Making Good Use of Genealogical Sources

There are a great number of new methods being used to help the average genealogist accomplish difficult problems. The most recent use of DNA in solving a family relationship could be the ultimate method in making a positive identification. We have a problem in finding and ancestor even where primary documents exist. Genealogy hasn't changed, we are still to go from the known to the unknown, but why should it be so difficult? Genealogical procedures are properly conducted from a point of, "What we have proven to be true", "What We Know" and continue into "What We Do Not Know".

The How's and Why's of what we know.

- A. There are many ways we have learned the truths of our ancestors, through our parents, pictures, books, letters, items from collections, other kin, histories, diaries and more.
- B. Each of you holds the answer to an important question, depending on the truthful knowledge of those who came before us.
 - 1. By a show of hands you will let others know where the interest you have in Family History had its start.
 - 2. By whom have you been encouraged the greater by your Mother, Father, another relative or someone else.

Consider the question? You are related or you are not related.

- A. Beginning a new search in the wrong direction often will delay the method that you had decided best at an earlier time.
 - 1. After you locate a document of use, record its source, date of your find, location of the material, and some method where you may return later when you realize you did not get everything the first time.
 - 2. Don't let entering a new family name in your files turn you away from the direction you were going, additional surnames will extend your search.
 - 3. A new search sometimes takes preference over how you had earlier planned to go.
 - 4. With additional information your proposed plan is expanded, don't get discouraged or confused, this new information will broaden your vision.
 - 5. New sources take time to review. Make entries on the proper forms, these forms, when kept up to date will determine your need for future research.

"Your Response" and proper use of your sources will influence your progress.

- A. Have an open mind as to the various ways of spelling popular surnames.
 - 1. Census takers use the most common way to spell a name. Take time to make a list of the the most common spelling errors of persons in your file.
 - 2. Where you search for a maiden name of your grandmother, where there are children often the mothers maiden name is given to a child.
 - 3. Where it is known that several families have chosen a new area to live, many are kin and there may be others that are related to the grandmother.
 - 4. Prepare yourself for additional surnames, as part of your direct line their place of importance may exceed other names of your previous search.

Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck. A.B. cum laude (biology). MA. (European history). M.S. (library science); h been with the Dallas Public Library since 1973 and presently serves as Supervisor of the Genealogy Library.

He was a teaching assistant in the Department of History of Southern Illinois University from 1967 to 1969. From 1969 to 1971 he served in the Missionary Journeyman Program of the Southern Baptist Convention with assignment to the Baptist Mission of East Africa where he was a teacher and librarian the Mombasa (Kenya) Baptist High School. He was a graduate assistant in the School of Library Science at the University of Illinois 1970-71. He has been on the faculty of the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama since 1974 and was the first recipient of the Institute's Outstanding Alumnus Award.

He is the author of Virginia's Colonial Soldiers; Genealogical Research in Texas; and Revolutionary Bounty Land Grants Awarded by State Governments. He received the Award of Merit for the National Genealogical Society in 1982 and was named a Fellow of the society in 1993. In 1999 he was named first recipient of the Filby Prize for Genealogical Librarianship.

His biography is featured in Who's Who in America among others. His column, "Family Tree" appears weekly in the Dallas Morning News.

These Secretary of State's Report are published on occasion. The one prior to this was in 1926. The book is all encompassing in regards to any official governmental positions. The description of State Offices are given, pictures of the Senators and Representatives both national and state. There is a section on the early history of Arkansas with many important dates in that history. Arkansas Boards and Commissions are described. The Constitution of 1874 with amendments is given.

The two most meaningful sections for the genealogist would be the Historical Roster of State Official's beginning on page 183. Every State Official is listed by year served from the very first establishment of that state office. Then beginning on page 382 listed alphabetically by counties is the years and individuals who served as a county Judge, Clerk, Sheriff, Treasurer, Coroner, Surveyor and Assessor from the time the county was established to 1958.

My spouse, Veretta Ritchey Weiland, has a Yeager line and sure enough there on page 531 is her 3G Grandfather, Solomon Yeager, who served as County Judge for Lawrence County 1864-1866 along with his son Lemuel who served as County Coroner for the same period. Then on page 642 for Sharp County, formed 1868 from Lawrence, is Solomon Yeager, serving as the first judge in the new county, from 1868-1872.

If your ancestor served in any elected public position prior to 1958 they are probably in this book. 1958, 6 X 9, 683 pgs, pictures, subject index (no name index), hard cover.

PIERRE BOSSIER: The "Man" and The "Duel"

Pierre Evariste Baptiste Bossier was born in Natchitoches on March 22, 1797 to Francisco Paul Bossier and Catherine Palegrie Lambre. He served as a member of the Louisiana State Senate for ten years, from 1833 to 1843. He was also a General in the Louisiana Militia. The Parish of Bossier, which was taken from Claiborne Parish, was named for General Pierre Bossier by Act 33 of the Louisiana Legislature which was approved and made law when it was signed by Governor Alexandre Mouton on February 24, 1843. Bossier ran for the United States Senate in 1843 and was elected as a Calhoun Democrat to the 28th Congress.

The new Senator Bossier died mysteriously on April 24, 1844, at the age of 47. After a temporary burial in Washington his body was returned to his beloved Louisiana where on February 11, 1845, the clerk of the Immaculate Conception Catholic Church of Natchitoches made an entry in the burial register recording that Pierre Evariste Bossier was buried in the church cemetery.

The following incident happened, in the life of Pierre Bossier, and is submitted for your information.

Gen. Pierre Bossier had served with Gen. Francois Gaiennie of Cloutierville during his time in the Louisiana Militia. Bossier was a Calhoun Democrat and Gaiennie was a Whig. Both men were prominent in their respective political parties. On Sept 17, 1839 these two men attended a ball at the plantation home of Sylvester Rachel at Chopin, a few miles below Natchitoches. The became embroiled in a heated political argument in which Gen. Gaiennie had said "Come outside and we'll settle this man to man." He called Bossier a coward and was then challenged to a duel to be fought the next morning.

The duel took place at the "Savannah" in the rear of Emile Sompayrac's plantation on Cane River. Generals Gaiennie and Bossier faced one another until the command "Fire" was issued. Gaiennie, in his haste to end the fight, missed with his shot and Bossier reportedly took careful aim and shot, killing his opponent. The followers of both Generals became embittered and over the next few weeks 11 additional persons lost their lives.

Wisconsin Historical Society Holds Documents Pertinent to the Lewis and Clark Expedition

The Wisconsin Historical Society holds many treasured documents in its Draper Manuscripts collection. These were amassed by the Society's first director, Lyman Copeland Draper (1815-1891).

The Sergeant Charles Floyd diary is one of these, Floyd served as a sergeant on the Lewis and Clark Expedition, and his diary has been in the limelight recently as the expedition's bicentennial approaches. The diary is presently on loan to the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library in Austin, Texas as part of the exhibition, *Discovering America: The Journey of Lewis and Clark*, where it will remain on display through the middle of August 2003. It will then be moved to Missouri where the Missouri Historical Society will use it in the principal celebration of the expedition anniversary: *Lewis & Clark: The National Bicentennial Exhibition*.

This diary is not the only important piece of expedition history in the Draper collection. The Lewis and Clark Expedition, which departed from eastern Missouri in May 1804, was the brainchild of Thomas Jefferson. The immediate impetus was the need to explore and secure the lands acquired in the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. The possibility of such an expedition was mentioned in a letter from Thomas Jefferson to the explorer George Rogers Clark some twenty-one years prior to the actual expedition. The December 1783 letter written while Jefferson was serving as a delegate to Congress from Virginia thanks Clark for sending him shells and seeds, and without even starting a new paragraph, Jefferson makes a remarkable proposal.

"I find they have subscribed a very large sum of money in England for exploring the country from the Mississippi to California. They pretend it is only to promote knowledge. I am afraid they have thoughts of colonizing into that quarter. Some of us have been talking here in a feeble way of making the attempt to search that country, but I doubt whether we have enough of that kind of spirit to raise the money. How would you like to lead such a party? though I am afraid our prospect is not worth asking the question."

Couched in terms of protecting the West from take-over by the British, Jefferson here proposes what twenty-one years later came to fruition as the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

"POLLY" BRADLEY: LITTLE GIRL ON A FLATBOAT

One of the most interesting and valuable cargoes to ever pass through, to, or from Lafayette County, Arkansas arrived on Long Prairie aboard a few flatboats 184 years ago. One member of the "cargo" was nine year old Mary Jane "Polly" Bradley, who would one day become the first "first lady" of Arkansas. Her grandfather, John Bradley (c1738), an immigrant from Ireland, and his wife Martha had moved from Raleigh, North Carolina to become some of the earliest settlers of Middle Tennessee. In 1819 most of their surviving children would become pioneers again, this time in what would eventually become Roane Township of Lafayette County, Arkansas. Some reports have not included the Bradleys among the "first" flatboaters to Long Prairie, and it is not our purpose here to argue about who was "first". But substantial evidence indicates that the Bradleys arrived either with the earliest, or on separate boats at about the same time.

It is appropriate that the nearest town to Polly's home is called Bradley. No family had greater influence on the first century of the area than the children, cousins and husband of Polly Bradley. Historic commemorations in the area usually center on Governor James Sevier Conway, Polly Bradley's husband. This, too, is appropriate. Conway, his relatives, and friends were the dominant political force in Arkansas from territorial days to the Civil War. But apart from their connection to the governor, the Bradleys deserve commemoration on their own merits.

Wilson County, Tennessee

In order to understand the early history of Long Prairie and Lafayette County it is helpful, perhaps essential, to know something about Wilson County, Tennessee. If Lafayette County has a genealogical "mother county" it must be that one a few miles east of Nashville. Virtually all of the first white settlers of Long Prairie had close connections with Wilson County. Bradleys, Dooleys, Crabtrees, Dutys, Herndons, Beards, Woodwards, Wooldridges, Seviers, Conways. All had either been residents of Wilson County before coming to "the prairie", or married current or former Wilson County residents.

Several circumstances bound these families together to become the Long Prairie "colony". Besides the circumstance of geography, most, if not all of the adult men in the group, had served in the recent War of 1812 as neighbors of its premier general, *Andrew Jackson*. And Jackson was well acquainted with the Bradleys. He had moved his family to the "Hermitage" plantation in 1804, though the mansion of that name would only be constructed 15 years later. It lay on the south side of the Cumberland River and just west of the Wilson County border. [The invocation of Jackson's name is not "name dropping" on behalf of the flatboaters, but a clue on how they were bonded, and why they migrated to Long Prairie, the (then) western boundary of the country.]

Andrew Jackson's profession was law. And though his home was on the Davidson County side of its border with Wilson, he participated regularly (much of the time as a judge) at court sessions in Lebanon, the seat of Wilson County, and just a few miles east of the Hermitage. He also owned considerable acreage in the county. And during all of the 14 years Jackson had lived at the Hermitage, the sheriff of Wilson County was Thomas *Bradley*, Polly's uncle.

We believe that the Bradley 'flatboaters', at least some of them, actually began their trek to Long Prairie from a site upriver from Jackson's home in 1818. We further believe that it would have been

entirely in character for Jackson to join relatives and other friends of the Bradleys to wish them well as they started the long hard journey. It would have been typically Jacksonian for him to have even welcomed them for a brief stopover sendoff at his home before they continued their way down the Cumberland. As evidence for this assertion let's consider the following.

The Bradleys of Wilson County

It is inconceivable that Jackson, a "Superior" Judge, would not be well acquainted with the family of Wilson County's chief legal official. Two of Sheriff Bradley's brothers and three of his sisters were among the flatboaters. For that reason alone Jackson would have been interested in the Bradleys. Indeed, Tom Bradley's tenure as sheriff continued from 1803 to 1825 except for a hiatus from 1819 to 1821. Could this mean that the sheriff may have followed his siblings to Arkansas and then decided to return to Wilson County? We don't know.

What we do know is that another of Polly's uncles and one of her aunts had married a son and daughter of Colonel Sam Barton, another prominent acquaintance of Jackson in Wilson County. Barton had signed the Cumberland Compact in 1780, the original basis of government in Middle Tennessee. The county seat was built on part of his 21,000 acres. But aside from the official, political or social status of Polly's Uncle Tom Bradley and her "well-married" (other) uncle and aunt, Polly's other Bradley kin, the ones who boarded the flatboats for Long Prairie, would have gotten Jackson's attention on their own merits. They included the following:

- 1. James Bradley (ci 759-1822), Polly's father, and probably the oldest of the children, had also signed The Cumberland Compact in 1780, served with Jackson in the Battle of New Orleans, and is probably the officer Bradley mentioned in Jackson's earliest biography. James, too, had "married well". His wife was Jane Davidson, a descendant of the North Carolina Davidsons so important in early Carolina history, and for whom Davidson County, Tennessee (Nashville's county) was named. James would become the ancestor of all the Bradleys who remained on Long Prairie after 1826. The following children of James and Jane presumably accompanied them.
- a. Mary Jane "Polly" Bradley, the principal subject of this paper, who, eight years later, at age 17, would marry the future first governor of Arkansas, James Sevier Conway, and thereby become the state's first "First Lady". Conway was probably not aboard the Bradley boats in 1818/1919. However, his connections with middle Tennessee were many, and he was probably acquainted with some of the boaters. He was a relative of Tennessee's first governor, John Sevier. The Seviers had been closely associated with the Conways for generations, and the association would continue. Two of Governor Savior's sons married Conways, and two of Governor Conway's daughters would marry Seviers. Further, young Conway's uncle, William Rector, was Surveyor General for all lands of the Louisiana Purchase, and was responsible for the disbursal of those lands, including those to which the Bradleys were coming. The significance of Conway in Arkansas history is well documented and needs no further description here.
- b. Martha Bradley, Polly's sister, married Fleetwood Herndon, a native of Frederickstown, Virginia, where his family had been substantial citizens since the 1600s. At least one of his relatives was intermarried with the prestigious Randolphs of early Virginia history, and we believe that Herndon was a relative of Merriwether Lewis, the personal secretary of Thomas Jefferson and leader of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. And the Clark of the Expedition is credited with having

encouraged the Wilson Countians to settle on Long Prairie. Herndon, too, was a veteran of the War of 1812.

The marriage of Martha to Herndon was recorded at Natchitoches, Louisiana for October 1818. That date is part of the evidence that the Bradleys arrived at Long Prairie either by the early winter of 1818 or the early spring of 1819, possibly choosing to winter in the relatively comfortable town of Natchitoches. By 1823 Herndon had become a magistrate in Roane Township, succeeding Tom Dooley (below), who was elected Sheriff. Later, he would be one of the three officials who would select the site and plat (old) Lewisville to be the seat of the new Lafayette County. In the 1830s, recognizing the advantages of the upland in the Walnut Hill area, he purchased several hundred acres along the Old Shreveport Road between Walnut Hill and Louisiana. He was Postmaster for Walnut Hill in the early I 840s.

- c. Davidson Bradley, Polly's brother, married Eliza Crabtree, a daughter of William Crabtree, whose purchase of land in the prairie was the first recorded in Roane Township. William's father, James Crabtree, had owned 640 acres on the north bank of the Cumberland River ml 785, just a few miles north of the future "Hermitage" of General Jackson. James was the first member of the court for nearby Robertson County. However, by 1804, the year that Jackson moved to the Hermitage, William, James, Joseph, and John Crabtree all owned land in Wilson County, and were neighbors of Sam Barton (above). We can almost certainly assume that William also served in the War of 1812. He was a near neighbor of James and Polly Conway in1830, and a magistrate in Lafayette County in 1835. Davidson's granddaughter, Leila Booker, married William B. Worthen, who became owner of the Arkansas Gazette, the state's foremost newspaper since 1819. He also founded Worthen Bank, the state's largest.
- d. John M. Bradley, another of Polly's brothers, was a lieutenant in the Hempstead County Militia in 1820. (Lafayette County was not yet formed.) His wife was Sarafina Scobey, probably a sister of Matthew Scobey, also of Wilson County, who was a Justice of the Peace in Roane Township in 1821, resigned in 1825, and was elected again in 1827 and 1829.

The Dooleys

We do not know that Col. Tom Dooley (1778-1829) accompanied the Bradleys to Long Prairie, but we do know that he arrived at about the same time, and that he was closely linked to them. He was promoted to captain while serving with General Jackson in the War of 1812. He was with him in the Battle of New Orleans, and in the Indian Wars, having sustained a wound which resulted in his eventual death in Roane Township. We are informed that Tom Dooley's name is found several times among President Jackson's papers at the Hermitage. He married Elizabeth Barton, a daughter of Col. Barton (above), around 1803, the year that Long Prairie was purchased from France, and just a few months before Jackson settled east of Nashville.

In 1808 Dooley purchased 640 acres not far from the Hermitage, from Polly's uncle, Wilson County Sheriff Thomas Bradley (above). In the following year, 1809, he was named as executor for the estate of his wife's brother-in-law, another of Polly's uncles, John Bradley, Jr.

There is some evidence that Tom Dooley had already visited Long Prairie at least as early as 1816, the year he sold land in Wilson County. He was a Hempstead County (pre-Lafayette) magistrate in 1819, Colonel of the County Militia in 1823, and Sheriff in 1824-1826. At least a century and a half after the Dooleys and Bradleys became friends, the friendship continued in the

relationship at Walnut Hill between Francis "Frankie' Sevier Dooley, widow of Cal. Dooley's grandson, and her neighbor, Maria Bradley McCalman, a great granddaughter of Davidson Bradley. Those two, perhaps more than any others, worked together to maintain Walnut Hill Methodist Church in its final years. It was also Maria and her husband Willie who donated the old Conway/Bradley land which became Governor Conway State Park at Walnut Hill.

The Dutys

George G. Duty (ci 775-cl 837) was also born in North Carolina, and served in the War of 1812 from Tennessee. He married Elizabeth Thomas in 1798 in Sumner County (across the river from Wilson County) and purchased land there in 1805). They, too, may have accompanied the Bradleys. Their other connection with the flatboaters may have been his relationship to the Bartons (above), who had intermarried with the Bradleys and Dooleys. We do know that one of his sons, Robert Barton Duty, married one of the Dooley daughters. The name Barton reappears among their descendants for several generations. In 1833 George represented Lafayette County in the Arkansas Territorial Legislature, and the Duty name remained prominent in Walnut Hill and Lafayette County into the twentieth century. Two descendants were involved in the Walnut Hill Bank when it opened in 1906. One of them, Richard, was also an early mayor of Bradley, and Sheriff of Lafayette County. Descendants with a more familiar name are from the marriage of George's daughter Mildred to Morgan Cryer, an ancestor of all Roane Township Cryers.

Woodward

We also don't know that William Woodward accompanied the Bradleys in 1819, but like the Dooleys and Dutys, he arrived at about the same time. Identifying the relationship of Woodward to the other flatboaters was especially difficult. Although he had been a familiar figure in Wilson County for several years, the county archives presented a confusing picture of his family. We do know now that he married the widow of Polly's uncle, John Bradley (above) in 1812, and after her death and the death of Polly's father, he married Polly's mother. We include him here because of this unique relationship to the Bradleys. Woodward served in various capacities in the Arkansas territory, including as commissioner for negotiating the Choctaw Treaty, which established the western boundary of Arkansas.

The Bradleys Separate

We cannot declare with total certainty why all of Polly's Bradley kin except her father's descendants moved away from Long Prairie in 1826, but we pose a possible reason. Because of the very fertile soil the families on the prairie had probably prospered, but it was prosperity in a very difficult environment. The military post at the Indian "factor" on the mouth of Sulphur River was not capable of guaranteeing the safety of the settlers. There were frequent raids, sometimes provoked by opportunist settlers with different objectives from the Bradleys. There were floods, and the health problems contributed by mosquitos and other problems associated with the prairie swamps. James Bradley, the "big brother" of the group had died in 1822, and Polly's uncle, Tom Wooldridge, died a few months afterward. All of Polly's surviving uncles and aunts finally decided to get out. They would become the pioneers for whom Bradley County, Arkansas was named. Their names are:

2. Captain Hugh Bradley (1 783-1854), another of Polly's uncles, was married during the War of 1812 and chose to accompany the other flatboaters to "the prairie". He served as a magistrate on

Long Prairie before moving in 1826 to what would become Bradley County, Arkansas, his namesake. Three of his sisters accompanied him, namely:

- 3. Elizabeth "Eliza Jane" Bradley (1788-1850+), Polly's aunt, married her childhood sweetheart, Thomas Wooldridge (c 1785-1823). Both were born in Raleigh, North Carolina, married in Tennessee and, we believe, were among the flatboaters. They settled on Long Prairie, where their youngest child was born and named for her dying brother, James. But Thomas also died on the prairie a few months after her brother James. She decided to migrate 100 miles eastward with her younger brother and sisters to what would eventually become Bradley County.
- 4. Margaret "Peggy" Bradley, another aunt, married Alexander Beard, probably in Tennessee, and settled on Long Prairie, where Alex was a magistrate in 1823. They also moved to (future) Bradley County. She became a charter member of First Methodist Church at Warren, Arkansas.
- 5. Mary Bradley (c1766-cl 851) yet another aunt, also accompanied her brother and two sisters to (future) Bradley County and were also a charter member of First Methodist Church at Warren. She apparently never married, and was living with her brother Hugh and his family in 1850.

True Pioneers

We can only imagine the hardships, dangers and other drama in a flatboat journey from Wilson County, Tennessee to Long Prairie on Red River in 1818/1819. From a few miles east of the little town of Nashville the migrants drifted westward and north into the Ohio River above Paducah, Kentucky. They passed Cairo, Illinois, and entered the Mississippi toward Memphis, Arkansas Post, Vicksburg and Natchez. They may have detoured to New Orleans, pausing to outfit their boats for the final, and probably most difficult challenge of the journey, namely, the struggle up Red River to Natchitoches and finally, Long Prairie. That final trek through Louisiana required pushing, pulling and poling the clumsy crafts upstream through the late summer, then winter miles, including through the 'The Great Raft' logiam.

Polly Bradley Contribution

We can also only imagine how difficult it was for Polly, her family, and neighbors to survive those first years of heat, floods, winters, and disease on primitive Long Prairie. Of course, some of them didn't. Her father died on the prairie a few months before she became a teenager. Her uncle, Thomas Wooldridge died shortly after she became thirteen. In the year that Polly became seventeen all of her aunts and uncles on the prairie moved one hundred miles eastward to what they hoped would be a healthier environment, leaving only her immediate family and their neighbors, the Dooleys, the Crabtrees, Herndons, Dutys, and a few others to "civilize" the area. Within a few months after the others left, seventeen year old Polly married James Conway. The marriage didn't resolve all of her hardships, of course. Several of her children died before they became teenagers, and another died at age fourteen. Five of her children were either not yet, or barely teenagers when her husband died at Walnut Hill. Nevertheless, she was strong enough for the challenges. Finally, in the winter of 1878, almost six decades after she first stepped from a flatboat to the soil of Long Prairie, she died at age 68, having contributed what she could to the civilization of the Prairie, Walnut Hill, and Arkansas. She was buried across the road from her home at Walnut Hill, beside the remains of her husband, several children, and a few other kin.

Directions: From Interstate 20, take Exit 77 (Simsboro), and go south for one (1) mile on LA Highway 507 through the center of the town of Simsboro until you arrive at the first stop sign. Highway 80 and LA Highway 507 (now named Martha Street) intersect at this first stop sign. Make a left on Highway 80. Travel for eight-tenths (.8) of a mile to LA Highway 563 (Dicks Store Road). J & D's Service Mart is at this intersection. Make a right from Highway 80 onto LA Highway 563. After you driving for four (4) miles on LA Highway 563, you'll arrive at the Springhill Baptist Church, which will be on your left.

SLAVE SURNAMES

by Dale Jennings

The biggest impediment to doing black genealogy in slavery times is the absence of surnames. First names can be found in such legal records as inventories, conveyances, wills and successions. These are helpful in connecting post-slavery family lines to slave ancestors. It is generally thought that only "free men of color" possessed last names, but exceptions are found in Bossier Parish, Louisiana. Instances of slave surnames appear in early courthouse records of that parish. The 1843 succession of James B. Pickett, in favor of his wife Paulina and minor children, is the first entry in Probate Book A for the new parish of Bossier. Of the 161 slaves inventoried in the document, 9 were identified by both first and last name, as well as by age and plantation:

The widowed Paulina Pickett remarried to another Bossier Parish planter and slave owner, James B. Gilmer. When they divorced in 1856, the partition of certain of their properties and slaves were recorded in Conveyance Book 4, Pages 104-133. Out of the approximately 560 slaves divided, 64 were shown by first and last names. Others had identifying notations:

On a related note, there is now a two volume publication at the Broadmoor Branch, Shreve Memorial Library, entitled "No Land ... Only Slaves!" by Edith Smith and Vivian Lehman. The authors have abstracted the slave names from the slave conveyances of Bossier Parish (Vol 1) and Claiborne Parish (Vol 2). Many of these slaves (3,261 total in Bossier) have surnames. The names are cross-referenced to the conveyer and conveyee, but it is recommended that the serious researcher look at the courthouse documents themselves for details and verification of names. The Claiborne courthouse and its records burned in 1849, but many of the prior slave conveyances were recorded after that date.

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WILLOW CHUTE PLANTATION AND THE COMMUNITY OF WILLOW CHUTE By Dale Jennings

(The first part of the Willow Chute story told about the acquisition of this Louisiana plantation by James B. Pickett; its possession by his widow Paulina and son John; and its purchase in 1881 by another Bossier Parish planter, William Calvin Vance)

"Willow Chute" was long spoken of as a community and community center, but its location has been elusive, and its history is for the most part still obscure. Willow Chute Station at the northern edge of Willow Chute Plantation, some two miles south of Benton, could easily be mistaken for that place. That "Willow Chute" is still perpetuated on current maps by the tradition of retaining the identity of former depot sites. Some of the little towns did come over from the high ground along the river to the new railroad stations. "Old Benton" didn't have far to go in 1889 over to its new town site at the Benton Depot. Willow Chute was said to have been three miles south of Benton on the Shreveport-Lewisville Road, which followed Red River past Benton to Lewisville, Arkansas. The community center, apparently composed of only a country store and church, did not abandon its rural community. Historically, Willow Chute had one of the first post offices in Bossier Parish. The post office was opened in 1847, but served the community for only about three years. The Red River Baptist Church was established in "the Willow Chute neighborhood" near Red River in 1849 and remained at that location until about 1860.

Willow Chute Plantation had remained intact under Captain Vance and his widow Nina, except for the early sale of the "store tract" and losses to right-of-way acquisitions. In 1886, Calvin sold John Gordon Ogden the remainder of the plantation's "store tract." John Pickett had excluded the two and one-half acres occupied by the black Providence Baptist Church. Ogden's father, John G. Ogden, Sr., was said in his Shreveport Times obituary to have died at Willow Chute on October 2, 1875, in the 46th year of his age. Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Northwest Louisiana states that he went from Shreveport to Bossier Parish where he later died, "his occupation through life having been that of merchant." He owned no property in the parish, but his son "Gordy" purchased the Anchorage Plantation on the west boundary of Pickett's Willow Chute store tract in 1880. The store tract was a twenty-five acre strip of land running from the southwest corner of the plantation north between Willow Chute Bayou and the west section line of Section 7. The half-mile long tract narrowed to a tip where the bayou and section line converged at Red River - later "Old River," a part of which would later form "Cat Island Lake" (see map). The store tract was not always the isolated location that it is today. It was at the store site that the much-traveled Shreveport-Lewisville Road crossed Willow Chute. The bayou was navigable and once the main channel of the river through that point south. A map used by the Confederate military rated the crossing as "good." This may also have been the earliest landing for Pickett's plantation.

The 1885 Ward 2 tax assessment rolls show that Calvin's cousin, Doctor Norwood K. Vance, was living at "Willow Chute Store" and was assessed taxes on one horse. Doctor Vance was known to have been a practicing physician. Besides extending his Anchorage Plantation eastward, Gordy Ogden acquired the store that existed there. John F. Glenn's 1890 listing of the Red River steamboat landings indicated that "Ogden's Willow Chute" was on the right bank going upriver before reaching "Old Benton." This vague designation may have been for the old

Willow Chute tract, the store, the community center, or some combination of these. One might ask how a store could be sustained amidst the river plantations. Besides having the business of those using the public road, it enjoyed considerable local patronage. The white population was sparse, but a great number of black citizens, usually identifying with the plantations on which they lived and worked, needed access to a local store. The demographics along the stretch of Red River approximately from Vanceville to Benton are illustrated by the 1900 population census. It showed 177 black families with a population count of 774, as opposed to 11 white families with a count of 38. That pattern had not changed much from 1870, and would not change appreciably for decades, until mechanization changed farming methods.

The Bossier Banner in the early 1890's contains several parish police jury ("commissioner's court") references to the geographic location of Ogden's store on Willow Chute Bayou: "The bridge across Willow Chute at J. G. Ogden's store....." Pertaining to responsibilities for public road maintenance: "J. H. Belcher on Shreveport and Arkansas Road from Benton to J. G. Ogden's store and J. G. Ogden from his store to Buck Hall;" "G. M. Stinson from Benton to J. G. Ogden's store and S. W. Vance from Willow Chute bridge to Vanceville." During this period the Banner announced "Hotel Arrivals" to the Benton and Union Hotels in Benton. Those claiming "Willow Chute" as their place of residence were Henry W. Ogden, John G. Ogden, Frank B. Ogden, Robert L. Stinson, G. M. Stinson, John H. Stinson, W. M. Rushing, A. G. Teague T. L. Teague, T. M. Arnold, and W. C. Vance. Cal Vance, Sr., had moved from his nearby Riverside Plantation to Shreveport, but still claimed his legal residence in Bossier Parish. He still owned the Willow Chute Plantation house and his home on Riverside, formerly the property of Cezaire Wallace, the first postmaster at Willow Chute. On one occasion, John Ogden registered as a resident of "Ogdenville." One of several announcements of dance parties given at Willow Chute by A. G. Teague reads: "On Wed a largely attended dance was given at Willow Chute. Mr. & Mrs. A. G. Teague, the hospitable host and hostess spared no pains to entertain and make happy their numerous guests."

It is not known if John Ogden, who gave his occupation as farmer, ever ran the store himself. The 1900 census shows that his closest white neighbor, M. L. Bishop, was a "Salesman Grocery." The Banner announced in July 1892 that: "Mr. T. M. Arnold died at his residence at Willow Chute near this place last Thursday morning, in the 26th year of his age." T. Marion Arnold and Theresa Stinson had married in March. Another announcement followed in September: "Succession Sale T. M. Arnold Sep 20, 1892, at late place of business of deceased three miles south of Benton, to the highest bidder a stock of general merchandise consisting of groceries, dry goods, boots, shoes, hats, notions, etc, etc & a lot of accounts."

The Willow Chute community was centered around John Ogden's store somewhere on the store tract. The store's date of origin is not known, but may have dated to the time of the Willow Chute Post Office and Red River Baptist Church. Rural post offices were customarily co-located with the neighborhood store, which many times evolved from a plantation store. That and a church often constituted a rural community center. Cezaire Wallace had purchased the south half of Section 7 in 1839. Willow Chute Bayou dipped into the corner of his plantation at this common corner with the Willow Chute Plantation's store tract. Wallace was postmaster for only a short time before being succeeded by William Stinson. The black Providence Baptist Church, located in the corner of the store tract, may have been the site of the Red River Church. The slaves of the neighborhood plantations had integrated with the congregation of that church. It is possible that a remnant of the black congregation had reconstituted their church there as freedmen. The date of establishment of the Providence Church is unknown. John Pickett

transferred legal ownership of the property to the Providence Church trustees for the consideration of one dollar three years after his 1881 sale of the plantation.


The site of Ogden's store is important to the supposition of Willow Chute's evolvement. The store is known to have been located at the bridge over which the Shreveport road crossed Willow Chute Bayou. A 1901 survey map by Parish Surveyor Roswell Elmer places the crossing just north of the Providence Church. An earlier 1859 survey by Elmer has the bayou crossing in the same place, and clearly indicates the bridge. A 1939 agricultural aerial photo shows three building structures near the crossing site. The site is about one-eighth mile north of the church and the store tract corner, and almost exactly three miles south of Benton. The Confederate map seems to place the crossing farther north, but is not definitive. The case is made that the turn-of-the-century Willow Chute community center is congruent with the mid-1800's Willow Chute, and was located in the southwest corner of the Pickett-Vance-Ogden "store tract." This is the same southwest corner of the Northwest Quarter of Section 7, Township 19, Range 13. The tract passed in ownership through the Ogden heirs to Clint Gayle, and through his heirs, until finally being consolidated back into the Willow Chute land.

The total acreage of Willow Chute Plantation when Nina Varice died in 1935 was 1,960 acres, 758 acres of which was river land and 1,202 hill land. The heirs began selling tracts of land in 1941. It was said that Norwood Vance (Dr. Vance's cousin) walked out onto the sidewalk after the final settlement and first encountered "Pop" Glassell. Mr. Glassell said yes, that he was interested in buying a certain tract of land and wanted to talk about it as soon as he took care of an appointment. The next pedestrian encountered was the banker, Walter Jacobs. Mr. Jacobs was free at the moment, wanted the land and bought it. After the break up of the plantation, sales and subsequent sales are too numerous to list. Presently, former Willow Chute lands are the sites of Benton High School and Middle School; Sawyer Downs track, which almost became the "Louisiana Down" of Bossier Parish; W. E. Waggoner Memorial Park; Larry V. Hunt Subdivision; James E. Burt Subdivision; River Ridge Subdivision; and Bay Hills North Subdivision. Those tracts closest to the river and the store tract were bought up by the Icee Corporation, owned by the Festervans. Most of the river land is now in pasture. The hill land valued at \$6.00 an acre in 1940 is now very valuable as wooded subdivision lots.

The Willow Chute house was the home of the Picketts, as evidenced by an 1842 statement found in the James B. Pickett succession. The parish probate judge, George W. Peets, upon hearing of his death, and that his widow Paulina was out of state, went to the "residence and domicile of said James B. Pickett of said parish of Claiborne on the Willow Chute." He affixed a paper seal around a "hair trunk" and appointed William Stinson guardian of the seal and the other plantation house property. (Judge Peets inventoried the property at another of Pickett's residences, Hurricane Bluffs, on February 6, 1843, eighteen days before this part of Claiborne became Bossier Parish.) In more recent times, the house was occupied by Grey and Mary Arnold Vance Stinson and owners Joe and Larry Vance Hunt and daughter, Larri Hunt Jennings. The house tract was sold to Willie Garrett in 1945. The house burned either that or the following Christmas in a fire said caused by the Christmas tree lights. The site is now on the Festervan land on the opposite side of Benton Road from Benton High School. Larri remembers living in the old Willow Chute plantation house as a small child. The house had a big center hall running from front to back. There were several rooms on each side of the hall. One side was the dining room containing the only working fireplace still existing in the house. The kitchen was also on that side of the house. It had probably been added at a later time. There was also a bedroom on that side. The parlor, two more bedrooms and the bath were located on the other side. The

ceilings in this ante-bellum house were extremely high as was customary in houses built in that era. An open gallery ran the entire width of the front of the house and a screened-in porch was on the back. One of her memories is how cold this house was in the winter, with only space heaters for warmth. Cotton was stuffed around the windows to try and keep some of the cold wind from coming in the house. Larri also remembers that on the 4th of July, the people that worked on the plantation would dig a big pit and barbeque meat all day. She was allowed to stay outside and watch all this fun. Her mother used to say it took several days to wash the smell of smoke out of her long hair. Larri had a little child size replica of a wood- burning cook stove. This toy really worked and with assistance from her nurse, Carrie, she baked cornbread out on the back porch. "Miss Puddin," as she was called, had a Shetland pony that she rode around in the front yard and a very protective collie dog named "Bonnie Betty."

A 1939 aerial map photo is the only known picture surviving of the old Willow Chute house. If anyone has a photograph or memories of the house, or of the old Willow Chute community, Larri and Dale would like to hear from them. They live at 194 Vance Road, Benton, LA 71006, on a residential lot on the old Willow Chute Plantation hill land, which has been in Larri's family continuously for more than 120 years.

The McDade Family Contributed by Herman L. Weiland

Those of you who have been to Bossier City, LA may have driven on McDade Street from Barksdale Blvd. to the A. R. Teague Parkway. You may have driven through what is left of the town of McDade, going south to Coushatta on Highway 71. You may have been to Sibley and driven on McDade Street. You may have seen the McDade House across from Schumpert Hospital in Shreveport, Louisiana. If you were a native of Clayton, New Mexico, as is the contributor of this article, you know that Noel McDade was the Mayor there from 1950-1958 and that he was earlier the Mayor of Dumas, Texas from 1930-1935. I became curious as to any connection that might be found. My research on the McDades follows in very brief form.

The McDaid/McDade's were from Scotland where they were a Sept of the Davidson Clan. (Meaning they were not large enough to be a Clan of their own) Many English and Scotch went to Ireland where they became known as Scotch-Irish. Some of those Scotch-Irish started immigrating to America about 1700, settling in Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania. Migration continued into South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama. One of these, James McDade served in the Rev. War in So. Carolina. James had a son William McDade who served in the War of 1812 in the Georgia Militia. William had a son Alexander Jackson McDade who served in the Mexican War. Alexander Jackson had a son, Joseph Lafayette McDade who was born Dec 12, 1846 in Sumpter Co., Alabama. Joseph's older siblings were born in, guess where, Mt Meigs near McDade, Alabama, just south of Montgomery. Other McDade families immigrated to Texas where just east of Austin you will find McDade, Texas. Alexander and his wife, Mary Ann Miller, came with their family and some of their siblings families to Bossier Parish around 1848. Several settled near Fillmore and their descendants married into many prominent Bossier Parish families. The McDade plots at the Fillmore Cemetery are numerous and contain many large and impressive stones.

James Germany McDade served on the Bossier Parish Police Jury for many years and McDade Street is named for him. William Turner McDade and Ross Elias McDade moved their families to the area that was later named **McDade**, **Louisiana**. One of those McDade homes is now owned by the Elm Grove Baptist Church, the other burnt..

The McDade Family recognized the need for some type of hospitality house near the Schumpert Hospital and provided funding for the McDade House.

Now back to Joseph Lafayette McDade. He served in the Confederate Army under his Uncle, Capt. Abney. In 1874 he moved to Bonham, Texas where he married Jane Jennings in 1875. In 1906 the family moved by immigrant train cars from Bonham to Dumas, Texas. With them were their three children, Noel, Mary and Sam.

Noel McDade was born in Bonham, Texas on Dec 4, 1882 and died in Dumas, Texas in Dec 1979. In addition to serving as a Mayor of Dumas, Moore County, TX and Clayton, Union County, NM, he was a Moore County Judge for 10 years, the Moore County School Superintendent for 6 years and involved in Real Estate sales. There is a City Park in Dumas, Texas named for him.

So my curiosity was satisfied, I now know that my former Mayor, Noel McDade, had some pretty influencial roots right here in Bossier Parish, Louisiana.

Joe L. McDade, a son of Noel McDade, has the William McDade and Alexander J. McDade family bibles. The family bible records are printed in this issue of "The Genie".

William McDade Family Rible Contributed by Herman L. Weiland

The William McDade Family Bible is presently in the possession of Joe L. McDade, 803 Stanford St., Dumas, Texas 79029. The Bible was published by the H. & E. Phinney Co., Cooperstown, New York in 1827.

All of William McDade's children were born in Alabama. Several of them moved to Louisiana and settled near Shreveport. The following is a list of the <u>four</u> wives of William McDade, the dates of their marriages, their children and their birth and death dates, as copied from William's Bible and on file at Bossier Library History Center

ALEXANDER JACKSON MCDADE, the only child of William McDade and Rebeckah Ham, had 13 [14] children. This family resided in Fillmore, near Haughton. Mr. Ernest McDade, who died at the old home place in 1955 [Note: Died September 11, 1954] was the last remaining child of this union.

Also residing in this area were the Hickmans, Hendersons, James McDade and Turner McDade families.

Katherine Amanda McDade, daughter of Annabelle Turner and W. McDade married Asbury Arnold Abney, at Mount Meigs, near Montgomery, Alabama on Dec 18, 1844. They moved to Louisiana in 1845 and located at "Bossier Point". They were the parents of Adelaide Amelia Abney, who married William Henry Scanland. (Scanland Biographical, May 11, 1901)
