When Bible Records are submitted, give date and publisher of the Bible (if known), date copied, name of the contributor, name of present owner and the original owner.

Queries are free and encouraged. Please submit them typed or very plainly written. Space is limited. Please be brief and concise, using no more than 70 words per query. The editor reserves the right to edit or reject queries not suitable for publication.

The Genie cannot be responsible for errors or inaccuracies, but will hasten to publish corrections. Please read the material carefully and advise the Association in writing of corrections.

The purpose of the General Commission on Archives and History is to promote and care for the historical interest of The United Methodist Church. We maintain an archives and library in which historical records and materials relating to The United Methodist Church are preserved and are made available for public and scholarly use.

Researching Your United Methodist Ancestors: A Brief Guide

Start with Three Important Questions

Was my ancestor an ordained minister? Many families have the tradition that "great-grandpa was a preacher". Such family history may or may not be accurate. In United Methodism the term *preacher* could refer to an ordained minister or it could refer to a layperson who had many of the duties of an ordained minister, but only in a specific locale. This person was called a local preacher.

If the person was an ordained minister, then records held by the General Commission on Archives and History may be able to help you. The resources for genealogical research are limited to full-time, fully ordained clergy of the United Methodist Church and its predecessor denominations. (See below for a list of our predecessor groups) If the person you are researching falls into this category then please feel free to fill out our Genealogical Research Information form (available from the GCAH home page). What we may be able to provide is a copy of the official obituary taken from the person's Annual Conference Journal. (See below for definition). There is a non-refundable fee for this service. Many annual conferences can also provide this service. You may wish to contact (available from the GCAH home page) them as well.

Was my ancestor a missionary? If you believe that your ancestor was a missionary, then again, we may be able to help you. We have obituaries for many of the denomination's missionaries and we have reports filed by many of the missionaries about their work. If the person you are researching falls into this category then please feel free to fill out our Genealogical Research Form (available from the GCAH home page).

Where are baptismal and membership records? Local church records, such as baptismal and membership records, are not kept by the General Commission on Archives and History. Local church records are kept at the local church. If that church closes and merges with another church, then the records go to the new church. If the church closes and there is no successor church, then the records are usually transferred to the annual conference archives. You will need to contact the conference archives to learn more about the status of the church and how to go about finding its records. Feel free to use our on-line conference directory (available from the GCAH home page) to locate the person you need to contact. If you have any questions please feel free to contact us (available from the GCAH home page or see below).

What are the Predecessor Denominations of The United Methodist Church?

Today's United Methodist Church is the descendent of several predecessors. These denominations are: Methodist Episcopal Church (1784-1939), Methodist Episcopal Church, South (1845-1939), Methodist Protestant Church (1828-1939), Methodist Church (1939-1968), United Brethren in Christ (1800-1946), Evangelical Association (1803-1922), United Evangelical Church (1894-1922), Evangelical Church (1922-1946), Evangelical United Brethren (1946-1968), United Methodist Church (1968-present).

"United Method-ese" — What Some of our Terms Mean

- *Annual Conference* - an organizational unit within United Methodism (and all predecessor denominations), consisting of churches in a given geographical area. Clergy and lay delegates attend a business session each year, usually in the early summer, at which time clergy receive their preaching appointments for the coming year. Financial business, reports of the numbers of new members, and other matters are also addressed at this yearly meeting.
- *Annual Conference Journal* - Published every year, the journal contains detailed information about, clergy, churches, and ministries of an annual conference.
- *Appointment* - The preacher's assignment by the bishop of the annual conference where the preacher holds his or her membership.
- *Charge* - The church or churches to which a pastor is appointed.
- *Circuit* - A pastoral charge of two or more churches.
- *Local Preacher/Pastor* - In the 19th century, a lay person who was authorized to perform ministerial tasks (such as preaching, marrying and burying, but not conducting the Lord's Supper) at a local church while the fully ordained minister was away traveling the circuit.

Scottish Ancestry

Do you have Scottish roots? If so, there are two Web sites you won't want to miss: Scotland's People, at < www.scotiandpeople.gov.uk > and Scottish Documents, at < www.scottishdocuments.com >. Nationwide in scope and covering Scotland's most valuable sources — parish registers, civil registration, censuses and probate records — these databases greatly facilitate finding Scottish ancestors.

Many Scottish emigrants set sail for America. One migration that consisted mostly of Scots-Irish immigrants arrived after staying in Ireland for a number of generations. They often settled in the backcountry regions on the edge of civilization, in what later became the United States of America. Social historians have written many excellent books about their unique culture, such as David Hackett Fischer's *Albion's Seed: Four British Folkways in America*. Fischer calls one of the four groups discussed the "borderers." His 175-page expository on these people, who American genealogists refer to as the Scotch-Irish, shows how former residents of northern England, Scotland and Ireland, transported their culture from the Old World to the New World.

The General Register Office for Scotland generated the Web site Scotland's People. This Web site documents baptisms and marriages from the Presbyterian Church, Scotland's state religion, from the 1500s through the mid-19 century. Picking up in 1855, when civil registration records began, this Web site will help you find the birth, marriage and death certificates of your ancestors through the early 20 century. The Web site also has indexes to the 1881, 1891, and 1901 censuses. Scotland's People is a pay-per-view site, but, will speed up the research process.

Alternative computerized methods to access some of the same information also exist. Although none of these means cover the sources as comprehensively as Scotland's People, they are more economical. The Presbyterian Church records are available in a free database at LDS Family History Centers. This compilation, called Scottish Church Records, is accessible through the DOS Version of Family Search. Civil registration births and marriages from 1855 through 1875 are indexed on the International Genealogical Index at < www.familysearch.org >.

The other Web site, Scottish Documents, created by the Scottish Archive Network, houses scanned images of over 520,000 Scottish probate records. Their index provides quick reference to wills dating from 1500 to 1901. You can search the index for free, and for a nominal fee, have a digital copy of your ancestors sent to you. These organizations have harnessed the Internet's power to provide genealogists with nationwide indexes to find Scottish ancestors. In the British Isles, the Scots lead the pack over the English, Welsh, and Irish in indexing their historical documents.

COLLINSBURG, LOUISIANA

The 1860 census shows G. W. Sentell to be a prosperous Collinsburg merchant and planter. Besides his immediate family, George has in his household three of his younger brothers, William M., Nathan W. and James M. Sentell, all clerking in the store. Doctor Paul M. Davis of Alexandria, LA, who was born in 1919 and is a great-grandson of Nathan Wesley Sentell, can remember the then still standing ruins of a big log construction house that was said to have been the early Collinsburg residence of George Washington Sentell. He said that it was on the west side of Collinsburg Creek and just south of the Collinsburg-Rocky Mount road; and, that the site is east of the Collinsburg crossroads about one-third distance to the present Louisiana Highway 3. The spring-fed Collinsburg Creek, once called "Mill Creek," flows under the Old Plain Dealing Road north of Collinsburg and makes a bend southward intersecting the Collinsburg-Rocky Mount road more than one-half mile east of the crossroads.

In November of 1860, George W. Sentell established a cotton factorage and commission business in New Orleans. In December he registered a declaration with the Bossier clerk of court saying that his move to New Orleans was not a change of legal residence. He turned the Collinsburg store operations over to his brothers, and the January 1861 store ledger shows the proprietorship as "W. M. Sentell & Co." William M. Sentell replaced his brother George as postmaster on January 5, 1861, for a term that was cut short when Louisiana seceded on January 26th. The January store ledger reflects that the 1861 business year began as usual. However, retail operations soon closed abruptly, and several pages of bills receivable entries showed that W. M. Sentell & Co. was collecting on its credit sales accounts. The company's books stayed open throughout the war, but were not the ledgers for a retail store business. The entries were primarily for bills receivable, collections, notes, drafts, interest, sundries cash disbursements, taxes, etc. and cotton sales. The book was finally closed out by a few pages marked "1866 & 1867" that consisted of more of the same and entries in settlement of accounts by G. W. Sentell, W. M. Sentell & Co., J. B. Sentell & Bros. and Sentell & Prather. John B. Sentell had looked after his brother George's Arkansas planting interests, and Sentell & Prather was George Sentell's New Orleans partnership. The New Orleans enterprise had also been disrupted by the Civil War and the capture of that city by federal forces.

The four youngest Sentell brothers joined local companies and went off to war. James and Henry's company, the "Bossier Volunteers," went first in June 1861. Nathan's unit, the "Bossier Cavalry," was mustered into Confederate States service in March 1862, and William's "Marks Guards" was mustered into Confederate service in May 1862. George Sentell looked after the Sentell family interests. Both "Billy" and "Jimmy" Sentell died in the war. Other Collinsburg area men who went to war included John H. Nattin, Joseph P. Vance, David A. Davidson, George E. Gilmer, James

Winston, George H. Walker, J. L. C. Graham, William N. Doles, James M. Doles, James R. Cavett, James B. Cavett, Philander A. Rathbun, Morris Rathbun, William Marks, Andrew J. Marks, James H. Marks, Nicholas M. Marks, Jr. and William H. King.

Private William H. (Henry) King, a member of Company B, 28th Louisiana Regiment (Marks Guards) was related to the Cavetts. He mentions Collinsburg in his Civil War "Journal of a Private Soldier." The following entries are in connection with his furloughs home while the Marks Guards company was in northeast Louisiana: June 17, 1862. "Went to Collinsburg this evening to see G. W. Sentell concerning a horse to ride back to camp, he having sent me word he wished me to ride one back for his brother, Lieut Sentell to ride home. Succeeded in getting the horse" (This was William Sentell). September 11, 1862. "Attended church at Collinsburg. Sermon by Rev Robert Martin" (Collinsburg is known to have had a Methodist church in 1860, but Martin was a Baptist, probably on circuit from the Salem church in Red Land). September 18, 1862. "Arrived at Collinsburg just at dusk.....borrowed a pony of G. W. Sentell to ride home."

Rodney Bellar, who grew up near Collinsburg, recalls that while a youth the family's maid, Mary Lee Jackson, told him about what her grandmother had witnessed at Collinsburg. She had related to her granddaughter that during the Civil War Confederate troops had dug trenches and built defensive works around Collinsburg. This would have been at the time of the Red River Campaign in the spring of 1864. Federal Major General Steele was ordered to move a large force south from Arkansas against Shreveport. This was in support of General Banks' invasion up the Red River in an attempt to capture Shreveport. Steele's advance was aborted before he reached Louisiana, but Collinsburg had probably been fortified as a contingency. Mary Jackson also said that her grandmother told her that casualties, apparently from the Mansfield and Pleasant Hill battlefields south of Shreveport, were taken in for treatment and recovery by families as far north as Collinsburg. She had helped care for the wounded as a slave at Collinsburg.

After the war, George revived his New Orleans cotton brokerage business, and the Collinsburg operation was reestablished in early 1866 as a retail mercantile store. The firm was incorporated as N. W. Sentell & Co., with Nathan's brother George as an absent partner. Nathan was postmaster for a short time in early 1866, and then was succeeded by Oliver Richardson. John H. Nattin, who first clerked in the store for G. W. Sentell & Co. in March 1858, joined the company as a partner in 1866. William Calvin Vance joined the firm in 1867, but soon left to become a full-time planter. All three had been captains in the Confederacy.

Doctor Walker moved with his family to Shreveport before transferring the old Pineville store tract to his wife Margaret for the consideration of \$2,500 in June 1867. This conveyance included "forty hogs, eight cows and all the furniture of the house," and was made under pretext of being "paraphemal" (sic) or having to do with a wife's dower or separate property rights. Mrs. Walker then sold the two-acre lot number two to James Ridley, who soon resold it to James Byrd of Arkansas. No indication can be found that Byrd ever disposed of the property. In April 1868, Nathan Sentell bought the

80-acre store tract, except the lots previously sold. This was at sheriff's sale, resulting from judgment and seizure by Suit No. 1938, Susan Swindle vs. George H. Walker. Susan Swindle had sued Doctor Walker in federal district court for not completing payment for a slave purchased from Swindle in December 1859. The federal judicial system, disrupted by the Civil War, had to be reestablished and was evidently badly backlogged. The \$500 paid by Sentell was two-thirds the appraised value of the property. David A. Davidson at this time sued Walker over the sale of a two-acre lot across the road from his other lot. Davidson claimed to have been deprived of title because Walker's property had been subject to mortgage in favor of Susan Swindle. This undated sale appears only in the Davidson lawsuit and was not registered with the Parish Clerk of Court. By then Walker had left the state.

Another belated litigation that would affect Collinsburg was the joint lawsuit won by Mr. Albert Nalle and Madam Riene Welham against Paulina Pickett and her son-in-law, Robert C. Cummings, in 1868. Paulina had negotiated two one-year commercial notes totaling \$17,500 with the R. C. Cummings Company in New Orleans in April 1861. The notes were endorsed by Cummings to the South Louisiana residents Nalle and Welham, and the principle and interest were not paid those two parties when due. Now, after resumption of the federal court system following the war, Paulina's Orchard Plantation was ordered seized and sold at sheriff's sale. The 80-acre "store tract" and some other parts of the property had been disposed of before becoming collateral to the notes. Nalle and Welham claimed some 3,000 acres at sale, and took the proceeds from about another 1,000 acres. Of this, Nathan Wesley Sentell bought 240 acres, in Section 30. In September 1870 George Sentell "confirmed and completed a sale previously made" of his 1.29-acre lot to his brother, Nathan Wesley. The sale of this property in the very northwest corner of Section 32 was for a stated cash settlement of \$2,500 made in "AD 1867."

On February 3, 1873, Nathan bought additional land from Nalle and Welham in Sections 29, 30 and 31. This was a total of 480 acres, "less about one and a half acres embraced in the description sold to the said Nathan W. Sentell on or about the 16th day of June 1869 adjoining the lot on which stands his store house in the village of Collinsburg in said parish of Bossier – all situated on the Orchard Place formerly the property of Mrs. Paulina Pickett." It was Mrs. Welham's expressed concern that Paulina's old Orchard Place home (more than two miles east of there in Section 27) should not be included in the sale. The three-section land sale was for \$1,000. Nathan Sentell now owned everything in the "village" and general area of Collinsburg, except lots two and three and the Graham lot. A map used during the Civil War shows Collinsburg as a concentration of buildings annotated in the northwest quadrant of the crossroads in the very southwest corner of Section 29. This corner appears to be "downtown Collinsburg" and is probably the one and a half acres later bought by Sentell in 1869. That sale is not found registered at the courthouse. The aforementioned 1873 "adjoining lot" containing the "store house" was probably G. W. Sentell's 1.29-acre lot across the road to the south in Section 32. The Sentell store was likely reopened at that site in 1866. The increase in value of George Sentell's lot from \$200 in 1859 to \$2,500 when sold to Nathan Sentell in 1867 could be explained by the construction of a store

building there. There is additional evidence to indicate that the Section 32 corner became the site of the Sentell-Nattin store. Mr. C. A. Rogers, Jr., who is a local resident now in his eighties, can remember the large abandoned store building on that corner. Both it and the operational store across the road appear to be shown on a 1932 map based on aerial photos taken in 1927. Postal records show for certain that the Collinsburg post office was located in the northwest corner of Section 32 at least as early as November 20, 1876, and at least as late as September 11, 1892. At some point the Sentell store business was moved back across the road to the Section 29 corner where it is remembered by Mr. Rogers, the Sentell and Nattin descendants and many others. (Contrary to this, the Surveyor General's September 18, 1870, survey map, a slightly updated copy of their 1839 map, clearly places Collinsburg in Section 30 midway along the Section 30/29 section line, one-half mile north of the Sections 29, 30, 31 and 32 section corner. Nothing else can be found to support that location.)

Nathaniel Wesley Sentell died at his Collinsburg home of consumption in November 1878 at the age of forty-one. He died possessed of several thousand acres of land in Texas and the Louisiana parishes of Caddo and Bossier, to include his property in the Collinsburg area. Some of that in Bossier was owned in partnerships with Calvin Vance and John Nattin. Mr. Sentell had been preceded in death by his wife Mary in June 1876. He was survived by three of his five children, Nathaniel William (Will), John Mercer and Mattie, aged twelve, seven and five, respectively. All had been born at Collinsburg. His brother George was named by Nathan as executor of his will and administrator of the estate in the interest of his minor children. He bequeathed \$2,500 to his brother John's widow, Rebecca Prudence Sentell, for the "kindness, care and consideration" shown his children. He wished that his children continue to reside at his residence in Collinsburg in Rebecca's care until the youngest obtained majority. Although this 1878 will was invalidated in favor of his earlier 1876 will, Rebecca is shown there as head of household in the 1880 census. Also in the household are her nephews and niece, "Willie," "Johnie" and Mattie, as well as her brother-in-law, Sam Sentell. The children lived both there and with their uncle George and aunt Mildred Dickson Sentell in New Orleans, where they received their schooling. Nathan had sold his interest in the mercantile business to his partner, John H. Nattin in 1875, but had retained ownership of the store building. Nattin was appointed Collinsburg postmaster on March 23, 1880.

The Davidsons lived on their lot in Collinsburg until they sold it to James R. Cavett in 1880. In 1885, Cavett sold a part of the lot to Joseph P. Vance and Davidson's son-in-law, James P. Keeth. This was a seventy-five foot frontage on the Arkansas road off the southeast corner "upon which the store house now stands and occupied by J. P. Keeth." (Keeth was often confused with another prominent family, the Keiths). Vance, a local landowner, planter, and a bachelor, had put capital into the business when the partnership was formed two years earlier. James R. Cavett and Robert S. Doles, also had a store. F. H. Thompson wrote in 1886 that, "The village of Collinsburg has three large stores, and is the distribution point for a large country. The firms at this place are J. H. Nattin, Cavett & Doles and Keith & Vance." The 1880 census shows that Collinsburg had a physician, Dr. G. W. Watters; a lawyer, C. McClenaghan; a carpenter,

J. R. Hampton; a blacksmith, Tobe Lyles and five merchants. The merchants were John H. Nattin, David A. Davidson, Robert S. Doles, and the Jewish merchants, Samuel Hyman and L. S. Kronenberg. Cunningham Hamilton Steel McClenaghan was more noted as a surveyor, surveying the town site of Plain Dealing where he later became mayor.

Louisiana Vital Records – Online

Getting a birth certificate or death record is now easier because of a new online service recently started by the Department of Health and Hospitals' Vital Records Registry.

The state has contracted with VitalChek, an online service that provides remote ordering of birth certificates and other vital records. Through this service, customers are able to submit Internet requests for certified copies of Louisiana birth, death and Orleans Parish marriage certificates. VitalChek service is available at www.vitalchek.com.

The demand for certified copies of birth and death records is high, with more than 500,000 individual customer service requests each year. Boolean Searching on the Internet

Boolean searching is based on a system of symbolic logic developed by George Boole, a 19th century British-born Irish (English) mathematician. Most keyword searchable computer databases support Boolean searches. Boolean search techniques may be used to perform accurate searches without producing many irrelevant documents.

The Internet is a vast computer database. As such, its contents must be searched according to the rules of computer database searching. Much database searching is based on the principles of Boolean logic. This logic refers to the logical relationship among search terms.

When you perform a Boolean search, you search the computer database for the keywords that best describe your topic. The power of Boolean searching is based on combinations of keywords with connecting terms called operators. The three basic operators are terms **AND**, **OR**, and **NOT**.

The operator **AND** narrows a search by combining terms and retrieves every document that contains both of the words specified. Requesting that all search terms be present on the web pages listed in results. It can also be described as a *Match All search*. To locate general information on Internet security issues, you use the command like this: Internet **AND** security.

The **OR** operation broadens or widens a search to include documents containing either keyword. The **OR** search is particularly useful when there are several common synonyms for a concept or variant spellings of a word. It also allows for any of the specified search terms to be present on the web pages listed in results. It can also be described as a *Match Any search*. To find information on the topic or weightlifting you use the command like this: weightlifting **OR** bodybuilding.




The **NOT** operation narrows a search by excluding unwanted terms. This operation is used in order to require that a particular search term **NOT** be present on web pages listed in results. It can also be described as an *Exclude search*. To find information on gambling and not the lottery you use the command like this: gambling **NOT** lottery.

Boolean Searching

Use Boolean operators (and nesting) to search for combinations of words or phrases. Enter Boolean operators (i.e., AND, OR, NOT) in either uppercase or lowercase.

Note: Boolean operators (and nesting) may not be used in Basic Search types: Author/Creator, Title, Subject, LCCN-ISSN, Call Number or Keywords.

The chart below with Venn diagram illustrates the AND, OR, and NOT search.

William W. Wood Family Bible

The following pages were taken from a Bible purchased at an Estate Sale in Bossier City, Louisiana. Herman L. Weiland presently owns it. Several other interesting items were within the pages of the Bible and would seem to indicate the migration of the family.

One of the items within the Bible was a Postal Card mailed from Richmond, VA on Jun 26, 1893, addressed to W. W. Wood of Jamestown, TN. This might indicate that he either came from the Richmond, VA area or that this Hardware Store ships its wares quite some distance.

A 1909 or 1910 Listing of Indian Lands for sale in Western Oklahoma. Beside three of the property listings, the names of the closest town have been written in. The amount of \$2,850 has been entered beside the property located at Greenfield. Did the Wood's make a bid on this property and make their residence near Greenfield?

Also included in the Bible was a page from the El Reno, Okla newspaper dated November 25, 1963 depicting the details of the death of President Kennedy. This would indicate that at least some members of the family were still in that area in 1963. El Reno would be the closest large town to all three of the identified locations on the Land for Sale listing.

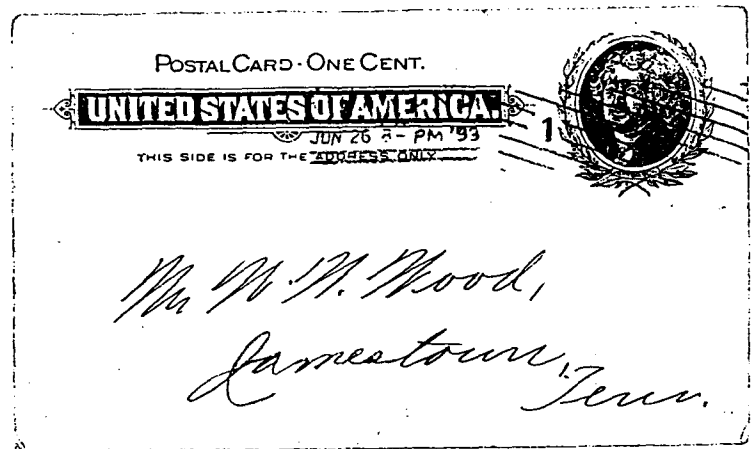

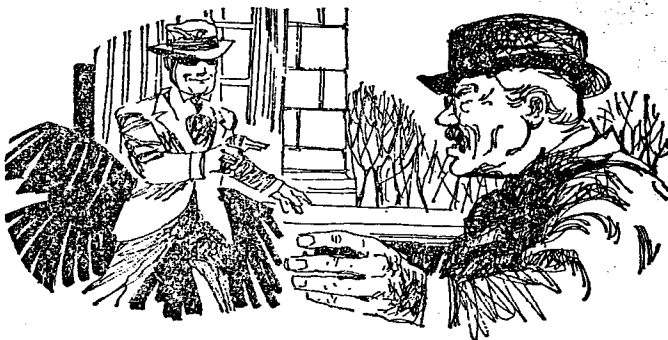

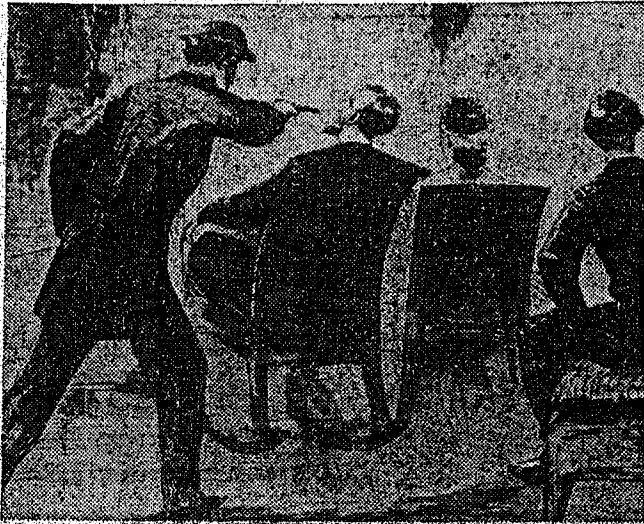
NOV. 22, 1963: Over the assassin's shoulder as he zeroes in on his target—President Kennedy.

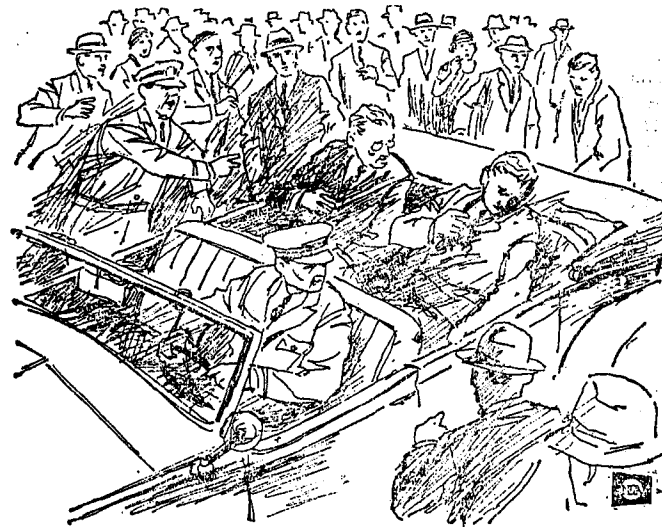

What other reasonable avenues are available to, and how does, Della May BUOSCIO pursue her goal of obtaining data on her birth parents? The legal system will start the legal process to open her entire record only at considerable cost to her, but without a guarantee that her records will be opened at the end of this process. Who are the birth parents of Della May BUOSCIO, who now bears the surname of her deceased, adoptive parents, Evelyn June (nee COTTLE) and Frederick Louis BUOSCIO? Della was born 23 May 1950 at the Wesley Memorial Hospital (now Northwestern Hospital) in Chicago, IL. Della was the third child of a 23-year-old mother. At birth her 24-year-old father worked for a construction company. Her true birth certificate was legally amended to replace the names of her adoptive parents with those of her birth parents and to add the name of the hospital where she was born. Nothing is known about a witness, "R. GREENE, 720 No. Michigan Avenue, Chicago, Ill," to this private adoption. (This adoption did not go through an adoption agency.) Della later attended Jane Adams Kindergarten, Annunicata Parochial School under Sister Rosaria and George Washington High School. 34th Texas Cavalry Soldiers Who Died In Shreveport In 1862

This list of soldiers' deaths was taken from the Shreveport City Council Record Book B, page 497-512. I have kept the original spelling of the names, although some are misspelled. The burial place for these thirty-four (34) men is not stated. They may be buried near the location of the Shreveport Confederate General Hospital. Over one hundred seventy (170) soldiers died at this Hospital between 1864 and 1865, and their burial place has not yet been discovered.

After the Soldier's name, I have added in parenthesis information found in service records and census records. Most of their service records were incomplete and did not even mention their deaths. A few records mentioned their date of death, but not the place. None mentioned the cause of death, but I believe that they all died of disease. I have listed the names in the order found in the City Council Records, which was chronologically.

June 1862...

BIRD'S EYE VIEW OF THE BARNES' LEGACY

A classic illustration of another "Thomas Jefferson-Sally Hemmings" saga occurred in the town of Keatchie, DeSoto Parish, Louisiana. This story differs in that William Barnes, a white farmer and soldier who served in the Civil War, openly acknowledged and supported his former slave, Betsy, and the children she bore him.

William Barnes was born about 1823 in Tennessee to the union of Dasha (or Cacia, maiden unknown). Dasha was born circa 1798 in Virginia and Collum was born circa 1797 in North Carolina. In 1820, Mrs. and Mrs. Collum Barnes resided in Gallatin, Sumner County, TN, where William was probably born.ⁱ William served in the military as evidenced by a military land warrant, Certificate No. 4014, he possessed in 1873. His father, Collum, a planter, served in the military and possessed a military land warrant, Certificate No. 36963 in 1873.ⁱⁱ In 1849, Williams Barnes purchased land in Louisiana. William Barnes was a 27-year-old laborer in his father's household in Keatchie, DeSoto Parish, Louisiana in 1850. William also worked as a straw boss for Richard D. Foster.

Family oral history states that Betsy was sold in Biloxi, MS, to Richard Foster, who came from Mississippi to Keatchie, Louisiana.ⁱⁱⁱ Collum and his son, William, probably met the family of Richard D. Foster in 1840 in Hinds County, Mississippi, where Collum Barnes paid cash for 119.92 acres of land.^{iv} After the birth of their third child in Mississippi, the Fosters also moved to DeSoto Parish. R. D. Foster is on the 1850 Slave Schedule for DeSoto Parish as the owner of nine slaves.^v

On 18 October 1855 in DeSoto Parish, Louisiana, William Barnes married Parmelia A. Collins, who was born in Mississippi about 1835. She was the widow of Thomas B. Weaver, an overseer, who was born about 1826 in Alabama.^{vi} She had married Thomas on 3 July 1850 in DeSoto Parish, Louisiana.^{vii} Parmelia was the daughter of Moses Collins, who was born about 1791 in Alabama and died on 4 October 1855 in DeSoto Parish, LA, and of Matilda Jane Prestridge, born circa 1812 in GA. When an appraisal of his estate was made in 1857, Moses Collins owned 1,037 (more or less) acres of land valued at \$7,330.00 and \$27,716.00 in personal property of which \$17,327.00 was the value of his slaves.

For \$1,660.00 on 9 January 1857, William Barnes bought three slaves--Betsy, age 20 with her two children, Lissy, age 4, and Douglas, age 2 years—from the estate of Moses Collins in DeSoto Parish, Louisiana.^{viii}

To date, no record has been found establishing when and from whom Moses purchased her. Betsy is not listed in an 1856 initial inventory or in an 1857 updated inventory of slaves made in the succession of Moses Collins. Betsy and her two children are

mentioned on a document in this succession only when they were sold to William Barnes on 9 January 1857.

Mrs. Parmelia Collins Barnes was not listed as William Barnes' wife when this DeSoto Parish, LA, household was enumerated on 20 August 1860.^{ix} She may have died.

Betsy was born about 1837 in Alabama to the union of Gilly Pipkins and Simon Pipkins, Sr. In 1870, she and her children used the surname of "Pipkins." However, by 1880, Betty and her children bear the surname of "Barnes" and are living in the same household with William Barnes as a family.^x

As William's mistress, Betsy Barnes^{xi} bore him ten children, who were all born in Keatchie, Louisiana: (1) Melissa "Lissy" born August 1852, partner of Napoleon McMillon, a Caucasian;^{xii} (2) William Douglas born September 1855 married #1 Emma Thomas on 26 February 1876 in DeSoto Parish and married #2 Violet King on 15 October 1908 in Caddo Parish, Louisiana;^{xiii} (3) Elizabeth "Betsy" born ca 1857 married Arch Hopkins on 31 January 1879;^{xiv} (4) Amanda born ca 1859, married Edward Ned Thomas on 9 January 1879;^{xv} (5) Priscilla "Silla" born January 1861, partner of Lunk Williams, a Caucasian overseer;^{xvi} (6) Henry born ca 1864 married Carrie Bennett; (7) Frances born ca 1866; (8) Wilburn born ca 1868, never married; (9) Charlie born January 15, 1870 married Eliza Hampton on 7 December 1892, Caddo Parish, LA; and (10) Palmyra born 22 January 1874, died 20 Feb 1952, partner of Charlie Scarborough, a Caucasian.^{xvii}

Collum died on 26 January 1881 in DeSoto Parish, Louisiana.^{xviii} William died about 1900 in Keatchie, Louisiana. According to the Barnes' family oral history, William is buried in the Confederate Cemetery, Keatchie, Louisiana. Betsy Barnes, whose headstone reads, "Bessie Barnes," died on 11 March 1913. She is buried at the Good Hope Baptist Church Cemetery, Keatchie, Louisiana, beside several of her children and other relatives.

To enrich the community's productivity, the Barnes' shared their skills, political support, and professional labor to develop the farming area of the northwest corner of DeSoto Parish, which is Ward One in Keatchie, Louisiana. To earn a living, Barnes' descendents were great farmers who produced cotton for clothes, dairy products, raised poultry, nurtured fruit orchards, and maintained a "truck patch"^{xix} to produce food for their table.

Each member of the family labored for a better life, spiritually and economically. Each desired an education. With these purposes in mind, they built churches and schools in a five-mile area of DeSoto Parish. They dug wells for water, built and repaired chimneys for comfort and as exchange labor. A written record of the ox teams they used to carry heavy loads such as steam boilers for the sawmill does not exist. To receive a decent price for their labor, they transported bales of cotton from Keatchie, Louisiana, to the Shreveport market. With their hands, the Barnes' families laid a portion of the Texas

Pacific Railroad from New Orleans to Shreveport, Louisiana. They also used their skills in exchange labor such as plowing fields, chopping cotton, roofing houses and barns, and building pasture fences.

Each season of the year had its "time." Spring was time for planting the garden truck patches, the fields of corn, cotton, peanuts, potatoes, sugar cane, and sorghum for syrup. Summertime they repaired fences and roofs, cut hay for livestock, preserved and canned vegetables and fruits. Fall was when they harvested and cut firewood. During the winter, the Barnes' women quilted while their men prepared the hogs and cows for slaughter. They smoked, salted, pickled, and dried meat from the cows and the hogs to preserve it.

There was never a dull moment. Family members always read the "Daily Bible" from the Ladies Birthday Almanac. They told fables, jokes and riddles. They read books. The Barnes' children played sandlot baseball, jumped rope, played rings, and had sing-alongs. They observed the holidays of Easter, 19th of June (or Juneteenth), July 4th, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

The Barnes' families always gathered for a picnic on the 19th of June. They barbecued a hog and ate homemade ice cream from a crank-styled ice cream maker. They reveled in fun activities and drank barrels of lemonade.

There was moonlight cotton picking. Each farmer had a night to pick cotton by the light of the moon. There was food, too. They had a pot of beans, peach cobbler, barbecued hog, goat, or beef, lemonade, a tub of cold beer, and hot water corn bread. They ate and picked cotton by the bales. The cotton was carried to the gin and baled for the market. Enough cotton was taken from each bale to make quilts, pillows, and mattresses. At one time, a bale of cotton sold for five cents a pound.

The Barnes' roots stem from the auction block in slavery time to the 6th generation today. Born in the very poor Parish of DeSoto in Louisiana, they had limited education, poor housing, and an income only from the produce of their farms. Each member gained enough energy and knowledge to put food on the table, make clothes to wear, build a comfortable house with a wood stove, a coal oil lamp, a pit outhouse, and used number three tubs for washing and bathing. They grew enough vegetables and prepared a variety of meat to never be hungry.

Some of the strong characteristics of the Barnes's descendents--strong bodies, brains and courage--enabled them to become self-made brakemen, section farmers, lawyers, doctors, veterinarians, teachers, mayors, and political representatives, to just name a few. They had the will power to strive for what they desired until they reached their goals.

The six generations of Barnes' descendents have established the Barnes' legacy, which they enjoy today.

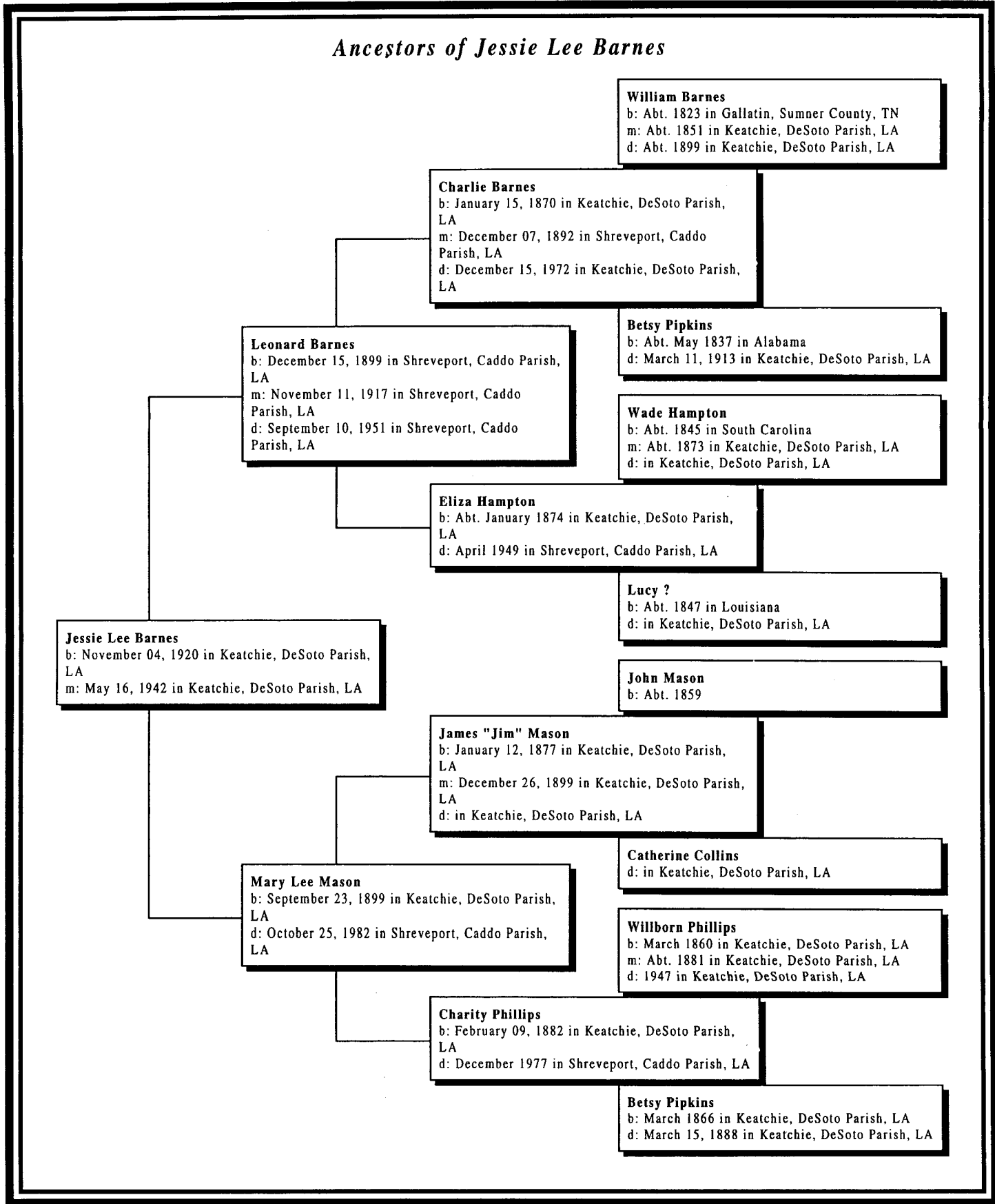

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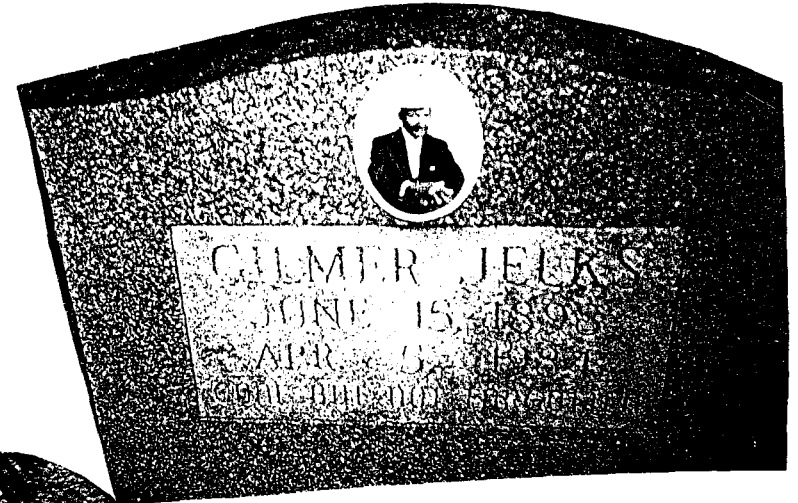

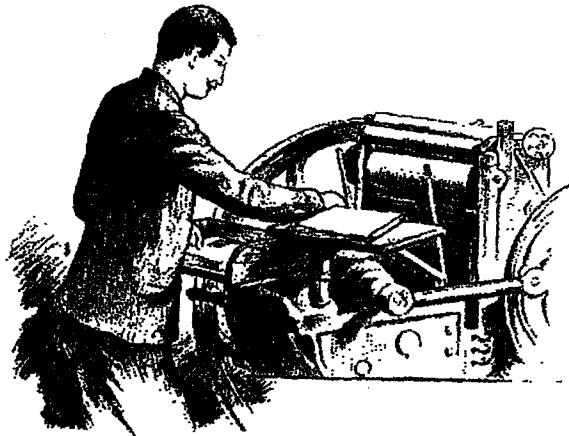

On *Buggy Books*

The Library of Congress actually "cooks" any books they suspect of containing silverfish, lice, or cockroaches. They place the book in a microwave oven and "cook" it for 60 seconds on "warm" or "low" setting. The heat kills all insects and any eggs. Use this method at home to ensure a book from the flea market, garage sale, attic or basement is insect free.



Helpful Hint from the Librarian on **Stinky Books**

"Musty" and "Smelly" books can sometimes be made less odiferous by standing the book on end and just opening the pages and fanning them out so that air can circulate. You can also try placing the book in a paper grocery bag with crumpled newspapers inside, the newsprint will help absorb the odor (close the bag tightly and change the newspapers every 5-7 days). You can also try using some of the clothes dryer static sheets placed within the pages of the book, these will at least cover up the smell and will aid in removing that smell. No method is quick and easy, they all take t-i-m-e.
