GRAVEHOUSE RESEARCH IN LOUISIANA By Marcy Frantom

Gravehouses, shelters built over in-ground burials, are still found in southern states such as Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas, among others. These unusual grave markers are typically hand made of cedar or heart pine wood, but ones built more recently may be prefabricated aluminum or hand built of other modern building materials. Scholars have studied these structures since the 1970s and are divided about where the tradition originated. Some think they are a European burial custom continued by the English, Irish and Scots in America; others believe gravehouses were originally Native American and adopted by the early settlers. Although I think that the former is more logical due to similarities in styles of earlier European grave markers, at the date of this writing no one has come forward with conclusive documentary proof of either theory. Gravehouses may have been a post Reconstruction fad, although there is some evidence that they were built for special types of people.

My research is in north and central Louisiana, where I found 51 gravehouses in twelve parishes (Bossier, Desoto, Claiborne, Lincoln, Jackson, LaSalle, Catahoula, Natchitoches, Winn, Rapides, Vernon, and Beauregard), with the largest number in Vernon Parish. Typically they are found in country cemeteries in communities that still practice the graveyard working tradition. This is important, because the gravehouses require regular maintenance to survive a hundred years or more. Methodist or Baptist churches are often located near these cemeteries, although in many cases the cemeteries predate the churches. The landscape is often hilly and wooded, and the cemeteries may show evidence of having been scraped in the past.

As I recorded information about the gravehouses and compiled it into a data base, I began to notice distinct types of buildings during different periods. The earliest ones (1870s-1890s) are small houses with forward facing gables, "walls" made of ornamental pickets, and roofs covered with cedar shingles. In several cases, a cedar tree is planted at the head and the roof is covered with "everlasting" or "forever" fern. The bottoms of the pickets are protected by a large baseboard. If one examines the posts, it is apparent that the structure is held together by mortise and tenon or pegged joints. Some of these houses have intricate gingerbread details. In essence, the gravehouses were built to imitate fine houses of the period. A few families had identically built gravehouses that seem to function as a family signature. A Sanders family researcher feels that the round picket top design may be an expression of the family's Scotch-Irish heritage. If one of your ancestors had a gravehouse, it was likely built by a family member or local carpenter who also built the coffin. During this period, the family and community handled all of the details of the burial including providing the marker or grave decoration. Some of these gravehouses also have a large round topped picket at the head and diamond topped picket at the foot of the grave. This is clearly copied from earlier geometric wood markers (some of which still exist) thought to originate in England.

Then an interesting change takes place during the period 1900s-1940s. The gravehouses become larger and taller. This change is accompanied by an increased use of the space inside the structures for decorative possibilities such as shells and flowers. Gates are built into the gravehouses that still have pickets, while later ones do not have fences at all. By the end of the

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period, the gravehouse building tradition seems to be on the wane. This may be because by this time most cemeteries had been fenced, cattle and hogs no longer roamed the woods since the stock law had been enacted to protect timber lands, and modern transportation brought funeral home services to the country so family participation in burials was no longer necessary.

More recently built gravehouses (1950s-1980s) resemble garages and are structurally less ornate than earlier ones. However, the interiors are often intensely decorated with personal items. Some people are also rebuilding early gravehouses using existing fragments as templates. Most cemetery associations no longer allow families to build gravehouses unless they provide for the special upkeep required or in unusual circumstances (death of a child).

Gravehouses seem to be built for special people. The earliest gravehouses were usually built for male children, reflecting the late Victorian sentimental treatment of child burials. After the turn of the century, more are built for males over 65 and were probably requested by the deceased. Recently built gravehouses are usually built for the elderly or very young. According to persons questioned, elderly men who remember the tradition request gravehouses, while parents chose to build them for children who die young to express their grief. However, young mothers and Civil War soldiers are also commemorated with gravehouses.

Traditional reasons given for building the structures is to protect the deceased from the rain or from roaming animals. Since a great deal of emigration occurred following the Civil War, it is possible that gravehouses represented a traditional means of protecting graves while the families moved on, as an expression of religious certainty that the deceased was provided for in "heavenly mansions," and as a result of the newly available lumber and home decorations possible due to the developing timber industry. DATABASE CREATED TO LIST SOLDIERS IN THE CIVIL WAR


WASHINGTON - The first name-Confederate Soldier Edwin F. Jemison, killed at age 18 - was punched into a computer yesterday to launch a database of the estimated 3.5 million Americans who fought in the Civil War. By early 1996, people who believe their ancestors fought for the blue or the gray should be able to look up their names in the Civil War Soldiers System. Computers at the National Park Service's Civil War sites will be available.

"It's been estimated that up to 100 million people may be descendants from Civil War soldiers," said John F. Peterson, project manager for the Civil War Soldier's System. With the database, those people will be able to learn the regiment and battles their ancestors fought in, Peterson said, giving them 'a personal connection to a great, historical event.'" The original handwritten records, on index cards, are stored at the National Archives, which receives nearly 1,500 inquiries each week on Civil War records.

Hundreds of genealogists, history buffs and others have volunteered to use their home computers to type the names onto computer diskettes donating work that park service officials estimate is worth \$4.5 million. Jemison, a Louisiana soldier, who died at Malvern Hill, VA in 1862, was chosen to begin the database because his photograph is so familiar. The image of his boyish face, staring into the camera from beneath a Confederate cap, has appeared frequently in books and documentaries.

The Parks Service director, Roger Kennedy, typed Jemison's entry at a press conference at Ford's Theatre, site of the assassination of Abraham Lincoln. The Civil War Soldiers System marks a transition from "an obsession with heroes" to "a new kind of history in which the common people who built the place have their role," Kennedy said. The Civil War Trust, a non-profit association, is raising money to pay for terminals in the parks. The National Archives, the Federation of Genealogical Societies and the Genealogical Society of Utah, a corporation of the Mormon Church, also are guiding the project.

In 1890 the first Houston, Central Arkansas, and Northern Railroad's train traveled over new tracks built through Northern Morehouse Parish to connect Little Rock, Arkansas, with Monroe, Louisiana. The conductor, who was given the task of naming the stops along the track, named the station "Bonita," which is Spanish for "beautiful." The Bonita, Louisiana, United States Post Office was also established in 1890. William W. Denham served as the first Postmaster.

FROM JAMESTOWN, VIRGINIA TO MISSISSIPPI II*

Among the sons of the Ancient Planters who spread from the original Jamestown Plantations to the coastal counties of the crown colony of Virginia were the three Graves brothers. Captain Graves' namesake, and second son Thomas (2), was born in 1617 in London, England. He arrived, with his mother, Rachel Croshaw, at the Accomac Old Plantation on the peninsula shortly after 1625. His patent for fifty-five acres, in 1636, was in Gloucester County "about a mile beyond the head of Timberneck Creek..." In 1657 he acquired 300 acres in Westmorland County. Before his death in 1675, he obtained (ca 1661) from Governor Morrison 700 acres in Lancaster County. He and his wife, Elizabeth, raised the heirs Thomas (3), Jeffrey (3) and William (3) in their home in Gloucester County.

Thomas (3) was their first son. Born in 1639, only nine years after his Virginia born Uncle Francis (2), he married Elizabeth _____, after his first marriage by 1677 to Mary _____. He and "his inherited 400 acres in Abington Parish of Gloucester County. His undated death was in King and Queen County.

The Virginia Quit Rent Rolls for 1704, show that Robert (4) Graves was in King and Queen County, owning 150 acres. His birth date was recorded as 4 February 1682/3. It is probably that clear copies of Abington Parish records can be found that were copied before the Rosewell fire of 1916, that will show Robert's wife and further details of the Fraves' northwesterly migration to Culpeper County.

Among the many Graves families that came south to Georgia and South Carolina from Culpeper County was that of James and Mary Copeland Graves. They were both born about 1730 in Virginia, and married there in 1750. James was a veteran of the Revolutionary War in Georgia. Their children numbered nine, when they passed away on their plantation in Wilkes County around the turn of the Ninteenth Century. After the death of James, Richard and Mary left the Georgia plantation in the care of his brother, Robert, and were in Mississippi when their son, Daniel was born on 6 December 1800. It is still not clear whether they took Nancy, Lawrence and Mary down the Savannah River and sailed to New Orleans or rode to Natchez via the Three Slash Trail, but they were there before 1800, as associates of Moses Starnes and his sister, Elizabeth Starnes Phares and William Phares.

The search continues for the tombstone of Richard Graves. He may be buried near his second wife, Olivia Savage and his son-in-law Moses Starnes in the Mount Hope Plantation Cemetery. Tracing Richard and Mary Lawrence Graves from Marion County, Mississippi to Wilkes County, Georgia shows that Richard, John and William helped their father establish the Wilkes County Plantation after their move from Virginia. Another possibility for Richard's burial is with his brother, Robert's family near Hebron in Jones County, Mississippi.

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

> New Orleans See March 8, 1868

Dear Mr. Hays:

Q 11.

I have heard from you so seldom during the past 12 months, that I am at a loss to know whether or not you are alive. Perhaps I have had one letter within the past six months, and only hear now and then of you by some person or persons passing-Who invariably inform me, that your health is poor, I would try and come up to see you, was it not for the fact of the trip being so fatiguing from Trenton (Trading post where West Monroe is today), out to your place. The weather is beginning to be vary warm here, and I expect at best doubtless prove another sickly season, judging from the past winter, which accounts for more deaths than was ever known during the winter seasons particularly. I am now making preparations to leave here as early as possible. Not feeling satisfied to run the risk I did last summeramongst the yellow fever-altho-we are subject to death everywhere.

I have no one in the house with me now-having had the misfortune to loose Mr. Bishop-who has for years been a friend & father to me. We buried him on the 3rd of March, and no one can feel so much his loss as I do-for few people had so good a friend in him as me. Capt. Sam is clerk on the Lizzie Hopkins running on Red River following his same old seven & sixpence. If I can save money enough I shall leave here about the first of May. I hope you'll write to me where all the darkies are, and which one of them are at home with you, and particularly if old Rachel is living. They made a bad kettle of fish of it, but I can't forget the fact of my being raised with them. I find the times are hard here, and many of the best house going into Bankruptsy, perhaps you would act wisely to secure your money in the House of Nupon (sic) Williams & Co., before they fail. I shall hope to hear from you vary soon as I do not think I shall ever go into any business here again, but try and secure one in a more healthy region of the Country, West or North.

Dear Sir:

I have delayed writing you for some days hoping to see Wm Cowart, who is the oldest citizen in the county that was initialy acquainted with the Hays family, but have failed to see him. A few days since saw James Hays son & only living child of John Hays, deceased. What Estate I represent as admst, he informed me that there were five (5) instead of four (4) brothers of James Hays. John, Etheldred, Wylie, Seabron & William. They all had children. The Sister was named Dicy, & married Peter Tatum. She had three

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children, one daughter named Elizabeth, two sons, John & William Tatum, moved from this State to Autauga County Ala, where the children were underage many years ago. That nothing has been heard from them since the War. Seabron Hays had several children when he left this State for Pike County, Ala. Nothing has been heard from him or his family for several years. Wylie Hays had a daughter named Elizabeth Tarpley (sic), living in Columbus, GA the last heard from her. William Hays had two sons, Augustus & Alexander, both dead. One of them left three children, minors now under the control of their Step Father & I think Guardian. His name is Jacob Lewis. The other son left two minors under control of their Grand Father. William Wilkins don't think that he is their Guardian. William Hays also left three daughters, but I am unable to give you any certain account of their condition or whereabouts. John Hays had only five children & their children that have an interest in his Estate are his son, Bird Hays, deceased, has only one child, Elizabeth. She is married to a man by the name of Stigall, but according to the Laws of Georgia he has no control of her property as long as she lives. His son, James is the only living child, then their daughters are all dead. Their children are nine (9) children & all of age. children from all of age. Hutchins, who married the youngest daughter is dead. They left only one child, a daughter. She was married on Thursday night last to a man by the name of G. T. Barksdale. Before her marriage W. W. Fleming was her Guardian. All of these wish me to represent them so far as my authority as Administrator will justify in my doing so.

Etheldred Hays children named by Mrs. Nany Hays (his widow) are correct. She has several other names on the Power Of Attorney must be their children. Mrs. N. Hays grand children as their are only four (4) of Etheldred's children living viz-John W. & Wm J. Hays. Sarah Ragan & Charlotte Ball. As to the amount of property owned by Mrs. Hays at the time of her inter-marriage with James Hays, I cannot say of my own knowledge, but James son of John Hays says that all that he knows of her property was three negroes two men & a woman, which they carried with them to Louisiana. Feels confident that his uncle owned everything else at the time of his marriage, but those negroes. Mrs. Clary Hays was a widow "Tatum" when she married James Hays and had a daughter by the name of Marilda P. Tatum, better known in this section as Pinkey, who was grown when they left this place for La. She married a man by the name of Lawson after they went north. If she is living & her mothers relations want to have no interests in her Estate.

If I can legally represent the heirs of John Hays are you willing to settle with me for one fifth of James Hays Estate. Some of the heirs are in verry indigent circumstances, really in distress. As I am a stranger to you, I refer you to Col M. G. Stamper, Merchant of Trenton, La.

I believe I have given you all the information I can at present in regard to the legal heirs of James Hays deceased. Please let me hear from you on receipt of this.

STILL FIGHTING THOSE DEMONS OR THE DAY THE BARN BURNED

by Dale Jennings

I really don't remember smoking in the hayloft near the silo at the rear of the barn. But, I remember the rest vividly enough. I think it was I who spotted the woodchuck, standing at his burrow in the field near the wood line. Ordinarily, Donnie would have ID'd him right away--as a German soldier standing guard over a Nazi command bunker. But this had become a personal thing. If memory serves me, on this occasion he was just our old adversary, the chuck--the key obstacle in our only mission failures. From experience gained in many successful air and ground campaigns, Donnie, Janet and I quickly put it together and kicked it off. We had skirted the field and were working our way up the wood line, rocks in hand, when one of us saw the smoke. We raced back, and our cousin Donnie braved the heat, smoke and swirling hay straw embers to locate a smoking pitchfork, which he pitched out the barn doorway. I always faulted Donnie for that--as I was forced often to look upon that fork with the scorched handle. The fire spread to the ice house, which it also consumed--then the chicken house. We were in shock as we huddled behind the house. None of those rushing by with hands full of scorched chickens seemed to notice us. Others were plucking and cleaning the chickens at the back door, trying to salvage something from the fire. One of the volunteers was cousin Margie's boyfriend, Donald, who worked with Uncle Ralph at the main dairy barn just down the road. Donald was overcome by smoke in the chicken rescue and had to be rescued himself. (The absentee owners of the dairy also owned the house we all lived in with Uncle Ralph and Aunt Bessie, as well as the hay barn, chicken house, etc.)

Donnie, Janet and I, in the flickering light and shadow from the flame, smoke and gathering dusk, made a vow of silence which would endure for forty years. I was terrified that our story--that we had been saved by a woodchuck when the barn suddenly caught fire--would not stand up to scrutiny. Being the youngest, at six or seven, I would probably be the weak link in the conspiracy. But then, I heard a term which I thought must have been sent from God, in answer to prayer. "SPONTANEOUS COMBUSTION!!" I had never heard of such a thing, but it was a wonderful theory, I learned, about heat rising to a combustion point from silage being packed into silos on a hot summer day.

Many years ago now, I was reminiscing with Janet, who likes to talk about old times. On a whim, I asked, "Do you remember when you, Donnie and I were smoking in the hayloft and burned the barn down?" Suppressed memory had been merciful to Janet. She replied, "I thought it was spontaneous combustion."



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Had confession not brought me closure! Why would I now reopen this old wound--apparently not cauterized by time and distance? I received a packet in the mail from my sister, Janet. She had sent me a draft of her childhood reminisces, entitled, "Through the Years," which she wanted me to review before forwarding to Cousin Doris, Donnie's sister. Would I confirm, correct, or add to as my memory would permit? Inevitably, Janet's nostalgic path led to that day--the day the barn burned. Her recollection was a similar, but somewhat more domestic parallel to mine (...we saw a woodchuck and came down to see if we could catch it before it got back to its hole.) She addressed the causation of this segment of "Through the Years." "It's thought to have been started by spontaneous combustion near the silo." Janet informed me that she had checked with Donnie, and Donnie definitely did not remember smoking in the barn. Hey!! Neither do I.

Mr. Hurley has authored two volumes on the Newkirk (various spellings) family. Volume 1 covers the descendants of Matheuse Cormelissen Van Nieuwkerche, born c 1600 in Holland, and of Johann Heinrick Neukirk, born c 1674 in Germany. Item #H 868, \$33.00 ppd from above publisher. Volume 2 covers the descendants of Johann Heinrick Neukirch, born c 1708 in Germany. The author has researched for nearly 30 years the family name of Newkirk and its some twenty identified variant spellings and finds that nearly all Americans bearing these names are descended from one of the three individuals covered in his two column presentation. This is a comprehensive study of the family and is an attempt to combine, into one source, information obtained from many avenues. Serious Newkirk researchers will want to purchase both volumes. I find the book interesting and easy to read. It is written in a narrative style so there is no complex numbering system to wander through. The author refers to each person by name and birth year, in both the narrative section and in the index, so there is some ease in finding the correct person where there may be family members with the same names. Some of the main related families are Barnheiser, Sheely, Nicary, Wampler and Judd. This reviewer was born and raised in the northeast New Mexico, Texas/Oklahoma Panhandle area, so Chapter 11 on the Judd family was of particular interest. The main families in the book are the Sturgeon, Milam and Nixon, with additional coverage of Robinson, Wilcox, Browning, Harlan, Blakeslee and Judd.

Part I of the book is computer generated descendancy charts. Part II is the Family Ties section with a narrative of the family and many anecdotes. Some of the families migrated together and one Aunt when asked if everyone in town was kin, replied "I reckon so. We just all lived over there in a wad and stayed together." Part III covers the various locations where the families lived. Many of the families in the book are in the states of Arkansas,

Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas with specific families in this area of Holston, Lawson, Nixon, McKinney, Milam, Ambort, Gerrald and Howry. The sources section contains only the books used and their location, census, court and county records are not listed. Book is based primarily on the notes of Benjamin F. Wilbour, whose family was one of the first to settle in Little Compton, and which has been prominent in the affairs of the town for nearly 300 years. He wrote the five volumes WILBORES IN AMERICA and LITTLE COMPTON FAMILIES. After his death the multitude of notes on Little Compton that he had gathered were compiled and edited by Mr. Brownell, into this work, which was published by the Little Compton Historical Society. The intent was to tell the history of the town from original documents whenever possible.

This book has 12 chapters covering the Sogkonate Indians, Proprietors of Sakonet, Population Growth, Revolutionary War and War of 1812, Period of the 1800's, Trades and Professions, Churches and Cemeteries, Schools, Organisations, Legends and Sites and Places. There is not much genealogical material in this book, as it was all published in LITTLE COMPTON FAMILIES, however, if your families were in Little Compton, you may find mention of them in this work, as it related to the history of the town.

The author has only printed four copies and has given permission to copy any portion of the book. She has no plans to publish and distribute this book. She was born in Bernice, LA and graduated from Minden, LA High School. The first part of the book is about her "travels thru" the Bernice, Doyline and Minden schools, the churches attended, the activities of the Minden teenagers with whom she was acquainted, and the places she remembers that were popular to frequent in those years of the early 1950's. This section cul minates with her graduation from Minden High School in 1955, and includes several interesting letters from former classmates. She next includes some interesting stories told to her by her Grandfather, as well as some of the superstitions and parental warnings of that day and time.

The book includes about 140 pages of her ancestry. The particular family histories, with the original state prior to migration to LA in parenthesis, are BAGWELL (NC), GRESHAM (VA), FERGUSON (TN), FEAZEL (VA), WISE (SC), COX (GA), HENDERSON (GA), MCELROY (NC), SHAW (MS), ANDERSON (TN), REA/RAY (AL), HAMMOCK (GA), PASCHALL (SC), THORNTON (VA), WATTS (GA), GOODRICH (GA), DOZIER (GA), KAUFMAN (GA) AND STAPLES (GA).

I find the book interesting and easy to read. For anyone who grew up in Minden, LA area, the stories will bring back refreshing memories. 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
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
