STEARNES ARRIVAL IN 1630

When the Goodship Arabulla docked from England at the second city of the Plymouth Company, Watertown, Massachusetts in 1630, Charles Stearnes was anxious to be the first boy to check on his uncle's scouting reports. His haste caused him to fall into the river. Despite other rumors, the family tradition thereafter is that the Charles River is named after this first pioneer Stearnes brother, who landed there. Sybel Starnes Williams now has the leather pouch and one of the marbles from a game which these boys played during the crossing.

Combining the twice-told tale of the Starnes Family, the pedigrees and family group sheets have been charted by Virginia Warbington, with the research of Avis Stearnes Van Wagenen from 1901 added.

The Stearnes family did well fitting into the communities where they settled, but they resisted the combination of church and state, whereby the church leaders ruled the townships. Charles married Rebecca Gibson and they begat the first of a long line of Shubal Starnes. The religious freedom friction caused the migration of succeeding generations southward. Following minor Massachusetts moves, Shubael III moved to Tolland, Connecticut, and eventually escaped to New Bern, North Carolina, where they published a pamphlet on their religious tribulations. There is a lot to be found about New Berne's Tyron Castle, but these historians have not been able to pinpoint Pepper Cotton. This was the name of the Shubael Starnes family residence.

It is believed that before Eli Whitney invented the cotton gin and long staple cotton was introduced, Pepper Cotton was the name evolved for "raw cotton". The black seeds were picked from it and the cotton was spun into cloth. It was here that Avis believes "the broad Southern pronunciation was given to the name and it has been generally written and pronounced STARNES.

The family members who followed Shubael Starnes III out of Tolland, are the core of the spread of the Baptist movement throughout the old west and the south. A study of maps reveals New Light Baptist Churches scattered throughout the South. Shubael Starnes IV was ordained a Baptist Minister, after belonging to Dr. George Whitfield's New Light movement for over five years, by Reverand Whit Palmer in Tolland in 1751. Then he led a large party of his siblings and their spouses to join Rev. Daniel Marshall and Martha Starnes Marshall in Winchester, Virginia, and on to the "west" in the Sandy Creek area of old Orange County, North Carolina, where Shubael IV spent the rest of his life. Other members spread south, Rev. Marshall settling near Augusta, Georgia.

With the movement came Charles, Shubael V and Peter I, who was born in Reading, Massachusetts in 1710, into the Carolinas when they were in their teens. He married Hannah Stinson and finally succumbed after years along the Little River branch of the Broad River in the Camden District of Fairfield County, blind at the age of eighty-eight.

Peter's second son was Ebenezer Starnes, who was born in 1738. He married Elizabeth Callahan, who died in the Edgefield District of Choleramorbus shortly after their son, Moses Starnes I was born on February 25, 1777. Ebenezer passed away in Wilkes County, Georgia in 1793 "below the Sweet Water Iron Works".

Among those listed as signers of the Mississippi Territory oath of allegiance in 1798-1799, was Moses Stearnes, assuring researchers that he had reached Mississippi before the turn of the nineteenth century. It is not clear whether Moses Starnes I and Nancy Graves, with her family, traveled by the Three Slash Trail or came upriver after sailing from Georgia to New Orleans. Although they had been pioneers in the "Amite" area since their 1800 marriage, and were shown in an 1805 census, Moses bought his first 175 acres in Wilkerson County while in Washington, Adams County on January 1, 1807. By 1816 the family was in Marion County, where they lived for about twenty years. They then joined their oldest daughter, Elizabeth, and William Tomlinson in Copiah County. There, a few years later, Moses died - a very wealthy planter. He was buried on October 16, 1845 in Copiah County's Mount Hope Cemetery.

The last born of the girls and Moses and Nancy's eleventh child was born in 1825. This was Martha Melinda Starnes, the youngest of the girls who made the 1840 trip with Moses into the "wilderness" of Copiah County, Mississippi. Part of her dowry that she brought when she wed John Shelton in 1846, was a number of slaves, retaining their ownership.

SHELTON AND DOMINGUEZ-BURNELL SEARCH

(Contributed by Merrill C. Williams, 23750 Highland Valley Rd., Apt. #110, Diamond Bar, CA 91765)

When John Shelton I met and married "Bella" Dominguez Burnell in Baton Rouge in 1806, the land between the Mississippi and Pearl Rivers had been under Spanish rule since (favoring the colonists) they drove the British from the city in 1779. On September 26, 1810 the parishioners of the area deposed the Spanish Governor, Carlos de Grand-Pr'e, establishing the tiny independent Republic of West Florida. Three months later the area was brought under the jurisdiction of Governor Claiborne and the United States. Louisiana was admitted to the Union and as a state on April 30, 1812. A few days later Congress added the Parishes of West Florida to this state. Therefore, it is in this addition that the Census of 1810 will show a John Shelton family of three.

From the dates of land acquisitions, it is clear that land titles did not change with government changes. Some "American" holdings are dated before the turn of the Nineteenth Century. Family tradition is that John Shelton I died about 1815, and his widow, Isabella, married again - before 1820 - to a Mr. O'Neil. They lived in the Old Shelton Home in East Baton Rouge Parish. There they raised John Shelton II, who would be twelve years old when counted in the Census of 1820. Also enumerated was one - or more - O'Neil children. Their descendants were Alice, Marcella Noland (alive in the 1930's) and her daughter, Mrs. Nida Covington. Marcella is said to have lived in the Old Shelton Home - near Baton Rouge. Mrs. Covington was not in residence at 1118 Florida Street, Baton Rouge in December of 1990.

The plantation plots along the Amite River, near Jones Bayou show the lands owned by the families of John Shelton II's first wife, Mary "Polly" Sides, and his second wife, Rebecca Ferguson. No Shelton or O'Neil names are shown among these early riverbottom settlers.

LETTERS FROM RED RIVER AGENCY

(These letters were copied and submitted by Fern Ainsworth, one of our Life Members)

Washington 30th April 1834

Sir,

Your letter dated the 28th inst. requesting such information as I possess relating to the positions, quantaty and probable value the lands within the Caddo Country in Louisiana which will be unclaimed by the removal of obstructions in Red River has been received.

All the information I have on the subject as regards the boundary I obtained from a conversation with Cole Brooks, the Caddo Agent, when on the lands alluded to in the month of June last. He informed me that the Caddo Indians claimed from a Bayou called the Pascagoola up to Cots Bluff. The land that will be reclaimed by the removal of pole (sic) raft in Red River within that boundary is a tract of alluvial bottom land situated between Bayou Pierre (a large stream that ____ of Red River at Coat's Bluff and flows down through the swamp & lake between the high land and the Red River., and the Red River averaging in breadth two and one miles by forty five miles in length. 71.820 acre at the government price 1.25 dollars \$89.775. However its probable value will be about an average of 4 dollars per acre. 287.280 dollars.

I may be in error as to quantity. It may be more or less, but as to its quality I am familiar with. I have been over its whole extent. "A" is all first rate lands. The timber is cotton wood, mulberry, ash, elm, maple, black walnut, sweet gum, box elder & papau with an undergrowth of cane & rushes. There is several settlements on the tract one of which has upwords of fifty acres cleared and has been cultivate from 12 to 14 years and produces abundant crops of corn, cotton and tobacco. Figs & peaches also flourish at these places.

Estimate of Expenses for erecting Public Building for the Red River Ind. Agency at Peach Orchard Bluff on the Bayou Pierre channel of Red River to wit:

Building one dwelling house of logs a story and half high with gallery\$650 and partitions Do, one kitchen house of pealed logs etc 125 Do, one store house of pealed logs, plank floor & log upper 100 Do, one gun and Blacksmiths shop of pealed logs with two 125 rooms and floored Do, one Mill house suited to the running gears on hand 150 Planks, Boards, Shingles, Clapboards, Scanthing (sic) stone 200 nails, hinges, locks, etc, etc Putting the mill in order for grinding 100

Transportation of Mill Stone, Irons, running gears and all other public property from the Caddo Prairie to Peach Orchard Bluff 150. Hauling timber shingles clapboards, etc to be used in the construction of said buildings 50.

I certify on honor that the above estimate has been made by me after having made due inquiry of experts as to the expense of erecting such buildings, and as to their structure, I have been governed by the considerations of economy and the convenience and durability of the work.

* * * * * * * *

We the undersigned do hereby certify that we have resided on and near the Caddo Prairie during the five years last past and know that the prairie was inundated in the spring seasons of the years 1826, 1828 and 1830 by the rise of water in Red River in consequences no doubt of the Raft in Red River. Having arrived about five years ago in its annual accumulation up the river to highlands on the east side which come bluff to the river - that the water has been four feet deep over the ground on which the Agency House stands, the foundation (as well as all the other buildings as situated) of which are now rotten and giving way - that the greatest inundation occur so late in the spring as to ruin agriculture and all the most valuable garden plants; not a fruit tree or garden ____ survive a single overflow - that the flood of water is so unexpected in its approach and rapid in progress that the human beings on the prairie have but little more times than necessary to escape in safety to the highlands with the few animals that can be driven, immediately around them, destroying all others and injuring or floating off every other description of property - and finally that the present stage of water in the adjacent Bayous and the rapid progress of the raft - judging from our experience of the past justifies the belief which we with many others now entertain that henceforward the prairie will be unundated annually if it do not ultimately remain transformed in a permanent Lake.

Given under our hands in duplicate at the Caddo Prairie the 31st day of January 1831.

We have been so imposed on by the Indians that come in our neighborhoods in gangs of 40 to 50 intruding on us by killing of our stock and other things equally aggravating that we think it insufferable ---petition you to take some specially methods of having them removed. We do hope and trust that you will give ear to our complaint and comply with our request. In so doing you will befriend your fellow citizens and receive our sincere

thanks.

The Indians that we complain of are the Shaunees and Dalawares that reside on the west side of the Sabine River. Dec. 21st 1830

Caddo Prairie February 25, 1831

I received yesterday by return express from Natchitoches your letter of the 14th ultimo: And thus hasten to have this communication in reading to send to Natchitoches by the first safe conveyance, that I may the more speedily comply with your wishes.

I presume it will be unnecessary for me to say anything in addition to what has been communicated as to the causes which have produced the extra expenditures of this agency already incurred under my superintendance and necessary to be made within the present year, or they have all been shown to arise from the facticeous circumstances incident to its peculiar condition. It is also inferable from what has been said that a very considerable reduction of the current expense must follow the removal - as house rent for the Agent, the Sodo Lake ferry (which is presently inconvenient to the Agency, and Indians also, owing to the frequency of high winds, transportation, and reduction in the amound paid to Expenses.

In answer to your inquiring relating to the Uniting of Agencies and discontinuing subagents and interpreters, I have the honor to state that so far as this Agency is concerned such measures appear to me to be incompatible with the public service. I will give the reasons which force me to this conclusion as briefly as their importance admits of:

This Agency is located several hundred miles from any other Agency. And the country which appears to be embraced within its legitimate bounds (though in its operations it extends far beyond to the east and north east) is marked by the Red & Mississippi Rivers on the north east and south east, by the Gulf of Mexico on the south, and by Texas on the south west and west. The shortest estimates of distance by land are upwards of three hundred miles on Red River - on the Mississippi and around on the Gulf to the mouth of the Sabine between five and six hundred miles, and the boundary on Texas at least three hundred miles. Within this territory, not including the country northeast of Red River contains the parishes of Concordia, Ouachita, Cattahoula and Claiborne, Louisiana, and along the river in Arkansas to the Choctaw line, the number of Indians may be safely computed at two thousand five hundred. They consist of the following tribes, to wit: Caddo, Pacagoula, Apalachi, and Boluxy, who claim by primitive right the occupancy of land in Cochattie, Gensa, Alabama, Quapam, Shawanee

& Delaware; who have accepted local habitating by invitation from the former and by the express or tacit permission of the Government: Choctaw, Chickasaw, Musevgy, Natchitoches, Yattepici, Adaic, Eyisse, Tunica, Fougla, Anadaco, Tenie and Houwanna, who live a wandering unsettled life, but attached to this region of country and apply to this Agency for various existance.

I have no Subagent and but two interpreters the one denominate Caddo Interpreter, I presume from its having been ____ originally the Caddo Agency, and the other Quapaw Interpreter, employed under the treaty with that tribe. These two Interpreters are capable of communicating with Indians freely in more than six different tongues. Neither of them are fully qualified but one or the other is sure to understand and make himself understood by every Indian that visits the Agency and often become the medium of communication between the Indians themselves. I consider the two now employed, Messrs. Larkin Edwards and John W. Edwards not inferior to any in the United States, and indispensable to the public interest.

The country coming within this preview of this Agency is very sparcely settled by white inhabitants, with the exception of two or three limited districts owing in part to the greater portion of available land, not settled under its grants, remaining out of market, but mostly to the great extent of countrys around the mouth of Red River. Being subject to annuel inundation and to the great lakes, swamps, and the inundation circumjacent to the region of the Raft. This condition of the country opens a wide and free range for hords of Indians, who occupy it as a sort of nutral territory and either hunt the game of the forest or forage on the widely scattered herds of the peas-

This frontier being thus inhabited and incumbent with a large slave population to the condition of which the Caddo, Quapaw and Apalaches express and sometimes exercise a hostility; and situated on the confines of a foreign State, oppose to slavery also, and containing many numerous and warlike nations of savages, immediately along our border, over which the Mexican Government, if so disposed, can exercise but a feeble control, contribute largely to the duties constantly resting on the Agent here; and while their subjection to a distant Agent would be incompatible with the interest of the country at large, a proper attention to them, I consider the Government will readily admit, are sufficiently onerous to one individual.

In regard to any "general changes and alterations in the Indian "affairs" of this Agency, I am not yet prepared to say anything. Having found no records or papers of any kind whatever indicating the course pursued or recommended by my predecessors and the embarrasments which have surrounded and beset me ever since my arrival forming the excuse I offer for not having it in my power at this time to suggest some improvement or change as contemplated by you, & as forming also my only apology for the length of this and some of my previous communications.



BELLEVUE CEMETERY

Northeast of Bellevue La.

The Bellevue cemetery is the official burying grounds for the old Parish seat and contains the graves of early judges and sheriffs. The "capitol" of Bossier Parish was here from 1843 until 1890. After that time all the doctors, lawyers and parish officials moved to Benton with the parish seat. The last vestige of the town was obliterated in 1910 when the old courthouse was sold for \$25 and torn down to make a house in Haughton. After that, the size of the community dwindled until 1945 when even the Police Jury passed an ordinance abandoning ownership of the roadways and alleys in the forgotten town.

This inventory was done in the fall of 1993 by Clifton D. Cardin. There are both negro and caucasian graves in Bellevue Cemetery. It was re-inventoried Aug 13, 1995.

A LOUISIANA CSA LETTER

Submitted by ALTGA member Stanford Whatley

(James LaCroix, Jr., was born ca 1840 and died 25 Feb 1863 in the Confederate Service. He was in the New Iberia McWaters Rangers, Second Louisiana Cavalry. He entered 26 Sep 1862 as a Private in Company G. He sent the following letter to his sister, Laura Eleanor LaCrois Price Legg. It was submitted to the Alexandria Daily Town Talk for publication by Viola Legg Murray.)

Bayou DeGlaze, LA, Nov. 30, 1862. Dear Brother and Sister:

After my respects to you and family this is to let you know that I am well at this time and hoping these few lines may find you all in good health. I have nothing new to write. I have written to you and have not heard from you yet. I have written nine or ten letters home and I can't hear from them. I wish you would tell papa and mamma to write to me. I would like to see you all very much. I do not fancy this life; it is a hard one. You have no idea what a soldier has to do. It was about two weeks that we got one a meal a day, and then not enough. We had to retreat seven days and then we got, in that time, about four or five meals and the rest of that time we lived on sugar cane and oranges. Our company had to cover the retreat and we got one night and a half of sleep.

The militia and infantry are naked, in a manner. There are some of them have no shoes, some no blankets others no clothes and not much to eat, and we are not much better off. We are all short in the clothes line. We were detached from the regiment and have been our here for three weeks. We get a tolerable plenty to eat. For myself, I do very well now, for I am a courier and have been for nearly four weeks.

We have the measles and typhoid fever in camps, and the way the conscripts desert is a sight. They are getting away and some nights eighteen and twenty leave and to to the Yankees to get paroled.

I want you to let me know whether old Charlie got home or not. The Yankees got him. There was one of our company went to them the other day. He was a Frenchman. They are the ones that leave. You must give me all the particulars when you write. Let me know what has become of the boys that took to the woods. Let me hear from them all.

Laura, you must tell the girls at home to knit Shell and me some socks and gloves, if you please, for we can't get any here. Shoes are worth \$12 and \$15 a pair, and are scarce at that. To tell the truth there is no clothing nor anything else here. Soldiers nearly naked is all.

Give my love to pa and his family, my respects to my inquiring friends, if I have any, my love to all. Adieu, for the present. Write soon. Your brother until death.



* * * * * * * * * * * * * JEWISH GENEALOGIES

(Taken from the Willamette Valley Genealogical Society Newsletter, January 1995)

Societies belonging to the Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (AJGS) intend to index and document Jewish cemeteries throughout the world. according to Arline Sachs, past president of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Greater Washington, who will chair the effort. The plan calls for three stages:

- 1. Create a list of all cemeteries worldwide where data on Jewish burials is known to exist and/or where people wish to participate.
- 2. Incorporate existing indexes into the database, and use volunteers to index the burials in unindexed cemeteries and
 - 3. Create a master index of all names in the various cemeteries surveyed.

Persons wishing to participate should contact any local Jewish genealogical or historical society or contact Ms Sachs, 6212 Thomas Drive, Springfield, VA 22150-1220. There are currently 59 member societies of AJGS in 11 countries. The United States has the largest representation with 45 societies throughout the country. (From Avotaynu 9:3 (Fall 1993).

In addition to participation in the above described project, the San Francisco Bay Area Jewish Genealogical Society has catalogued the 500-plus yizkor (memorial) books collection of the Holocaust Center of Northern California in San Francisco. Members have also begun the indexing of the over 1,000 Holocaust oral testimonies of the Oral History Project of the Center. This indexing is specifically aimed at making the thousands of Holocaust and historical oral histories available and useful to genealogists. For this reason the group is indexing town names as well as surnames. (22 March 1994 survey returned by SFBA JGS)

TITLE: MISSISSIPPI CONFEDERATE PENSION APPLICATIONS P-Z by Betty C. Wiltshire.

This is an alphabetical listing of the Confederate pension applications for soldiers, sailors and widows taken from microfilm at the Mississippi Department of Archives and History at Jackson, MS. A few of the pensions were given in the 1890's, but most were after 1900. The applications usually give name, age, place of residence, service unit, names of unit officers, date of discharge, length of service, medical condition, property ownership, income and the person or persons the applicant is living with. For widows it usually gives the husband's name, date and place of marriage, and date and place of husband's death. This index gives the name, date of pension application, the service unit and the county of residence, and is to be used to locate the record itself. This is a real treasure for Mississippi researchers. Size $5\frac{1}{2}$ x $8\frac{1}{2}$. Paper Bound. 324 Pages.

TITLE: SEWARD AND RELATED FAMILIES, INCORPORATING WE REMEMBER CARROLL.

2nd Edition. By George C. Seward.

After a forward on the Seward name, which is tracked back to the dawn of history in England, the author gives a history of the marriage of his parents, with a list of the many places the family lived and the schools he attended. After a summary of the descendants and his dad's ancestry, the author then begins chapter by chapter and generation by generation to take the Seward ancestry back to 1634. He then picks up his mother's Rugh family, which is traced into Pennsylvania in the 1790's. An allied line, the Kloennes, is traced to Germany in the early 1800's. The author then takes up his wife, Carroll's lines, beginning with her father, Carroll Francis McKay, whose immigrant ancestors settled in Virginia in the 1700's. Other lines are Eley, Day, Corbell and Phillips. Written in narrative style with footnotes, it makes easy and interesting reading. There are ten appendices

containing copies of family letters, many pictures, interesting documents and "We Remember Carroll". Carroll is the author's wife, and "We Remember Carroll" is excerpts from letters from friends and essays of remembrance written by her husband, children and grandchildren. It is a beautiful tribute to Carroll. Size $5\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$. Paper Bound. Full-name and separate place index. 316 pages.

It gives the name of the soldier, his birth and death dates, if known, the cemetery and place of burial, his service rank, state of service and name of his wife or wives, if known. The table of contents gives a fascinating introduction to this historic region: The Ute Trail, A Road to the Goldfields, Wagons Through the Canyon,

Building the Colorado Midland, Resorts in Ute Pass, Into the Twentieth Century by Horseless Carriage and a Modern Highway to a Modern Age. The area, although not the pass that was explored by Lt. Zebulon Pike in 1806, and interesting tales of past times, are told by area residents. There is an 1860 map showing the routes to Colorado City. There are many rare photos taken in the 1870's. The chapter on Building the Colorado Midland has photos of building camps and workers building the tunnels. The bibliography is a gold mine for anyone doing research in this area, and Colorado in general. Size $5\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$. Paper Bound, Stapled. No Index. 96 pages.

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TITLE: FALLS CHURCH: PLACES AND PEOPLE by H. H. Douglas.

A map giving house locations and about 50 photos of the lovely homes and churches is included. There is a glossary of architectural terms, which is useful. Size 6 x 9. Paper Bound. This is a listing of 135 cemeteries copied between 1930 and 1965. This publication is a real treasure because it no doubt contains listings of early stones no longer legible. 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TITLE: WICHITA COUNTY BEGINNINGS by Louise Kelly. 1982. Wichita County, TX

There is a resume of many small communities in the county with maps and many pictures. The book ends with an alphabetical biographical sketch of the county residents. Size 9 x 11½. Hard Bound. 
