went south to visit my relatives and to look for a location. While at Quincy, Illinois, on my return north, I received a letter from my father from Iowa City, Iowa, urging me before locating elsewhere to visit him. I left Quincy and arrived at Iowa City January 3rd, 1853 and remained there some time. In the early

spring I left my father's farm in the northern part of Johnson County, and I finally located near there in Linn County. I bought 160 acres near Hoosier Grove and moved my family there in June, 1853. I cultivated this farm for several years, then sold it and bought a stock of goods and opened a store at Western College, Linn County, Iowa. I did not succeed very well, sold out and moved to Cedar Rapids in March 1865. While living on my farm I was elected by the legislature one of the regents of the Iowa State University at Iowa City, and served some time. I was also elected to represent my township on the board of supervisors, under the old township system.

After living in Cedar Rapids for about two years, I accepted employment by the Farmers Insurance Co., then a mutual company, at a salary of \$1,000 per annum. In 1868 the company was reorganized as a stock company, and I was one of the ten stockholders and elected treasurer. I have served in that capacity about thirty-four years, and I have served about the same time as treasurer of Crescent Lodge No. 25, A. F. & A. M.

I have served as senator from Linn County two terms. I was opposed by J. W. Bull the first time, and he contested the election. It cost me about \$1,500. However, I came out all right and held the position. In the second election I was opposed by F. J. Upton. My friends also elected me mayor of the city of Cedar Rapids. E. S. Hill, J. H. Smith and John B. Henderson, also officers of the Farmers Insurance Company, filled that position, rather a singular incident.

I was married in Stark County, Illinois, on the 9th day of October, 1840, to Mary Perry, daughter of Swift Perry. She died on the 15th day of April, 1847. We had three children, Lucinda W., William P. and Mary Ann. Lucinda married Dr. J. H. Smith. She died and left one son, Edward H. William P. married Emma, daughter of Dr. Wagner. He left two children, Mabel and Mary, who now lives with their mother in California. Mary Ann married Jacob A. Shuey. She resides at Red Oak, Iowa, with her husband, having four children, two married and two single. I married the second time, Elizabeth G., daughter of Capt. Butler, of Stark County, Illinois, who at our marriage had three children by a former husband. Ira Ward, Jr. Mary, one of the children, is now second wife to Dr. J. H. Smith. I had five children by my second wife, Kate W., Jno. B., Edward, George and Ella, all living except Edward. Kate W. married the second time, James E. Sevier, and now lives near Brownsville, Tennessee. She had two children by her former husband, J. C. McGregor. Jno. B. married Helen, daughter of O. P. Emery of Cedar Rapids. He has three children, Edward, Louise and Helen. George married Carrie Fleek and has two children. Ella R., married H. G. Burr.

I had six brothers, three are dead, viz—Wm. P., Stephen H. and James A. My brother Thos. J., resides at Princeton, Ills. Had four children, three married and one single. H. C. resides in California, a widower with several children. Daniel W. is located at Jefferson, Iowa, and has several children, one son, James, being quite a prominent lawyer and business man.

I have seventeen grand children and six great grandchildren. I had two sisters both deceased. One, Mary Ann, older than I, married John T. Sevier at Brownsville, Tenn. She had one daughter, Mary Ann Amanda, who was married twice and now a widow. She had no children and still resides in Tennessee near Brownsville. My sister Elizabeth died at Brownsville, Tenn., when about three years old.

My father was a Whig as far back as I can recollect. He was elected, prior to his removal to Illinois, to represent his district in the senate about the year 1834. He disliked General Jackson on account of connection with a man by the name of Overton in a law suit, whereby my grandfather and his sons and sons-in-law were dispossessed of their homes, and they always opposed him when he ran for office. He surveyed the original town of Brownsville, and acted as agent for John C. McLemore, a large owner of lands, and others. After settling in Iowa

he had a contract to survey lands for the government in western Iowa. In presidential election of 1840 he took an active part.

During an argument with a man named Garrett, at Peoria, Illinois, who stated that General Harrison was not within a mile of the battlefield of the Thames in Canada, my father gave him a blow that felled him in the street. This might be called a knockdown argument. Anyway it ended the discussion. My father would not stand it to listen to the abuse of his old commander. He was always sincere in all his convictions and ready to defend them at all times. He died at Marshalltown, Iowa, in 1865 and was buried in the cemetery there beside his wife.

Three of my brothers were lawyers and one a Methodist preacher. The other two were farmers. In my business transactions throughout my life, have avoided litigation. I think my experience as clerk of the court and sheriff in early life taught me to settle matters in dispute without litigation, considering it cheaper and best.

In the foregoing there may be some errors as to dates etc., as it is written from memory principally, not having many records for reference. It is, however, generally correct, and in closing this 26th day of July, 1902, my eighty-third birthday, will only add, "Peace and good will to all and enmity to none."

ADDENDA

Lucinda Wimberly was born 8 June 1801 in Bertie County, North Carolina, the daughter of Levi Wimberly, Jr. and his wife Mary "Polly", maiden surname unknown. Levi, Jr. was born c. 1770 to Levi Wimberly, Sr., and his wife Hannah, maiden surname also unknown. The will of John Wimberly, father of Levi, Sr., is dated 2 September 1742, and proved in Bertie County, North Carolina, 15 September 1749. Witnesses were Needham Bryan, Marten Gardner and Sarah Smith. It names his brother-in-law, John Smith, and Elizabeth, his wife, thought to have been a Smith. Children named are Ezekiel, John, Levi, Moses, Benjamin, Rachel, Sarah, Ruth and Mary. Ezekiel went to Georgia. Many descendants of Ezekiel Wimberly now live in Louisiana and Texas (Ref: Wimberly Family History Ancestors, Relatives and Descendants of William Wimberly, Pioneer from Georgia to Louisiana 1837, compiled by Vera Meek Wimberly, Conroe, Texas). Levi Wimberly, Jr., and his family went to Tennessee, and it was here in Stewart County that the young Lucinda married William H. Henderson, 11 January 1816. Here three children were born: John Wimberly, 26 July 1819; William Perry, 22 November 1821; and Mary Ann, 1817, who married John T. Sevier. Lucinda died 23 May 1823 after the family had moved to Brownsville, Haywood County, Tennessee. William H. Henderson, having been left with three small children, married Sarah Murphy Howard (born 15 September 1804, Sampson County, North Carolina to Edmond and Edith Howard) 6 November 1823. Six children were born to this union: Thomas Jefferson, 29 November 1824, Elizabeth Howard, October 1826; Henry Clay, 6 December 1827; Stephen Howard, 4 March 1829; Daniel Webster, 15 December 1830; and James Allen, January 1832. The father, William H., died 27 January 1864, and Sarah, 7 January 1879, both at the home of their son, Judge Henry Clay Henderson, in Marshalltown, Iowa. (Ref: Family Bibles, Tombstone Inscriptions and manuscript dictated by William H. Henderson in 1852 on his sixty-ninth birthday.)

John W. Henderson - Mary Perry were married October 9, 1840.

J. H. Smith and Lucy W. Henderson were married Feb. 4, 1861 in Western, Linn County, Iowa. Lucy died October 19, 1863.

J. H. Smith and Mary Ward were married Mar. 22, 1866 in Cedar Rapids.

Jacob Augustus Shuey of Shueyville, Iowa and Mary Annie Henderson were married at Western, Linn County, Iowa November 24, 1864, Rev. Martin Bowman, Minister.

John Wimberly Henderson was born July 26 AD 1819 at Dover, Tenn.

Mary Henderson was born September 29 AD 1819. This Mary Henderson was the daughter of Swift Perry, a relative of Commodore Perry. She was born in Greenbrier Co., Va.

Lucinda Wimberly Henderson was born September 19, 1841.

William Perry Henderson was born June 27th, 1843.

Mary Ann Henderson was born August 12, 1845. (In the handwriting of her daughter, Virginia Shuey Rogers, is written, "Hennepin, Ill.")

Mary E. Ward was born Jan. 3, 1848.

Harry Ward was born July 13, 1849.

Lucy Wimberly Henderson Smith died at Western Oct. 19, 1863.

The Wards were children of Mrs. E. Ward, daughter of Captain Butler of Wyoming, Illinois whom John W. Henderson married for his second wife. To them were born:

Note. With the help of these Bible Records of John Wimberly Henderson and those of his uncle, John Hope Henderson, which follow, Priscilla Reinowski submitted two supplemental applications (National Number 654713) for New Ancestors to the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution. Approved were Joseph Perry, of Washington County, Maryland (great grandfather of Mary Perry Henderson), and Christopher Singleton of Virginia (great grandfather of John Wimberly Henderson).

JOHN HOPE HENDERSON BIBLE

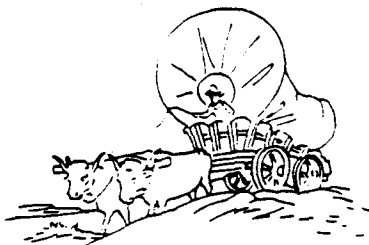
CLAN MACLELLAN IN AMERICA, INC.

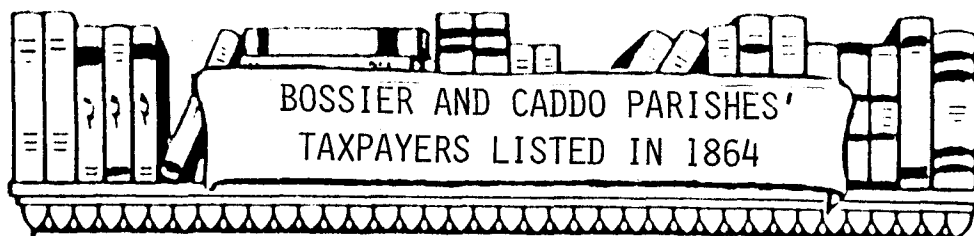

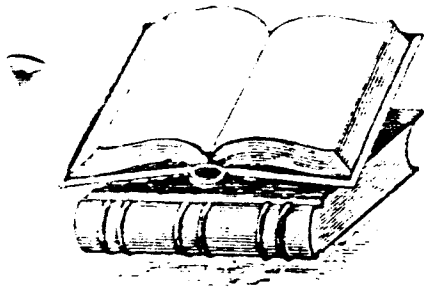

NORTHWESTERN LAND DISTRICT RECORDS AT STATE LAND OFFICE

(Reprinted here is the introduction to the book Index to U. S. Tract Book Northwestern Land District (Old Natchitoches District) In the Louisiana State Land Office, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, compiled by Ennis Mayfield Tipton in 1980. According to Mr. Tipton, much of the information in the introduction was obtained from lectures and published articles by Orey J. Poret, who was then Director of the Division of State Lands in the Louisiana State Land Office. The maps and drawings were reproduced from copies of a collection prepared by Joy Davis Eaton, who was then the State Lands Administrator with the Louisiana State Land Office. This articles is printed here with the permission of Mr. Tipton, a past president of the Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association. The book is available from Mr. Tipton, 4810 Barksdale Boulevard, Bossier City, Louisiana 71112.)

The Louisiana State Land Office is one of the finest and most complete state land offices in the South. The U. S. Tract Books covering Louisiana lands are only a portion of their holdings. Research on any individual or tract of land could very well involve other documents and materials in this office. A brief history of how the land office developed may help you determine just which records you may need.

In 1803, the United States purchased some 544 million acres of land from France for fifteen million dollars. Thirteen states, partially or wholly, were formed from this vast uncharted land known as "The Louisiana Purchase". Reaching from the Gulf Coast to the Canadian border, it was inhabited by several Indian tribes, some friendly - some hostile, by white settlers who held French, Spanish or British land grants, and by white settlers who had moved onto the land without benefit of grants. Many of them spoke no English, and some remained fiercely loyal to the country of their origin. All these were problems associated with the Mississippi Territory which had beset Congress for the past eight years and this experience proved to be of great value in dealing with this new land. (See Map I)

By Congressional Act in March 1804, the land was divided into two territories. The area north of the 33rd degree latitude was called Louisiana Territory and all land south of this line was called the Territory of Orleans.

This act empowered the President to appoint a Governor and thirteen men to serve as Legislative Council for the Territory of Orleans. The Council divided the Territory into twelve counties: Acadia, Attakapas, Concordia, German Coast, Iberville, Lafourche, Natchitoches, Opelousas, Orleans, Ouchita, Pointe Coupee and Rapides. In 1807, the Territory of Orleans was re-divided into nineteen counties or parishes. The term "county" was gradually dropped and by 1845 was discontinued altogether so that the State of Louisiana uses only the designation of "parish".

By act of Congress in 1805, the President was authorized to appoint district land registers and a Board of Commissioners to handle all private land claims - to receive, arrange, classify and make records of all papers and documents pertaining to each claim. Residents holding a French, Spanish or British land grant were required to appear before the Board of Commissioners with witnesses, affidavits and other evidence to prove their grant was valid. Decisions of the Board were recorded by the registers and reports were sent to Washington, D. C. (See Map II)

District Land Offices were opened in New Orleans and Opelousas. Later land districts were established in Natchitoches, Ouchita and Greensburg. These same Land Districts are used today to identify lands within the State of Louisiana. (See Map III)

Surveyors were sent into the Territory of Orleans and by 1807, had established a base line and principal meridian. The base line, running east and west, was an extension of the boundary line between Mississippi and Spanish West Florida. The principal meridian ran north and south in the approximate center of the Territory. Using the system of townships and ranges to survey the land, monuments were set every six miles along the base line and principal meridian to serve as main points for later surveys to lay out squares six miles wide and six miles long, re-divided into one mile square sections of 640 acres each. (See Map IV)

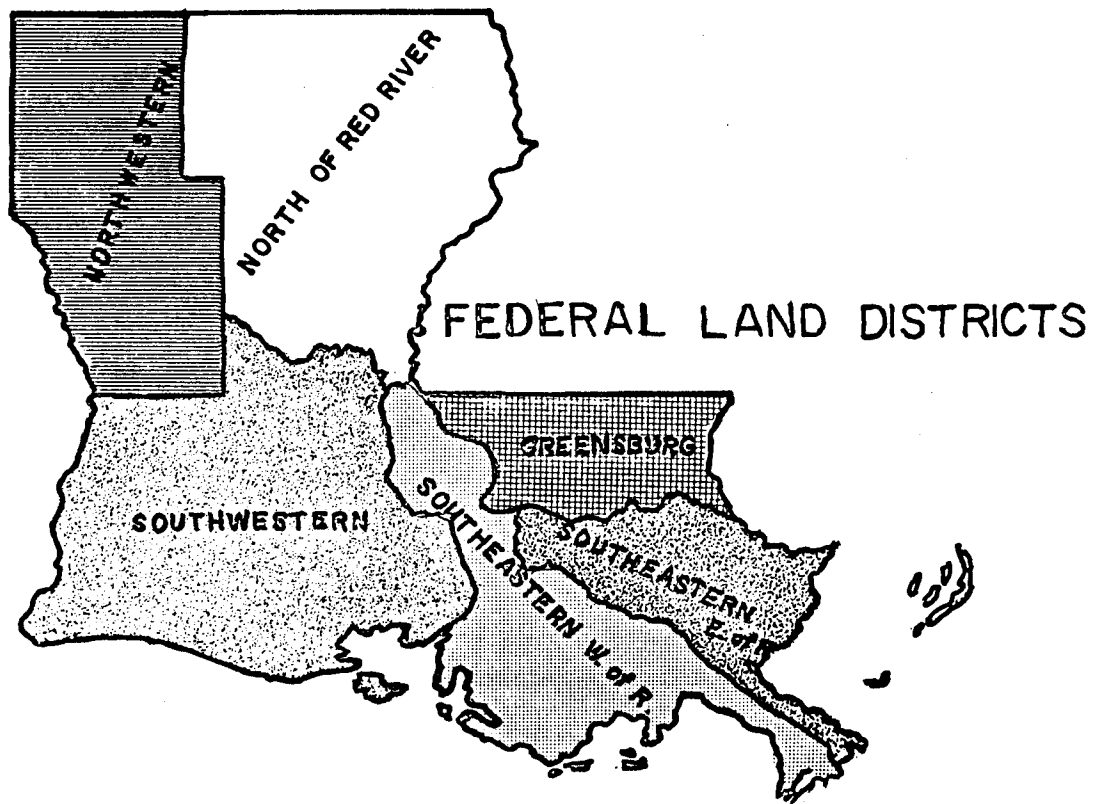
Waterfront property along navigable lakes, rivers and streams was especially valuable since these waterways served as public transportation routes. Therefore the surveyors laid out sections that were less than 640 acres and more or less triangle or wedge shaped, with the narrow side along the water front. The usual size of waterfront property was from six to twelve arpents wide and forty arpents deep. Plats of some townships with several navigable streams have 100 or more sections instead of the usual thirty-six. (See Map V)

All approved private grants within a township were designated on the township plat before surveying and plotting the rest of the township as vacant lands. Lands granted to Indians residing in the Territory of Orleans were also shown on the township plats. (See Map VI)

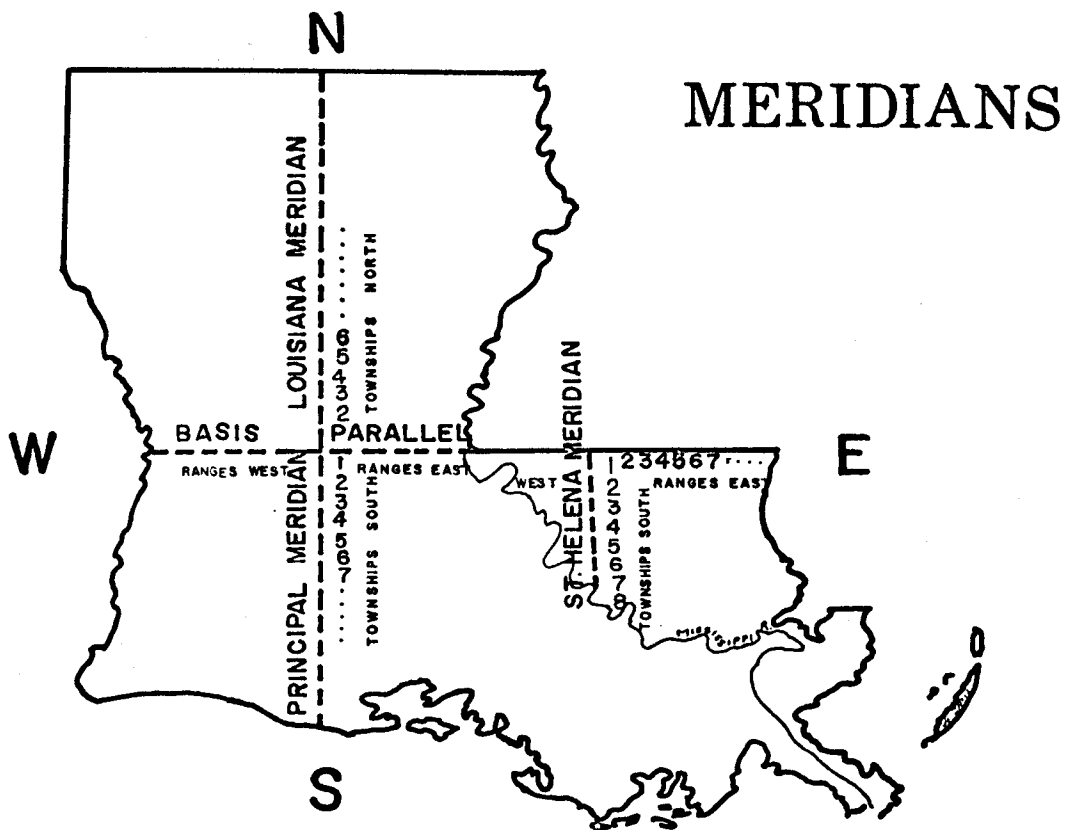
In 1812, the Territory of Orleans with the addition of the Florida Parishes, was admitted to the Union as the State of Louisiana with twenty-five parishes or counties, 76,556 citizens, 27,785,000 acres of land and 3,269,000 acres of navigable lakes, rivers and streams.

At this time, the State of Louisiana owned only the beds or bottoms of navigable waterways, but not one single acre of land. Title to all land in the Territory of Orleans had to be secured from the federal government by approved land grants or by direct purchase as provided by Congressional acts.

The Act of 1806, provided that the 16th section of each township be set aside for schools. If the 16th section did not consist of 640 acres due to private land claim or a navigable body of water, then some other section of 640 acres was substituted for the usual 16th section. In 1827, the Seminary of Learning Act granted Louisiana the right to select two entire townships of land for use in establishing seminaries of learning under direction of the State Legislature. In 1841, Congress granted some 500,000 acres of land to the State of Louisiana to be sold for not less than \$1.25 per acre, with proceeds used to build roads, dig canals and thus encourage more settlers to move into the state. The selection and sale of these lands were under direction of the State Legislature.

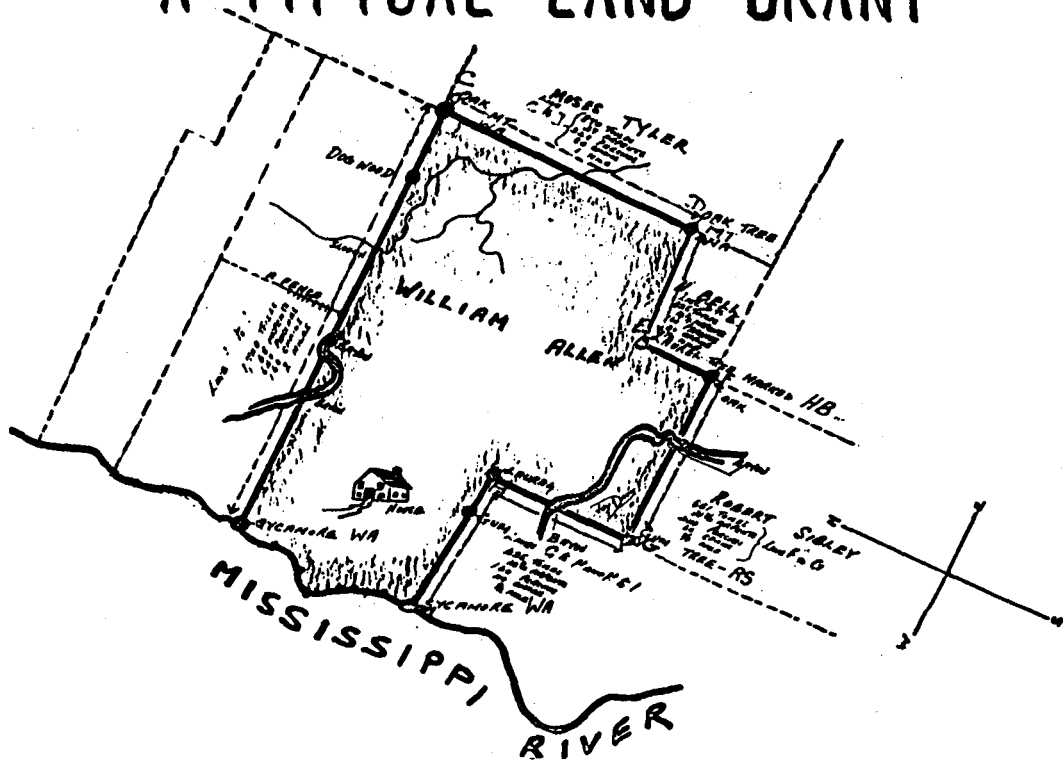

Louisiana Purchase 1803

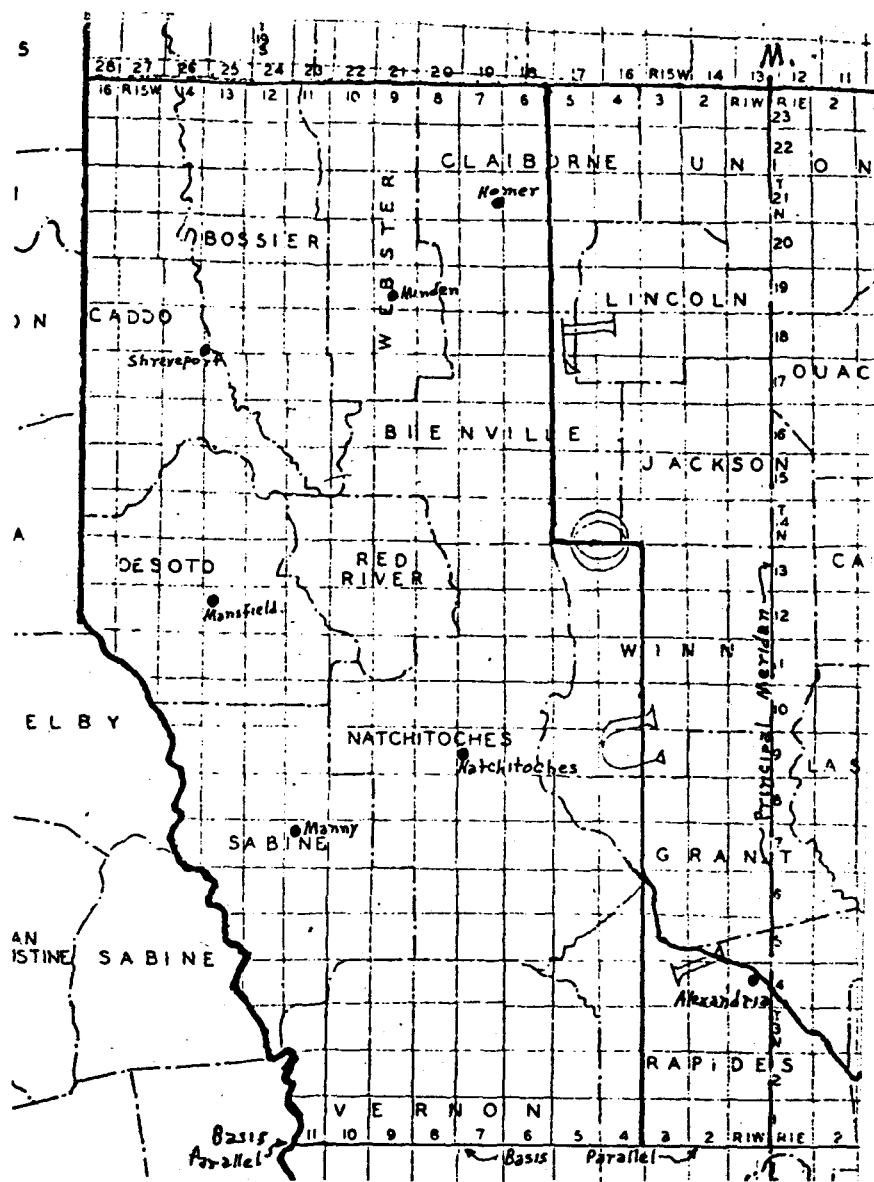

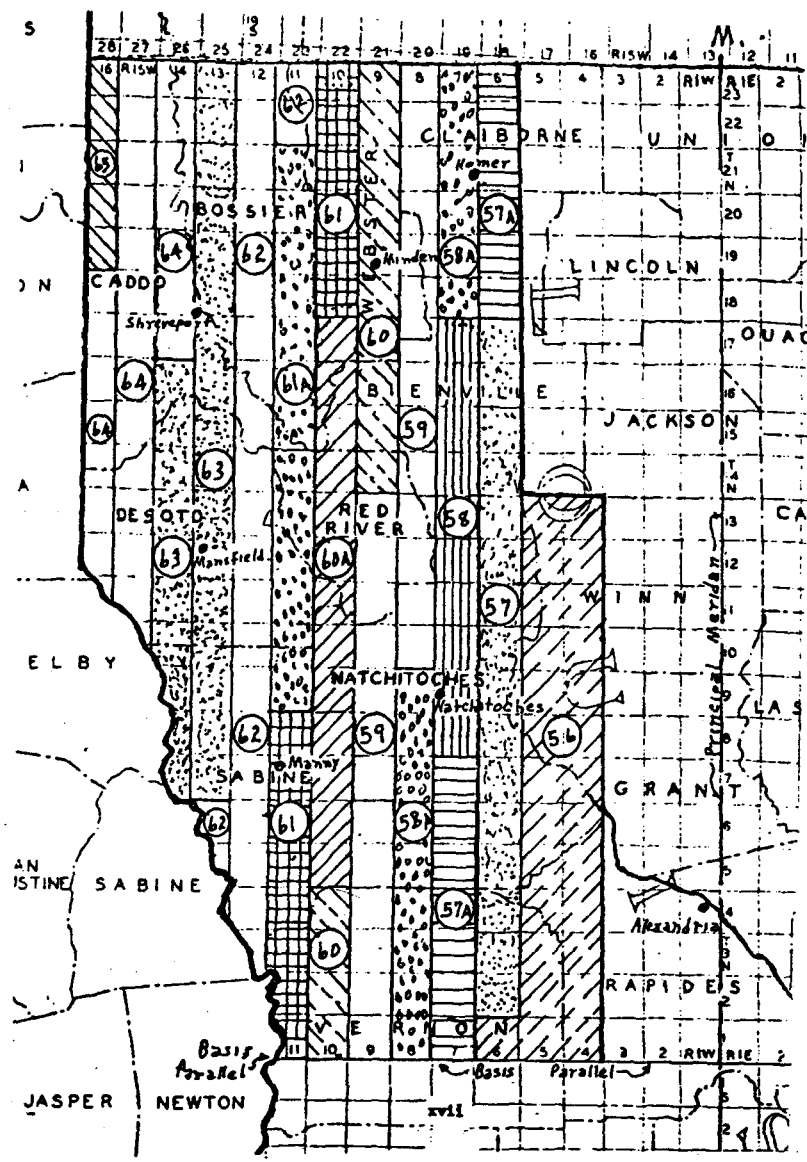
A TYPICAL LAND GRANT

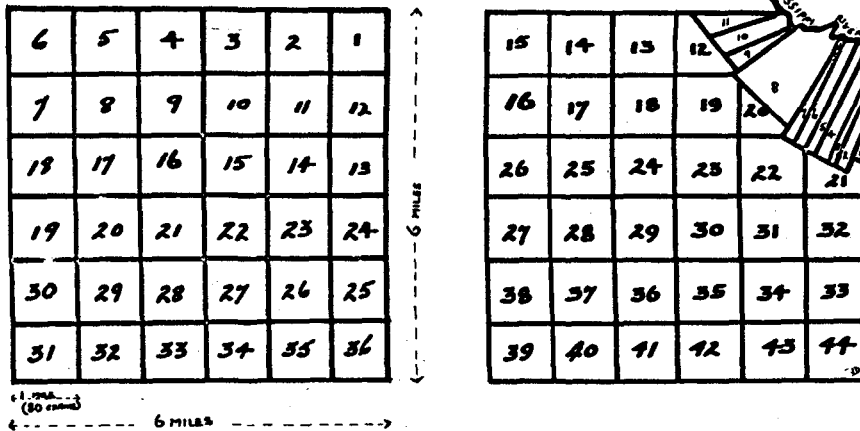

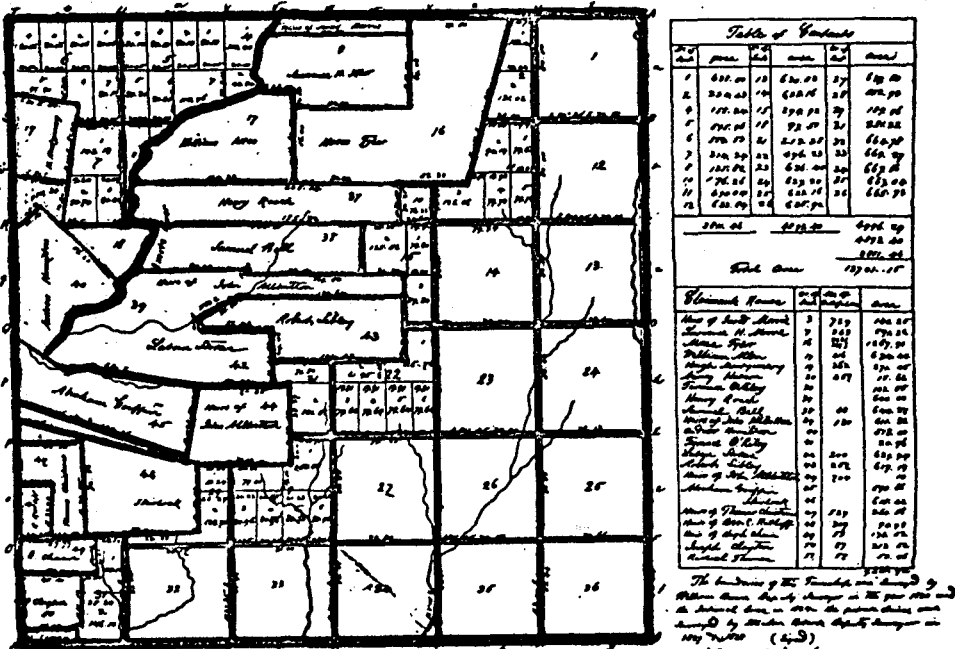
TOWNSHIP PLATS

In March 1844, the Louisiana State Land Office was created with the governor authorized to appoint a Register of State Lands. Swamp Land Grant Acts of 1849 and 1850 authorized the State to select and acquire title to any vacant lands that were swampy in character. As a result, the State of Louisiana acquired title to some ten million acres of swamp land, much of which was sold to individuals, with some wet lands going to levee boards or other state agencies.

The U. S. Military Bounty Land Act of 1847, granted 160 acres of vacant public land wherever desired for one year's service in the Mexican War to encourage men to enlist for duty in that war. In 1850 and 1851, Congress allowed veterans of the old Indian wars and War of 1812, between 1783-1835, to select up to 160 acres of vacant federal land anywhere they desired and to obtain title by direct Military Bounty grant or by purchase with Military Warrant scrip. Veterans who did not wish to move into some new land frequently sold their scrip to non-veterans. Additional bounty land was granted to veterans of the Revolutionary War. Later, widows of these veterans were granted up to 160 acres of vacant federal land of their own choosing and many of them applied for and received this bounty land. The records of these bounty land transactions are found in the U. S. Tract Books.

Louisiana's bounty land acts provided that Confederate veterans or their widows could select up to 160 acres of vacant State owned land. The records of these State bounty land grants will be found in the Louisiana State Tract books.

In 1862, a Congressional Act allowed any person who was head of a family or 21 years of age to homestead up to 160 acres of vacant federal land. Louisiana state laws also allowed Louisiana citizens to homestead up to 160 acres of vacant State owned land. However, in 1962, all homesteading of land in Louisiana was stopped due to a shortage of vacant land in the State.

Federal surveyors were appointed for the Territory of Orleans in 1805. In 1831, the U. S. Surveyor General opened an office in Donaldsonville to serve as headquarters for all local surveyors. At the end of the War Between the States, this office was moved to New Orleans and closed in 1910. All survey notes and plats on file in the Surveyor General's Office were given to the Louisiana State Land Office. The Federal District Land Registers and Offices, also created in 1805, were later consolidated into one office which closed in 1927, with all their records being given to the Louisiana State Land Office.

These Surveyors records and U. S. Tract Books cover every acre of land in the State of Louisiana. The U. S. Tract Books show first transfer of title from the U. S. Government to the State of Louisiana or private ownership. Any subsequent transfer of this title of State owned lands will be found in the Louisiana State Tract Books. Sale of land by private owners will be found in the courthouse where the land is located.

This index covers only entries in the U. S. Tract Books for Northwestern Louisiana Land District (Old Natchitoches District). This district includes the following parishes: All of Bossier, Caddo, DeSoto, Natchitoches, Red River, Sabine and Webster; most of Bienville and Claiborne; northern two-thirds of Vernon; and the western portion of Rapides and Winn. Records in the Tract Books are by township, range, section, portion of section, by whom acquired, price paid, date of transaction and certificate number, extending in a straight line across two facing pages in the books. Once title to U. S. Land was transferred to the State or to an individual for any reason, the U. S. Tract Book Records were closed on that particular piece of land. (Se Map VII)

1867 LEGISLATIVE ACT CHANGED CLAIBORNE AND UNION PARISH BOUNDARY

Arelia Breed, who does much research in the records of Union Parish, Louisiana, has sent The Genie a copy of the following act of the Louisiana Legislature of 23 March 1867, which was found among the papers on file of Union Parish Civil Suit #249D, M. A. Talbot and Son vs. B. N. St. John.

This change in the boundary line between the parishes of Claiborne and Union explains why some families who were in Claiborne Parish on the 1850 and 1860 Census were in Union Parish in 1870 without having moved.

Incidentally, Talbot lost the suit since he described land that was in Union Parish but quoted it as lying in Claiborne.

AN ACT

TO CHANGE THE BOUNDARY LINE BETWEEN THE PARISHES OF CLAIBORNE AND UNION.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, in General Assembly convened, That the boundary line between the parishes of Claiborne and Union be changed so as to include the east half of section number thirteen, township number twenty-one, north, of range number four, west, within the parish of Union.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That this act take effect from and after its passage.

CATO LEE

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER



By Carroll Heard Goyne, Jr.

One of my ancestors who served in the American Revolution was Cato Lee. Cato was born in Prince George Co., VA. in 1759, and died in Wilcox Co., AL 26 Sept. 1836. He served in the North Carolina Militia from Johnson Co., NC. In part payment for his service in the Revolution, Cato received a five-dollar bill with two tobacco leaves etched thereon, printed by Hall & Sellers in 1776. Cato gave this bill to his son, Martin Battle Lee, who died in Union Parish, LA, 28 Mar 1884. Batt Lee, in turn, gave the bill to his son John Martin Lee, Sr., and he gave it to his son, John Martin Lee, Jr. The last reported possessor of this bill was William Burch Lee, son of John, Jr., who died in Shreveport, LA, in 1938. This writer would like to obtain a photo of this bill, if the present possessor can be identified.

DAR records show the burial place for Cato Lee, Pvt NC Militia, as Snowhill Cemetery, Wilcox County, Alabama. In August 1989, my wife and I set out to locate the grave of my Revolutionary ancestor and photograph it. The difficulties encountered in accomplishing this task prompted this article.

Driving west from Montgomery on highway US 80, we turned southwest on Alabama Route 21. Upon reaching the road sign designating the community of Snowhill, we found it to be little more than a combination store/post office. A lady there said that she knew of no old cemetery near by. She suggested that we return to Furman where an elderly lady in the post office might know about such things. We informed her that we had not seen Furman. She said to go back about 2 miles to the blinking yellow light and turn north. We would soon see the post office. She was accurate in her instructions. At the Furman post office, we met an elderly lady, upward of 80 years old, who said that there were two graveyards nearby. One was behind the church and the other, which was older, down a dirt road a distance. An elderly gentleman who was present took up outside and pointed the way. Neither of these people knew the cemetery by the name of Snowhill. It was simply called the "Old Cemetery"

The "Old Cemetery" was the right place. There was Cato's grave marked with a DAR headstone. Graves on either side were of younger generation Lees. Thus, there is no evidence of Cato's wife, Nancy Holland, being buried there.

Also found in Old Snowhill, was the grave of Enoch Albritton. His daughter, Levincy Albritton married Cato Lee's son, Martin Battle Lee. Enoch's widow, Penelope Frizzell, moved to Union Parish, Louisiana with her daughter and son-in-law.

To find Old Snowhill Cemetery from Alabama Highway 21, turn north at the blinking yellow light on to Wilcox County Road 63 (turning south the road is County Road 59, and that is the only marker we saw at the intersection). Continue on this blacktop road through the largely deserted community of Furman to Bethesda Baptist Church on the left. A distance of 4/10 mile past the church is a dirt road on the right. Turn here and follow it for 9/10 mile when the road is on the right. Turn here and follow it for 9/10 mile when the road divides three ways. Take the middle fork. Continue 3/10 mile to the top of a hill and the

cemetery is on the left. Do not attempt this road in wet weather.

It is interesting to note that after finding this cemetery we visited both the courthouse and library in Camden, the county seat. A book in the library on the history of Wilcox County identified William Snow as a pioneer settler and stated that "Old Snowhill" is now called Furman.

The Federal Government did not give bounty land to Confederate veterans or their widows based on service in the Confederate Army or Navy. No record of these bounty land grants will be found in the U. S. Tract Books. For Confederate Bounty Land records see the Louisiana State Tract Books.

The map showing townships covered by each U. S. Tract Book may help you decide just which records you need, especially if you know where your ancestor lived or which township or section records will be most helpful. (See Map VIII)

The Louisiana State Land Office can furnish you with a photo copy of any page from the U. S. Tract Books or the Louisiana State Tract Books. Be sure to specify Book and Page Number and if U. S. Tract Book or Louisiana State Tract Book.

THE OLD HOSS FAMILY CEMETERY

Caddo Parish, Louisiana

Inscriptions in this old family cemetery were recorded by a committee of members of the Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association 25 October 1970, and are submitted for publication by B. R. Randolph, who was a member of that committee. This cemetery is located about one mile west of the Greenwood-Mooringsport Road. It is back in the woods on what used to be the Jacob Hoss place, owned in 1970 by the Trosopers of Greenwood, who are descended from Jacob Hoss. Committee members drove in via a dirt lane located just south of the Hammack Road, drove back to a house where they left their cars and walked the rest of the way. Crossing an open field, they entered a fenced wooded area, crossed a branch and found the little cemetery on the high ground on the western side of the branch in a rather heavily wooded area. There were briars and brambles encroaching upon the headstones, many of which were toppled over. Only one was broken. All were clearly legible. The monuments, with the exception of those lying on the ground, were in good condition.

He gave up his medical profession to become a minister of the Kentucky Conference. Several times, to meet expenses, he fell back on the profession of teaching. In 1971, Robert J. Taylor, Jr., established an irrevocable trust to provide genealogical study and research in Georgia. Primary emphasis was to be placed on information about the state's citizens prior to 1851. Since its beginnings the Foundation has developed and published seventeen reference works and assisted with the publication of numerous others. The Reprint Company, Publishers is the exclusive distributors of these publications and this book is one of the latest publications. This index contains approximately 20,000 names of persons who were either the original recipients of grants issued by the Crown from 1755, to the time of the Revolution, or who were mentioned in the grants as holders of adjacent property. Geographical names which occur in the descriptions of the grants are also indexed. Information is given in the index entry as to the volume and page number of the original grant book, the location and description of the land parcel, and the survey or grant date. From there the family spread out to such states as Michigan, Iowa, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Dr. John Frederick Aubrey founder of this Aubrey family, was born in France, educated in Germany, and is said to have been a surgeon in the British Army commanded by General James Wolfe. This Stump line originated with John, who married Barbara Summers in Germany and had three sons before coming to America in the early 1800's. Thomas Pederson came to the United States from North Thornheim, Norway in 1881 or 82. William Gregg (1642-1687) and his wife were Quakers who landed at Upland, now Chester, Pennsylvania, in 1682. Dietrich Fansler lived in Chenandoah County, Virginia in 1808. His father came from Germany about 1727. The Gehrke family began in Hurckow, Pommern, Germany, where August was born, his father being Julius of Prussia. August sailed from Bremen in 1882, and settled in Minnesota, where he married Augusta Scheffler.

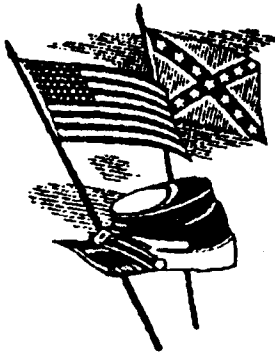
