QUERIES are free. They must be 75 words or less and must be typed or plainly printed.

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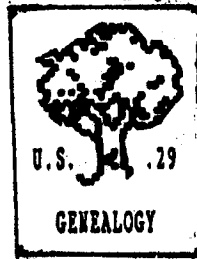

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A STAMP FOR GENEALOGISTS

Several times in the last few years, I have heard the discussion of a stamp honoring Genealogy.

I am sure there is no private segment of the population that uses more stamps! And, (I have often thought as I was affixing a particularly garish one: some are of most inappropriate design.

Would'nt you like to be able to buy stamps which would be used only for your genealogical correspondence?

I am sure that there are some graphic designers among us who could come up with a tree or SOMETHING suitable.

Admittedly, there is a lot of competition in getting a stamp approved. There ARE certain requisites; for instance, the ruling regarding those honoring a person. That person may not be considered unless he has been dead for ten years. A House Resolution urging that the ten year rule be waived for the late Senator Claude Pepper...and previously, for Elvis Presly, have not yet been approved. And, frankly there was some powerful lobbying going on!

The ultimate decision on who or what is honored is the private preserve of the Postmaster General. However, he does not act without a favorable recommendation from the Citizens Advisory Board. It was created in 1957 by Postmaster Arthur Summerfield. The Chairman of the Post Office committee is currently Rep. Bill CLay, Dem. of Missouri.

Lets give this some thought; any suggestions regarding either design or implementation of the plan will be carefully considered and brought before the assembly!...Problem solvers such as ourselves SHOULD come up with a plan. We spend our lives looking for answers, lets address this challenge with our usual acumen!

LETTERS FROM THREE CONFEDERATE SOLDIER BROTHERS

EDITED WITH NOTES BY WESLEY THURMAN LEEPER

The following letters were copied and noted by the late Wesley Thurman Leeper. They were written by his great uncles, James Monroe Park, Newton Alexander Park and Burrell Josephus Park who were soldiers in the Civil War.

Col. Leeper was a member of the Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association for many years. His book, "Rebels Valiant" and manuscript, "James and Margaret Leeper" may be seen in the genealogy room at Shreve Memorial Library. He also has a manuscript on the Park Family. His Park, Leeper and Bradley Families settled in Arkansas and the Cox Family settled in Missouri.

Mrs. W. T. Leeper, widow of Col. Leeper, has graciously consented to have these letters published in our quarterly.

The Park Family resided in Paraclifta, Arkansas (Southwestern Arkansas). Paraclifta no longer exists. It was located south of DeQueen.

It is to be noted that the notes on the letters by W. T. L. are more fruitfull than the letters themselves.

Camped near Granby at the Lead Mines
Camp Cooper, Missouri October 4, 1861

Dear Pa:

I think it hard that I cannot get a letter from you. I fear there is something the matter. Pa, do write to me. Is it that there is no one left behind to tell me anything? Fanny (1), as often as I have written to her, she has never answered one. I do not know what to think.

We leave here tomorrow morning for the Arkansas line (2). I know not what for, but I expect another fight (3).

Pa, I havn't much to tell you. I want you to send me a good pair of saddlebags (4), as mine was stolen the day of the battle (5), and I havn't had anything to put my clothes in since then.

It is very damp today and it will soon be time for drill. Pa, I only weigh one hundred and thirty four pounds. I am in better health than I ever was before.

We have had some very cold weather, but it is warm at present.

Another one of our boys is dead, James Permity, and several more are very low-there is no hope for them. Charley (6) is well, and fat as a bear.

I must come to a close. Give my best respects to all, and kiss little Fanny (7) for me. Tell Betty (8) to write to me.

Notes

This letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his father, JAMES ALEXANDER PARK, of Paraclifta, Sevier County, Arkansas.

JAMES MONROE PARK left his home at Paraclifta on June 28, 1861, to enter the Confederate Army.

Granby, Missouri is in (1950) Newton County, approximately seven miles northeast of Neosho.

At the time this letter was written, Missouri, while not finally lost to the Confederacy, was almost entirely in the hands of Union forces, although what was left of the Missouri Legislature that Union General Lyon had driven from Jefferson City, the capitol, had marched to Neosho, the temporary capitol. At this point only a few days after this letter was written (October 31, 1861), the Legislature did formally secede from the Union and join the Confederacy

- (1) Fanny was apparently a "girl friend". James was almost 21 years old when this letter was written, and naturally was interested in the opposite sex.
- (2) Approximately 35 miles due south.
- (3) That is, another battle. The Park boys invariably referred to battles as "fights".
- (4) The boys had left home on horseback, and naturally a pair of saddlebags would be a real necessity.
- (5) Referring to the battle of WILSON'S CRREK, MISSOURI, August 10, 1861. In this battle, LYON, the Union leader was killed, and when the battle went against the Union troops, they retreated to SPRINGFIELD, and then to ROLLA, their rail head.

In this battle LYON was opposed by PRICE, with some 5,000 Missouri State troops and McCULLOCH with 3,000 Confederate troops, under the general command of McCULLOCH.

- (6) Charles H. Atkins, a close friend to James.
- (7) Am not sure whom this refers to.
- (8) James had a little sister, Elizabeth Colen Park, called "Betty", but I am not sure that she was writing letters when only six years old.
- (9) Colonel James McINTOSH (see special biographical sketch), who was killed at the battle of PEA RIDGE (ELKHORN TAVERY), Arkansas, March 6, 7 and 8, 1862.
- (10) General Ben McCULLOCH (see special biographical sketch), who was also killed at the battle of PEA RIDGE.

BRIGADIER GENERAL JAMES McQUEEN McINTOSH

General McIntosh was born at Tampa Bay, Florida, in 1828, and came from a long line of fighting men.

He graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1849 as Brevet Second Lieutenant of the First Infantry. He had a brilliant career in the West and

in 1861, when it became evident that war between the States could not be averted, he resigned his commission and entered the service of the Confederate States.

He was first Captain of Cavalry, Confederate States Army, and was later made Colonel of the Second Arkansas Mounted Riflemen.

On January 24, 1862, he was commissioned Brigadier General, in the Army of the Confederate States. His command at that time consisted of the following:

First Arkansas Mounted Riflemen
Second Arkansas Mounted Riflemen
South Kansas-Texas Regiment
Fourth Regiment Texas Cavalry
Sixth Regiment Texas Cavalry
Burnett's Company of Texas Cavalry

He was killed in the bloody battle of Pea Ridge, Arkansas (March 7, 1862). At Pea Ridge, after leading a brilliant charge of cavalry and carrying the enemy's battery, he rushed into the thickest of the fight again at the head of his old regiment and was shot through the heart.

* * * * *

Dear Sister:

I seat myself tonight to answer your kind letter of the 22nd, which was of much pleasure to me to get from one so dear.

This leaves me in the enjoyment of good health, and I hope this may find you all well. The health of the company is very good. Mr. Rind (1) and James (2) is well, with the exception.....

the boys have...

the scout....

the same...

Our loss was 10 killed....

The loss of the Indians (3) was some 300 and only one wounded was taken. The rest was killed (4)....

One white lady was found among those which had been taken (5) by them. We have had a very pleasant time during Christmas. They have lots of parties and the boys enjoy themselves very well at the parties (6). We have preaching in the settlement and also in camp. We have lots of ladies to.....

We would have liked very well to have been down there (7) to have spent Christmas with you, though I could not be there and here at the same time (8).

....as I have got to be a good cook. I can bake as good corn bread and meat and make as good coffee as any of them and make as good pies as any of them. When I get home I think I will quit cooking for this way of working up flour dough I don't like very much (9), and the way some of the men have of getting furloughs.....

The boys say they all will marry when they get home if they can get any one to have them that is of the right kind (10).

I must come to a close for the present. You must promise to write to me soon. My best respects to all the women (11).

I remain your brother most respectfully.

NOTES

This letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his sister, HARRIET NARCISSUS PARK, of Paraclifta, Sevier County, Arkansas.

The date and place of this letter is not clear. Apparently it was written soon after Christmas, 1861.

- (1) J. G. Rind, a close friend (Later Captain (?) Co E (?)
- (2) Am not sure whom this refers to.
- (3) This apparently refers to the Indians from Indian Territory (now the state of Oklahoma) who participated in some of the early battles of the Civil War.
- (4) Apparently they had made up their minds to die fighting.
- (5) That is, captured by the Indians.
- (6) Boys apparently have not changed much since the sixties!
- (7) That is, in Sevier County, more than 200 miles to the south.
- (8) He had already learned that he could not be at two places at the same time!
- (9) No doubt it was a big mess!
- (10) The boys liked to have their fun, but they wanted to marry nice girls.
- (11) Soldiers of all wars seem to think of the opposite sex every now and then!

Cantonment Bee
February 12, 1862

My dear Mother:

I received your kind letter by Major Brown (26 Jan 1862). (1) I am always glad to hear from home, especially from those who are near to me by ties of kindred than any one else and, above all, Her, whom the Lord has given me for a mother (2).

I am sorry you are so anxious for me to reenlist for two years or for the duration of the war (3). I sincerely hope you will not be grieved when I inform you I have now fully made up my mind not to reenlist at this place, if I do anywhere.

If I had time I could give many reasons for the course I intend pursuing. I will merely give a few.

There are some officers belonging to this Regiment I am unwilling to remain with (4). Again the portion of the Army which remains in this part of the Confederacy will never get Justice done them. They will have a much harder task to perform than any other portion of the army and when the war is ended the army here will hardly be known in it's history. (5)

Again, there are many now at home who are enjoying all the comforts of Home and the sweet enjoyment of the society of families and friends who have much more stake than me (6), but will never come and join the army or do anything in any way whatever as long as they can keep us as walls between them and their Northern foes. (7) At the same time they look upon us as being almost beneath their notice. They are what may be termed "Shylocks", (8), or men who are doing all they can to get the last dollar they can lay their hands upon, more especially if it is by speculating in the necessities of life which they

very well hurts us most—we who are now deprived of almost every comfort.

Our county (9) has done as much I expect as any other county in the State, and as a general thing her citizens are as patriotic as anywhere in the Confederacy. I would ask you! How many are there in that county now who would give one cent for the benefit of a soldier or his family without knowing they would again receive it back with interest (perhaps compounded), or would take State Bonds or Confederate Bills in payment for salt, sugar, coffee, iron, etc.,—such articles as the soldiers' families actually stand in need of?

I think you will answer they are few, if any, but then you might say I should first think of my own interest. I can safely say I do, but so long as we remain here and others are permitted to stay at home who have more at stake than us, they will continue to treat us in the same way, and if they stay at home until the end of this war, we will then be looked upon by all such men as no better than their slaves and treated accordingly. (10)

If I had time I would give a few more reasons, but for the present will desist. (11)

You had not heard when you last wrote that no more furloughs would be given, and that all furloughed men had been ordered back to their commands with the least possible delay. (12) I would be glad indeed to pay you a visit, but you will at once see that it is impossible.

You seem to think that I would soon get tired of home. In that I must be permitted to say you are mistaken. Some men may be fond of camp life, but it is not so with me. After remaining here in a crowd as long as I have, I expect I would be a little lonesome for the boys for a while, that is all.

Home is dearer to me than any other place on Earth.

NOTES

This letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his mother, MRS. EDAH BASS PARK, who resided with her husband, JAMES ALEXANDER PARK, at Paraclifta, Arkansas.

- (1) (See "Z" below) Apparently the Major was one of those men who had been given a furlough.
- (2) A beautiful tribute to his mother!
- (3) Most of the original enlistments were for three or six months, as no one thought the war would last long.
- (4) Regimental and Company officers were often elected by popular vote of the men. Some of them were apparently not so popular after a while.
- (5) James thought at this time that he was "bogged down" for the duration. Follow his travels through this series of letters and you will see how wrong he was!
- (6) James was a typical young man of the day. He had no worldly property, but he thought every man should do his duty.
- (7) James did not like the idea of fighting for a group of what he considered "Slackers".
- (8) He had even read Shakespeare!
- (9) Sevier County, in the southwestern part of Arkansas. Recruited at least two companies for the Confederate Army.
- (10) James was all hot under the collar at the time this letter was written.

- (11) He had done pretty well, thank you!
- (12) The battle of PEA RIDGE (or ELKHORN TAVERN), ARKANSAS, was fought a short time after this letter was written (March 6-7-8, 1862). Apparently the Confederate leaders were rounding up all their men for this impending conflict.

 Henry K. Brown elected Captain 2nd Regt. Ab M? 15 Aug 1861
 Henry K. Brown elected Major 2nd Regt. 26 Jan 1862

Dear Sister:

I was very glad you thought enough of me to write me a few lines in Ma's letter.

I am glad to know you are going to school. I wish you to learn as fast as you can. You know not how high you may be able to go. I had much rather have a good education than almost anything else. (1)

You say "hoops" are the fashion, and you had rather be out of the world than out of the fashion. I like to see ladies fashionable dressed, and if I could get you a set of hoops and have an opportunity of sending them to you, I would be glad to comply with your request. (2) But, my dear Sister, I would like to know if you speak the sentiment of your heart when you said you had rather be out of the world than out of the fashion! (3)

Are you prepared to leave this world and enter upon a glorious immortality or are you a Universalist (4), who thinks all the woe a person will ever experience will be in this life? If so, I pity your condition. (5)

The cotton cards, I will do my best to get. (6)

Write soon and often. Give my love to all who may enquire after me.

NOTES

This fragment of a letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his sister, HARRIETT NARCISSUS PARK, accompanying his letter of February 12, 1862 to his mother. NARCISSUS ("Sis") was then about 16½ years old.

- (1) The older brother was trying to give his "kid sister" some good advice!
- (2) Apparently she had written asking him for a set of hoops.
- (3) Shame on "Sis"! She had her older brother worried!
- (4) One who believes that all men, regardless of their conduct, will eventually be saved, or restored to holiness and happiness.
- (5) For shame, "Sis"!
- (6) She really had the "gimmies" when she wrote him!

Cantonment Bee
 February 17, 1862

Dear Sister:

I received your letter of the 10th and was glad to hear from home. We

are going to leave in the morning for Missouri, where we are expecting another battle. (1)

The order came last night to come as quickly as possible, so we leave in the morning on a forced march. I cannot tell you when you will hear from me again, but I want you to write often, and when I write again will tell you perhaps more than I can now. We will have a very large battle this time, and a great deal of blood will be shed. (2)

I will not promise you a long nor an interesting letter this time. Our company is in very good health. Times is very unreliable now. My own health is good at present.

You asked me in your letter to let you know whether I was joined for three years or not. I have not yet, and I do not think I will until my time is out, and then it will be time to join. (3)

There has been a good many in our company that joined. I think it will be time enough to join when my time is out. (4) I think Henry (5) and myself will join. When our time is out we intend to go together, but we want to get to be free men, and a free man is an object (6) here.

Henry Penney sends his love to you, and he hopes he will live to see you all again.

James Rind is well and sends his love to you. (7)

I want you to not forget to write to me, and write me all the news. I will write to you every chance and write all the news. I know if we get in a battle and come out safe I will write you all about it. (8)

I think it has come to a pretty pass that you all do not write more often. Father does not write often. I hope you will write oftener hereafter.

Give my love to all (9) and all the ladies. So good bye.

NOTES

This letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his sister, HARRIETT NARCISSUS PARK.

For location of Cantonment Bee, see notes on letter written on February 12, 1862.

(1) He missed the location by a few miles, but he was evidently forecasting the battle of PEA RIDGE (of ELKHORN TAVERN), Arkansas, which was fought March 6-7-8, 1862. For more about this battle see special report attached.

(2) Pea Ridge is considered by many to be the second real battle of the War between the States (The First Battle of Bull Run, July 21, 1861 was the first). The others were generally called "engagements".

(3) See his letter of February 12, 1862, on this same subject.

(4) That is, when his original one year enlistment expired.

(5) Believe this refers to his friend Henry Penney.

(6) Possibly he intended to say a "curiosity".

(7) Evidently his young sister was quite popular with all the boys!
(James G. Rind)

(8) Follow his subsequent letters to see how he did his best to carry

out this promise.

- (9) He evidently intended to say "all the folks", and then gave special mentioned to the ladies.

Camp at Ozark, Arkansas (1)
March 25, 1862
(Should be March 23)

Dear Sister:

As I have an opportunity of sending a letter home through (2), I thought I would write you a few lines.

These few lines leaves me well and hoping it will find you the same. I wrote home a few days ago and gave all the news. I hope you saw it. I have no news at present.

Brother Newt (3) came up yesterday and joined the army for three years. (4) I tried to get him to drive a wagon until my time is out (5) so that he could go home with me when I went, but he would not. He said he would not be serving his country by driving a team. (6)

Henry Penney (7) sends his respects to you, and says he will write to you in a few days.

My love to all, so good bye. Your brother.

(Signed) James Park

NOTES

This letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his sister, HARRIETT NARCISSUS PARK.

Letter should be dated Mar 23 instead of 25.

(1) Ozark is located (1950) on Highway #64, between Fort Smith and Russellville, Arkansas. It is in Franklin County, Arkansas, 38.8 miles by railroad due east of Fort Smith. It is on the Missouri Pacific Railway and the Arkansas River.

(2) The name of the courier is indistinct.

(3) Referring to his younger brother, Newton Alexander Park, then 19 years old, who had left his home at Paraclyfta, Arkansas, on March 19, 1862, to enter the Confederate Army.

(4) Over the protest of his older brother, James, Newton had enlisted for three years minimum service, or for the duration of the war. Newton was killed at Bentonville, North Carolina, on March 21 1865, in the last battle of the Civil War, three years to the day after he left home to join the Confederate Army. Poor boy-he lived up to the letter of his agreement with his beloved Southern people.

(5) That is when his (James') original enlistment expired.

(6) Some one had to drive a team, but not Newton. He wanted to fight!

(7) A friend. See notes on letter written February 17, 1862.

* * * * *

Camp at Ozark (1)
March 29, 1862

Dear Father and Mother:

Being blessed with another opportunity of writing to you with a certainty of your receiving my letter, I thought I would write you a few hasty lines letting you know how I am doing and getting along.

We are on this evening camped at this point and tomorrow morning we will leave here for Dardanelle, some sixty miles below here (2), and where we will go from point I am unable to say. Some say we will go to Jackson Post; others that we will go to Pocohontas, on the Mississippi River (3).

That some point on the Mississippi River is our destination I think is too apparent to admit of a doubt, and no doubt it will create quite an alarm throughout the State of Arkansas on account of its leaving certain portions of the State exposed to the inroads and forages of the enemy and perhaps may be the cause of your portion of the country (4) suffering great disasters, and cause many complaints against the Confederate Government for leaving so much of our country exposed while so many of our gallant sons are in the fields fighting for our equal rights.

Yet it is no doubt for the benefit of the Confederace that prompts our leaders to adopt this policy and I am persuaded that this police will prove the salvation of our common country, for if we give up the Mississippi River our country and the glorious cause of Liberty must perish which I hope may never be the case, for let the North but succeed and our beautiful South, instead of blooming like the rose will become a waste howling wilderness, fit only for the brutes to inhabit. (5)

But I am not yet willing to give up our gallant Southern Ship and hope to see the day when she will ride out the storm and ride over the waves that now threaten to engulf her in woe, and unfurl to the breeze her bold, proud flag, the proud symbol of a few and independent people whose rights will be respected and whose liberty and prosperity will be the envy of every true lover of Freedom in the broad expanse of the world. (6) But this is a picture to be realized and for which the future will have to fulfill.

I have not joined for the duration of the war as yet, but Brother Newton (7) has, and belongs to our company. I did not endeavor to prevent him from joining (8), as I thought he ought to act upon his own judgment, not thinking that I was capable of giving him advice.

I do not know at this time whether I will join for the duration of the war. If at the expiration of my time (9) I see that my services is really needed, I shall not hesitate a moment but will go in (10).

I have not seen Uncle Jack (11) nor Doc Turner (12). Dawson's Regiment I understand has gone to Fort Gibson (14) to General Pike's (15) Headquarters.

I do not know where to tell you to direct my letters as I do not know where we are going. As soon as I receive the information I will send you my address and the necessary directions so that you may write to me.

Hoping, dear Father and Mother, that these lines may find you and the family all well. My own health is tolerably good. Brother Newt's (16) health is fine and he is well satisfied with the soldier's life.

I remain your affectionate son.

- (3) Actually Pocahontas is on the Black River, in northeast Arkansas, but not far from the Mississippi.

- (5) Talk about your fiery Rebels! This boy could really express himself!
- (6) This part is really beautiful!
- (7) Newton Alexander Park, his younger brother. See notes on letter written March 25, 1862.
- (8) That is, for three years or for the duration of the war.
- (9) That is, at the end of his one-year enlistment.
- (10) Actually James did not have much to say when his one-year term expired. In the spring of 1862, it was announced that all soldiers between 18 and 35 years of age whose one-year term of enlistment was about to expire would be held by continued service by conscription.
- (11) Am not sure whom he refers to here.
- (12) One of his friends from the same home community.
- (13) Think this refers to the second 19th Arkansas Regiment, under the command of Colonel C. L. Dawson. His brother, Burrell Josephus Park, was a member of this regiment.
- (14) In Mississippi.
- (15) General Albert Pike, great author, philosopher, and outstanding Mason.
- (16) Newton Alexander Park, his younger brother. See note #7, above.
- (17) Presumably a courier, but possibly a fellow-soldier going home for some reason.

Camp near Tupelo, Mississippi (1)
June 23, 1862

Dear Sister:

I have an opportunity today of sending you a letter and will do so with the greatest of pleasure.....

We are all enjoying good health and doing the best we can. There is no prospect of a fight soon. (2) The Feds (3) are up somewhere about Corinth (4) if they have not skedaddled back North. Most of our leading officers are off somewhere-we can't tell where. (5)

Everybody is talking of Peace being made right away (6) and I hope how soon it may be made for I am getting anxious to see my relatives and friends at home, and, by the way, I am getting tired of war, any how. (7)

Brother Newton (8) left us at Corinth with the measles. I heard from him the other day and he was getting better and was going to Oxford, down in Calhoun County. (9)

My health is very good at this time and all the boys you are acquainted with from about Paraclifta. (10)

There is some talk of us being sent back to Missouri (11) and I should like very much to make the swap for there is too many soldiers encamped about here (12) for a person to enjoy himself. (13)

Tell all my friends to write when they have a chance, and I will do the

as often as I can conveniently.

I must tell you what a fine dinner we intend to have today (14). We killed the old rooster this morning and are making a pie out of him. (15) I wish you could see how much (16) chicken pie is left tonight.....

My regards to all the family and for yourself.

Your brother (Signed) James M. Park

P. S. Since the above was written Brother Newton (17) has returned. He has been staying with Uncle John Goodwin (18) and his family. They are all well and doing as well as could be expected. Newt says to tell Pop Turner that he still puts water in the gravy. (19). Nothing more. Your affectionate brother.

(Signed) James M. Park

NOTES

This letter was written by JAMES MONROE PARK to his sister, HARRIETT NARCISSUS PARK.

(1) Tupelo is located (1950) on the Gulf, Mobile and Ohio Railway, 50 miles south of Corinth, Mississippi.

(2) This letter was written after the battle of Shiloh (or Pittsburg Landing), Tennessee, which took place on April 6th and 7th, 1862. The Confederate had won the first day, but were driven back by overwhelming numbers the second day.

General Beauregard, in command of the Confederate forces after the death of General Albert Sidney Johnston at Shiloh, had got back to Corinth with about 30,000 men. He had been reinforced by the Army of the West, from Arkansas and Missouri, under Van Dorn and Price (they had arrived at Corinth too late to be of help at Shiloh), and other units for a paper total of 80,000 men, of whom 18,000 were in hospitals with more coming down sick (Newton Park was among the number!), and with only 53,000 effectives present for duty.

Halleck, in command of the Union forces, had spent a month advancing his great army from the fields of Shiloh to the environs of Shiloh, less than 20 miles. With a force of 100,000 men, Halleck finally pushed his front parallels at some points within a thousand yards of Beauregard's entrenchments at Corinth. Confederate sorties against his works had failed to drive him off or halt his advance. Under the circumstances there seemed nothing to do but to retire from Corinth and leave it to Halleck. With great skill and the strictest secrecy the evacuation was carried out.

Supplies and ordnance were sent by train to Tupelo, fifty miles farther south in Mississippi, the sick were sent to the rear, and finally, during the night of May 29, 1862, the Confederate troops quietly marched out and started south. Over on Pope's left wing the Federals heard some unusual stir in the Confederate camps, but interpreted it as preparations for an attack the next day. By the time that Beauregard's departure was discovered, well into the daylight hours, his troops were safely away.

This letter was written by James Park after they settled down near Tupelo.

(3) Federal troops. They were usually referred to by Southern troops as "Yankees".

(4) About 50 miles due north.

(5) From his statement we can't say whether the whereabouts of their officers was a secret or whether they simply did not know. Probably the latter.

- (6) A vain hope, as subsequent events proved.
- (7) James Park had left his home at Paraclyfta, Arkansas, on June 28, 1861, to join the Confederate Army. When this letter was written he had not seen his folks for a whole year. Naturally he was anxious to see them.
- (8) Newton Alexander Park, a younger brother. See previous letters about him.
- (9) In 1950 Oxford, Mississippi, was located in Lafayette County. The Park boys had some close relatives there at the time this letter was written.
- (10) Paraclyfta, Arkansas, the home town of the Park boys, located in Sevier County, in southwestern Arkansas.
- (11) Later Price, with the Army of the West, recrossed the Mississippi, but James and Newton Park failed to go back with him.
- (12) About 80,000 Confederates were in the vicinity of Tupelo (see note #2). This was too much for James. He wanted more peace and quiet!
- (13) In his letter written February 12, 1862, James wanted to get away from Northern Arkansas. Now he was willing to go anywhere!
- (14) This apparently an after thought.
- (15) Understand that the whole army was not dining off one poor rooster! Possibly James' squad shared this particular bird.
- (16) He meant how little.
- (17) His younger brother, New Alexander Park, a member of his company.
- (18) Colen Bass, sister of Edah Bass Park (James' mother), had married John Goodwin, October 20, 1835. This was evidently the "Uncle John" James was referring to.
- (19) The boys must have their fun.

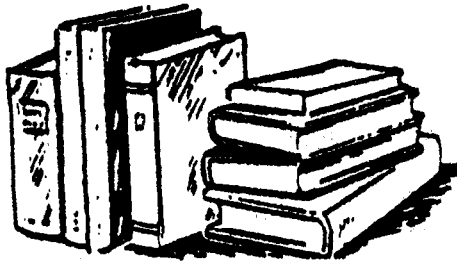

DIARY OF SARAH VAN HOOK

Following are excerpts from the diary of Sarah Van Hook Wilson. She was the eldest child of Thomas and Maria Van Hook, and according to tradition, the first white child born in Farmerville, Union Parish, La.

"My father, Thomas Van Hook, was born in Tennessee of Holland descent. His father was one of the brave Tennesseans who went with General Jackson to defend New Orleans. He died as he was returning home in 1815. His widow, with her family, then moved to Louisiana settling on Boeuf River. After his mother's death, Thomas went to Union Parish where he assisted in laying out the town of Farmerville. He and his party lived in tents while at work. I remember as a child hearing him say he had stood on the site of the courthouse and killed deer for their next day's dinner by shining their eyes with the light of his fire pan. This was a long handled iron pan filled with live coals and carried over the shoulder, the reflection shining in the eyes of the deer made them an easy mark for the hunter but to my mind was unfair and not of a true sportsman's nature.

" Thomas Van Hook was active in the public affairs of Union Parish, holding public office almost continuously until his death. In 1839, he was made clerk of the police jury; about 1846, he was commissioned clerk of the district court. After this he was elected to serve as legislator. In a letter to his wife, dated March 6, 1855, he writes her that he was named on the committee for the removal of the remains of Lieut.-Gov. Farmer, after whom the town of Farmerville was named. A joint committee from the senate and the house escorted the body from Baton Rouge to Farmerville.

"The last few years of his life were devoted to the study of law; he was admitted to the bar but died shortly thereafter on November 8, 1857; honored and beloved by his friends; honest and faithful to any trust and charitable beyond his means."

MY EUROPEAN ANCESTRY

(Contributed by James A. Oliphant, Jr.)

Gaspard and Marie Dietrich were European farmers who immigrated to Louisiana from Alsace, France—Alsace was also under German rule at times. They are my father's maternal grandparents. The first three of their six children were born in Alsace. Joseph Alphonse (called Sep) was born under the French flag on October 25, 1838. Catherine Agnes (called Kate), my grandmother, was born under the French flag January 14, 1870. Marie Anne (called Marie) was born under the German flag on April 14, 1873. The remaining three children were on the family farm in Pointe Coupe Parish, Louisiana. Anton John (called John) was born January 16, 1875. Rosa Antoinette (called Rose) was born July 28, 1878. Louis George (called Louis) was born March 11, 1881. Gaspard was six feet two inches tall, had blonde hair, hazel eyes, and a fair complexion. Marie was four feet eleven inches tall with black hair, brown eyes, and dark olive skin. The family spoke French, German and Cajun Patois, as Marie could not speak English. Gaspard called Marie "Non" which means doll.

Gaspard was born in Sliddle—a small village near Strasbourg, District Bas Rhin, Province Alsace, France on August 25, 1837. He was one of three children. The oldest child was a girl, he was a twin, and the other twin was a girl. His family farmed and owned several plots of land. They lived in the nearby village and used a cow to milk, plow, and pull a cart to mass and market. In 1866, Gaspard had served his tour of duty in the German army, and he married Marie Landenvetsch. Marie was of French descent and was born October 25, 1838 in Alsace. They went to live with his mother (a widow), his oldest sister (a spinster), his widowed twin sister, and her son. The entire family farmed. Gaspard and Marie had two children by 1870, and around this time the Franco-Prussian War erupted. During the siege of Strasbourg, a battle took place in the village of Sliddle. The Dietrich family took refuge in the woods under a wagon bed during a heavy rain. Kate later recalled the stories of the artillery sounds, cavalry and dead horses and bodies. In 1871, when Germany took over Alsace, it was decided that Gaspard should go to America, as he would be called back to German military service.

Marie's brother had immigrated to Louisiana earlier and married a French-Louisiana girl. He was prosperous, owning both a farm and a village store, and agreed to loan Gaspard the money for his passage. Marie was expecting her third child, and at the time an expectant mother could not immigrate to the United States. Gaspard landed in New York City in 1872 with a tag giving his name and destination pinned to his coat. He worked at various jobs during his arduous journey across the country and walked some of the way. With

the help of people he met and worked for along the way, he arrived in Louisiana in two months.

Marie had her third child, Marie Anne in April of 1873, and immigrated that same year. She landed in New Orleans with her three children and Joseph Dietrich, Gaspard's twin sister's son. Joseph's father was killed as a soldier, and the family did not want him reared in Alsace with the war situation as it was. Marie brought him into this country as her own child by falsifying church records. Joseph was older than Kate but younger than Sep. It is interesting to note that Marie, a French woman, married a German man and came to America on an English ship that used both steam and sail. In order to stay well aboard the ship, they drank watered wine and ate dried raisins.

Gaspard worked for his brother-in-law as an overseer while learning American crops and how to grow them. He was amazed at black people, as he had never seen any before. The family lived in a plank house with wooden shutter windows. A fireplace caused a fire in which most of their family possessions were lost, but the family prayer book, crucifix, and some few other things were saved. Gaspard and Marie were very hard workers and frugal. Shortly, he bought his first farm.

The farm was located on "Old River" in the Raccourci area in Pointe Coupe Parish. Gaspard was overseer, while Marie led the black women, who chopped cotton. The blacks were astounded at Marie: she worked European style, barefoot, with her skirts pinned up. Sep, the oldest son, ran the commissary for the blacks. Kate managed the household with the help of an old black man, "Wash", who chopped wood and helped with the heavy work. All the other children had chores: Rose remembered baking bread for all the family after she was eight years old. Gaspard put his barn, chicken coop, and pig pens on heavy log rafts chained to trees, so that when the water rose they floated. The family members rowed a boat to milk the cow and gather eggs. The horses and mules were put on high ground. All supplies came by riverboat which was always a festive occasion. The captain and crew on the boats were friends of the planters and took orders for them.

All the children were educated to some extent, as they could all read and write, but there is quite a contrast in the way they were educated. I don't know about Sep, but Kate was self-taught. Marie Anne went to a Catholic convent in Plaquemines as a boarder. The younger children rode horses or went by boat to the village school. If the water was up they rowed the skiff a distance of two and a half miles.

Most of the family social life centered around the Parish church, where the planters brought Sunday dinners and spent the afternoon socially. These hard-working French-Louisiana people liked to have a good time too, and Saturday night dances were frequently held. Gaspard and Marie were excellent dancers, and a story goes that they could waltz with glasses of water on their heads.

Gaspard did not like violence. This was evidenced by the fact that he only spanked one of his children, John, for whipping a horse. He would not allow his blacks to hit each other or abuse his animals. I have the impression that he loved his family very much and probably had many friends.

The family prospered and bought a second farm. In 1890, as was his custom, Gaspard went to Baton Rouge and sold his cotton crop valued at approximately ten thousand dollars. He returned home to start getting the crop in. He also started supervising the clearing of his second farm, and there he

drank some stump water, took typhoid fever, and died within two weeks. Sep assumed management of the farms and family in accordance with European custom. He went to New Orleans, gambled away the cotton crop, and lost the first farm. Marie knew nothing of farm business or American law and let it go, even though there were minor children. Sep left and was not heard from for years.

The family moved to the village nearby where the oldest girls sewed, and John took a team and did odd jobs to help support the family. John later went to New Orleans to join Joseph, his cousin, who was working there. John obtained a job with the streetcar company and sent for the rest of the family as soon as he was able. The family had boarders, did sewing, and both brothers worked for the streetcar company.

John continued to work for the streetcar company until his death. Louis became a glazier and worked in San Francisco after the earthquake; also in Galveston after the hurricane. He owned his own glass and mirror company. Kate married a railroad engineer for the Texas and Pacific (my grandfather). Marie Anne married a man who worked dredging rivers and later worked for the Houston Industrial Gas Company. Rose married a railroad man who was a boilermaker. Sep, after being away for years, returned with tuberculosis. The family was very upset. The brothers did not want him to stay, but Marie and the sisters cared for him until he died in 1908 at forty years of age. He had been an overseer on a Mississippi farm and never saw his family until he returned. He never married.

Gaspard was very grateful to live in America. He often said "everyone should kiss the soil of this wonderful country". It is interesting that he had such a strong love for America, but adhered to European customs. Great-grandmother, Marie never learned the English language, and I am not sure she ever became naturalized. Marie Anne had to declare her a German citizen during World War I. Marie died of nephritis September 26, 1910, and is buried in the family plot in St. Mary's Cemetery in New Orleans. Gaspard was moved there beside her from the family cemetery in Pointe Coupe Parish. What would have happened if the family had not lost the good farm: It is most intriguing to speculate about it.

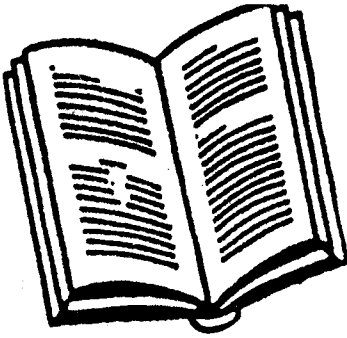

The three-brother Syndrome: Sometimes it was more. In my family it was five brothers that immigrated from Edinburgh, Scotland to Spartanburg, South Carolina-I've never been able to prove this out. The story usually goes that one brother went West, one went South (or North) and one stayed put. This is definitely not true as a general rule as families tended to travel together and in groups. You will read over and over as you research different family histories, that there were three brothers, or five, or seven that immigrated from England, or Ireland, or Scotland, etc. to America. It gets to be kind of humerous after awhile. The brother your line came from always disappeared or his line wasn't traced for some reason or other. There may be cases where several brothers did come over together and then split up for some reason or another, but these stories should be verified carefully and documented with some positive proof.

FARMERVILLE HAD FIRST TELEPHONE IN ENTIRE SOUTH

(Extracted from the Centennial Edition of THE GAZETTE, Farmerville, Union Parish, LA, October 5, 1939 by Carroll H. Goyne, Jr.)

The distinction of having the first telephones below Mason-Dixon line goes to Farmerville and Union Parish.

The credit for bringing this distinction to Farmerville goes to Col. Daniel Stein, pioneer merchant of these parts.

Running an enormous store here, Mr. Stein went to New York several times a year to buy stock. On one of his trips north, he witnessed a demonstration of the newly invented telephone. Assured of its eventual success, Mr. Stein bought stock in the new formed Bell Telephone Company.

On his return to Farmerville he brought with him three of the instruments which he had installed in his businesses. One was placed in his store in Farmerville, another at Stein's Bluff on the bayou Cornie, a large shipping point for this section where he kept a branch store, and the third was installed at Fork Ferry on Bayou D'Arbonne.

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
