ALONG THE OLD SABINE RIVER

(This article was contributed by Chester McMillan, 8510 Linda Ln., Little Rock, AR 72207, whose ancestors settled in Panola County, Texas.)

Down through the years, the tireless Sabine River has raced her course from deep in East Texas to the sea. She has hosted hundreds of men and and dozens of boats. Along her banks have grown and then faded clusters of houses, warehouses and stores, which made up long forgotten towns. She has carried millions of logs to the sawmills in Orange. She has fed her neighbors by the hundreds. For centuries she wound her course through the lives of the people of Texas and Louisiana. But time, like a river's exploding action, has erased the Sabine's fable of fame, fortune and fantasy. For now, there are only a very few memories of the infance of Texas along this river's western shore.

During the middle 1880's, the Sabine River was used for commercial trade. It is almost 500 miles by river from Logansport, Louisiana to Orange, Texas, yet once upon a time, steamboats made regular trips to the inland port. Merchants waited for furniture, coffins, saddles, copper post, iron skillets and even spices. Some looked to the coming of the steamboat for a letter from a relative, or a newspaper from New York or London. N. J. Caraway & Co., and Pace Hardware are two firms in Logansport that have remained since their forefathers met the steamboats for supplies.

The Sabine River's water route was only navigable in the early spring, and winter months, when the rains put the water level with the river banks. During these months, logs were also floated down the river to the gulf ports. Many logs are still at the bottom of the river at Logansport. The logs were of virgin cypress and will remain as a monument to another age.

As legends go, the pirate Jean LaFitte was the first to sail far north on the Sabine. He and his crew went ashore near Patroon Creek to establish the long forgotten town of Shacklefoot, regarded by historians as "a den of robbers and thieves". LaFitte was also said to have left some captives of pure Spanish descent, whose descendants still occupy the area around East Hamilton.

In the year 1837, the United States Army sent Major B. Riley of the Sixth U. S. Infantry to chart the Sabine River's course. His charts, made while rafting downstream, have changed little to this day, until you reach Logansport. It was his charting that opened the Sabine to commerce.

A year later the steamboat, VELOCIPEDE, navigated the Sabine, making two trips upriver. She was followed upstream that same year by the CERES. The steamer, WISCONSIN, made the trip in 1839, and the RUFUS PUTNAM in 1840. The ALBERT GALLATIN also tackled the river in 1840.

It was never easy for the steamboat captains. They could move only when the river rose enough to make her navigable, allowing passage over the massive snags Major Riley found in 1837. Two of these massive snags exist today although covered by the waters of Toledo Bend. They are located about 72 miles downstream from what was Hickman's Ferry. Downstream another 80 miles, Major Riley found what was then known as the "narrows". Three separate channels choked into one where the river currents twisted, turned and swirled.

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If there is a niche of praise for the rivermen who fought that river over a century and half ago, many names would be enshrined there. Some of the steamers and their captains included:

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The old riverboats died, many of them in the river. Others sailed to more navigable waters. The CERES, WISCONSIN and the PUTNAM all sank in the upper Sabine at early dates. The WASHINGTON opened her seams in dry weather and sank at Fullerton's Landing. The UNCLE BEN, a Civil War vessel standing by with cottonclad decks at the Battle of Sabine Pass, struck a snag on the upper Sabine. The beautiful toned bell from the UNCLE BEN now sits in the front of Center Elementary School. After being salvaged from the UNCLE BEN, who went down near East Hamilton, the bell served the First Baptist Church, until around 1906. The bell then was placed on the roof of the old Center High School building erected in 1912. A rope from the bell came through the roof and was in the school lobby.

During the end of the 1800's three steamboats came to Loganport's docks and stayed. Deep beneath the waters of Toledo Bend, those gracious old boats of another era sit.

The NECHES BELLE was perhaps the grandest and most popular of the boats. Most of the natives of Logansport got a glance at the NECHES BELLE when the Sabine River was low the summer before Toledo Dam was completed. Almost the

entire 150 foot length of the vessel was visable to anyone standing on the bridge across the Savine. The planks of her deck, made of cypress, were well preserved. During World War II members of her crew volunteered to raise the sunken boilers for Loansport's scrap drive.

The NECHES BELLE was built in Beaumont, Texas in 1890, near the mouth of the bayou. Pearl Bunn and Capt. Will built the big steamboat with lumber from the Reliance Lumber Co. The machinery came from another boat, the VICKSBURG. They built the NECHES BELLE on dry land, put it on rollers, and lowered it into the water. It cost about \$3,000 to build the boat, not counting the machinery. Soon after launching, the boat came to Orange by way of the Neches River and Sabine Lake. A boatload of sightseers went out on the first trip on the Sabine River. Fully loaded, she carried over 1,000 bales of cotton. Her second deck housed a saloon, where bands played and passengers enjoyed the finer luxuries of steamboat travel.

Capt. John White was Capt. Will's first mate when the NECHES BELLE made her last trip. These are the words in which Capt. John described the journey to a newspaper reporter before he died:

"We sailed out of Orange during the latter 1890's with lumber to build a new bridge for the H. E. & W. T., the railroad from Shreveport to Houston. Sometimes referred to as Hell Either Way Taken), but she never came out of port at Logansport. She was siezed by the law for some sort of debt. I can't recall just now what it was. We tied her up and left her there. That was in fairly high water. Soon the river fell and the NECHES BELLE keeled over.... I have no doubt that she's still there."

The MAUDE HOWELL had a Logansport native as captain, the late E. E. Price. This steamboat hauled many bales of cotton, giving the farmers a market for their fields of the fluffy white product. Timber and skins ran a close race for second as cargo. The MAUDE HOWELL was sunk around 1890 on the Texas side of the Sabine River across from where the NECHES BELLE had sunk.

Capt. Price also steered the EXTRA, a 100 foot side-wheeler that hauled cotton between Logansport and Orange. Capt. E. E. would stand with a rifle in the pilot house of the EXTRA and shoot the huge alligators that then infested the Sabine River. The EXTRA sank a few miles downstream from the bones of the NECHES BELLE.

Long ago Logansport was known as "Polvadour" (DeSoto Parish was settled by the Spanish and French) and later called Logan's Ferry. Local legend tells of another ship, a Spanish vessel, sinking three or four miles south of the EXTRA. The ship is said to have been carrying barrels of whiskey and gold. Years ago when the weather was warm and the water low, Texas and Louisiana boys dug for gold from the old ship.

Steamboat traffic on the Sabine River, hauling mostly cotton, was at its peak between the Civil War and 1897, when the railroad bridge at Logansport was built. Then the "Hell Either Way Taken" puffed and rumbled its message of impending doom to the vessels below. It is also interesting to note that the last trip of the NECHES BELLE brought lumber to build the railroad through Logansport. Thus the steamboat era on the Sabine River ended.

Man has never conquered the Sabine River, though he has tried. Toledo Bend Dam holds her momentarily in check, but only for the instant it takes to overflow the spillway and then she rushes again towards the Gulf. In her backwaters are still heard the hoarse croak of bull gators in the balmy mating days of

spring. Poisonous moccasins and lazy turtles still sun on the river snags and nerons stand stilt-legged in the shallows. And, perhaps, if only in one's mind, we can faintly hear, far off, the whistles of the steamboats churning northward.

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The handsome steamer "Electra" whose neat staterooms are named for favorite flowers of the South, was a thing of beauty at the wharf. The boat is beautifully illuminated with electric lights and is one of the most attractive of the waters. It has been a long time since a large and beautiful boat landed at Shreveport, the river being at such a low stage. The steamer "Scovell" was a welcome visitor too, and going down the river again had a good passenger list and among the "precious freight", a bride and groom. River trips were once the choice way of taking a bridal tour and no one relates more romance than the veteran captains of steamboats. The "Electra" left last evening.

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It is said that Milam Street was the first paved street in Northwest Louisiana, East Texas and Southwest Arkansas.

HANDFASTING - WHAT IS IT?

Do you know the meaning of the letters "H/F" after a person's name? This may be found in marriage and birth records and the letters stand for the term "Handfast". It is basically a sign of the confirmation of a form of uncannonical, private or even a probationary form of marriage. Handfasting was a form of announcing a union between a man and woman who wished to live together as husband and wife before receiving the blessing of the church.

The couple would stand before a group of their peers, hold their clasped hands above their heads and state their intentions. The agreement was good for a year and a day, or until the preacher came to perform the rites of the church. If, at the end of the specified time, each wished to go his own way, they could do so with no ties. No matter what happened, any child born of a Handfast couple was considered legitimate and would inherit.

MY FORTSON FAMILY

(Contributed by Merrill C. Williams of Diamond Bar, CA. It is the latest chapter on "My Fortson Family" and clears up the mystery of the location of the E. R. Fortson Plantation out of Bethany, LA.)

It was in January 1991, that the many years of search for Francis Marion Fortson ended. The greater family genealogists came through. By then the story of the Fortson's trek, first south and then west, had been recorded. Then it was learned that Marion Fortson was the name he was known by in the Bethany (Lickskillet) community. He became a Captain in the CSA during the Civil War. That is why he and his wife, Virginia A. E. Respess Davenport had two children, Elijah Marion (1860) and V. A. Elizabeth (1861) born before the war, and Mary Frances (Fannie), Francis Marion II and Willie born after the war. All of their children were born on their plantation in Harrison County, Texas. Virginia's older children, Rebecca, Sarah and Isabella Davenport were also born in Deep East Texas.

Marion Fortson had several cousins who also fought for the cause of the Confederacy. His Uncle, William A. Fortson, according to custom, raised his own troops, Company K, Fifth Louisiana Volunteers, in DeSoto Parish and fought in the Mexican War, earning the right to be called Major. His grandfather, William Fortson, was commissioned by the Army in Georgia (1809) and served as a captain in the War of 1812. His two great-grandfathers, of course, served as officers in the Revolutionary War.

Marion Fortson passed away on October 25, 1905, and is buried in an unmarked grave at the Fortson Cemetery in Caddo Parish, Louisiana. He lived to see his youngest daughter, Fannie, married to James C. Williamson on 23 November 1890. They were married in the Greater Shreveport area of Caddo Parish at the Providence Baptist Church. For over fourteen years the minister of this church was Marion's brother, Elijah Richardson Fortson. He signed the Process Verbal of Marriage Certificate. Mary Frances, listed on the 1880 DeSoto Parish Census Records as "Fanny" signed the certificate, "Fannie Fortson".

Virginia A. E. Fortson passed away in 1875 in DeSoto Parish and was put to rest in Keatchie Cemetery three years after the family moved from Texas. Her mother, Judith Respess of North Carolina, lived on with the Fortson family. Marion did not marry again.

When his daughter Elizabeth's husband, J. T. Bateman, tried to wrest control of his affairs from after the turn of the twentieth century, Marion protested loud and long. He thought that despite his seventy plus years he was quite fit and competent. His estate was settled, after his death, in the Caddo Parish Court. Eight of Marion's brothers, children and heirs of others, mostly grandchildren, shared equally in his estate.

A letter from Andrew L. Leath in February, showed the Record of Deeds in Caddo and Harrison Counties. Andy proves that despite no 1850 and 1860 census counts of Elijah S. Fortson and his family in Caddo Parish, it was there that he established his plantation and engaged in many land transactions during these years. It was to this plantation that Marion returned in the 1890's and lived out his years.

THE INGRAM FAMILY

The Ingram Family, although having resided in England and Scotland for many centuries, was originally of Scandinavian origin. The name, originally Ingegramme, comes from the combination of the ancient Scandinavian words, "inge", meaning house and "Gramme", meaning grain; hence "storehouse of grain". The name in England even today is sometimes found as Ingramme.

The family evidently came to England prior to the Norman Conquest in 1066 for it is found in several forms as Ingram, Ingramme, and Ingraham in Domesday Book, Ragman's Rolls of the Hundreds, the first three conci taken by the Normans for tax purposes between the years 1085 and 1150.

In dealing with proper names, and especially with family names, it should always be remembered that up until the publication of the English dictionary in 1752 by Samuel Johnson, there was no such thing as exact spelling. A person spelled a family name, a place name or any other word as it suited his personal fancy. Thus we find the names of brothers in early records spelled in entirely different ways. Sometimes a father and son would use different spellings or several spellings each. For example, Shakespeare spelled his own name sixteen different ways.

The Scottish branch of the family migrated to Scotland in the early eighteenth centure and settled in the Lowlands. They became covenanters and suffered much from religious persecutions.

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JOHNSTON-PATTERSON BIBLE

This beautiful Bible was loaned to Mrs. Rodney (Mary Ann) Howes of Bossier City, Louisiana, who is also a member of the Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association. Her great-grandparents, Alexander Johnston and Elizabeth Patterson, her grandparents, Annie Johnston and Henry Asher Stark are listed in these records.

The Bible is four inches thick with a deeply debossed hardbound cover. The metal clasps that secured it are missing. It is beautifully illustrated throughout and the last page is the marriage record of Alexander Johnston and Elizabeth Patterson. At the top of the page are two oval pictures of the bride and groom. This book was "Potters Standard Edition of Holy Bible" Philadelphia, PA. Printed by John E. Potter & Co., 614-67 Sansom St., (No dates)

Alexander Johnston migrated from New York and Elizabeth Patterson from Burlington, Vermont. They settled first in Painesville, Ohio (near Cleveland) and later moved to Madisonville, a suburb of Cincinnati, Ohio.

It is covered with Johnson grass, shoulder high, and it is only with the greatest difficulty one can make his way about. There seems to have been no order in the placing of the graves.

There are many very nice monuments, many that are not, and some of these better ones have fallen over.

Many graves have caved in and need filling, one can hardly walk across the cemetery without danger of stepping into an unfilled grave. This cemetery is a shame on its people.

EDITED WITH NOTES BY WESLEY THURMAN LEEPER

A continuation of letters written by the sons of James Alexander Park and Edah Bass during the Civil War. They resided in Paraclifta, Arkansas, which no longer exists.

I received your letter of the 29th of April which was a great satisfaction to me. I have no news worth writing to you as I have written you all the news (2),

Well, I think you said something about the Widower a few times. You write like you want me to say something (5). I am afraid you bother yourself too much about the boys. I think you might wait until Peace is made, then it will be time enough, I think (6).

You said that if we did not come home very soon we would not get a wife. I want to know what use I have for one now. I am very sorry that they wont wait until Peace is at hand, because I will look for one on this side of the Mississ-

So no more news at the present, but remain your affectionate brother until death.

This letter was written by James Monroe Park to his sister, Harriett Narcissus Park, at Paraclifta, Arkansas. We last heard from James while he was in winter quarters at Shelbyville, Tennessee. See his last letter, written on March 7, 1863. This letter was written after the Confederate retreat from Jackson, Mississippi, following their defeat there on May 14, 1863. Following the battle of Jackson on May 14th, General Joseph E. Johnston and his troops pulled out of Jackson and halted at Canton, from which point this letter was written.

- (1) 23.3 miles due north of Jackson by railroad (1950).
- (2) Our last letter from James was dated March 7, 1863.
- (3) Burrel Josephus Park, his brother, who last wrote on May 3, 1863, from Petersburg, Virginia.
 - (4) Photograph.

NOTES

This letter was written by James Monroe Park to his younger brother, William Columbus Park, known as "Lum" to his family and friends, then 14 years and 11 months old.

- (1) Canton is 23.3 miles due north of Jackson, Mississippi, by rail (1950).
- (2) His brother, Newton Alexander Park.
- (3) Newton had been left on detached service at Selma, Alabama. Newton tells about this in his letter of June 12, 1863.
- (4) James apparently had "writers itch" this day, for we know that he wrote separate letters, all in pencil, to Harriett Narcissus Park, Mrs. Coker, Martha

Ann Park, and William Columbus Park.

- (5) Joseph Brooks was a prisoner of the Federals on March 7, 1863, having been captured after the battle of Murfreesboro, Tennessee. Apparently he had been exchanged and was back in Mississippi with James as this letter was written. Burrel Josephus Park wrote on April 26, 1863, that he had seen Joon particular design of the profit of the conseph Brooks in Virginia, still a prisoner.
- (6) In his letter of February 13, 1863, written from winter quarters at Shelbyville, Tennessee, James Park stated that James Rind had been sent back sick to Tullahoma, Tennessee.
- (7) James was 22 years, 4 months, and 20 days old when this letter was written; "Lum" was not quite 15. Apparently this part of the message was just talk between "two young bucks."

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Camp Wartrace, Tennessee (1) June 10, 1863

Dear Father:

word at I will attempt to write you a few lines as I have an opportunity of sending it by hand (2) to Arkansas. These lines leave me well, and I hope you all are similarly blessed.

J. T. Wood (3), Captain Herndon (4), and F. L. Coker (5) are all well. Merit Coker left here on the 8th to go to the hospital at Rome, Georgia. Jimmy (6) is trying to get a discharge, and it is thought he will succeed. If so, he will leave here soon.

I received a letter from brother James (7) yesterday. He was well, and Newton (8) also. He (9) sent me a letter from you, and one from Sis (10), Lum (11), and one from Aunt Molly (12) which he had received from home.

It was a great pleasure for me to hear from you for it seems like a long time since I have seen or heard from home. (13) As soon as you receive this, write to me and direct your letter to me at Little Rock, Arkansas, 19th Regiment Arkansas Volunteers, Churchill's Brigade (14), care of W. P. Johnson, and he (Johnson) can bring me your letter.

We have not heard any news from Vicksburg that is reliable. At last account Grant (15) had fallen back and spades is trumps again-that is he went to ditching. It is the impression here that the Yankees can't take Vicksburg = (16). State of the state 30 J. L.

There is no news from the front here. There is some skirmishing occassionally. We have plenty to eat and are drilling daily. The health of the army here appears to be fine. Wheat crops are fine; corn crops late. It has been raining every day for two weeks.

Everything is very high here. Horses are worth from three hundred to one thousand dollars; cows and calves from fifty to one hundred dollars, and other things in proportion.

Lum (17), if you are so busy courting the girls that you can't put in a word for me, don't marry until I get back (18), and I will give you a pig for your wedding.

The way you wrote to James (19) scared me for fear you would have all the girls engaged and there will be no chance for me when I get back (20).

Give my love to all the children (21) and write to me every chance you get to send a letter on this side of the Mississippi River. It can be mailed to this side of the river and I will get it.

J. T. Wood (23) sends his respects to you and family, so no more at present. I remain your son as ever.

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NOTES

This letter was written by Burrel Josephus Park to his father, James Alexander Park, at Paraclifta, Arkansas. When this letter was written Burrel was slightly over 19 years old. He had been captured at the fall of Arkansas Post, Arkansas, January 11, 1863; had been exchanged in Virginia, and was now on his way back to fight again with the Army of Tennessee.

- (1) Camp Wartrace was located at or near Wartrace, Tennessee, on what is now the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway, 96.5 miles from Chattanooga, and 55.0 miles from Nashville.
 - (2) That is, by messenger.
- (3) This refers to J. T. Wood, a dear friend, who was, I believe a Lieut-enant in his company.
 - (4) Captain Herndon, commander of his company, Company "K".
 - (5) Floyd L. Coker, a dear friend.
- (6) This refers to James Stovall, brother of Merit. He got his discharge, all right. See Burrel Park's letter of July 13, 1863.
 - (7) His brother, James Monroe Park.
 - (8) His brother, Newton Alexander Park.
 - (9) James Monroe Park.
 - (10) His sister, Harriett Narcissus Park.
 - (11) His brother, William Columbus Park.
 - (12) Am not sure who "Aunt Molly" is.
- (13) Burrell had been in the Confederate army eleven months and five days when this letter was written.
- (14) Brigadier General Churchill had been in command of the Confederate forces when they surrendered at Arkansas Post, Arkansas, January 11, 1863.
 - (15) General U. S. Grant, later President of the United States.
- (16) He was so wrong! Vicksburg surrendered to Grant less than 30 days after this letter was written-July 4, 1863, to be exact.
 - (17) Here he apparently directs his letter to his younger brother, "Lum".
- (18) "Lum" waited. Fourteen years later, on August 29, 1877, he was married to Miss Martha Alice Steel.
 - (19) James Monroe Park, his older brother.
- (20) Burrell found his chance later. He got back, all right, and on March 12, 1867, he was married to Miss Amanda M. Falls.
 - (21) Referring to his younger brothers and sisters at home.
 - (22) Relatives.
 - (23) See Note #3, above.

Camp near Yazoo City, Mississippi June 12, 1863 (1)

Dear Father:

I arrived at camp this morning and have not seen the letter that you wrote to us. Borther (2) is out on picket (3) and I have not seen him and do not know what you wrote.

I am well at present. I have no news to write to you, only that we have orders to march, but do not know where our destination is.

Brother James remailed the letters and sent them to Selma, Alabama (4), where I was on special detail and I never received them, but hope I will get them (5).

Well, I just dined on corn bread and beef, and I am as well satisfied as I had dined at your table. I have got so used to hard living that it does not go hard with me now (6).

Our men had a fight the other day and we was victorious. It is reported that we took 800 prisoners, 200 negroes, 200 mules, and 22 flat boats loaded with corn and bacon, but this you need not believe unless you hear it is confirmed.

We have hot weather here and dry, but we had a good rain yesterday. You cannot tell that it has rained, but crops look well at this time. I think we will have good corn crops, but wheat there is not much of in this part of the country. I am glad to know there is good crops in Arkansas, for we have been living on corn bread for about five months.

I would write a longer letter if I had seen your letter to James.

I fared sumptiously in Alabama while I was there on detached service, but it was so short a time that it did not appear good. I will bring this to a close, so remain yours.

Give my love to all of my relatives and inquiring friends and all of the family. I remain your affectionate son.

P. S. If you see Billy Lewis' (7) folks, give them his respects and tell them that he is well. His father lives in Brownstown, near Hogtown.

This letter was written in pencil by Newton Alexander Park to his father, James Alexander Park, of Paraclifta, Arkansas. At the time this letter was written the Vicksburg Campaign was nearing it's close. The Park brothers had moved to Yazoo City from Canton, following their defeat at Jackson, Mississippi, on May 14th, 1863.

- (1) Yazoo City is located on the Illinois Central Railway (1950), 45.3 miles northwest of Jackson, Mississippi. It is about 45 miles airline from the Mississippi River, and about the same distance from Vicksburg.
 - (2) James Monroe Park, an older brother.
 - (3) Picket Post. He was apparently on the lookout for enemy forces.
- (4) In his letter of May 28, 1863, James Monroe Park states that Newton had been left at Selma, Here Newton explains what he was doing there.
 - (5) That is eventually, we also not say a section was set all the pairs

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- (6) Notice that Newton is a good soldier. Most boys would have complained of the poor food, but not Newton!
- (7) This is the same William P. Lewis, who in Newton's letter of January 18, 1863, certified that Newton did not gamble. He was killed at the battle of Ezra Church, Georgia, on July 28, 1864.

As I have one more chance to write you, I will write a few lines by Mr. Barksdale (2).

I have no news to tell you except that we have had a plenty of hard times, and I expect harder coming (3). We have been in hearing of the cannons now for three weeks, and I reckon we will be with them before long (4).

I cannot tell you how the battle terminated at Vicksburg (5). The report is that we slaughtered them (6) like hogs. I reckon when we leave here that we will go to Vicksburg. (7). (A) would state bed by

Brother Newton (8) is not with me at this time. (Note. Brother Newton had actually retired, but James had not yet seen him. See Newton's letter of the same date). He was left with our baggage at Shelbyville, Tennessee, and has not returned to his command yet, but I have heard from him several times since I left (9). He is well. I am well at present myself.

I have not heard from James Rind (10) yet. J. J. Brooks (11) is in fine health. Aron Prescott (12) is in better health than he has been since he joined the army.

I heard from Brother Burrel (13) a few days ago, and he was in fine health. There is some talk of him coming down here, or rather his command. I would like for his commander, General Churchill (14) to command us, for the boys all like him very much.

We have a report that General Kirby Smith (15) has crossed the Mississippi River and is on this side now, and that he defeated the Yanks at Milliken's Bend (16). If that be so, we stand a good showing yet.

We have heard that many men are deserting every day, and a few from our regiment, but none from our company yet. I think it is the wrong time for the boys to be leaving in the time of battle. It makes it harder on us. We have very strict orders now. We have roll call three times a day, and every man that does not answer to his name is sent to the Provost Guard and made to walk post eight hours in a day, and no man is allowed to leave camp for any distance.

The health of the company is better than it has been in some time. Henry Penney, (17) has been having the chills and fever. With the exception of him we have no more sick in camp.

No more at present. I must close. Give my love to all. Tell all the family to write to me by Mr. Barksdale (18) when he returns to his command.

NOTES

This letter was written by James Monroe Park to his father James Alexander Park, shortly before the surrender of Vicksburg, July 4, 1863.

- (1) For location of Yazoo City, see notes on Newton Alexander Park's letter written on the same day. (Yazoo City was captured by the Federals July 13, 1863. One month after this letter was written.
 - (2) The regular courier, mentioned several times in these letters.
- (3) He was a good prophet. Actually the real hard times were yet to
- (4) Here he refers to the gunfire in and around Vicksburg. Actually the Park boys did not engage in the conflict in Vicksburg, for General Joseph E. Johnson was frantically trying to bring up enough men to relieve General Pemberton, besieged in Vicksburg, but the surrender came before he did any real good.
 - (5) Actually the real battle did not terminate until July 3, 1863.
- (6) James was apparently referring to Grant's grand assault made on Vicksburg on May 22, 1863. It was a most gallant attack supported by heavy shelling from the gunboats and the mortar fleet in the Mississippi River. Three times the assault was repeated. Finally, after the assault had ceased elsewhere, General McClernand, thinking he had made an entry, called for one more charge to create a diversion in his favor. The assault was made-the last to be made on Vicksburg-and repulsed with fearful slaughter.

More than 3,000 dead and wounded Federal soldiers lay on the ground between the lines-the wounded dying in agonies untellable, the dead rotting in the heat of the early Mississippi summer. Three days they lay, stubborn Grant refusing to ask for a truce for the treatment of his wounded and the

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burial of his dead, thinking that such a request would be an admission of weakness. Finally on the afternoon of May 25th, 1863, after more than three full days of horror, General Pemberton, the Confederate commander, asked the truce, so that aid might be given the enemy soldiers. Talk about chivalry in war!

- (7) See note #4 above.
- (8) Newton Alexander Park, a younger brother, member of his own company.
- (9) Actually Newton was left at Shelbyville, but later he came on to Selma, Alabama, where he spent some time before coming on to Mississippi. The shortest distance from Shelbyville to Jackson was by way of Chattanooga, Birmingham and Meridian, a distance of approximately 496 miles by rail. Due to invading armies on the route and war-racked railroads, however, Newton had to go to Chattanoogs, thence to Atlanta, Montgomery, Mobile, and thence to Meridian before reaching Jackson, a distance of 825 miles. No doubt the boy thought he was travelling around the world! In an effort to reach Jackson in time to aid in the defense of Vicksburg, General Joseph E. Johnston left a sick-bed in Chattanooga, and made the same round-about trip in three days, arriving in Jackson on the night of May 13, 1863. On the next day he was defeated and forced to retreat to Canton, 23. 3 miles to the north.
- (10) In his letter of February 13, 1863, written from winter quarters at Shelbyville, Tennessee, James Monroe Park stated that James Rind had been sent back sick to Tullahoma, Tennessee.
- (11) J. J. Brooks had been captured at the battle of Murfreesboro, Tennessee, and carried to Virginia, where he had been exchanged. Apparently by this time he had rejoined the Army of Tennessee.
 - (12) In two or three letters James Monroe Park had written that Aron "Poke" Prescott was in bad health. Apparently he was in fine shape by this time.
 - (13) Burrel Josephus Park, his brother.
 - (14) Brigadier General Churchill had been in command of the Arkansas troops (Burrel Park included) which surrendered at Arkansas Post, Arkansas, January 11,4,1863. Apparently he was very popular with his men.
 - (15) General Edmind Kirby Smith, in command of the Trans-Mississippi Department, with headquarters at Shreveport, Louisiana. The vastness of his territory and it's remoteness from Richmond made of it almost another Government, with Shreveport as it's "capitol".
 - (16) Milliken's Bend is twenty miles upstream from Vicksburg, Mississippi, on the Louisiana side, opposite the point where the Yazoo River joins the Mississippi.
 - (17) Henry Penney was a close friend of the Park boys. He has been mentioned several times in these letters. Apparently he was acting as a courier, carrying letters and other items for the troops, to and from their homes.
 - (18) Mr. Barksdale was the courier who has been mentioned several times in these letters.

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WHY A FAMILY HEALTH TREE?

It was suggested in a recent local newspaper article that while you are compiling your family genealogy you should also gather material for a medical genealogy. A family health tree can help solve immediate medical problems and match lifestyles and health care to genetic makeup. Medical problems can be inherited as easily as hair color. Many health problems are a combination of genetic and environmental factors and a person's lifestyle can be adjusted to match genetic tendencies. If your family health history showed a tendency for heart disease you would certainly want to watch your diet, cut back on red meat, watch your cholesterol, and watch your stress.

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Control of the Contro

To prepare a family health tree, start by talking to living family members: grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins. Has anyone had cancer, heart disease, diabetes or mental illness? The March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation has a form available to help families complete health histories. Single copies are available free from local chapters. For each family member you should record the date of birth, blood type, occupation, major medical conditions or disorders, and health-related habits, such as drinking or smoking. Genetic diseases to ask about include alcoholism, allergies, blood diseases, cancer, cardivascular disease, cystic fibrosis, epilepsy, diabetes, mental illness, miscarriages, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, obesity, skin diseases, and thyroid disorders. · 是一句,就是他的情况。 包含:

"Basically, it isn't necessary that you know your ancestor came over on the Mayflower." Genetically, your four grandparents are as far back as you need to go. If something occurs several times in the family, you might want to then obtain the death records of your grandparents and their brothers and sisters.

A thorough understanding of one's medical roots is vital for every family said Dr. Aubrey Milunsky, head of the Center for Human Genetics at the Boston University School of Medicine. "They may be able to prevent, anticipate and treat conditions which they might otherwise not be aware of which could cause ill health or fatality," he said. and the state of t
