## SHREVE MEMORIAL LIBRARY ENTERS ERA OF CD-ROM FOR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

As far as can be determined, Shreve Memorial Library is the first public library in the Central South to have a computer with CD-ROM (Compact Disc-Read Only Memory) capability dedicated to genealogical research. The Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association made a gift of the computer to the library in March 1994.

Mr. James Pelton, Director of Shreve Memorial Library, is having a computer desk constructed to support this new addition to the library.

For those interested in the technical specifications of the computer, they are as follows:

Two Teac high density floppy disc drives: 3.5" and 5.25".

Installed software includes: MS-DOS 6.2 and Windows 3.11.

At the outset, two CDs were a gift to the library. Their controlling programs are installed on the hard drive. They are:

The Handy Book for Genealogists, Eighth Edition, by Everton Publishers, Inc.

The New Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia, 1992 edition, by Grolier Electronic Publishing, Inc.

Several genealogical data files published by Precision Indexing are loaded on the hard drive. The Data Access Program (DAP) and Vision/View 2.1 program required for accessing Precision Indexing products is also loaded on the hard drive. At this writing these files include the following:

Marriages, Early to 1800: GA, NC, TN.

Marriages, Early to 1825: AL.

Marriages, Early to 1850: AR.

1890 Civil War Veterans and Widows Index: LA.

Genealogical Research Systems, Search and Retrieval Software, Version 2.6, is installed on the hard drive. This program allows a person to search for information in any of the genealogical databases produced by Automated Archives, Inc. These include information on CDs, floppy diskettes, and the hard drive.

Individuals and organizations wishing to support this program, either by ordering software or by contributing money, should contact the head librarian of the Genealogy Department. The Genealogy Department will maintain a list of software in the library's inventory.

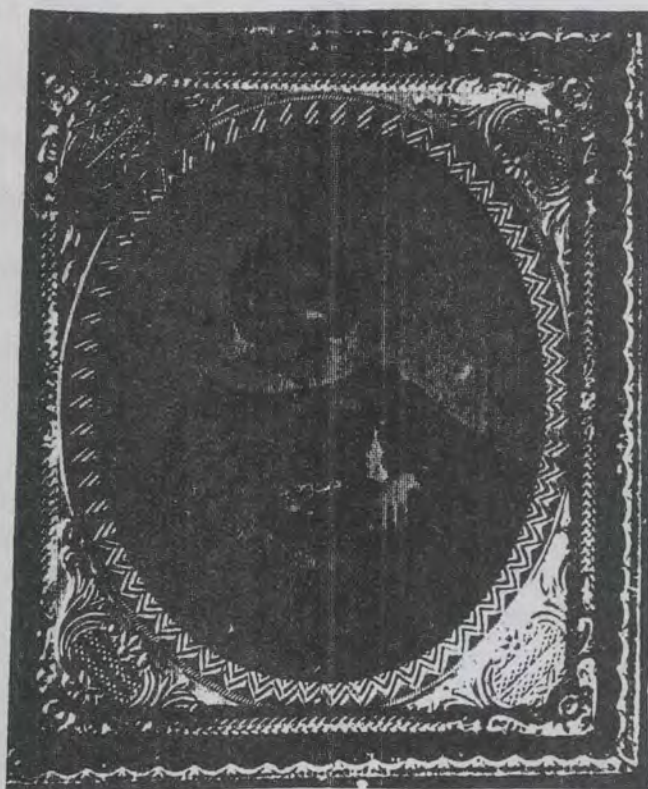

## THE CODAY FAMILY

(This Family History was submitted by our member, Linda Atkins Coday, 2402 Waverly Dr., Bossier City, LA.

Jesse J. Coday was born in Georgia, and his wife, Mary Ann Elliott, was born in South Carolina. Following their marriage in Greene County, Alabama on January 3, 1827, they moved to Jackson County, Mississippi, and remained there through 1840.

Jesse J. Coday apparently was in the Shreveport, LA area in 1843, because mail was in the dead letter office. J.J. Coday, James H. Clark and William Craig had a lumber mill during 1846-1849, possibly earlier. This mill was 22 to 25 miles from Mansfield, Louisiana.

Mary Ann Susan Coday (1843-1933) a school teacher, wife of Frank Alston, was the last child. She said they lived on Castor Bayou when she was a child. The mill could have been located on this bayou. Jesse was 49 years old when he died on 5 October 1849, with ulceration and yellow fever, leaving Mary Ann and seven children.

Mary Ann became a farmer. She bought 160 acres of land from Samuel Schooler in October of 1850 in Logansport, Louisiana. (The present F. C. Coday home is located on this acreage.) Jesse and Mary Ann's children were as follows: Napoleon Bush, Jane Elizabeth, Ethelbert Glover, Washington Franklin, Lucian Fabion, Mary Ann Susan and Francis Marion.

Napoleon, Washington and Lucian were in the Civil War. Washington was in the Battle of Vicksburg, taken prisoner, and last heard from at Keatchie, Louisiana in the hospital. Napoleon did not return. Lucian returned to marry and live on the land Mary Ann had bought.

Lucian Fabion, 1843-ca 1880, and Mrs. Alabama "Bama" Tidwell Mabry, 1843-1923, married April 28, 1864. Lucian was a farmer. Their children were Henry David, M. N. Annie, Charles Solomon, Marion (Mary) A., Robert H., and Willie. Robert H. and Willie died young. The Coday's and Tidwell's were Baptist.

Henry David married Stella Johnston on April 4, 1889. They married at C. W. Johnston's home near Joaquin, Texas and traveled by horseback to Oak Grove (Stanley) Louisiana. Their first grocery bill was \$20 and it filled a wagon. Henry was a farmer, worked on the railroad bridge gang, and was Constable for the 8th Ward (1920-1931 at the time of his death, 22 March 1931. H.D. and Stella are buried in the Old Logansport Cemetery along with two of their children, Alma (1895-1899) and Cecil (1899-1911). They had three other children, Fred Charles Coday, 12 Jan 1892-22 Feb 1985; Roger 1908-1980; and Gertrude born 1913.

Fred Charles Coday and Ethel Audrey McMillan married at Deadwood, Texas in the home of C. N. McMillan on 12 Sep 1923. He graduated from Logansport High School at 15 years of age and received a teacher's certificate after taking a test in Shreveport, qualifying him to teach third grade. His jobs varied after this because of the depression. They were farming, working in the office of a lumber company, roughnecking, the U.S. Navy, paint and paper hanger, and retired from the U. S. Postal Service as a rural mail carrier. During World War I, he was at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station Radio School. He was trained there and then sent to Harvard University for training as Electrician 3rd Class-R, discharged several years later as First Class.

Logansport was a port during the early days. They closed the town when yellow fever came in from New Orleans. You had to have a health certificate to get beyond the edge of town. Many Coday family members died of yellow fever. Smallpox caused a quarantine and they would place you in a pest house

in Mansfield, Louisiana. Mr. Coday did not remember a pest house in Logansport. Logansport and the bridge across the Sabine River would flood. The flooding may account for the loss of graves, such as Jesse, Mary Ann and Lucian. Fred Coday went to Shreveport with his father to see Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. Fred Coday would play while H. D. Coday visited with Buffalo Bill in the tent. Buffalo Bill's father and H. D. Coday's grandfather, Jesse, were first cousins.

Fred Coday's family joined the First Methodist Church in Logansport. Fred C. Coday, Jr., graduated from Logansport High School, Louisiana Tech at Ruston, Louisiana and the University of Houston. He was an administrator and school teacher. His wife, Linda Atkins Coday, was a teacher. She graduated from Centenary College in Shreveport, Louisiana. Their only son, Tom David Allen Coday is a student at LSUS. This family is a member of King's Highway Christian Church in Shreveport, Louisiana.

## GOVERNMENT ERECTS MARKER ON GRAVE OF GENERAL DICKSON, HERO OF REVOLUTION

(Submitted from article in Fayetteville, GA newspaper, THE CONSTITUTION, by Mrs. Fred Coday, Jr.)

"After more than 100 years the Federal Government recognizing the distinguished Revolutionary service of General David Dickson, has erected a marker on his grave, with representatives of the Daughters of the American Revolution in charge.

This grave is located near Lovejoy Station on the eastern side of the Flint River in Clayton County (formerly Fayette County).

General Dickson was appointed General of Georgia Militia in 1820. He came to Georgia to locate in 1784 and applied for a land grant in what was then Washington County.

General Dickson died in 1830 at age 79, leaving the following sons: Wm. H., Michael, Wm. David, John C., Thornton Smith, Robert David, John Orr, and Charles Allen. Daughters were Nancy Campbell Smith and Martha Easley McConnell.

Robert David was the grandfather of the Clayton and Fayette County Dicksons, his sons being W. W., Sherman, John M., each being in Civil War. Robert Dickson's daughter, Emma, married a Dixon.

From White's Historical Recollection of Georgia the following: General David Dickson died in Fayette County in 1830, aged 79 years. He joined the standard of American independence in February 1775 at Snow camps on Speedy River, at the taking of Colonel Cunningham and his Tories. In 1776 he commanded a volunteer company, under General Williamson, in the Cherokee Nation, against Cherokees and Tories. In 1777, he brought a company of minute-men to Georgia, and was stationed on the frontiers. In 1778, he and his company went with the American army to take St. Augustine, and served in the artillery. The taking of St. Augustine miscarried; the minute-men were discharged, and he returned to South Carolina, joined the standard of Independence, and continued in the service of his country to the end of the war."

## DICKSON FAMILY BIBLE

This Bible was published by N. & G. Guilford and Morgan & Sankay in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1830. These Bible records on the William Hugh Dickson family were sent to Mrs. Fred Coday, a member of ALTGA, by a Ms Beth Cook who had photocopied them from the Bible that was in the possession of Gladys Dickson Miller, now deceased. William's wife, Sarah, died 3 Aug 1835 in Georgia, probably Madison County. William migrated to Lawrence County, AR and was found in the 1840 census at that time. William died 8 Oct 1863 and was buried at Little Elm, Denton County, TX in the family cemetery.

# CONFEDERATE MILITARY RECORD CIVIL WAR

of

WILLIAM WYATT CARTER, Jr.

(This information was sent by our member, Wanda Bowlin Davis, 102 Cynthia Dr., Kerrville, TX 78028-4805)

William Wyatt Carter, Jr. was born in 1842 in Louisiana, son of William Wyatt Carter, Sr., born 1820 in Mississippi (Probably Pike County) and Polly, born ca 1819, also in Mississippi. William Wyatt Carter, Sr., is the son of George Carter, born in North Carolina and Drucilla, born in Georgia. He moved with his family from Sabine Parish, Louisiana to Cherokee County, Texas around 1851. Shown in the 1860 Cherokee County, TX federal census as follows: William W. Carter age 40 b MS, Mary age 37 b MS, William W. 18 LA, George R. 16 LA, Martha 12 LA John W., 11 LA, Margaret 8 b TX, David 6 TX and Rhoda 2 TX.

## MILITARY RECORD

5 Feb 1862 William Wyatt Carter, Jr., was mustered in as a Private at Rusk, Cherokee County, Texas. He was in Company C, 11th Texas Infantry, Robert's Regiment, Captain W. G. Engledow's Company of Texas Rebels. His enlistment period was for twelve months. Number of miles to rendezvous was twenty-five. He was twenty years of age.

5 Feb 1862 to 30 Apr 1862 Company Muster Roll states that he was present.

30 Jun 1862 Company Muster Roll states that he left sick on the march from Camp Lubbock.

Sep - Oct 1862 William Wyatt Carter, Jr., was present but sick in quarters.

Nov - Dec 1862 He was present, but left sick at Camp Nelson at Little Rock.

Jan - Feb 1863 William W., was present and last paid by Captain W.M. Ross to October 31, 1862.

May - Jun 1863 He was present and last paid to April 30, 1863 by Lt. Roberts.

Jul - Aug 1863 Company Muster Roll states that he was present and had not received pay since April 30, 1863.

3 Nov 1863 William Wyatt Carter, Jr., was captured by Union Forces at Grand Coteau, Louisiana, led by Brig. General Burbridge's Division. On November 11 he was confined to Custer's House at New Orleans, Louisiana.

21 Dec 1863 William Wyatt Carter, Jr., appears on the Roll of Prisoners of War who were sent from New Orleans, Louisiana to New Iberia, Louisiana for exchange.

Jan - Feb 1864 Last paid by Captain W. G. Engledow to August 31, 1863. William Wyatt Carter, Jr., was sick at hospital in Marksville, Louisiana since Feb 25.

From February 1862 to February 1864, William Wyatt Carter, Jr., had served twenty-four months of a twelve month enlistment. It is not known when he was finally discharged. Cherokee County, Texas records show that he returned to Cherokee County and was among a list of many, who were indigent from Cherokee County after the Civil War. He is shown with nine dependants, most of whom were probably his brothers and sisters.

## ITALIAN SETTLEMENT IN NORTH LOUISIANA

By Dr. Vincent J. Marsala

(Dr. Marsala, Dean of Continuing Education and Professor of Political Science for twenty-six years addressed the Ark-LA-Tex Genealogical Association with this interesting lecture at one of our regular meetings this year.)

After the Civil War in 1865, Louisiana like other southern states experienced a dramatic shortage of financial capital and labor. Both the sugar and cotton plantations lacked labor as former black slaves, now free men, were literally free to seek higher wages and moved freely from one state or region to another.\*

As early as the fall of 1865, there was talk of using white immigrant labor from Europe and other areas of the United States to work the plantations of Louisiana. In 1866, the state government created the Bureau of Immigration. Attempts were made from 1865-1879 to lure Chinese, Germans, Spaniards, Portuguese and Italians to Louisiana, but their efforts failed.\*

Two events occurred in 1879 and 1880 that stimulated efforts to replace Negroes with white immigrants. First, was the "Kansas Fever" which caused more than ten thousand blacks to leave Louisiana for Kansas, and second, a series of black labor strikes in St. Charles and surrounding parishes.\*

In 1881, the Louisiana Sugar Planter's Association created a committee on Italian Immigration. It hoped that through their efforts, three steamships per month would arrive from Italy. According to the federal census, in 1880 there were only 431 Italians in the sugar region of Louisiana, but by 1890 there were nearly 4,000.

This dramatic increase in Sicilian immigrants coming to Louisiana was due largely to the efforts of Joseph and Peter Torre. They were sons of the harbor master in Palermo, Sicily, who knew that New Orleans was an American port of entry for Mediterranean produce, especially citrus fruit. The Torre brothers set out for New Orleans, became importers, and started their own regular packet service, The Royal Mail Line from Palermo. They imported lemons, olive oil and tomatoes. However, this trade route from Palermo to New Orleans became more important for its traffic in Sicilians than for its traffic in lemons and olive oil.\*\*

Many police juries in sugar cane parishes formed special committees to assist planters in securing Sicilian laborers. By the 1880's the so-called "Citrus Connection" was in full swing. Steamships loaded with lemons, tomatoes and olive oil were carrying Sicilian peasants from the most depressed villages of western and central Sicily to New Orleans. By the 1890's more than 2,000 Sicilians were arriving at the Port of New Orleans each year. From 1850-1929, over 100,000 Sicilians arrived in New Orleans. Clearly, all did not settle in Louisiana. The 1900 U.S. Census Bureau reported approximately 17,000 foreign-born Italians in Louisiana. For most, New Orleans was the first stop on their journey to North Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas and Arkansas and points West.\*\*\*\*\*

Italians soon became an important source of labor, not only on sugar plantations and cotton plantations, but on the docks and levees of New Orleans. Col. Maxwell of Madison Parish, in 1906, worked Sicilians on his cotton plantation.\* As male Sicilians fanned out from New Orleans in search of work, they joined the timber, sawmill and railroad labor gangs and worked their way north to Alexandria, Natchitoches, Ferriday, Tallulah, Monroe, Bastrop, Bossier City and Shreveport. They worked hard, saved their earnings, and subsisted on the barest of essentials. They saved to buy land and become independent truck farmers,



or opened small grocery businesses, and soon sent for their families. By the early 1900's several Italian communities were clearly identifiable in Louisiana. Many of these families moved until they felt safe from bigotry and had some security in numbers.

The fear of foreigners expressed in xenophobia and the Know-Nothingism of the early 20th Century fell heavily on Italians, who were the largest ethnic group immigrating to the United States at the time. Italians were lynched in West Virginia in 1891, several murdered in Denver in 1893; in 1895 six Italian labor agitators were lynched in Colorado and in Hahnville, Louisiana, six Italians were taken out of jail and three were hanged. In 1899, in Tallulah, five Sicilian shopkeepers were lynched. Their offense was they had permitted Negroes equal status with whites in their shops. In New Orleans in 1890, the chief of police, David Hennessy, was murdered while he was investigating charges against Italians, suspected of being in the Mafia. The mayor gave orders to arrest "every Italian you come across". Nine suspects were tried, but six were acquitted. Nevertheless, a mob seized the jail, shot nine Italians and hanged two others. \*\*

It is well-documented that xenophobia and Know-Nothingism was embraced by famous and powerful Americans. For example, Senator Henry Cabot Lodge was a rabid bigot, and often spoke to the American people about his hatred for Italian-Americans. Theodore Roosevelt called the 1891 mob lynching of Sicilians in New Orleans "a rather good thing", and boasted that he had said so at a party where there were what he called "various dago diplomats". \*\*

From 1898 to 1929, 70,000 Italian immigrants had passed through New Orleans. The migration reached its peak from 1902 to 1905, with 18,000 arrivals. Mrs. Rosalie Sardisco arrived on the last boat to travel a direct route from Sicily to New Orleans in 1905. Later arrivals came to Ellis Island in New York City. The number of Italian arrivals after 1905, decreased as a quota system was established to limit unskilled Italian workers. \*\*\*\*\*

Sicilians generally found Louisiana, particularly South Louisiana with its Mediterranean culture (French and Spanish) a compatible environment. The cultural values and social experiences they brought with them from Sicily prepared many of these immigrants for life in Louisiana. For example, Sicilians found South Louisianians very receptive to their joy of eating and drinking. Fine food and wine, which occupied an important place in Italian culture, occupied a similar place of importance in South Louisiana. Therefore, Sicilians found ready customers for their produce as fruit peddlers, grocers, restaurateurs and tavern keepers. \*\*\*\*\*

In Sicily, people survived by virtue of their ability to negotiate and haggle over the price of whatever was purchased. Also, the shrewd peasant would set aside a small plot of land to the growing of mixed vegetables for personal consumption and for sale to local customers. This allowed the peasant to enter the money economy by earning cash for produce. Thus, the immigrant was self-taught in some of the basic skills of the marketplace. This, of course, is a trait that can be found in most peasant economies.

Likewise, even though most of the Sicilians were illiterate, most peasants acquired some skills useful in business as a result of the wide-spread practice of gambling. In the United States gambling is ordinarily defined as a sin, vice, a deviant activity. But seen in another light, gambling, like other games, may be an essential element in socialization. In fact, there are characteristics of gambling that can be very valuable in the world of business.

For example, the elements of speculation and risk in gambling are also involved in operating a business.

Of particular importance is the fact that gambling contributes to the development of skills in arithmetic. A noticeable attribute, especially of Italian males, was the considerable difficulty involved in cheating them. Even though illiterate, gambling gave Sicilians competency with numbers. Many immigrants could add and subtract, if not multiply and divide. Consequently they could make change, figure stock, and run a small business. The tradition of gambling in southern Italy and Sicily is universal. There, everyone gambles-the men with each other, the women among themselves, and the children in their own games of chance. \*\*\*\*\*

I have personally known many Italian immigrants who could neither read nor write but who could easily handle arithmetic problems. In particular, my grandmother, Elvira Marsala, who could neither read nor write, ran and operated a grocery store in Monroe, Louisiana for 20 years. In Monroe, from 1925-50, Sicilian family-owned stores were numerous. They were owned by the Marsalas, Fontanas, Scalias, Cascios, Tonores, Lasuzzos, Tichelis, Mianos, Embanotos, Messinas, Constanzas, Spataros, Lissottas and Romanos. In Bastrop, grocery stores were owned by the Parrinos, Dominos and Mirabellos. \*\*\*\*\*

The same was true of Shreveport and Bossier City. The 1910 Census listed 35 Italian grocers, a few of which, such as Cascio, Catanese, Defatta, Dominic, Liberto, Maggio, Miciotto, Brocato and Fertitta, are still found in the yellow pages. The same was true of Bossier City, (Santoros Sardiscos), Alexandria, Bunkie and many other towns and cities of Louisiana. Italian families quickly moved into grocery, food and liquor establishments, truck farming, wholesale and retail produce and real estate.

Needless to say, these Italians depended upon a steady diet of pasta and the need was recognized by the Cordaro family, who opened the Shreveport Macaroni Factory to produce spaghetti. Lucille Cordaro said her husband and uncle spent long hours insuring the perfection of their product. The spaghetti factory was run by the extended family including the nine Cordaro sons. \*\*\*\*

It is important to note that it was the strength of the Italian family and family loyalties that helped the immigrant Sicilian through the transition from field hand to merchant or landowner. Everyone in the family worked and contributed to the household. The business, in short, was a family business. Not only sons, but also wives and daughters worked in it. These people were petty merchants; they opened businesses in the front rooms of their homes, and the shops they owned, or the truck farms they operated, they operated as a family. They did all the manual labor as well as whatever white-collar work was associated with the enterprise. One often speaks of the Protestant work-ethic as if hard work and perseverance was limited to one group. The cultural history of many different peoples show us that many times hard work and family unity is often-times a shared culture trait. It was not just a virtue of the Anglo-Saxon Protestant.

Because Sicilians were not accepted socially by Anglo-Saxon Shreveport, generally, the Sicilian residents established an insular or isolated Italian neighborhood of businesses, catering to other Italians and other ethnic groups, particularly blacks.

The early Italian settlements in Caddo Parish and Shreveport were located in and around; \*\*\*\*

1. Allendale and West End at Walnut and Pierre Ave., near the Italia Moderna Hall. Several blocks of this area was known as Luchini's Subdivision. (Italian brickmaker and contractor.)
2. Truck farming communities were established in the:
  - a. Dixie Garden area of Southeast Shreveport.
  - b. Area between the Village of Lucas to the vicinity of LSU-S along Harts Island Rd. The Harts Island farmers included the following families; Pizzolato, Lina, Rinchuso, Gullo, Gigiovanni, Casciolo, Milazzo, Roppolo, Mandina, Elina, Tagliavore, Maniscalco and San Angelo. \*\*\*\*\*

These truck farms provided a dependable supply of fresh produce to the urban resident of Shreveport. Tomatoes, corn, onions, garlic, bell peppers, egg-plants, zucchini, were commonly grown.

As the Italian population grew in isolation, support structures evolved by 1910 to provide security, and a sense of community. Some of these consisted of:

1. The Catholic Church and its religious organizations such as the Knights of Columbus, The Italian Blessed Sacrament Society, The Immaculate Conception Society, The Altar Society, Saint Joseph's Society and the Holy Name Society. The Churches in Shreveport were Holy Trinity at Marshall and Travis and St. Johns in the 1500 block of Texas, later moved to Jordan.
2. The Italian Band of Shreveport which provided music on religious and festive occasions.
3. The Italia Moderna Society-organized in 1910 as a civic and political club working to improve the welfare of Italians in the community. Had over 400 members.
4. The Italia Moderna Newspaper founded in 1929 by Frank Fulco to give a voice to the Italian community. Fulco urged Italians to learn English, become educated and to be civic minded. Fulco was an excellent role model for the Italian community. He joined the Junior Chamber of Commerce and in 1930 attended the Louisiana Constitutional Convention, where he represented minority groups. Mr. Fulco later served with distinction in the Louisiana Legislature.
5. Young Men's Progressive Association, formed by Frank Fulco to bring young Italian men together. The Tux Boys Dramatic Club emphasized the importance of personal appearance and provided entertainment to the Italian community. Fulco urged the youth to become educated for business or professional life. The group raised money for charity and organized baseball games.
6. St. Joseph's Day, March 19. This special celebration brought Italians together to give thanks to St. Joseph. Elaborate St. Joseph Altars were organized in individual homes. At one time 12 to 15 altars were set up in Shreveport. Altars were also set up at Holy Trinity Church, and Ernest's Supper Club owned by the Palmisano Family on the river front.

I personally remember the St. Joseph Altar's in Monroe as a festive occasion. St. Matthews Catholic School in Monroe (Operated by the Daughters of the Cross) naturally had a holiday on St. Joseph's Day and all of the boys and girls dressed up and visited the altars with their parents or, if teenagers, they went in groups to enjoy the festive occasion. In the homes the furniture was moved out of the living room and a wooden pyramid altar was constructed to the

ceiling and covered with white linen. Then traditional meatless Sicilian dishes, pastries, cookies and fresh baked bread were arranged in a beautiful pattern on the altar. Candles, flowers, and Italian wine were also included. A picture or statue of St. Joseph was placed at the top of the altar.

Food was in abundance as everyone came to eat and give thanks to St. Joseph. Pasta, sculptured breads of all designs, fruit, vegetables cooked in olive oil. Italian cookies and Cannoli tubes filled with cream were in abundance. All of the food was to be eaten that day or taken home by the guests. In the spirit of the poor, nothing must go to waste. Fava Beans were also on the altar and were considered to bring good luck. Everyone took a blessed Fava Bean home with them.

It was the strong community of family, religious beliefs, language and culture traits that preserved unity within the Italian community. This was necessary to sustain its members in the presence of a community in which they were largely ignored or ridiculed.

## UNION PARISH JURY

(Our member in Bernice, LA., Mrs. Arelia Breed, who keeps us advised on information from the Union Parish Courthouse, sent the following article.)

P. 129 March 31st 1862

Be it ordained by the Police Jury in and for the Parish of Union and State of LA a caller session held in the Town of Farmerville on this the 31st day of March AD 1862 that Wm H Carson be and he is hereby appointed special agent to receive the Pro ratto share belonging to Union Parish of the Powder Shot Bullets etc as provided by an act of the Legislature of the State of Louisiana at the last session and that he be authorized to receipt for the same and do all other acts which may be lawful and necessary to obtain the same

Be it ordained by the Police Jury in and for the Parish of Union and State of Louisiana Extra Session in the Town of Farmerville on this the 6th day of May 1862 that the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of aiding the families of soldiers now in service and who may hereafter enter the service of the Confederate States.

Be it further ordained that the President of the Police Jury be authorized to issue Parish bills to the amount of Ten Thousand dollars in sums from one to twenty dollars to be signed by the President-countersigned by the clerk and Endorsed accepted by the Parish Treasurer, that said bills be made negotiable by delivery, and good as a debt against the Parish to be paid by future taxation.

Be it further ordained that said bills be and they are hereby made receivable in payment of all Parish claims, as will the military as the parish Tax proper.

Be it further ordained that the President be required to have printed at the expense of the Parish a sufficient number of blanks in the proper form with such other appropriate design as he may think proper to correspond with the amount above appropriated, which bills when assigned together with what ever amount of money may now be on hand raised for the purposes aforesaid shall be plaisted in the hands of the Parish Treasurer who shall give his bond for the same conditioned for the faithful disbursement of the same as herein after provided, that the said Treasurer shall keep a separate Book in which he shall record all his disbursements which Book shall be open for the inspection of the Police Jury at all times, and that the Treasurer be required to report and make settlement with the Police Jury whenever called on to do so and that he have the same compensation for his services as for keeping and disbursing the Parish funds proper.

Be it further ordained that three discreet citizens be appointed whose duty it shall be to ascertain the wants of all families within their respective bounds of absent soldiers in the War and from time to time draw their drafts on the Parish Treasurer for the amounts necessary to relieve each family in necessitous circumstances which drafts shall be made payable to the party or heads of families entitled to relief

## UP AND DOWN ARK-LA-TEX WITH WASHY FORTSON

(This article of family history was submitted by our faithful member, Merrill C. Williams who resides in Diamond Bar, CA.)

James A. Fortson's first marriage was to Martha E. Spencer, for four months in 1849. Francis Marion Fortson's first marriage was to Frances A. Spencer in 1848. No doubt these two were sisters, children of James Thomas Spencer and Elizabeth Pleasant. From the latter union there was one child, Alice M. Fortson, who would marry in 1879 Richard Levesley Hightower, the widowed last husband of Martha E. Fortson. Martha's first husband, Douglas John Rogers, was a brother of Sarah D. Rogers, the second bride of James A. Fortson in October of 1853. They were married for only two years.

On September 29, 1854, Sarah and James' only child was born, in Panola County, Texas. Washington Satterwhite Fortson claimed his names from his uncle, Washington Pegram Fortson and from his grandpa, Elijah Satterwhite Fortson. After Sarah died, James took his son, "Washy" to Clark County, near Arkadelphia, Arkansas. There he married the boy's new stepmother, Luerene Jane Rogers, who was a cousin of Sarah D. Rogers. They settled in Clark County to be near her parents. Though the family lost his first brother, Wiley M., born in 1857, in 1860 his surviving brother William Elijah was born. After the Civil War, the family would lose William M. at three years of age and Melissa E., who didn't quite reach two. Then Luerena Douglas "Duggie" Fortson was born in January of 1871. She was a 20th century survivor.

The story of Washy's dad, Lt. Fortson's years in the Confederate Army is being written by Duggie's grand-daughter, Linda Shaddock Rogers, who published the award winning 1875-1897 journal by James A. Fortson entitled Clark County, Arkansas. Much of these years were spent as a prisoner on Johnson's Island across the bay from Sandusky, Ohio. His wife and two young sons were waiting for his return.

Washy spent the years of his youth helping his father re-establish the farm. They raised and ginned cotton, though not always getting the first bale from the mill. Then they picked, shucked and shelled corn. To fill the early summer days, they harvested and thrashed wheat. They also slaughtered their own "mut" and hogs, and helped start a community smokehouse in Arkadelphia. This, too, is where he was in school and joined the church of his father and his baptist minister grandfather, George W. Rogers of Panola County, Texas.

Washy was grown when he headed for Texas. He didn't make it over to his Aunt Mary E. Gill's funeral in '73. He did get word that his grandpa Fortson had visited Clark County with his new wife, Elizabeth Dollahite. He was at that time recovering from a broken leg from his work in a stock steam mill in Gladewater, Texas. By 1887, he did get back to Arkadelphia's farm country for a couple of months stay. When he left in September, he made his way to and from Deep East Texas to visit his uncles and granddad, "Lige" in Caddo Parish, Louisiana. From there he went south to join the pioneers like his Uncle Marion to help settle DeSoto Parish. His Aunt Virginia, Marion's wife, died there in 1875 and rests in Keatchie Cemetery.

On the 24th of November 1879, at the age of twenty-five, Washy (unknowingly) married another descendant of Captain William Fortson (War of 1812) and Ann Higginbotham, thus tying them both to Rev. War veterans, Lt. Thomas Fortson, Captain Samuel and Captain Aaron Higginbotham. This distant cousin was the child of James M. Williams of Warren County, Georgia and his

third wife, Frances Jane Ridgeway (Wilson), child of Burnell Ridgeway of Amherst County, Virginia, and Rachel Wynn, the reknowned daughter of William Fortson.

Dora was twenty-one in 1880, when on October tenth she gave birth to a son, who lived only one week. That was enough time for a local newspaper to publicize him, in 1881, as the first child to be born in Grand Cane. She and Washy then had a daughter, born in 1882. Ruby Fortson married Leslie W. Wells and, as did their daughter, Ruth, lived on into the next century.

After a twelve day visit to Grand Cane in 1884, two years later Duggie Fortson entrained for DeSoto Parish to attend school at the fall session in Grand Cane. In March of 1886, Washy's nephew, Charley Lafayette Fortson was born. His father, William was to live just two years from that month, passing away in Smithton County, Arkansas. His wife, Asneath, followed him in death in 1888. Following William's death, Civil War veteran uncles began to fade away. Jephtha L., was lost to cancer in Caddo Parish, LA, and in the following year of 1889, Washington P. Fortson was buried in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Grandpa E. S. "Lige" Fortson was still around in 1890, when Washy's leg was amputated at his Uncle E. R. Fortson's home near Greenwood, Louisiana. His father rushed down by train, via Longview from Arkadelphia. Two years later he was on his way back. Washy's "gramp" by then 84, fell from a porch in Keatchie and was unable to recover from internal injuries. He outlived both of his wives and was put to rest alongside "Betsy" in the Caddo Parish Fortson's cemetery.

Another personal disaster hit Washy, when the W. S. Fortson storehouse in Grand Cane, containing most of his goods, burned in January of 1892. Both his health and his finances eventually were recovered. Then in 1895, his father was awarded one-eighth of the E. S. Fortson Estate, which was equally divided between his children and his deceased children's heirs.

The last of Washy's uncles to pass on before 1900, was William Greene Fortson in 1897. Next it was Washy's dad's turn. He was put to rest in Clark County's Palestine Baptist Church Cemetery in February of 1898. His mother lived until 1915. After the turn of the century, he lost his Uncles Marion and the Reverend Elijah Richardson Fortson. This was the year before 1906, when he attended Duggie's funeral, little knowing that he would be called in 1909. His wife, Dora, outlived their daughter, Ruby, who passed on in 1916. She died in Grand Cane, Louisiana in 1924.

## BOOK REVIEWS

**TITLE :** THE ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS OF MINNIE HALE GORTON by Carolyn Crosser Volpe.

**ORDER FROM:** Carolyn Crosser Volpe, 4025 Pulitzer Pl., #218, San Diego, CA 92122.

**COST:** \$30.00.

The first three chapters are historical background beginning in England, laying the ground work for the Mayflower and the other early ships bringing the founding Colonists to America. It is well-written, with a wealth of detail on the lives of those people. Five of the ancestors of Minnie Hale Gorton arrived on the Mayflower, three others on the next two ships, the Fortune in 1621 and the Anne in 1623. Three more arrived on the Mary and John in 1630 and the main fleet brought six more.

Chapter by chapter, these lines are skillfully woven together in narrative form down to Minnie Hale Gorton born 1855 in Michigan, and then generation by generation her descendants are brought up to date. The index contains 650 surnames. At the beginning of each chapter a chart showing that line makes it easy to follow.

There is a very helpful 13 page bibliography. An appendix contains an 11 generation ahnentafel giving dates and place of birth. Appendix B lists the heads of family ancestors who arrived in the colonies before 1650, giving the date of arrival, when known and the date of the first record in America. Size 6 x 9½. **TITLE:** THE NETHERLAND, LEATHERLIN LEGACY WITH ALLIED CRANE AND WALLS FAMILIES by Gena Ayers Walls.

The main focus of this book is the family of James Leatherlin of Richmond Co., GA, who died about 1793. His daughters, Prudence, who married Daniel Richardson, Nancy, who married John Tinsley, and Elizabeth, who married Frederick Winter are mentioned, but the families of sons, John James, who married Polly Tinsley, and William, who married Rachel, maiden name unknown, are brought down in detail to the present.

Solomon and John Netherland are orphan brothers reared by William Neatherlin. One tradition says he was an uncle, another says he was no blood relation. Whatever the relationship, he reared them and they used the name although they spelled it differently in the beginning. John's descendants kept the spelling, while some of Solomon's use the Neatherlin, Netherlin

spellings. Both of these families are brought to the present.

The families of Abraham of VA and Benjamin Netherland of KY, another James and William Netherlin of Richmond Co., GA are included. All the families regardless of spelling are believed to be connected, but the connection for these four families to the other families has not been found.

Part two is the Crane family, which begins with Dennis Crane, born 1783 in SC and his wife, Nancy Wheeler. They moved to KY then to Washington Parish, LA where they died. Their descendants lived in Louisiana and Mississippi and scattered out from there.

The Walls line is part three and appears to be from Ireland about 1848, refugees of the "potato famine". The first positive record of the line is William Henry b MO, the son of Nancy Elizabeth Roberson and Mr. Walls in the 1800 census in the home of his stepfather, A. R. Smith. He married Frances Price and lived in Lincoln Co., MS. The descendants of their son, Hugh Henry b 1887 in Lincoln Co., MS are traced.

For all lines where possible a narrative biography has been given. This book is enhanced by 82 original documents, maps, game diagrams and letters plus 77 photos of people, homes and tombstones. Size 8½ x 11. Hardbound. 595 pages. Full name index.

These obituaries and accounts of accidental deaths and murders were taken from 46 newspapers throughout the state. Some papers have only one or two editions extant, while others cover the span of years. They give the person's name, date, place, cause of death, and often additional information such as date and place of birth, the maiden names of women, plus relatives of the deceased. As this period is after the War Between the States, many blacks are also reported. This is an excellent addition to Mississippi research. Size 8½ x 5½. Softbound. 253 pages. Full name index.

Then area by area, she gives the Drennen Roll Group number and where known, the connections on the Guion Miller Applications, giving the application number and the relationship, if known. These works are a must for Cherokee researchers. Size 8½ x 11½. Spiral bound. 85 pages. Full name index.

Written in narrative style, this work details the families of John B. Shaw of Wake Co., NC, cavalryman of the Revolution, Archibald McElroy, John Baptist Shaw and the Brassfield family, followed by many documents pertaining to these families. Then comes the descendants of Matthew Lynn and Elizabeth Shaw, plus pages of documents. The next section is on Mittie Nancy Rea/Ray and Wiley Abraham Anderson of Union Parish, LA, bringing descendants down to a death in 1989 and includes documents and pictures. The last section is on the author's more immediate ancestors, Lotress Cleva Bagwell and Mattie Lou Anderson. This is followed by 3 pages of detailed documentation for the entire book. In the introduction the author says she is attempting to let the descendants of Caroline/Carolyn Lynn and Joseph Shaw know more about their heritage. This she has done and given them documentation, names, dates and places to continue the work. Size 8½ x 11½. Spiral bound. 38 pages. No Index.
