Background

- +/ Many settlers of different national backgrounds made homes in present-day Louisiana
 - 4 In/colonial Louisiana often decades before the Louisiana Purchase (1803)
 - + In Orleans Territory (1803-1812)
 - + In the state of Louisiana (1812-)
- + In 1803 the <u>U. S. Government put ALL of Louisiana Purchase into its "public domain,"</u> which forced <u>ALL</u> prior settlers wishing to hold onto their improvements to prove their British, French, Spanish, and Indian claims and seek confirmation of title from Congress. Some of these **private claims** took *decades* to settle, a few exceeding 100 years. In addition, lands acquired by the State and selected businesses (e.g, railroads) had to first be selected, then approved by the U. S. government, thus severing these lands from the U. S. public domain.
- + Four major problems added to the discord
 - + Extensive delays in surveying complex terrain & approving the surveys, then offering lands for sale to the public.
 - + <u>Boundary disputes</u> with Spanish authorities (yes, Spanish) for years after the Louisiana Purchase.
 - + Settlers' reluctance to appear before federal officials to press their claims in the legally allowed time period.
 - + <u>Squatters on unsurveyed lands</u>, which they would have to vacate once the lands were surveyed, *unless* Congress gave them preference over other bidders. This process took years, sometimes decades.




High Level Navigation: Historical Records






Keys to Land Descriptions in Louisiana

- 4 Public Land Survey System (PLSS) is the foundation
 - + Rectilinear grid system: **36** nominally 1-square-mile **sections** of 640 acres in 1 nominally square PLSS township
 - + Used to describe all land transactions <u>other than</u> those claiming land derived from British, French, Spanish, or Indian authorities
- + Metes and Bounds
 - + Land derived from British, French, Spanish, or Indian authorities
 - + Generally associated with pre-statehood transactions and subsequent decisions involving those lands after statehood
 - + Section numbers begin at 37. These numbers signal a private land claim!!




Louisiana, 1857 Federal Land Survey Map



Local Land Offices in Louisiana



E. Wade Hone, Land and Property Research in the United States (Salt Lake City: Ancestry Inc., 1997), 367-371.

- + Treat local land offices as you would counties and parishes over time:
 - + Formation dates
 - + Jurisdiction line changes
 - + Closure dates
- + However, township formations and locations generally remained **fixed** relative to one of two meridians (Louisiana or St. Helena) and baseline (31st Parallel).
- + Bottom line: more than one land office may have handled an ancestor's land acquisition over time.


- + Based in **New Orleans**
- + 1 Régister appointed by President
- 4 2 Appointees
- + Adjudicated title claims and made subsequent recommendations of confirmation to Congress
- + Lands east of Mississippi River and parishes that bordered them on its west bank

+ Western District-Board of

Commissioners

- + Based at **Opelousas**
- + Same structure and mission as above
- + All remaining lands in the territory.






Changes in 1848 [Hone, 368-9]

Changes in 1878—lasted until 1911 [Hone, 370-1]







- + Section 23: 6 entries dated in 1960s; no railroad company entry.
- + Isaac Alden entry, Lot 3, Sec 24, does not include patent info





+ "General" Land Entry Files"

- + Cash
 - + Actual Cash Purchases (once surveyed and opened to the public for sale)
 - + Pre-emption Right Claims (aka preference claims) for squatters on unsurveyed lands who improved & cultivated their land and sought to bar other bidders once the land was opened for sale
 - + 'Commuted' Homestead Claims for those who started the 7-year claim process but subsequently elected, after a minimum time period, to abort the process and pay the cash price for the land
- + Credit: installment payments spread over 4 yrs, terminated in 1820)
- + Homesteads: 3- to 5-year minimum residence & improvement requirements, & 2 years to successfully prove the claim
- + Other: Timber, Mineral, Desert Land Sales; Donations






Private Land Claim: Jeremiah Walker

- + Barred from completing his 1817 private purchase due to
 - 4 U. S.-Spanish (yes, Spanish) boundary disputes
 - + Competing Spanish headright claim
 - + *Delays* obtaining final survey
- + Claim spans **51** years, 1802-1853.
 - + Begins with another settler Thomas Smith's Spanish headright claim in **1802**, **"erased"** and then **reapplied** by Spanish authorities to another 1805 tract settled by Smith.
 - + The Spanish headright claim was unknown to Walker when he first purchased the land privately for \$1000 in **1817**, then settled there and improved it.
 - + Congress issued private act for relief to Walker in 1830, granting him **up to 640** acres for lands in his possessed location that were <u>vacant before</u> **1830.**
 - + Final survey of Walker's tract completed in **1853 (293** acres).

Chap. CLXXII.—An Act for the relief of Jeremiah Walker, of the state of Louisiana.

STATUTE I.

May 29, 1830.

Be it enacted, &c., That Jeremiah Walker be, and he is hereby, confirmed in his title to a certain tract of land, situate in the parish of East Feliciana, and state of Louisiana, lying on the Lost Fork of Thompson's Creek; it being the place first settled by Thomas Smith, and transferred by him to Sullivan, by Sullivan to White, and by White to the said Walker; containing not more than six hundred and forty acres: Provided, That this confirmation shall only operate as a relinquishment on the part of the United States only.

Land title confirmed.





Pre-emption Right Claim: James Coates, **Ouachita**, **Opelousas & Natchitoches** Land Offices

NARA land entry file, James Coates, Certificate #802, Claim of Settlement & Improvements under Act of **19 June 1834**, with patent not issued until **1848**.

- + James Coates, petition & oath, Ouachita parish, 1 September **1834**, claiming initial settlement in 1833 in NE4, Section 6, T19N-R13W.
- ★ Witness affidavit & deposition, Reuben Wingate, 17 Sept. **1837**. [<u>Unusual time gap</u>]
- + Character affidavit for Coates by J. Cable, P. A. Morse, **Henry M. Shreve**, & B. B. Breazeale, 14 December **1837**, noting Coates was a resident of Claiborne Parish.
- + Character affidavit for Wingate by Ph. Judge S. P. Jenkins, Caddo Ph., 22 February **1838**.
- + Final Certificate #802, James Coates, 23 May **1839**, Natchitoches Land Office. James states he is of Claiborne Parish.
- + GLO Commissioner's letters to Register & Receiver, suspending claim on 14 March 1840 & noting on 18 September 1841 that claim was held for not specifically proving that cultivation occurred in 1833, as required by the act. [These letters are not in the land entry file but are referenced on the claim jacket in the file.]





- +Coates claims that he **cultivated** his preemption claim in **1833** and 1834, 160 superficial acres situated on the **west bank of the Red River** "about **80 miles by land above the Town of Natchitoches**, bounded on all sides by vacant lands" and that he was in possession thereof on 19 June 1834.
- +Cites his age as 45 or 50, married with children, and that he had a "dwelling house, kitchen, corn crib, meat house, and negro cabin and made small crop of corn, potatoes, vegetable etc."

This and the next two documents probably were addressed to the **Opelousas Land Office**, and <u>they were not in the federal GLO's land entry file</u>. It is possible that these items had not been transferred to the Natchitoches Land Office when it opened in 1838. Had they been, would the GLO Commissioner *not* have suspended the Coates' preemption claim in March 1840?





That said Coates has a wife and five or six children and several slaves and has a stock of cattle and has made his living chiefly by trading."

Conclusions

- #Many settlers made homes in present-day Louisiana before and after it became a Territory and then a State.
- +While some records were created before, at, or soon after a first settlement, many others were triggered years or decades later, & many were affected by federal & state land policies and laws.
- +Research of your earliest ancestors in Orleans Territory and State of Louisiana should not be considered reasonably exhaustive without consulting the historical documents housed in Louisiana's **Office of State Lands**.
