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MCMILLANS OF TEXAS

(Compiled from numerous sources by Chester McMillan of Little Rock, AR. Address 8510 Linda Ln., Little Rock, AR 72207.)

In 1821, Mexico became an independent republic and at that time Texas had a population of about 4,000 people not including Indians. The Mexican government encouraged people living in the United States to move to Texas by offering new and cheap land. In 1836, Texas became the Republic of Texas and at that time had a population of about 30,000 people. By 1840, 50,000 free citizens and 17,000 blacks lived in Texas. The Republic of Texas continued to offer free land to people coming to Texas. The offer was that a man with a wife could come to Texas, select a home site, build a house, clear the land and start farming and clain 640 acres of land. A single man could claim 320 acres. It was a great adventure like a grand camping trip. A family would take everything that they could carry, furniture, clothing, cooking equipment, livestock, farm tools, food for themselves, feed for livestock and travel by wagon. There were no improved roads and often homes along the way were 20 miles apart. They would be traveling through swamps fording streams, creeks and rivers through virgin timber areas. In virgin forests the trees were often huge and the big trunks of the trees had no limbs below 30 to 40 feet. There was very little undergrowth as the canopy of the trees prevented most direct sunlight from reaching the ground level. The ground would be covered with a thick layer of pine straw or leaves. The streams were clear and beautiful. The water was so clear a person could see minnows, topwaters, darters, fish, tadpoles and water bugs. The water spider with six legs dimpling, but not breaking through the surface film, skated with surprising speed and agility across slow streams and ponds. Its middle legs did most of the "rowing", the hind legs acted as steering rudders, while the forelegs were used for grasping prey. Mostly insects smaller than itself. To get some idea of how the water spider manages this feat, try floating a clean needle on still water in a saucer. The melobugwhirligig beetle, like a shiny speedboat, animated black watermelon seeds, they gyrated crazily on the surface, yet never seem to bump into each other. The damsel fly was dainty compared with the powerful mosquito hawk, the dragon flies. The damsel fly's wings formed one graceful leaflike unit held vertically over its back when at rest. The damsel flies were known as snake doctors. The dragon fly holds its wings spread out when resting.

A person coming to such a stream could drink the cool clear water by getting face down on their hands and getting their mouth into the water. Many of the small streams were known as spring branches, as they were fed by a steady flow of water from numerous springs along its course. In the springs could be found the most beautiful crayfish, in bright colors of red.

William McMillan, Sr., and his wife, Elizabeth, were born in South Carolina in about 1788. John McMillan was also born in South Carolina in 1810. They possibly lived in Barnwell County, South Carolina, which is on the border of the State of Georgia, about 30 to 40 miles from Augusta, Georgia. Their son, William, Jr., was born in 1824 in Alabama. At that time, John would have been 14 years of age. Their sons, Matthew and Marshall, were born in Alabama in 1829 and 1833. It is not known when William Sr., and his family moved from South Carolina to Alabama. According to the births of their children, it was between 1810 and 1824. They would have traveled about 350 miles, passing south of Atlanta, Georgia to Dallas County, Alabama.

The 1820 census for Alabama apparently is not available for examination. The 1830 census for Dallas County, Alabama reflects Mc Millans possibly identifiable with William, Sr., and John. That census listed only the name of the head of the house along with the sex and ages of the other members of the residence.

According to the records of the Texas General Land Office, William, Sr., arrived in Texas prior to January 1, 1840. In 1839, he and his wife, Elizabeth would have been about 51 years of age. He most likely was a cotton farmer and owned land that he would have sold prior to leaving Alabama to come to Texas. They could possibly have left grown children in Alabama. If William, Sr., and his family traveled through Arkansas, they would have traveled about 400 miles in about a month.

John McMillan, born 1810 in South Carolina, is believed to be a son of William, Sr. John had two sons, Anthony, born 1834, and Benjamin, born 1832. They were both born in Alabama. John had a son, John born in 1842, in Louisiana, and a daughter, Jane, born in 1844 in Louisiana. Nancy McMillan born in 1825, place unknown, was not old enough to be the mother of John's sons, Anthony or Benjamin. A Mary McMillan, born in 1843, in Louisiana, lived in the home of William, Sr.

The 1850 census listed people by residence numbers. William, Sr., had residence No. 315, and William, Jr., born in 1824 in Alabama had residence No. 314, indicating that he lived in the next house. His wife, Sarah, was born in 1826 in Alabama. They had two daughters born in Texas. Marian was born in 1847, and Sarah was born in 1849. The L. Simpson and family, also lived in residence No. 314. L. Simpson was born in North Carolina in 1791, Nancy Simpson was born in South Carolina in 1800. Martha Simpson was born in Louisiana in 1832 and Elizabeth Simpson was born in Louisiana in 1835. John Simpson was born in 1826 in Louisiana, Francis Simpson was born in 1826 in Alabama.

The 1850 census listed residence No. 185 for Peter McMillan, which would have been some distance from William, Sr. Peter McMillan was born in Georgia in 1820 and Mary McMillan was born in South Carolina in 1824. Their children, John 1844, Ann born 1846 and Alexander born 1849, were all born in Georgia.

According to the Texas land grant records, Peter McMillan, who arrived in Texas in November 1840, was allotted 320 acres of land in Panola County as a single person.

Texas, when annexed to the United States in 1846, retained its public lands, some of this public land was given to veterans as bounties. In 1881, there were many indigent Civil War veterans and widows living in Texas. Again the state gave land to these people in lieu of money. Confederate scripts for 1280 acres of land were given to disabled surviving veterans and to widows of husbands killed or died in the Civil War. It is to be noted that half of 1280 acres, which is called a section of land, is one mile square.

On August 17, 1881, Mrs. Mary McMillan, Panola County Certificate No. 488 was issued confederate script for Peter for 1280 acres. The public land was almost exhausted at that time and existed only in far West Texas. Land was cheap and often times the grantee had to give one-half of the land to have it surveyed. The grantee could not get a deed or title to the land until it was surveyed. The certificates could be sold or bought for \$5.00 to \$400.00.

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It appears that Peter McMillan as a single man came to Panola County in 1840 and got a grant for 320 acres of land. He married Mary and three of their children were born in Georgia between 1844 and 1849. Peter's name did not appear with that of Mary McMillan and children of the 1870 census. Apparently Peter was killed or died in the Civil War. The 1860 census for Panola County reflected that Peter McMillan and family lived in the Fair Play Post Office area.

The National Archives, Washington, D.C., made available photocopies of handwritten records concerning the Post Offices and Post Masters in Panola County, Texas from 1847 through 1877. Post Offices were established at Pulaski and Grand Bluff in 1847. The McMillan Post Office was established January 13, 1848, with William McMillan, Sr., the Post Master. Wesley Willis was the Post Master of McMillan Post Office from April 24, 1857 to January 11, 1858, until the McMillan Post Office was discontinued on November 5, 1866. Between 1847 and 1877 there were about 24 Post Offices in Panola County. They were being established, discontinued and reestablished. The names of the Post Offices were being changed or the site was moved to another county or state. Listed below are names of Post Offices in Panola County from 1847 to 1877:

Wesley Willis, the Post Master at the McMillan Post Office in 1857-1858, was according to the 1860 census for the area of the McMillan's Post Office, was born in 1832 in Georgia, his wife, Agnes, was born in 1836 in Alabama. Their children were: Robert, born in 1854 in Alabama, William, born in 1855 in Louisiana, Sarah born in 1857 in Texas and John, born in 1859 in Texas.

Wesley Willis was apparently a son of William Willis, born in 1809 in Georgia, and Ann Willis, born in 1813 in South Carolina. Their other children were: Elizabeth, born in 1841 in Georgia, Mary, born in 1846 in Georgia, and Robert, born in 1852 in Alabama.

The records of Louisiana Confederate Commands compiled by Andrew B. Booth, Commissioner Louisiana Military Records, New Orleans, Louisiana 1920 on page 1234 reflects the following information:

Marshall McMillan, Private Company G. 11th Battalion, Louisiana Infantry, enlisted on May 28, 1862 at Pulaski. Roll from June 1862 through April 1863 present.

Benjamin McMillan, Private Company G. 11th Battalion, Louisiana Infantry enlisted on May 28, 1862 at Pulaski. Rolls from June to October 1862 present. Roll from November and December 1862, died at Delhi Hospital of camp fever on November 17, 1862.

M. D. (Matthew) McMillan, Private Company G. 11th Battalion, Louisiana Infantry enlisted on May 28, 1862 at Pulaski. Rolls from June to October present. Rolls from November and December 1862, sick furlough November 18th for **Z**0 days still sick. Rolls for January and February 1863, died January

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28, 1863 of typhoid-pneumonia at Rosedale.

Delhi, Louisiana is on I-20, halfway between Monroe and Vicksburg. Rosedale, Louisiana is about 25 miles west of Baton Rouge. The military records for Marshall, Benjamin and M. D. from the National Archives, Washington, D.C., reflect that all three were enlisted by Lt. C. D. Moore for the duration of the war. These records also reflect that the three McMillans each in the Shelby's Battalion, Louisiana Volunteers were each paid on September 30th or October 1st, 1862, a bounty of \$50.00. There was a notation that the bounties were recorded in the Confederate Archives, Chapter 5, File No. 54. Pages 282 and 283. This was a record of Confederacy Quartermaster Payments to noncommissioned officers and enlisted personnel. The names of Marshall, Benjamin and M, D. were listed as receiving the \$ 50.00 bounty. There was a column for remarks as to why the bounty was paid, but the column reflected no information. The pages were records of payments for persons with names starting with "M" and that a number of enlisted men had received a bounty of \$50.00. Apparently the bounty was promised to get the men living in Texas to enlist in the Louisiana units of the Confederate Army. In addition to the records of bounties. there were records of payments for clothing and other items. The records of Louisiana Confederate Soldiers also reflect that Captain Charles D. Moore, Company G. 11th Battalion, Louisiana Infantry enlisted on February 2, 1862 at New Orleans. He was promoted Captain from 2nd Lt. He was killed in the battle of Mansfield on April 8, 1864.

W. D. (Buck) McMillan, Logan Community, Panola County, advised that his father, James Anthony McMillan, recalled that his father Matthew enlisted in the Confederate Army, and with his army unit received training in Panola County. He remembered that his father, Matthew, with the army unit passed their home on the old place the McMillan Post Office. He stood by the gate of the home and his father waved to him as the unit moved toward Louisiana. He never saw or heard from his father from that time. Reportedly the Confederate Army made no policy of advising the family when a soldier was killed or died. The family would learn of the deaths by notices on bulletin boards and notices in newspapers. Lt. Charles D. Moore recruited men from Panola County area to organize Company G. 11th Battalion, Louisiana Infantry and trained that company of men in Panola County. Matthew and Marshall were brothers. Benjamin was a son of John, who was a brother of Matthew and Marshall. As Marshall and Matthew served in Company G., they would have known that Benjamin died on November 17, 1862, less than six months after enlisting. Matthew died after serving only eight months.

Matthew's widow, Harriet Reeves, married a man by the name of Pate. James Anthony lived with his mother and stepfather in Bryan, Texas. James Anthony later returned to the Logan Community and married Clementine Pyle, a daughter of James and Edie Pyle.

According to the 1840 Citizens of Texas, Volume 1, Land Grants by Gifford White, William McMillan, Sr., arrived in Texas prior to January 1, 1840 and received a grant for 640 acres of land in Harrison County. This book reveals that many claims were fraudulent. In an effort to prevent fraud, congress passed a law imposing a punishment of thirty-nine lashes on the bare back and a jail sentence upon all persons convicted of fraudulent schemes to obtain land. Land squabbles reached the proportions of a small war in Shelby County, across the Sabine River from Logansport in East Texas. Immigrants from the notorious Neutral Ground poured into East Texas and soon had control of the county governments. In August 1844, President Houston proclaimed martial law and sent 600 militiamen into Shelby County and res-

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stored law and order.

The Neutral Ground was the area in Louisiana between the Sabine and Red River. Logansport, Louisiana was in the Neutral Ground and was about 12 miles from McMillan's Post Office. In 1837, the Sabine River's course was charted, a year later steamboats were navigating the Sabine River. Logansport was almost 500 miles by river to Orange, Texas. The Sabine River's water route was navigable in winter and early spring. Logs were also floated down the river to the gulf ports. The people living in the McMillan Post Office would have sold cotton and bought merchandise in Logansport. Steamboat traffic on the Sabine River, hauling mostly cotton, was at its peak between the Civil War and 1897, when the railroads came to Logansport.

Logansport had a population of some 2,000 in 1891 and was handling about 30,000 bales of cotton annually, making Logansport one of the best markets and trading centers in the area. The town had nine saloons at the time. In the minutes of a Shelby County Church, it is mentioned that the church hired a preacher from Keatchie, Louisiana, but he charged them \$5.00 per month extra to pass through lawless Logansport.

Prior to 1838, the Red River was not navigable by steamboats due to log jams from Shreveport to as far as Alexandria. The log jam, known as the Great Raft, was removed by Captain Henry Miller Shreve between 1833 and 1838. At times 300 men worked on the project. The first steamboat passed up the river in 1838. Many people used the steamboat to move all of their personal property up the Red River. They could move their furniture, wagons, livestock and slaves. Kate McMillan remembered that her father, Chapman Lee Fargerson, came to Louisiana by steamboat. His parents left Mississippi in 1858 with five children between the ages of 2 and 12. After arriving in Shreveport, they camped for several weeks near the town. They planned to go to Texas. After leaving Shreveport, they made camp at Longstreet, Louisiana, where they settled.

In November 1838, the Natchitoches Herald carried a story with this headline: "Invasion of the United States by Texas". Shreveport was invaded by the Republic of Texas, a foreign army. Caddo Indians had gone on the warpath in East Texas in support of a Mexican rebellion and were chased across the United States border. General Thomas J. Rusk, of the Republic of Texas and his army, were determined to bring peace to East Texas for good. They paid about as much attention to the United States border as the fleeing Caddo Indians. The Texas Army, hot on the Indian's heels, did not stop until they overhauled them in the very heart of Shreveport, where the Indians were immediately disarmed. The Texas Army returned to Texas.

In 1863, during the Civil War, the population of Shreveport leaped from 4,000 inhabitants to nearly 12,000. Shreveport became the headquarters of the military districts of Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas and the Indian Territory. The Caddo Parish courthouse became the Louisiana State Capitol.

Early in 1864, the Union Army planned to sweep up the Red River and capture Shreveport and another Federal Unit was planning to advance on Shreveport from Little Rock, Arkansas. On April 8, 1864, the Confederate Army of 5,300 infantry and 3000 cavalry men, at 4 P.M. made a stand against the Federal Forces about 3 miles south of Mansfield at Sabine Crossroads. In two hours in three separate engagements, the Federal Army was in retreat. Although a great victory for the south, it was a costly battle to both sides. Casualties in the Federal Army numbered 2,235, out of some 10,000 men engaged

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in battle, while the Confederates lost 1,000 men out of 8,300 engaged in battle. The Confederates claimed 2,500 prisoners, 20 pieces of artillary, several thousand rifles and small arms, 250 wagons and about 1,000 horses and mules.

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HEARD CEMETERY Yazoo County, Mississippi

(Mr..John P. Frazier of Pittsburg, Texas, a member of our association for many years, supplied the following information. Directions for finding this cemetery are as follows: From Lynwood, MS, which is west of Vaughan, MS, go north on blacktop road past Blackjack Cemetery for 2.1 miles. Right (east) on blacktop road for 0.9 miles. Right (south) on dirt trail through farm fields for 1.0 miles. Through gate reading "No Hunting or Fishing". Cemetery is on the left about 50-60 yards in a clump of cedar trees on plowed land.)

> Jesse F., born in Hinds Co., MS 3 Sep 1830. Died in Yazoo Co., MS 13 Jul 1875. Aged 44 yrs 10 mos 10 days. "Beneath this sod now lies the form, that to us was dear and lovely, whose sparkling eyes increased our joys, but now they're gone and we are lonely".

Nancy, born in Yazoo Co., MS 4 May 1834, died 3 Nov 1866, w/o Jesse F. Heard, Jr., d/o T. J. & R. Ford-married 1 May 1851. "Though lost to sight, to memory dear".

Mary J. born in Yazoo Co., MS 16 Mar 1858, died 18 Jun 1875, aged 17 yrs 3 mos 2 days, d/o Wm. F. & Elizabeth H. Heard. "A loved one has gone from our circle, on earth we will meet her no more; She has gone to her home in Heaven, and all her afflictions are o'er". (Holly Sprnigs marker maker)

Elizabeth W., born in Sumpter Co., AL 2 May 1835, died in Yazoo Co., MS 20 May 1878, aged 43 yrs 18 days, w/o W. F. Heard. "A devoted wife and loving mother, has gone to a mansion of rest, from a region of sorrow and pain; To the glorious land of Diety blessed, where she never can suffer again". (T. Maydwell, Memphis TN.)

Wm. Franklin, 26 May 1833-30 Oct 1893. "Altho he sleeps, his memory doth live, and cheering comforts to his mourners give. He followed virtue as his truest guide, lived as a Christian, as a Christian died".

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FILLMORE CEMETERY

(These records contributed by Mrs. Ben Sour)

Five years after Bossier Parish was created in 1843 from Claiborne Parish, land was deeded for the establishment of Fillmore Methodist Church and the adjoining cemetery, where the first burial was reported in 1849.

While the church was active, the cemetery was well cared for, according to early history of the area. Then, in the early 1900s, families of the deceased met annually to clean the cemetery and have dinner-on-the-ground. That worked well until the 1940s when both the church and cemetery showed neglect. In the early 1950s, Alvin McAnn of Haughton and George Nelson of Benton took over the leadership for maintaining the cemetery. They worked diligently for about 30 year, until McAnn's retirement and Nelson's death.

During the time these men were in charge, the church building was in such bad shape that it had to be torn down. The iron ore rocks, which had been the building's foundation, were used to mount a plaque commemorating the site of the church and the first trustees, including J. G. McDade, A. Lawrence, C. A. Boon, W. P. Haughton, and J. P. Gaines.

A group of concerned citizens and descendants of some early settlers buried at Fillmore Cemetery, located south of Old Highway 80, about seven miles east of Bossier City, became interested in maintaining the cemetery. Soon the Fillmore Cemetery Association, Inc., was chartered and the cemetery was deeded to the organization by the Louisiana Methodist Conference.

A fund for perpetual care has been established and the association is now accepting tax-exempt donations to ensure continued care of Fillmore Cemetery.

SLAUGHTER CEMETERY (N.E. Rodessa)

If any cemetery could be considered beautiful, this is it, with all its associations. Situated on a high hill, flat on top, it overlooks the entire country side. The grounds are well kept, closely mowed and clean. It is much larger than I expected to see, well-fenced with woven wire, with two large gates for vehicles.

It is quite attractive, there is no church connected with it.

No grave shows the slightest neglect. There are some 93 marked graves, a good many unmarked, mostly children.

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CENTERVILLE CEMETERY

(West Side of Centerville Road)

In the middle of a big pasture on the Centerville road is a grove of big trees.

No one seems to know the origin of this cemetery, however, there is one grave with an iron fence about it some four by seven feet that was probably the first grave there. There is no mark or name, not even a mound, with a few muscle shells scattered about.

This was probably the first grave there, and because it was already there, others followed until there are some 28 graves, a large number being very young children, even infants.

Around this isolated cemetery, there had been a barbed wire fence, now broken down in many places.

The posts are rotted off and the gate stands open, it is entirely uncared for, not a single grave showed any care whatever.

There are nine graves out of the 28 that are of infants of one year and under.¹ At the head of this one-fenced grave, there is a giant oak and that is dying, probably of old age. This high infant mortality would be impossible now.

It is alarming, in all of these ancient cemeteries the large number of deaths among the very young, no doubt because of the lack of medical care.

BLACK BAYOU CEMETERY

* * * * * * * *

This cemetery is at the right of the highway about half way between Gilliam and Vivian.

This at one time was the site of a Baptist Church. Some say it was burned

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by the woods being burned, others that the building had been taken down and a residence built of the lumber, and was afterward burned. This scribe just doesn't know, and he can't find anybody that does. This is seemingly a very old cemetery. Unfortunately, there are few marked graves with dates of births and deaths. A large portion of the graves are marked by an oblong group of native rock, with no marker to indicate the identity of the person buried there. Then again there is simply two native red rocks so placed as to indicate the head and foot of the grave and nothing else.

There had been a barbed wire fence, but it is all broken down now, no gate as there doesn't seem to be the need of one.

This cemetery is fairly grown up, and seemingly has received no care for years. Surely the friends and relatives, if any survive, should give it some care. It would be an excellent service for the public spirited citizens of the communities, especially the clubs in the various towns to render this service.

It seems a group of these people came in here before the Civil War and entered or bought lands and put them in cultivation. How much land they had we do not know. This burying ground is on a very high hill, overlooking a great valley to the West. These lands were abandoned long ago and gone back to the original forest conditions.

There is a residence somewhere about, but this scribe has not had the opportunity to look up the location. He will do so later.

STEWART-BONHAM BURYING GROUND

This cemetery lies east of Black Bayou Dam, on a ridge between Caddo Lake and Black Bayou, not far from Caddo Lake Dam, in the general direction S.E. from the dam, only a short distance.

Tradition says there were a lot of families. It is not known how many, came from South Carolina before the Civil War, just at what time nobody seems to know. They brought their slaves with them, bought or entered lands on the east sice of Caddo Lake, cleared the lands and put it in cultivation. Just how large an acreage there was, nobody knows.

In the course of time, there were deaths that could not wait long for burial. There seems to have been no system about the matter nor order, and there is only one grave with a marker, and that reads Robert Sidney Gilbert 1882-1895. Which was some 59 years ago. This marker is of cement, home made and is almost illegible, being broken in several places. There is one grave composed of cement and brisk, in the form of a vault that has been broken into. There had been a rumor going the rounds that money and other valuables had been buried there for safe keeping, but it wasn't any too safe.

Many other graves have been dug into, the soil not having been replaced and abandoned, probably scared away by the approach of someone. There seems to have been no order in these buryings, or if they were whites or blacks, no one knows, but the chances are that both are buried here.

At any rate, there is now no trace of former occupation. The probabilities are that with the end of the Civil War, the slaves being freed, slaves and owners scattered, never to return. At any rate, the forest has taken over again and now looks as if the hand of man had never interfered. Such is life.

BONHAM'S LANDING ON CADDO LAKE

Bonham's Landing on Caddo Lake, made famous by Capt. Bonham of the steamboat "Friendly". At this point there is a group of graves in an iron fence some 24 x 24 feet.

The fence is broken now and the graves have been cleaned off in recent years, by whom I do not know, probably by relatives.

Within this railing are two oak trees near 24 inches in diameter. There are several graves.

THOMAS BRANTLEY BIBLE as Union Parishy Louisiana and a second seco (Submitted by Betty Brantley Goyne)

Thomas Brantley was born in 1809 in Bladen County, NC. He was the son of Jesse Brantley, who was born in 1769 in Northampton County, NC. His mother's name is unknown. Jesse was the son of Thomas Brantley, born ca 1740, who died in 1777 in Northampton County, NC, and Martha, surname unknown.

Thomas Brantley moved with his father and two of his three brothers and five sisters to Greene County, AL by 1829. His oldest brother, James Abner Brantley, settled in Montgomery County, AL by April 1824. James Abner Brantley was married to Elizabeth Kirven,

Thomas Brantley married Caroline Elizabeth Tisdale in Greene Co., AL on November 9, 1829.

Thomas Brantley, his father and two of his brothers moved to Kemper County, MS by 1836. Thomas and his brother, Jesse, Jr., are seen in the tax records of Kemper County, MS for the years 1836-39. Evidently their father Jesse, Sr., died ca 1836, for his estate is taxed in 1836 and 1837.

Thomas Brantley and his brothers Jesse, Jr., and Philip Charles moved to Union Parish, LA ca 1843. Jesse, Jr., was married to Elizabeth Tutt, and had four children. Philip Charles never married. Evidence suggests that Philip Charles was handicapped in some way. Thomas' three brothers predeceased him. Thomas Brantley and Caroline E. Tisdale had ten children. Caroline died

in childbirth on 28 September 1847. Thomas remarried on 8 March 1849 to Holland Lee. They had four children, two of whom survived to adulthood. Thomas died 23 September 1856 at his home near Marion, Union Parish, LA. Both he and Caroline are buried in Concord Cemetery, Union Parish, LA.

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HAVE YOU DONE YOUR PART? Rachel Wagner

(This article was extracted from a quarterly published by The Genealogical Society of Broward County, Inc., Fort Lauderdale, Florida called "Imprints".)

Have you done your part? Have you put the names, month, year and place taken on all your portraits and photographs? Are all the children's school pictures dated and named? What about the wedding pictures, including yours? Remember all those trips you made? Have you identified the places and names where you and what's her/his name were standing in front of a statue of General WHO? on horseback? Aha! Just as I thought; most of us are guilty. Our pictures are in this box and that waiting for that day when I have more time; I retire, I finish this project or that.

Now, what about all the recorded information? Do you have Bible records, journals or diaries, old letters, newspaper articles, autograph or memory books?

Let's start with the Bible. Many families today do not own one but have Bibles that belonged to previous generations. Check to see what the last entry is and update to the present. If no room is left on the page then write or type the information and attach the sheet(s) to a page. <u>Never</u> use paper (metal) clips.

Journals or diaries are not kept by people as they once were, but think about how valuable those that were written are to the lucky genealogist that finds one. How many of us take time to record the happenings and thoughts of our daily life? We can all find time if we want. Just buy a spiral notebook and set a time aside each day or even bi-weekly. You will be surprised at the flow of words once you start and the pertinent information you will have at your fingertips.

Letters? Most of us pick up the phone and call out of state or even out of country to keep in touch. If letters are received and answered, do you promptly throw them away? Did you have a son, brother, husband or father in service? Admittedly, I am a packrat, but I am glad I am. I have all the letters from my father and brothers from World War II, most of them written Vmail and several from a brother stationed in Japan after the war written on rice paper. My son joined the Army as a paratrooper in 1966; receiving his wings at Ft. Rucker, Ala., he saw service as a chopper pilot in Vietnam. He retired in 1988 after twenty-two years of service having been stationed around the world-Vietnam, Italy, Ansbach, Germany, Hawaii, Korea, New Zealand and many stateside forts or camps. I have kept every letter he wrote. What a wonderful journal to pass on to his son or daughters in the future.

What about the pictures your sister sent with birth information of her newest child/grandchild; the picture of the reunion that you could not attend and a cousin was kind enough to send you copies of the pictures she took? Are the names and dates on the back? Who is that toddler and baby with cousin Jack? The next reunion, when you attend, is there a book or journal passed around for everyone to sign and to record information about the family, such as births, deaths and marriages during that year? If there is no such journal, start one and see to it that it attends each reunion even if you can't. Make arrangements for the next generation to have the book when you no longer can participate.

Newspaper articles. The best sources in the past and present are from small city or town newspapers, daily, bi-weekly, even weekly. These papers report more local and social news and often go into detail of relationships in reporting happenings, celebrations, births, deaths or marriages. Larger

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city papers often list only closest survivors in their obituaries and parents' names in wedding announcements and often do not publish births at all.

There is also news, especially in smaller papers, of fraternity, club, or church gatherings; reunions, retirements or just an article about a prominent citizen. Don't overlook any potential source.

Autograph books aren't popular now but were "the thing" years ago when, at the end of each school year, you'd have everyone in your class sign your book. Remember "Roses are red, violets are blue, sugar is sweet and I wish you were, too" and other non-sensical verse? The high school year book is also a grand source with dates of graduations and many are signed by class mates. Class reunion books or pamphlets are often published with update of who married who, children, etc.

Programs. These are given out at graduations, weddings, funerals and other functions. Many have relationships noted such as Jane Doe, bridesmaid, cousin/sister of the bride; John Doe, husband of Jane Doe and father of Joan Doe Rivers and Jack Doe, etc. Churches often publish pamphlets/books for 25-year, 50-year, centennial events. These usually list the deacons, church members and often the date they joined the church, pastors and tenure of service plus information on the construction of the church and whether it is the original building and site and/or additions, etc.

Towns, counties, townships or areas often put out historical books on the history of the settlement and biographies of the settlers. These are of great interest to genealogists as many relationships are noted through several generations. For instance, recently the Plymouth (Ohio) Historical Society published a book for their upcoming 175th anniversary of the founding of the Plymouth area. The book includes a narrative and photographical history of Plymouth including when the first streets and homes were built, the first business. Biographies of the first doctor, lawyer, businessmen, farmers, teachers are covered. The founding and building of the individual churches and their pastors, deacons and congregations are mentioned. All families that had lived or are still living in the area were asked to write a brief history of their families and encouraged to send pictures of family, reunions, gatherings and old pictures of the area. It is a delightful and informative book.

Quilts, stitchery, paints. Recently there have been articles on making "Remembrance Quilts". Each square contains names, birthdates, marriages, etc., of family individuals and often are presented to the eldest member to be passed on through future generations. Another idea is a "Reunion Quilt". All family members are asked to sign their names and birthdates on individual squares of cloth and during the ensuing year these signatures are embroidered and sewn into a quilt.

Embroidered family trees now are offered by companies with do-it-yourself kits, and some companies will make a finished tree for you.

Many families have a photographer who will take portraits of individuals or group settings at reunions, and think about how lucky you would be if a member is an artist who can sketch or paint portraits in oil.

One major project I have started is photographing each house that I have lived in during my lifetime; only one, an old farmhouse, was razed before I could take a picture. With each picture of a house, I include pictures of the family members taken at that period of time. Progressing thru the years it might include camping friends, roommates in college, service buddies, or the person you shared your first apartment with. Don't forget the pets, dogs, cats, gerbils, horses or whatever that were such important members of the family. You might get bonuses such as I did when I knocked at the door of a farmhouse I lived in when I was eight or nine years old. The lady who answered the door was in her 60's and fascinated by the explanation of my project and my request to photograph the house. She insisted I sit down and have coffee and fresh-baked rolls with her in the warm, familiar kitchen.

There are, no doubt, many, many more ways to help preserve your past for the future generations that I have not covered. I do hope that by setting down these ideas, I can help you in your projects of preserving your past.

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FIRST POST OFFICE OPENED HERE IN 1838

GROWTH IS REVEALED BY RECORDS

Peak in receipts was reached in 1929, but business has been improving for the past three years. Twenty-eight postmasters have served.

The post office in Shreveport was first established under the name of Coates Bluff in Natchitoches Parish, April 10, 1838, with John Cr Green as postmaster. Since that time twenty-six other men have held the postmastership. Carey P. Duncan, incumbent is the twenty-seventh since that time.

Records do not disclose where the first post office building in Shreveport was situated. Historians believe it was located somewhere in the 400 block of Texas Street.

The first post office building of brick construction was located on the site of the present edifice. It was the first government post office in Shreveport. The building was replaced by the present building in 1910. In 1932, the present building was enlarged, the floor space being doubled.

Of the twenty-seven postmasters who preceeded Mr. Duncan, only two are alive today. They are Nathan Ratcliff and Clem B. Clarke.

J. T. Tompkins is assistant postmaster and A. E. Stephenson is superintendant of mails. There are 66 clerical employees and 54 carriers employed by in the Shreveport office.

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THE ERA OF THE STEAM LOCOMOTIVE

Contributed by James A. Oliphant)

It is a sad thing to me that my descendants will never experience the sight and sound of a steam locomotive or the thrill of riding on a train pulled by one as it once was in my day. When I was growing up in Marshall, Texas, Marshall was a hub of activity for the Texas and Pacific (T & P) Railroad, and there were 37 passenger trains a day through Marshall at one time. They were still using steam power when I was in my twenties, so I well remember this era.

My grandfather Oliphant was an engineer for the T&P for 40 years. He started out as a fireman, operated a switch-engine in Marshall for a while, and eventually had a passenger run from Fort Worth to Texarkana. I can remember my grandfather taking me down to the "Roundhouse" in Dallas and that was a sight to see. They performed maintenance on the big locomotives there, and they could put them on a big turntable and move them around to different tracks or reverse their direction. My grandfather would come through Marshall one evening a week, on his run to Texarkana, and our family would usually go down to the Depot that evening to meet his train. My Dad would get up in the engine with him to visit and sometimes they would have to switch a car on or off while there. It was a big thrill for me to stand by the track down at the Depot and watch a train come in. You could hear it coming a good distance off, and then it would rumble past you blowing off steam, making a tremendous amount of noise, rattling the windows, shaking the ground, and clanging the bell. There isn't any other sound or sight like it.

After a train pulled into the Station and stopped, there would be a "hustle and bustle" of activity for a little while. People would be getting off and on the train. Vendors walked up and down the track "hawking" sandwiches, peanuts, newspapers, etc., and baggage handlers rushed around pulling wooden baggage carts. In it's "heyday", the Depot was a very busy place both day and night.

My great-aunt Nannie Holcomb lived over on the North side of town, just a few blocks from the Depot. She was more like a grandmother to me than an aunt, and I spent many nights over there with her. I can vividly remember laying in bed at night listening to the trains go in and out. You could hear the whistle blow and hear the sound of the engine for a long distance at night. Usually, when a train pulled out, it would start off slow with a slow motion of the drivers, and then the engineer would give it a good bit of throttle and you could hear the drivers turning real fast and then slow again, and this would alternate until the train got into motion. Then the sound would be slow and steady and would increase gradually as the train picked up speed. You could hear it as it went off into the distance blowing the whistle for the crossings. I can still remember the sound well.

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To ride on a train was always a big thrill for me, and to ride on the "Sunshine Special" was really something. I was lucky enough to have that opportunity a couple of times. I can still remember the special sounds of a train from a passenger's viewpoint too. You could, of course, hear the engine and hear the bell and the whistle as the engineer whistled for the crossings. You could also hear the click-clack of the wheels as they passed over the joints of the track, and you could hear the crossing signals get louder as you approached and then fade gradually into the distance.

I rode the train from Marshall to Dallas several times when I was a youngster. When I left home to go in the Air Force in 1947, when I was 17 years old, I rode the train to Dallas to enlist. They sent us from Dallas to San Antonio to Basic Training on a train. After Basic Training, I went from San Antonio to Keesler AFB at Biloxi, Mississippi by train, and while I was stationed at Keesler, I went back and forth to Marshall a couple of times on the train. After Keesler AFB, I was assigned to Davis-Monthan AFB in Tucson, Arizona, and I rode back and forth between Tucson and Marshall several times on the train. The train fare was \$32 one-way between Tucson and Marshall. Patsy, my wife, came out to Tucson on a train when we got married and she and the children rode a train from Marshall to New York in 1957 to join me in Germany. They had a compartment on a coach for that trip, which meant they did not have to change trains. Whenever a transfer was required, the coach was changed from one train to the other. So, we experienced quite a bit of train travel in our lives and all of it was behind a steam locomotive.

That train ride down through South Louisiana to New Orleans was quite interesting to me. We went through quite a lot of swampland, and in some of the small communities the train station with the platform around it would be built up on piling. In some of these small places, a passenger would put a flag out if he wanted to catch the train, and unless the flag was out, or someone needed to get off, the train would not stop. Trains carried most of the mail back then, but they could throw the mail off and pick up the mail pouch from a hook without having to stop, if a stop wasn't required. There was no air conditioning back then, and you rode with the windows up in warm weather. You would get a lot of black smoke and soot in the car sometimes.

I liked to travel on the train. It was a 24-hour trip between Tucson and Marshall, and I traveled in a "chair car" each time I went. A pullman or "sleeper" was more expensive. In a pullman car a porter would come at night and make up a bed for you. I just slept sitting up in my seat with a pillow. The dining car, or "Diner" was always real nice, but too expensive by my standards. I could get a pot of coffee for breakfast, and sometimes a sandwich. The meals were usually really good on those Dining cars. The train usually had a Lounge car or "Smoker", and if a passenger wanted to smoke, he could go down there without bothering anyone else. You could see a lot of country from a train.

I guess my last train ride was from Marshall to Tucson. After Patsy and I were married, we had a car and traveled that way, and then the passenger trains, along with the old steam locomotives, gradually disappeared. I was sorry to see them go.

Bethesda Baptist Church was originally organized as Whatley's Mill in 1785, in what was then Wilkes Co., GA. The area became Oglethorpe Co. in 1793 and Greene Co. in 1799, and many members of Bethesda Church became residents of Taliaferro 32 1 . Co., when it was cut off in 1825. The name was formally changed from Whatley's Mill to Bethesda Baptist Church on 14 Nov 1818. The first Minute Book is missing, but researchers are indeed fortunate to have Books 2 and 3 intact for church minutes are a marvelous genealogical source, and these are especially good. They give maiden and married names for ladies and second marriage names for widows. They give places of former residences when letters were presented from other churches. Deaths are noted. The author has given special treatment to slaves. They are indexed separately with their owners and many times former owners are named. Some estates are also mentioned giving clues to death if it is not listed in the minutes or membership lists. An index of Churches and places is also given. Size 8¹/₂ x 11. The author says, "The pioneers of the Province of Louisiana were few, beginning with only a very small number who came with Iberville in 1699, yet we find among those pioneers settling in Louisiana in the early seventeen hundreds the names of as many as eighty-two who were our direct ancestors. They were first generation Louisianians". She then names these 82 ancestors and where they came from with their date of arrival in Louisiana. Most came directly from France; many were French who stopped off in Canada before coming to Louisiana; others came from Germany, Switzerland, New Spain, now called Mexico, Luxemburg, Spain, and one even had Flemish ancestry.

Each of these ancestors is introduced in narrative form and the other lines introduced in the same manner, chapter after chapter, bringing them down to the present. The earliest dates I found were in the 1600's and the latest a birth in 1963. These families are taken through the various regimes of rule in Louisiana. There are many reproductions of documents. Some are in French, others in Spanish and most have been translated. There are many pictures of paintings of the early ancestors, which are fascinating. There are many, many ancestor charts to help you keep track of the lines. There is a list of references. If

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TITLE: TEXAS IN 1848 by Viktor Bracht. Translated from the German by Charles Frank Schmidt.

This book was written in 1848, as a travel guide for emigrants leaving Germany for Texas. The author had lived in Texas for several years, and had traveled widely over the state. He gave an honest appraisal of the land and its suitability or unsuitability for various kinds of crops and orchards. He described in detail the flora and fauna of the area, the climate and water sources available: He told the people to come while they still had assets to sustain themselves and what they could expect if they didn't. He advised them on what to bring from tools to food, and the kinds of clothing to bring and how much of each. He gave advice on the best time of year to depart and arrive along with ports of departure, arrival and routes to take. After landing in Texas, he gave names of merchants and people to assist them and the inland routes to travel with the distances between each stop. He quoted land and food and merchandise prices, the various types of housing and its costs. There was no area of the emigrant's life that he did not touch on from his first desire to emigrate until he was settled in Texas.

The author loved Texas and stated more than once that he would never return to Germany to live, but he did not paint Texas as an idle paradise. He gives its other side also, warning the emigrants not to linger in the swamp lands on the coast, as the area was deadly for the Germans not used to the heat, humidity, and at certain times of the year, the mosquitos. He also warned of the dishonest sea captains, merchants and scoundrels in the ports in both Germany and America, who preyed on the newcomers.

This book gives an excellent picture of the emigrant experience of these people, of the economies of the Germany they were leaving and of the Texas of 1848 that they were coming to. The only regret is that the author did not give us more names of the people in his accounts. Size 61/2 x 91/2. Hardbound. 229 pages. Indexed.
